VFW sponsors Memorial Day service

A free breakfast is just one of the many activities the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 6797 is planning as part of this year's Memorial Day observance. Along with the meal to start the day, the VFW will be placing American flags on the graves of veterans buried at Post's Terrace Cemetery.

The activities start at 7 a.m. Monday morning, May 30 at the VFW Hall east of Post on the Clairmont Highway with the breakfast. The meal is expected to conclude at 8:30. Also, during this time, Boys Scouts from the local troop will be placing the American flags at the cemetery in preparation for the 10 a.m. memorial service.

The service includes a seven man rifle team from the National Guard Armory in Lubbock who will do the actual raising of the American flag. Local preacher Paul D. Jones from the Church of Christ will lead the Pledge of Allegiance followed by the invocation and a short message.

Tentative keynote speaker is Lt. Col. Tom Yowell from Lubbock. Col. Yowell is a lifetime VFW member and a combat veteran.

To conclude the service, the seven man rifle team will give a 21 gun salute to fallen veterans followed by a two person team playing Taps.

"We want to have a really nice service this year," said J.W. Jolly III, spokesman for the VFW.

Jolly added that "if we miss a vet's grave, any family member can approach a VFW member and we will get a flag put out there."

All flags will be picked up shortly before sunset Monday.

Workers tackle theater renovation

With most of the paperwork out of the way, the actual physical work has begun on renovating the Tower Theater. The historic building located at the west end of Post's central business district is receiving the once-over as workers remove years of clutter and debris.

The work on the Tower is the result of the city's efforts to find a tenant to use the building. Two groups (Cecil Caldwell and the Caprock Cultural Association) presented the Post City Council with proposals for the historic building, the first coming late in 1993 and second coming the first week in January. The city opted for Caldwell's offer over that of the CCA.

Caldwell plans to present live performance musicals at the theater every Saturday night. The entertainment will be along the "Medicine Show" format Caldwell has made famous with local audiences.

Along with the renovation work, an organizational meeting was held May 19 to elect a governing board to oversee the operation of the Tower. Elected were Victor Ashley, Giles McCrary, A.C. Cash, Jim Plummer and Wanda Mitchell.

A spokesman for Caldwell says project managers hope to have the work completed soon and have projected an opening date somewhere between 30 and 60 days.

Caldwell and Holly Robertson met with the Post group recently to discuss talent arrangements for "The Medicine Show". The projected entertainment will be a country variety show that will appeal to the entire family. Show dates and other details are still on the table with a schedule expected to be announced soon.

"This is another first for Post and a very exciting one," said Caldwell's spokesman.

Schools back summer lunch program

It's tough to have fun when you're hungry! This summer being hungry shouldn't be a problem for many local youth thanks to a government program. The program is providing free nutritious meals to eligible children 18 years of age and under.

The Post Independent School District is participating in the Summer Food Service Program.

The program will provide a free snack and lunch to all children age 18 and younger. The meals provide essential nutrients for active, growing kids.

To participate in the free meals program, a child needs only to show up at the Post school cafeteria. The snack will be served from 9:30 a.m. until 10 a.m.

Lunch will be served from 11:30 a.m. until 12:30 p.m.

Children seeking the meals do not need to provide proof of income. Also, they don't need to register and there will be no meal tickets.

The summer food program will begin Monday, June 6 and continue until Friday, July 15. The meals will be served every weekday with one exception. Monday, July 4 will be considered a holiday.

Ortiz figures all the hours of non-paid service to the county and the long drives from his home in Lamesa worth it. He is doing a job he loves.

"I figured if I finally wanted to get on here, this was something I needed to do," said Ortiz of his volunteer service. "I enjoyed it, otherwise I would have just come over for the required 20 hours a month."

Ortiz put in more than 20 hours per month, much more. A welder by trade, Ortiz was able to pursue a career in law enforcement after his business in Lamesa became a victim of a Conoco oil lease sale.

County ADA survey reveals problem areas

County buildings provide only limited access to individuals under the strict Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). This according to a survey completed by Linda Wyatt from the Texas Department of Health. Wyatt's report was reviewed by the Garza County Commissioners during their May 23 meeting. The findings came as no surprise to the commissioners court members who have been working to bring the buildings into compliance for a number of months.

The Texas Department of Health conducted two surveys for the county, one on April 18 and the second on May 18.

Reports turned in by Wyatt include one for the courthouse, sheriff's office, library and Garza County Tax Appraisal office on Main Street. The lengthy reports included a number of small, non-costly corrections the county could easily make to eliminate some non-compliance areas.

"There are numerous small and inexpensive areas to work on that would require only our labor," said Garza County director Donald Windham.

Many of the changes call for signs, special tape, securing floor coverings and other such similar items.

The survey also listed many, "big ticket" items such as widening door ways, lowering drinking fountains, changing plumbing, counters and other such changes to the actual structure of county buildings.

The county had attempted to address the ADA requirements last year with a bond vote on constructing a new courthouse. The measure was handily defeated by county voters.

The county approved a \$500 amendment to the Extension office travel budget. County Agent John Senter had requested additional funds of \$1,000 to keep his travel budget from being depleted. He explained that 4-H youth traveling to four major stock shows this spring instead of one was the cause of the shortfall.

Commissioners approved the purchase of a new commercial weed eater for the community service program. Cost of the tool was \$330.

The commissioners requested the probation department obtain additional bids on a new phone system for the department. Department head Carmen Lopez had requested the commissioners use available grant money to purchase a new \$1,331 system that would have expanded the office's available lines from one to three. She explained that heavy usage of her office's phones by several law agencies including the district attorney and district judge resulted in numerous long waits by individuals calling in and out of the office.

The halter class show was judged by Kimberly Glass, a member of the Texas Tech Horse Judging team. Glenna Reiter filled in as superintendent of the show.

Horns end 'Lopes season

Fueled by a first inning three run rally, the Post Bold Gold 'Lopes had high hopes of gaining their first-ever bi-district playoff win. The 'Lopes were turned back by Lockney as the Longhorns rallied for a 6-3 bi-district win. The game was played May 19 at Estacado High School in Lubbock.

The Post Antelopes jumped all over Lockney ace Leo Vargas for three runs on just three hits in the first to take the early lead. The 'Lopes threatened several more times, loading the bases once and leaving men on second third only to be turned away by Vargas and the Longhorns.

Winners of eight straight, the Antelopes jumped on Lockney early as lead-off batter Pete Torres slapped a Vargas pitch to left field for a game opening double. Bodie Simpson was walked before Raymond Garza singled home Torres. Post starting pitcher Phil Leininger then singled to score both Simpson and Garza for the 'Lopes early lead.

From there, Vargas shut the door on the 'Lopes, holding them to a single hit the rest of the way.

Leininger looked sharp in the early going, striking out seven Horns and walking only one. Lockney got to the Post senior for one run in the bottom of the third. The wheels came off the Post playoff wagon in the fifth as the Longhorns scored five runs, including a two run shot over the right center field fence by Lockney's Jared Mosley.

Bodie Simpson relieved Leininger, pitching one inning of perfect ball in the sixth.

"We had some pretty long faces on the bus back," said Post head coach Fred Postell.

The loss ended the 'Lopes season at 14-6. Post earned the District 4-2A title with a perfect 6-0 record. The 'Lopes were 8-5 in non-district contests, including an 11-1 win over Lockney in Post.

Radishes, Roots & Rosebuds

Once again, I want to congratulate all the students who were presented awards and scholarships last week. I can't tell you how impressed I am. It is obvious that Daisy Breedlove has done her homework in researching grants and scholarships for these graduating seniors. I know the students and the parents are especially appreciative.



This brings me to a very important subject...money. Are you parents worried about the saving and spending patterns of your children? I'm sure you realize that their spending is important to your present financial condition and to their future financial condition. A typical teenager spends several thousand dollars a year, mainly on cars, clothes, food, and entertainment. This amount to nearly \$80 billion annually nationwide according to the Consumer Federation of America.

Before these young people leave home they need to know some important consumer skills. They need to know the importance of saving, and the dangers of spending more than their income. If they can develop and adhere to a budget this will help to save and avoid debt. General shopping strategies, like buying what you need, comparing quality and price, and learning how to negotiate for products and services will help them stick to a budget. The Consumer Reports magazine is a good information source especially when you are about to make a major purchase. One of the most important things that my mother told me regarding finances was to "sleep on it", before I purchased anything over \$25. Today, however,

with inflation, they say \$50.

I've mentioned the new food labels before, but wanted to remind those of you who had given up trying to understand the contents of food, to try reading them again. The label is expanded and the fat content is illustrated in detail. It gives the calories from fat in a single serving of the product. The change I like as much as anything is that a "serving size" is more consistent and more accurately reflects the amount of food I eat! According to a 1995 Calorie Control Council survey, 62 percent of adults say they always try to check nutrition labels of foods to determine the fat content (57 percent also check for calories). Remember, for healthy eating the target is to limit dietary fat to 30 percent of calories.

"We buy the badge, but the county still owns it so when they quit, we get the badge back," said Herridge.

The officers are required to purchase their own guns, uniforms and leather (holster etc.)

"We won't let them work in civilian clothes," said Herridge.

Herridge said the public has a hard time understanding why anyone would be willing to do the job asked of the volunteer officers. He explained they do it for the experience.

All of the "reserves" are fully certified peace officers and are classified as full non-paid deputies.

Herridge explained that Garza County Sheriff Kenny Ratke carries the officers as un-paid deputies to help them with their certification and experience that counts if and when they join a force as a paid officer.

The "reserves" are usually paired with a "paid" deputy while on patrol. Ratke also uses his volunteer force to help cut overtime expenses and Herridge says "they come in real handy when we are asked to provide security officers for various events."

He added that with the reserves, the department is able to use them for

security details instead of pulling an officer off of patrol.

Reserves are double trained in dispatch and patrol duties and are able to fill in where and when needed.

"They fill in where ever we need them," said Herridge. "They don't gripe, they just do it."

The officers are usually the first in line to step into a job opening within the department. Memo Ortiz followed this route to becoming a full-time deputy.

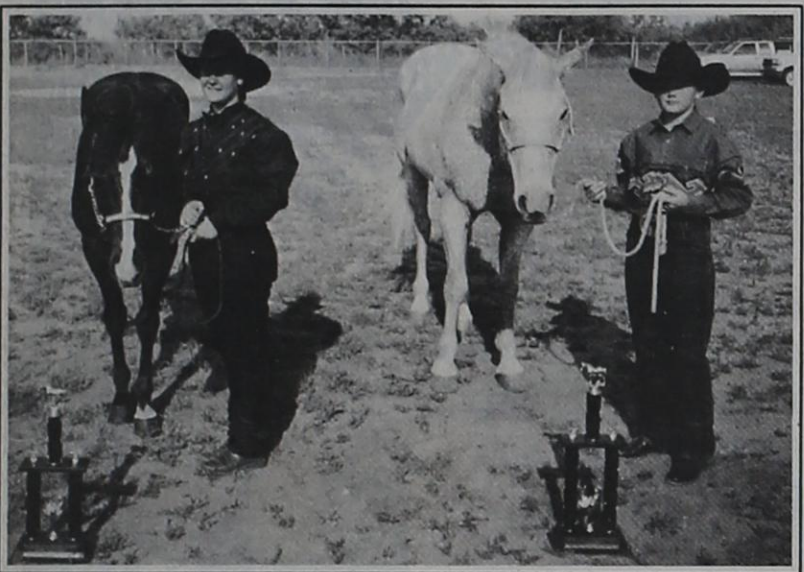

From the Pulpit Bible Study #3

Mastering the Bible one book at a time is like putting together a puzzle. We can connect the pieces together and get the whole picture of God at work in the world. We hope you will study the Bible book by book.

Consider studying Bible characters. Much can be learned by studying people. It helps us see that just knowing truth is not enough. We must strive to live that truth.

Consider King Saul. Chosen by Jehovah to be king, he could have been a great leader of God's people. He was ok with God until he decided to do things his way in opposition to God. By his refusal to obey God, he showed his lack of character and as a result, was rejected as king.

1 Samuel 16:14 says that the Spirit of the Lord departed from Saul and an evil spirit was sent to terrorize him. In 18:12, we see it again. He was chosen leader of God's people, but refused God's leading. In time, Saul promoted David to the leadership position of his army. After a particular battle, the women were singing that Saul killed his thousands and David his ten thousands. In 18:9, we read that from that day, Saul looked at David with suspicion. He was eaten up with envy. He was consumed by bitterness.

When we read the life of Saul, we see how ungodliness takes over a life. The roots of the bad attitude must be rooted out. His problem was a problem of repentance. It is true that he confessed his sin to Samuel, but a look at his life shows that his confession didn't change him. He didn't obey God and didn't like it when one who was obedient was accepted by God.

He began having a problem with jealousy. We can read his life story from that point and see that it was all down hill.

An application for us...be careful of our attitudes. One that is led by God's Spirit is characterized by the fruits in life. Galatians 5:22 gives us the fruit. Joy, peace, love, kindness, gentleness & etc. One who claims to be a child of God, but doesn't possess these fruits, is like Saul. Ephesians 4:32 gives another thought on it. Put away bitterness, etc. WHY? Those are not Christian attitudes.

The proof is in the pudding, so to speak. It is easy to see if we are following in Saul's footsteps. What is our attitude? If we are angry, hateful, bitter and unloving persons, all of our claims to live the Lord are meaningless. We have allowed an evil spirit to rule us and we are becoming more like Saul. We are responsible for our attitude. No one makes us bitter. We do that ourselves.

Do we find ourselves becoming more like Jesus? Or like Saul? We see ourselves when we study Bible characters.
