

Marianne Hart of Post, met the schools criteria and was willing to accept the job as School Nurse. But Marianne's husband was a member of the School Board. Texas Nepotism laws state that a member of the School Board can not hire a member of their family to a position with-in the school while they are on the board.

To solve the entire problem, Royce Hart resigned as School Board Member, Marianne Hart was hired as school nurse and Alexa Collier was sworn in as School Board Member.

Collier is an 11 year resident of Post. She was first employed by the Post ISD as a Jr. High School Teacher in 1972. She taught school for one year before moving. Collier returned to Post in 1983 and worked full time with her husband in their oil and gas company. She returned to teach school at the Post Elementary School as a first grade teacher in 1990 and remained in that capacity until the summer of 1994.

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

TAX ANGLES ON **VACATION HOMES**

This is the season when many people decide to buy a second nome for family vacations, perhaps for rental income, too. Whether or not to buy depends on finances, family dynamics and other factors. Here are the tax angles you'll want to consider, too.

If you use the vacation home yourself for more than 14 days or less during the year, you get to deduct fully the mortgage interest and property taxes, as allowable. And if you rent out the property for 14 days or less during the year, that income is completely tax-free.

On the other hand, if you choose to maximize rental income, what you are paid is taxable, but you can deduct rental expenses: depreciation, maintenance costs, utilities, insurance and advertising. If expenses total more than rental income, you can deduct up to \$25,000 against other income, depending on your adjusted gross income. But to keep the deductions, you can't use the house yourself more than 14 days or 10 percent of the days rented, whichever

Cold weather savings

Cold weather brings on higher suggestions from the Texas Agriculture electrical and utility bills. 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

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
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"Our reserve deputies are not paid at all for the time they put in for the department," Sheriff Ken Ratke said. "It is strictly up to the Commissioners Court to either pay or not pay reserve deputies and ours are not."

According to Ratke, the Garza County reserve deputies put in a lot of time. "Each reserve deputy is required to put in 20 hours a month, but most of ours put in more than that. I figure our reserve folks put in somewhere between 3500 and 4000 hours a year for the department." That's a lot of hours for six volunteers with the same obligations as the rest of us.

Ratke explained that although there are actually 8 reserve deputies with the department, two of them, Sandy Lamb and Ramon Holquin are both paid dispatchers and listed as such on the department rolls.

Lieutenant J.W. Jolly, III, of the Garza County Sheriff's Department explained further, "Actually, all our 'reserve' deputies are not listed on the rolls as reserve deputies at all. They are listed as un-paid deputies, because all of them are sworn deputies, and qualified to become paid deputies with any department at any time.

A true reserve deputy is not."
So, why are these folks doing what they do? According to Ratke, the answer is knowledge. "These folks are patriotic, self motivators. They aren't in this to make a name for themselves. They are starving for knowledge.'

Ratke says that the Garza County Sheriff's Department is just the place to find it. "Our situation is very unique here," he said. "We don't have a police department, and we're a little bit isolated. So, they have the opportunity here to learn a wide variety of things-ethics, policy and procedure, methodology, interviewing techniques, investigation techniques you name it, and if it has to do with law enforcement, they have can learn it with us."

The reserve deputies in this county must believe that their job is a worthwhile one, because it isn't an easy job to come by. "There was a time, a lot of years ago, that it was mostly a matter of 'knowing' someone to become a reserve deputy, but that's not the case any more at all," Ratke said.

In Garza County, all the reserve deputies are required to go through a regular Peace Officer Course, rather than the Reserve Officer's Course. This is why they are not carried as reserve officer's on the roll.

"First, they have to have a sponsor to be accepted into the course," Ratke said. "That doesn't mean that the sponsor has guaranteed them a job when they get out, though. There are a lot of course graduates looking for jobs, and many reserve deputies want to become full time deputies, or to work for some other law enforcement agency full time. With the exception of one, all of our reserve deputies want to go full time with some law enforcement agency."

Having a sponsor is only the beginning. Next, the applicant must pass an entrance examination. They must also undergo a detailed background investigation and credit check. Then comes school - six hundred hours of very intense train-

ing, according to Ratke. Once they have completed the course and passed a difficult final examination, they still have to take and pass – the State Examination. Providing an applicant survives all

this, they can start looking for a job. "Before a deputy can go to work for us, or another sheriff's office, they must have both a medical and a psychological work-up," Ratke explained. "Just like with the Academy, the reserve folks pay for this themselves if they are going to work for us. They also pay for their own bond, their own uniforms and equipment, and their own weapon. By the time one of these folks actually hits the streets, they are out of pocket around \$2,500.

According to Jolly, the cost is about to go up. "The next class that goes through the Academy will have to buy uniforms specifically for the course. They haven't had to do that in the past.'

Once a deputy starts to work with the department, the real training begins. First, they must work 40 hours dispatching. "This gives them a real overview of things, plus it makes them more versatile," Ratke said. "In a department this small, everybody needs to be able to fill in for everybody else to a certain extent."

Every reserve deputy must work for six months with a paid deputy before they are qualified to work alone. That is at least 120 hours of one on one training! "At that point, I am willing to turn them loose with no hesitation," Ratke said.

"Our reserve deputies are more than qualified to do the job," Ratke continued. "Three of our reserve deputies have Associates Degrees, (two of those in Law Enforcement), one has a four year degree in Law Enforcement and another is a full time student at Texas Tech working on his four year Law Enforcement degree. Another, Bobby Dean, has over 10 years experience as a full time officer, both with the old Post Police Department and with the

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Sheriff's Department. When we have a full time paid position open up, these are the folks we want to choose from. We trained them, and we know they are good.

According to Ratke, the reserve program in Garza County has benefited the department, as well as the citizens, in a number of ways. "Reserve Deputies, (along with working supervisors and the officer working with the department on a grant), have brought the loss recovery rate on thefts up over 20% in the last two years," Ratke explained. "This is due at least to a large degree to the Reserve Deputies, Having them has allowed us to follow-up immediately and personally, as opposed to by phone, on burglaries and thefts. By having these folks, we are able to cut guys loose to investigate these crimes."

The use of Reserve Deputies has also greatly reduced the overtime within the department, there by reducing the cost to the taxpayers. "We rely very heavily on these officers," Ratke said.

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



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

The winner of Friday night's game will go on to play the winner of the game between Stratford, the district 1 AA first place team, and Memphis, the runner up team in district 2 AA.

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

Eagerly waiting C.S. Lewis tells about a lady

who found herself in hell. She angrily complained, "What am I doing here! I spent all my life doing

"Yes," the devil laughed, "but you didn't enjoy it."

"What!" replied the lady. "If I had known that I had to enjoy it, I wouldn't have wasted all that time being good!"

You can tell what humans really enjoy by what they eagerly wait for. Children eagerly wait for Christmas presents. Teenagers wait for their first car. Parents wait for a dream house, a hoped for vacation - or perhaps for their children to grow

We are always dreaming and waiting for something. One writer said that "the houses and mansions that people dream of are eventually those in which they dwell." Well, maybe not for all of us, but some of our dreams do come true. Unfortunately, dreams in this life never quite measure up to what we had hoped. The new car gets its first dent, the dream house looses its roof to a hail storm, and the "true love" of romance fades into resentment.

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
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
