C.W. Post Museum to open in time for June trade days event

by Jodi Bain Many museums are usually quiet, reserved places to look at very old, expensive documents and possessions in a somewhat "handsoff" atmosphere. But, the old C.W. Post museum in the 100 block of North Ave N is reopening under a different pretense.

Director of the museum, Dianna Cordsen, stressed the museum, once it re-opens June 2, would be a "hands-on museum". The hands-on theory encourages visitors to become "touch oriented with some of the items in the

The museum is divided into several rooms, the first of which includes a prehistoric dinosaur bone collection. While many of the prehistoric bones are not to be touched, a sample of the density of the dinosaur bone is available

for guests to pick up. This hands-on view of the museum directly correlates to one of the main goals of the museum "to include the community and tourists. Everyone who lives in or has lived in Garza County helped make it what it is today," Cordsen said.

The re-opening of the museum later this week has been in the dreams of since last July. "Several people were interested in getting the museum open," said Cordsen.

JoAnn Mock, executive director of the Caprock Cultural Association, (CCA) said the CCA was approached by many of the former members of the museum board to re-open the museum. After taking on the colossal task "we began to format a plan. We presented our ideas to the County Commissioners for all the necessary approvals. The museum was greatly missed."

When I was in the eighth grade my English teacher required us to do a project on freedom. We were to express what freedom meant to us in a fashion of our own choosing. I never will forget some of the pictures and papers that were presented. Most were pictures of animals in fields, people fishing, and one of several balloons in flight. Those who chose pen and paper to express their concept of freedom wrote about a lifestyle where they could do as they pleased. They would eat, drink and be merry in their

ideal world of freedom. I decided to reveal my idea of freedom in a collage. I took several magazines and some Marine Corp publications and begin to cut our pictures of soldiers fighting, bleeding, and dying. Pictures of men holding comrades in their arms with distorted faces and missing limbs. Pictures of women weeping while clinging to our flag all folded in the shape of a triangle. Pictures of caskets draped in old glory surrounded by men who

knew what freedom meant. When it was my turn to present my project I was shaking like a leaf. All I managed to get out was "without the shedding of blood there is no freedom." My English teacher cried and gave me the only "A" she would ever give me.

years since I sat in that English class and I am still learning the truth that was implanted in me that day. I am still learning that it takes the shedding of blood to bring true freedom.

I am still piecing Mike Butts collages together in my mind. Images

of a man struggling, bleeding, and dying. Images of men and women weeping as they look on. Images of a tomb draped in Glory. Images that portray the high price of freedom. As I look on I hear the words, "without the shedding of blood there is no freedom." shedding of blood there is no freedom."

I have come to realize how true those words are in my own life. I came to the place where I realized that I was enslaved by sin. I needed someone to come pay that high price of freedom in order that I might live in peace with God. As I looked on I saw the bravest of souls, Jesus Christ, shedding his blood that I might be free from sin. Now I truly know what freedom is. It is being forgiven of all my sins because Jesus was willing to shed His blood


