sorrow, praising the Commerce secretary in terms that would have been excessive for Mother Teresa.
The extravagance of his eulogies, however, didn't honor Brown.
Just the opposite: It turned attention away from him and toward the
eulogist.
That, of course, was its purpose - to let everyone know of Clinton's
