Sales tax shows slight decrease

For the first time in several months, the state comptroller's report on sales tax rebate to Post shows a decrease. The payment of \$21,497.18 was a 3.08 percent drop from last year's total of \$22,176.39. The total for the year is \$99,892.55, a 13.51 percent increase over last year's total at this time of \$88,001.45.

This month's payment is for taxes collected on March sales reported by businesses in April and businesses filing quarterly returns for January, February and March.

Post ISD trustees elect officers, begin work on '96-97 budget

Post ISD trustees, meeting in regular session Tuesday, May 14, elected Mark Kirkpatrick to serve as president, Alexa Collier as vice president and Jeff Lott as secretary. Current members of the board also include Rex Cash, Gary Workman, Barbara Hardin and Mark

Superintendent Dr Bobby Bain presented a brief explanation about preliminary budget estimates. Dr Bain pointed out that state funding is based largely on valuations by the state comptroller, compared to local values. If the stte comptroller values are higher than local, then state funding declines. In the Post ISD property valuations, the local values are higher than the state comptroller... but the Texas Education Agency has certified the comptroller's lower value, which will give Post ISD approximately \$66,000 more state funding. The budget estimate indicates total revenues (based on current \$1.41 rate) at \$5,942,000 with projected expenses of \$5,991,000. A budget workshop was scheduled for May 22 at 7 p.m.

the board, as well as budget change orders.

A policy stating the ISD's commitment to elimination of student retention was also approved.

The school calendar for 1996-97 was set, with two bad weather days scheduled on Monday and Friday. The first two weeks in March has been set for spring break and there are five staff development days in the calendar.



Trustees then went into executive session, in which the agenda included "employment of new personnel, coaching stipends, superintendent contract form, TRS, additional teacher substitute, school sponsored dances, special education cooperative and student code of conduct."

After reconvening in open session, the board approved the hiring of Rito Hernandez as teacher/coach, Marsha Norman as an elementary teacher, Christi Daily as teacher/coach and Crystal Tarplex as high school English teacher.

A \$500 stipend was approved to UIL coaches Candace McConnell, Carolyn Black, Melvena Moore, Delton Moore, Joy Pool, Sandra Alexander, Christy Morris, Doris Giddens, Kim Mills, Malea Mullins and Amy Easterling and to cheerleader sponsors Kim Mills and Karleen McDougal.







Public health vital part of everyday life in Texas

Long before the turn of the century, the state's health workers had a clear mission: fight epidemics of yellow fever, small pox and cholera in the frontier that was Texas. More than 100 years later, the Texas Department of Health (TDH) sill combats dreaded diseases such as tuberculosis and diphtheria along with the newer enemies such as HIV/

The work of TDH and its more than 6,000 employees, however, has increased considerably, all under the vision of public health.

"Public health is not poverty, health," said Dr David R. Smith, Texas Commissioner of Health. "It means trying to reduce the things that the public needs to worry about: Public health means that people don't worry about the meat they eat, the Xrays they get or the environment in which they live.'

"Public health," said Dr Smith, "is something people notice by its absence more often than by its presence." Public Health Week, the first week of April each year, is set aside to

recognize the contributions of public

health workers and prevention series to the well-being of people and their communities. Governor George W. Bush recently signed the proclamation for Public Health Week. Texas Department of Health deals with public health in a variety of ways: preventive health care, disease surveillance and control, injury prevention, environmental and consumer health, health care quality and standards and health services for women and children. Along with the health complex in Austin, TDH has regional offices spread across the state, two hospitals that offer specialized care for patients with tuberculosis and other chronic

Abraham Lincoln delivered the Gettysburg Address without once choking up, Franklin Roosevelt informed the nation of the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor without losing his composure, and Dwight Eisenhower gave his farewell address with eyes that were perfectly dry. But when Bob Dole announced his resignation from the U.S. Senate last week, he did what has

become obligatory for politicians these days - he let his eyes mist up and his voice quaver.

We were supposed to be moved. Some of us, however, were only moved to irritation at the idea that the nation is supposed to feel a tug at the tear ducts every time Dole recalls his recuperation from his

Certainly he, like every battle-scarred veteran, deserves the gratitude of his fellow citizens. But his success in overcoming his wounds doesn't qualify him to be president, and his habit of exploiting that experience for political gain doesn't warrant our indulgence. We

have a right to object. Dole is hardly alone in resorting to this expedient. Bill Clinton is the heavyweight champion of the moist eye, trembling lip and consoling embrace. In the week after Commerce Secretary Ron Brown's death, he wallowed in the opportunity to dramatize his sorrow, praising the Commerce secretary in terms that would have been excessive for Mother Teresa.

The extravagance of his eulogies, however, didn't honor Brown. Just the opposite: It turned attention away from him and toward the

That, of course, was its purpose — to let everyone know of Clinton's bottomless supply of the milk of human kindness. Like the town hall meetings he held during the 1992 campaign, the ostentatious mourning for Brown let him demonstrate that whatever his failings, he has a heart as big as the Grand Canyon.

It's enough to make you think that maybe our fathers had the right idea in telling us that real men don't cry. Some candidate could probably profit from borrowing the old slogan of Johnson's Baby Shampoo: No more tears. There is a lot to be said for iron self-control in the face of adversity. When war breaks out, we don't want a president who'll start blubbering.

The histrionics of Dole and Clinton could make us all miss Calvin This election is not about them; it's about us. Coolidge. The 30th president might have used his retirement

announcement to wax nostalgic about his long career, to reflect on his regrets over leaving the presidency or to celebrate his bonds with the American people. Instead, he issued a one-sentence, written statement: "I do not choose to run for president in 1928." Such arid terseness would be a welcome respite from the soggy climate of the modern political era.

John Kennedy endured lifelong suffering from his war injuries, but it didn't occur to him that the public had a responsibility to help him cope. Franklin Roosevelt never milked his paralysis for sympathy. Nor did he show his devotion to the American people by weeping over the Great Depression. He showed his devotion by doing something about it.

Emotion, to be sure, has its place in political discourse. Good political speeches are not dry, relentlessly logical lawyer's briefs. They make effective use of powerful images, phrases and ideas. They sometimes even evoke tears in the audience.

In the audience — not the speaker. When Ronald Reagan gave his are being manipulated by a calculated display of emotion, and we famous address at Pointe du Hoc, Normandy, honoring the men who had fought there 40 years earlier, he was inspiring tears, not shedding them. A profuse display of his own emotions would have directed the focus away from the grand — namely, D-Day's meaning for these men and for the survival of freedom - and toward the inconsequential — namely, its effect on Reagan.

Development of the coronary stent, a wire-mesh tube placed in an artery to increase heart-muscle blood flow, has revolutionized treatment of certain heart conditions. The Gianturo-Roubin coronary stent reduces the need for coronary-bypass surgery and is especially valuable during angioplasty when a coronary artery collapses and prevents blood flow to

the heart. According to a report, "The Human Cost of Regulation," by David C. Murray, a scholar at the Indianapolis-based Hudson Institute, the Gianturo-Roubin coronary stent was developed in 1986 but the Food and Drug Administration didn't approve its use until May 28, 1993.

We want medical-device manufacturers to demonstrate safety and effectiveness. We don't want the FDA arrogance, delays and bureaucratic bungling that are responsible for the United States lagging 11 months or more behind Europe's device-approval rate. FDA ineptitude doesn't simply impose time-wasting, costly procedures on device manufacturers; each year, it kills thousands of Americans.

Approximately 15 percent of patients die undergoing emergency bypass surgery made necessary due to coronary artery collapse during angioplasty. During clinical trials of the Gianturo-Roubin stent, far fewer patients needed bypass surgery after a collapsed coronary artery, and of those who did, only 5 percent died. Murray says roughly 1,230 American lives per year were lost in angioplasty procedures because of FDA-delayed approval of the Gianturo-Roubin

If your loved one died in the early '90s during an angioplasty procedure, Dr. David Kessler, the head of the FDA, is in part responsible. The tragedy is that you and your loved one are some of the many invisible victims of FDA policy. Here's the modus operandi: If FDA officials mistakenly approve a device that has unanticipated harmful effects, their necks are on the chopping block because the victims are highly visible. Career-minded FDA officials don't like that kind of exposure. They prefer the hidden mistake, erring on the side of over-caution by needlessly delaying approval. When FDA officials err on the side of over-caution, their victims are invisible. After all, you didn't know there was a device available that could have saved a loved one's life, as would have been the case had the angioplasty procedure occurred in Belgium or some other European country.

FDA delays in approval of the Omnicarbon heart valve contributed to the suffering or death of as many as 8,000 of the 16,000 Americans who experience either a thromboembolic event or bleeding complication with their artificial heart valves each year. Again, these people are the invisible victims of Dr. Kessler's FDA.

There are many medical devices, or improvements to existing medical devices, introduced each year and needlessly held up because of FDA self-serving Byzantine procedures. The medical profession shares some of the blame. Doctors are at least partially aware of the introduction of new tools in their profession. I think they have an

ethical duty to inform patients about lifesaving and sufferingsparing devices and useful drugs being needlessly held up by the

The problem is not resources. In 1988, the FDA's budget was \$482 million and it was staffed by 6,869 people. That year, it approved 46 applications for pre-market approval of medical devices. By 1994, with a budget of \$877 million and a staff of 8,539, it managed to approve only 26 applications for pre-market approval of medical devices. The FDA is long overdue for overhauling. In the process, Congress should allow for private medical device certification. After all, Underwriter's Laboratory does an excellent job assuring electrical device safety.

'The system causes 99 percent of all learning disabilities'

Responding to a complaint on the "Separation of School and State" Internet talk group (sepschool@SepSchool.Org) that "The schools will destroy your child; can you afford to leave him in the classroom?" 

DPS requires pre-trip vehicle inspection tests for CDL's

Beginning June 3, applicants for Class A or B Texas Commercial Driver Licenses will be required to pass pre-trip inspection tests.

"This is really just some fine-tuning of our CDL program," said DPS Inspector John Hall. "New applicants will be required to pass a test to make sure they can determine whether a commercial vehicle is safe to operate on the highway. It should only take about 10 minutes."

CDL applicants previously only had been required to pass an airbrake inspection of their vehicle, Hall said. The new pre-trip vehicle inspection test, which will include the airbrake inspection, is mandated by federal and state regulations, the inspector

CDL applicants should prepare for the test by obtaining and studying a copy of Section 10 of the Texas CDL

Handbook at any DPS Driver License

Since Texas' federally mandated Suzanne Hudman, CDL law went into effect on September 1, 1990, some 560,000 Texans have been issued Commercial Driver Licenses. The pre-trip vehicle inspection test requirement is the first change in the licensing program since then, Hall said.

AUSTIN - Gov. George W Bush said he would not tell the state pension and endowment funds to sell the more than \$500 million they have invested in tobacco stock.

Bush's statement came after Attorney General Dan Morales urged the Permanent School Fund, Permanent University Fund, Teacher Retirement System and Employees Retirement System to sell tobacco

"Texas should not be in business with those who seek to do our children harm. Our state should repudiate its financial involvement in these unconscionable efforts to profiteer at the expense of our children's lives," he told the Dallas Morning News.

But Bush took another view. "I'm not going to tell the people in charge of generating a reasonable rate of return in the state of Texas The charge for the July 4th Mr and Mrs W. J. Bounds of what they ought to be doing with their money," he told the Morning

On March 31, Morales filed a federal lawsuit against the tobacco industry seeking to recover \$4 billion spent in Texas on tobaccorelated illnesses.

Political Fines Going Unpaid

Dozens of political action committees and former political candidates owe the state thousands of Mr and Mrs James Samson, dollars in fines that the attorney THE-TEST and obtain the kit. ported last week.

The report said there are delinquent fines dating back to 1992 assessed by the Texas Ethics Commission for missed deadlines for filing campaign finance reports, personal financial statements and other required documentation.

Attorney General Morales can go to court to collect the fines, but Morales' spokesman Ron Dusek said the fines, most of which are less than \$1,000, were not large enough to pay for the collection

"That's frustrating," said James Cribbs, an Arlington lawyer who serves on the eight-member Ethics Commission. "We're not going to be able to enforce the law if we can't collect these fines."

Tom Harrison, executive director of the commission, said 42 individuals or committees with the largest unpaid fines had potential liabilities totaling \$158,000. He said he hopes the attorney general will try to collect fines of \$500 or more.

Perot Gets Enough Signatures

Dallas billionaire H. Ross Perot's Reform Party delivered 90 boxes of petitions with 255,000 signatures to the state capitol last week enough to get his name on Texas' November election ballot.

Verification of a random sampling of the signatures is expected to take three to four weeks. To be counted, the signers must be registered voters and not have voted in either the Democratic or Republican primaries or runoffs.

Perot's name is on the ballot as an independent candidate in South Dakota and Tennessee, and the Reform Party has fulfilled

requirements to put his name on November ballots in California, Maine, Montana, New Mexico, North Dakota, South Dakota, Ohio and Utah.

Perot continues to say he is not running for president. Bomer Eyes Benchmark Rates

Texas Insurance Commissioner Elton Bomer heard proposals from two state judges and a panel of consumer advocates and insurance industry representatives regarding

where to set auto insurance premi-

Two state judges recommended to Bomer a more than 6 percent increase in the statewide average auto insurance premium for most drivers.

The panel recommended a steeper increase - 25 to 30 percent - for high-risk drivers, under a special program.

Bomer said he would decide within a couple of weeks whether to accept the proposals.

HIV Test Kits to Be Sold

Texans will be the first in the U.S. to buy home HIV test kits over the counter, following Food and Drug Administration approval

In June, the \$40 test kits will be available at drug stores, clinics and student health centers, said officials with Direct Access Diagnostics.


Texas was chosen over other states because of its large, culturally diverse population and high rate of infection, said Dr. Gary Noble of Direct Access Diagnostics.

Previously, HIV tests were done in medical settings where those being tested were counseled before the blood was drawn.

I would never have believed that I would find myself a political prisoner in a Texas jail being held by a U.S. federal judge who claims his family to be one of the founders of Texas freedom. This is the 19th day of my capture. As a child growing up in Missouri and the mid-west, I felt somehow out of place from the time of my first essay in the third grade, for my blood was that of a Texican giving constant book reports and essays on the Alamo, Texas freedom and Texas as a separate nation, at least in my mind.

The blood of freedom was a gift I was born with, always celebrating the Fourth of July as my favorite holiday and always respecting and revering all those men and women of America and other countries who fought and died for the idealistic concept of freedom and truth. The Republic of Texas is the vehicle of opportunities for those who will build on it and move with it. Texas is not owned by anyone nor is it a corporation. We are a body of people exercising our rights to regain what both Texas and America were intended to be about. Somewhere along the line the original intention was lead astray and was almost lost, but a staunch group of Texicans are rescuing the Republic.

The people who join and stay in the Nation of Texas are those who are alive in true spirit and seek a cooperative venture. It is unfortunate that so many are still being duped by the misrepresentations of those in existing government and by the news media in portraying the Republic of Texas as anti-government. I assume that if being pro-people is anti-government, then existing government must be anti-people.

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
