Winners In Parmer County **Essay Contest**


Each year the Soil and Water Conservation District sponsors an essay contest relating to conservation in Parmer County.

Among the sugarbeet growers recognized at the annual banquet of the Texas-New Mexico Sugar Beet Growers Association at Hereford were several growers in Parmer County.

Members of the traditional "10,000-pound Club" for pounds of sugar produced were: Mark and Greg Howard of WDH Farms in Bovina, 11,577 pounds; Cris and Sylvia Ingram of Friona, 10,040 pounds; Richardson Seeds of Farmers Corner, 10,274 pounds; Doyle and LaDawn Schulte of Nazareth, 10,299 pounds, and David Norton of Bovina, 10,527 pounds.

Dennis Printz, Holly-Hereford's agricultural manager, also recognized the 1994 highest quality growers during the banquet. They were:

Factory northwest: Albert Meyer, 18.9 tons/acre and 16.44 per cent sugar; Factory southeast, Kenneth Taylor, 18.6 tons, 16.27 % sugar; Dawn: Marion and Suzy Hicks, 23.6 tons, 16.2 % sugar; Friona: Mike and Debra Beauchamp, 32.9 tons, 15.12 % sugar; Bovina: David Norton 38.9 tons, 14.38 per cent sugar.

Also, Farmers Corner: A.H. Brorman, 22.3 tons, 17.05% sugar; Wildorado, Mason Farm Partnership, 18.8 tons, 16.12 % sugar; Dimmitt, 6 R Land & Livestock, 28.3 tons, 16.20 % sugar; Nazareth: Steve Albracht, 21.1 tons, 16.32% sugar; Kress: Steve W. Foster, 24.8 tons, 17.06 % sugar.







GRAND CHAMPION STEER....D'Anne Jones is shown here with her steer that was named Grand Champion at the Bovina Junior Livestock Show recently.






