## CCA to host regional Texas Arts Council conference

The Caprock Cultural Association will host one of ten regional meetings of the Texas Arts Council in Post this summer. The Texas Arts Council will convene one of the organizations regional gatherings Wednesday, June 29 at the Hotel Garza. The meetings get underway at 1 p.m. and conclude at 6 p.m. that evening.

"With everything that has been going on with the arts in Post we felt like it would be great to have this meeting there," said Peter Fox, president of the Texas Arts Council.

The Texas Arts Council is a statewide arts service provider. Its primary constituency are local arts agencies

whose programs involve two or more of the various arts disciplines. The Texas Arts Council strives to educate, promote, develop and support multi-discipline community arts agencies and arts programs throughout Texas in cooperation with local, state and federal entities. The Council works to foster a climate in Texas communities in which the arts can flourish.

The regional meeting will focus on issues facing all arts organizations today. Topics for discussion will include: Government regulations for local arts agencies and non-profits; A section dedicated to networking among these groups entitled "No Problems,

Only Solutions," where participants share the challenges they have encountered, along with creative solutions; A discussion of the educational reforms and the effect they will have on arts-in-education; A legislative focus where arts organizations can dialogue with elected

officials and state representatives; A discussion that will center around funding for the arts from governmental sources, corporations and foundations and ways that arts organizations can effect this funding.

The Texas Accountants and Lawyers for the Arts are partnering with the

Texas Arts Council to identify speakers for the meetings. Jim Bob McMillan, Local Arts Agency Specialist for the Texas Arts Council will facilitate all meetings.

Participants will be encouraged to take part in discussions and are asked to bring examples of printed materials, membership brochures, flyers, newsletters, publications, photographs and samples of news coverage and promotional materials for the networking session.

The Texas Arts Council will convene 10 regional meetings across the state in 1994. Meeting locations in addition to Post include: Texarkana, Irving,

Temple, Crockett, Houston, Victoria, Big Spring, El Paso and San Antonio. Local arts agencies, such as the Caprock Cultural Association, in each community will host the meetings. They will present unique activities and provide special incentives for participants.

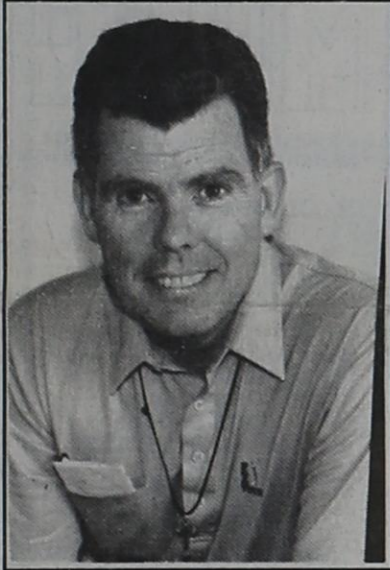

## Group plans mission west of Post

A Dallas based group calling themselves Gospa's Children is in the process of building a mission approximately seven miles west of Post just off of U.S. 380. When finished, the facility will house the elderly and handicapped.

The group is currently bringing in mobile homes during the first phase of the project that will eventually be home

to close to 100 people.

"We will have less than 10 people in this first stage," said Tom Hurley, spokesman and one of the group's founders. "When we have it all built up, we hope to have as many as 100."

When "it" is built up, Hurley said the facility will include an adobe mission that will use native materials from the area.

"We're still drawing plans up for the adobe structure," said Hurley. "We hope to start building on it in late June or July."

He did ask for any local residents who know anything about adobe and who would want to help to contact the group at the mission site.

"We hope to employ a number of people to help us build the mission," said Hurley. "Particularly anyone who has any experience with adobe."

The mission chapel will be the first adobe construction undertaken said Hurley.

Plans and dreams of the group eventually call for residents of the mission to raise some of their own food on the 82 acre parcel of land they purchased west of Post.

Hurley said the people and land of West Texas appealed to the group as they looked for a location for their mission. With a general area in mind, the group headed west and their search brought them to Post.

"We found the people of West Texas to be very friendly and accepting, even of strangers in their midst," explained Hurley.

He added that they believe the people of West Texas judge people by their fruit, not on pre-conceived ideas.

The Post site appealed to the group because of its location and resources that were available.

"We're told the site is one of the best in the country," said Hurley. "We like the idea of living on the Caprock, it cools down at night and it's not too hot."

The land has three producing water wells that the group plans to use in its food production venture.

Physical help and assistance is not the only purpose of the mission west of Post. Hurley said members of the mission will also "spiritually adopt" children. The children are kept with their families while God parents at the mission pray for the child. Hurley said

## Rescue squad frees trapped motorist

Two Brownfield men escaped serious injury in a one vehicle roll-over accident west of Post.

The two men were southbound on U.S. Highway 84 early Monday morning, June 6 when the driver lost control of the 1981 red Ford pickup near the city limits sign on 84 just west of Post. The vehicle apparently fishtailed several times before rolling once and coming to rest on its side, driver's door down.

The passenger escaped without injury during the 1:30 a.m. accident. The driver, despite having his head trapped between the door of the overturned pickup and the ground, suffered only minor injuries.

The Post EMT's and members of the Post Volunteer Firedepartment rescue team used the "Jaws of Life" and a series of cables and pulleys to pull the driver from the vehicle.

According to DPS sources, charges are pending in the accident



## Effort underway to help local cancer victim

Garza County and Post residents have a chance to help an 18 year old woman in her fight against cancer. A special fund has been established and donation jars are cropping up around town to help Heather Wulfjen in her fight against cancer. Supporters are asking for a donation and a prayer to help save Wulfjen's life.

The 1993 graduate of Post High School lost her right eye last year to Ocular Melanoma at age 17. She now suffers from liver cancer.

All available treatment has been exhausted at the M.D. Anderson Cancer Center in Houston. Wulfjen is now traveling to Japan monthly for treatment with a drug that has been very successful with liver cancer.

She is forced to make the long trip because the drug, approved in Japan, is not available in the United States. Treatment and air fair cost approximately \$16,000 per month.

## Long distance changes coming to Bell customers

Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. customers in West Texas and the Texas Panhandle will soon start including their three-digit area code when making long-distance calls within their own area codes, it was announced today.

The dialing change—which will not affect customers' rates for basic telephone service, their long-distance rates or 9-1-1 services—is a result of mandated modifications to the North American Numbering Plan which were announced last fall. The new dialing pattern will affect customers in the 806 and 915 area codes.

The plan is administered in the United States, Canada, Bermuda and parts of the Caribbean by Bell Communications Research (Bellcore). Last fall, Bellcore and Southwestern Bell announced that the changes would begin in July 1994.

Local business and residential customers are being reminded of the change again later this month and in June through letters and bill insert notices. Additional reminders will be

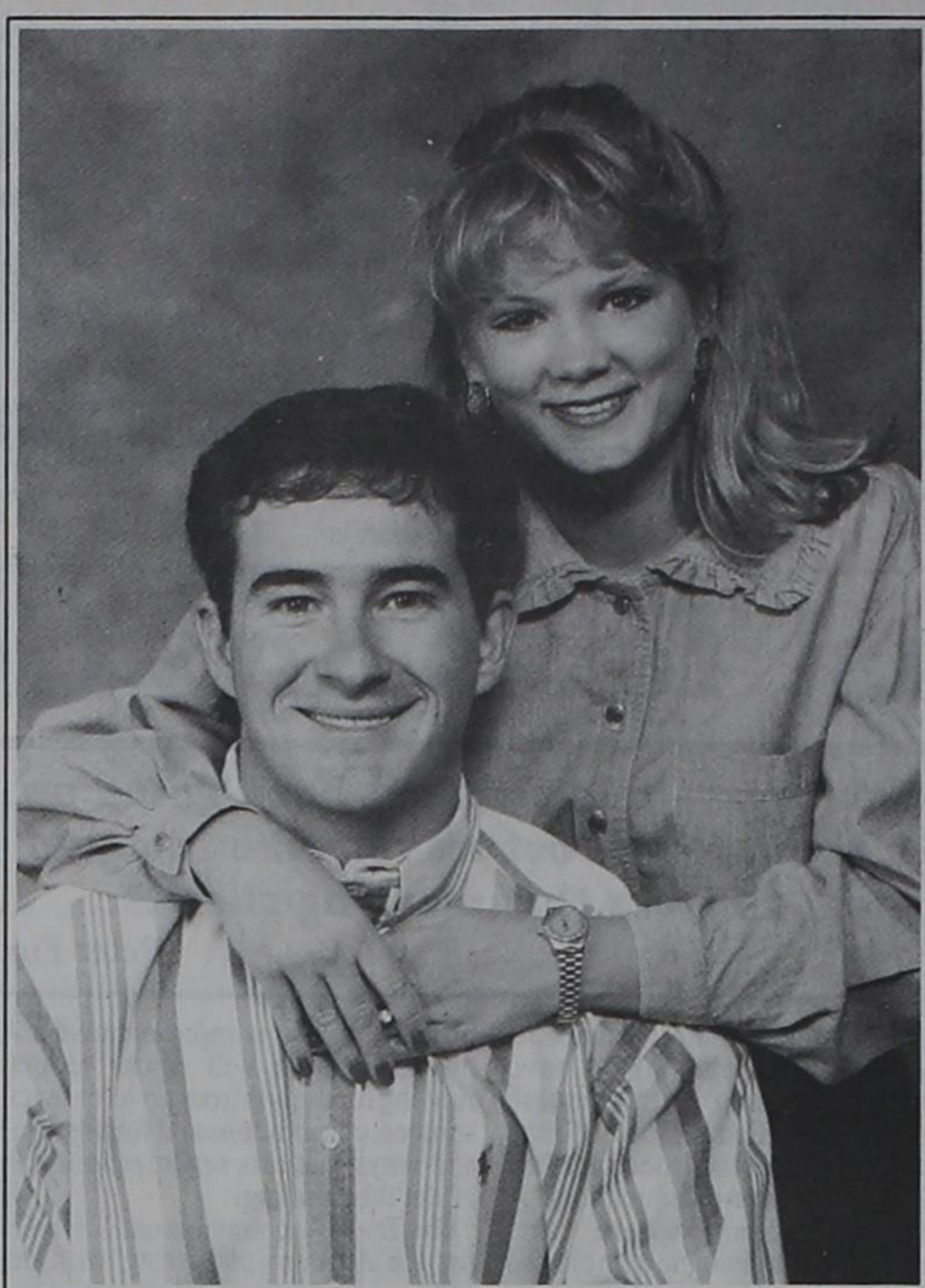

## Tax 'n Facts

### TRIMMING TAXES WHEN YOU SELL A HOUSE

Moving up from a small house to a bigger one is relatively easy, tax-wise; any gain on the first house is simply rolled over into the basis for the larger one. Capital gains taxes can be deferred for many years as long as the owners keep moving into more expensive quarters.

Comes the time when the old house is too big and the owners scale down, a tax bill will come due. There are ways to soften the blow.

To reduce the taxable net proceeds, the sellers can first factor in all the costs connected with the sale like real estate commissions, fix-up, legal and closing costs. Then add to the basis the cost of all capital improvements made to all the properties owned over the years. Be sure to document all the relevant figures.

Another way to lessen the tax due is to make substantial improvements to the new home within the first two years of the sale of the old one. That way, the improvements are incorporated into the price of the new home for tax purposes. It is allowable to file a tax return as if the new home had been bought for the total cost.

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# Living on the Edge of the Caprock

## Time to control pesky bagworms

Bagworms are one of the major pests of juniper and other trees and shrubs in Texas. Spring hatch began in early May on the South Plains this year. Hatching is usually completed in about three weeks. Insecticide control is most effective in early June when the bagworms are small.

In the spring, bagworm larvae emerge from hatching eggs inside last year's bags and begin feeding on foliage. Each bagworm begins to construct its own protective bag of silk, twigs and leaves, making them camouflaged and hard to see. As the larvae and their bags continue to grow, control becomes more difficult.

Bagworms feed throughout the summer months, building their bags until they are about one-and-a-half inches long. In the fall, the bagworms become adults, mate and the females lay eggs inside their bags. They then overwinter in these bags in the egg stage on trees and shrubs. Each overwintering female bag on a tree contains from 500 to 1,500 eggs.

Since the bagworm only completes one generation a year and spreads very

slowly from plant to plant, picking the bags off infested plants in the winter will help a lot toward controlling this pest. But if bagworms were present on plants last year and control measures weren't applied, chances are an insecticide will be needed this spring. Insecticides which can be used to control bagworms include seven, dursban, diazinon, malathion and

orthene. The biological insecticide *Bacillus thuringiensis* can also be used. To obtain effective control, thorough coverage of the foliage is important. The addition of a small amount of liquid soap or surfactant to the spray solution will improve control because it helps adhere the insecticide to treated trees and shrubs. Always read and follow label instructions when applying insecticides.

provided through newspaper ads, bill inserts and bill messages until the new dialing pattern becomes mandatory.

During the "permissive" dialing period beginning July 1, Southwestern Bell customers may start dialing their area code in long-distance calls within their area code region. Beginning January 3, 1995, customers must dial a "1" or "0" plus the area code and seven-digit number for all long-distance calls.

While the new dialing pattern is just being introduced to Southwestern Bell customers in West Texas and the Texas Panhandle, it already is in effect in more than a dozen states and major metropolitan areas including Houston, Dallas, Fort Worth, San Antonio, Austin, Waco and other Texas markets.

The numbering plan was established nearly 50 years ago by the old Bell Laboratories, and is being modified to include the numbers "2" through "9" as the middle digit in new area codes. The numeric combination enables Bellcore to create 640 more area codes, which can be assigned as needed through 2025 or beyond, and establishes billions of new phone numbers during the next 30 years.

When the system was created in 1947, it established 152 area codes that were projected to be sufficient until the year 2000. However, due to the nation's increase and shifts in population and the technological advances that have enabled the skyrocketing use of cellular phones, pagers, facsimile machines and the additional telephone lines, the system is exhausting the available supply of phone numbers.

While no new area codes are projected in the foreseeable future in West Texas and the Texas Panhandle, this new dialing pattern will enable local telephone switching devices to define the call's routing. For most residential customers, this new dialing pattern will be little more than a minor inconvenience until they become accustomed to it.

Business customers, however, must modify their private branch exchanges (PBX) or internal telephone switching systems and other equipment, such as fax machines and e-mail systems, to ensure that they can recognize and process calls under the new dialing pattern.

Plexar systems currently in use by local businesses will automatically be modified through Southwestern Bell. If they are not using a Plexar system, business customers must contact their local vendor to discuss modifying their PBX.

All customers—residential and business users—must also reprogram the phone numbers used in their Call Forwarding and Speed Dialing services to include their home area code for long-distance calls.

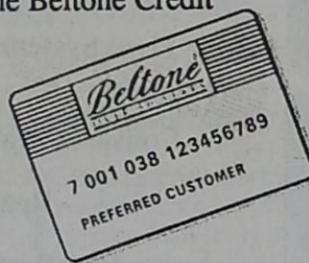

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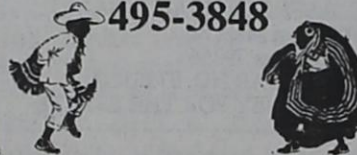

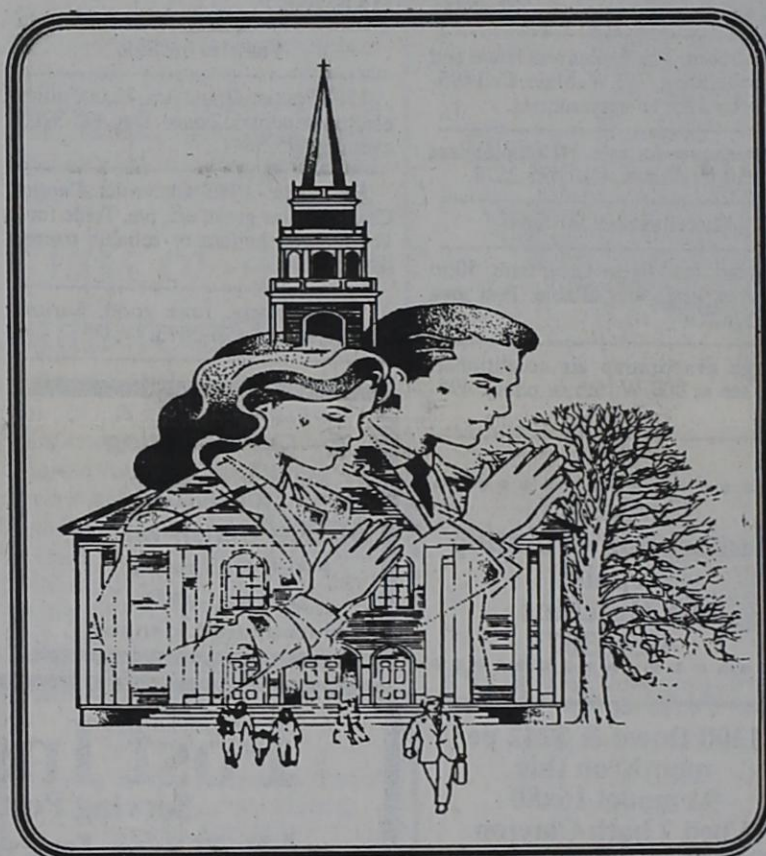
