Republicans dominate the election returns in Texas

Tuesday, November 8 was election day. General Elections were held for State and County officials. The only two elected officials who won office on a state level that did not win a majority of votes on a local level were Railroad Commissioner Charles R. Drugs in Garza County no laughing matter, Sheriff's Department stays on the job



PUT OFF THE WEDDING

When love and romance run into tax penalties, something has to give. And a winter wedding may be even happier if it's after the new year instead of before, assuming both partners work. Here's why. More than half of all married

couples in the U.S. are affected by the so-called "marriage penalty" when joining incomes bump them into a higher tax bracket. For instance, single taxpayers pay 15 percent of the first \$22,750 of income; thus two singles pay 15 percent of \$45,500. But once they marry, they pay 15 percent of the first \$38,000, and everything over that is taxed at 28 percent.

There are exceptions, of course. If one partner has significantly more income than the other, it's more advantageous to be married earlier. If that \$45,500 total breaks down as \$44,000 for one partner and \$1,500 for the other, being married lowers the tax bill. Instead of paying 15 percent on the first \$24,250 and 28 percent on \$21,250, the couple pays 15 percent on the first \$38,000, and 28 percent on \$7,500.

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



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Gardening in Garza "Our Special World"

Potted Bulbs

There is nothing like walking into a warm room filled with the sweet fragrance of hyacinths in late winter, or having a pot of Paperwhite Narcissus bloom in your kitchen for Christmas! If you have never played with bulb to achieve these mini-Spring delights, this could be the

Forcing bulbs to bloom early means we provide a shorter more controlled winter than they would have in the garden. To do this we chill the bulbs in a dark place, after they are snug in their pots, to let them form roots. Any place will do: an attic, a garage or a refrigerator. Temperatures below zero can damage some bulbs. When you see roots coming out of the bottom of the pots and sprouts forming, it's time to move into a cool area in your house, out of direct sunlight. When the sprouts are about three to four inches tall, set in a warm, bright area to stimulate blooming.

To plant bulbs use only containers with a drainage hole in the bottom, and a sterilized potting soil which drains easily to prevent bulbs from rotting. Paperwhite narcissus are an exception since they can be planted in pebbles and a water tight container as well. Potted bulbs need a balanced fertilizer with a higher percentage of phosphates. A slow release fertilizer works well. Place an inch of gravel or foam peanuts in the bottom of each pot, then fill with soil to two to three inches below the rim of the pot. Firm the soil and place the bulbs, neck up, in the pot. Cover bulb noses one inch. Water to keep moist. Many different bulbs are suitable for indoor blooming so I will only give you a few for "how to" instructions.

Narcissus - Paperwhite and Soleil d' Or are two varieties which can be planted in pebbles and a watertight container. Place bulbs on top of pebbles and add water til it reaches the bottom of the bulbs. Tete-a-Tete is yellow flowered and should be planted in soil. Place in dark closet for three weeks then set in sunny window and wait for blooms. Narcissus do not need chilling.

Crocus need about eight weeks of cooling before bringing into the house. Try Yellow Mammoth for a pretty

cheerful basket. All colors do nicely. Daffodils need about twelve weeks of cooling and Tulips need up to sixteen weeks before bringing

indoors. If cooling time is a little short, the bloom will form in the rosette of leaves instead of on a long stem. Ask your nursery for good forcing varieties.

Hyacinths also need about twelve weeks of cooling time. Sky Jacket (medium blue) and Pink Pearl are recommended varieties. After bulbs sprout, surround the base of stems with long fibered spragnum peatmoss to add beauty and keep the soil moist.

Amaryllis is another bulb that does not need cooling. Once planted, it only takes six to seven weeks to flower! A top quality bulb should be at least four inches in diameter, firm and with many well developed roots. Expect to pay at least \$5 a bulb for these beauties. People that grow these bulbs are hooked on them! Details for growing should come with the

Garden Bulbs - I must make a few comments about outdoor bulb planting. Buy your bulbs now if you have not already done so. Put them in your refrigerator until ready to plant. Late November through December is planting time for us so no need to panic. If getting down on your knees has gotten to be too much for you, I recommend investing in a long handled bulb planting tool (works like a shovel) and a knee pad. These are available in garden centers and certainly make the work easier.





The statistics about the dangers of plan to stop smoking that will work for smoking are enough to take your breath you: away: an estimated 558,000 deaths will be attributable to tobacco in the a "smoking journal" for a few weeks United States in 1995; tobacco use accounts for 25 percent of the total economic cost of illness in America and one in every five deaths in the United States is directly related to smoking.

Although some of these figures may surprise you, smoking's negative effect on health is no surprise. Most people who smoke want to quit, but many are unable to do so. If you are a smoker, the physicians of Texas Medical Association urge you to stop smoking for your health and the health of those

Of course, the easiest way to stop smoking is not to start. Tobacco use prevention is extremely important, especially for children, because few smokers begin as adults. However, if you are a smoker, how can you kick the habit and stop smoking for good?

Consult your physician before you stop smoking; he or she can help you prepare to stop smoking and may want to prescribe a nicotine substitute, such as nicotine gum or a nicotine patch, to help ease the symptoms of withdrawal. These steps may help you devise a

 Analyze your smoking habits. Keep and record every cigarette you smoke smoking, but the average weight gain in a day, including the times you routinely smoke, such as with every cup and watching what you eat can help of coffee or after every meal.

· Make up your mind to stop smoking for good. List the reasons you want to quit and the benefits of quitting, such as improving your health, keeping your family from being exposed to secondhand smoke, saving money, etc.

· Set a date to stop. Inform your family and others of the date and seek their support. You also may want to identify possible barriers to your success and ways to overcome them in

· During the difficult early days, use any method you can as a cigarette substitute, such as chewing gum or sucking on hard candies. Avoid situations that encourage smoking. You may have a prescription from your physician for a nicotine substitute.

· Reward yourself for not smoking. You may want to set aside the money you normally would spend on cigarettes for something special.

· During the first few weeks, eat as much low-calorie food as you want and drink plenty of water. Many people fear gaining weight when they stop is less than five pounds. Exercising you avoid gaining too much weight.

Once you've devised your plan and stopped smoking, don't become too discouraged if you relapse. The first four weeks are the hardest, and you should lose your intense craving for tobacco after about eight weeks. Many smokers need to try quitting several times before they succeed, so view an occasional relapse as a chance to renew your focus and commitment, not a license to resume smoking.

Disaster sign-up to begin December 1

the soon to be announced 1994 crop. Producers need to be aware that disaster program will pay producers an adjustment will be necessary at disaster payment.

earlier in the week the 1994 disaster VISA IMMIGRATION CARDS program will be fully funded not pro-rated like past programs. Previous programs paid only 50 cents for each dollar a producer was eligible to receive.

Another provision likely to remain in the final package is a three tiered payment schedule. The schedule is based on whether a producer harvests, abandons or was prevented from planting their crop. It appears eligible producers who harvest acreage with qualifying loses will receive 100 percent of the calculated disaster payment.

Producers who abandon their acreage and do not harvest will receive 70 percent of the calculated payment and producers prevented from planting their crop will receive 45 percent of the calculated payment.

"The tiered payment schedule included as part of the 1994 disaster program seems to provide a strong incentive to harvest disaster stricken acreage in order to receive a 100 percent payment rate," explains Donald Johnson, Executive Vice President of Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers. "Qualifying for the program will be much the same as in past disaster programs."

Producers with federal crop insurance coverage will qualify with losses greater than 35 percent of expected production while producers without insurance must prove losses in excess of 40 percent of expected production.

Sign-up for the program is currently scheduled to begin December 1, 1994 and run through March 31, 1995. Final program provisions are expected to be sign-up period.
