# City files for federal grant to replace main water lines

In the South Plains area there will be 2.6 million dollars in grants awarded sometime after the first of the year. After the papers are filed they will go before a regional review. committee and be scored. If Post scores within a certain range they will be notified of the grant. Each grant request is reviewed twice, if a request is turned down the first time they will have a second chance at the ward during the second round.

Since last weeks paper was published the City Council and the Commissioners Court have both met in regular session and have held public hearings. The main topic of discussion of both parties was attempting to adopt their annual budget. Both the city and the county have lost money from oil and gas revenues. This has put a strain on relations between the city and the

The city and the county both have to deal with the publics interest and yet balance a budget. Garza County and the city of Post have had many years without the worry of lost revenue. Last year a roll back forced them into making decisions that were not popular with many citizens. This year even more revenue has been lost and more decisions will have to be made that are

inevitably going to upset some people.

Tax increases and budget cuts are certain for both parties. For the city and the county to operate the same as last year they are almost surley going to adopt the effective tax rate. The county feels this alone will not be enough to safely operate the county as last year. 



In a midyear review of your finances, it's wise to review your debts to make sure their aftertax cost is as low as possible.

Now that personal credit costs are no longer deductible, the first place to look is at credit-card and auto loans. The smart move is to consolidate the high-interest credit card balances and pay them off with a deductible homeequity loan. Ditto the auto loan.

Review any margin loans, keeping in mind that investment interest can only be deducted up to the extent of dividends, interest and other investment income. However, as of this year, longterm capital gains are no longer considered investment income, unless you opt not to utilize the 28 percent maximum tax rate on


