Mustangs Scrimmage Here Fri.

The Bovina Mustangs will scrimmage against the Ropes High School Eagles here Friday, beginning at 6 p.m.

The following week, the Mustangs will travel to Meadow for a scrimmage game.

The scrimmage against Ropes has more than passing interest for the Bovina coaching staff. Coach Moore is a Ropes High School graduate, and in addition both he and Coach Talley are former coaches at the Hockley County school.

Bovina won last year's scrimmage, one score to none, and Coach Talley thinks the Mustangs will put on a good show on Friday.

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Bovina Grid Coach Likes His Chances

Things are looking up for the Bovina Mustangs for the 1987 football season.

For the first time since he became coach of the Mustangs, Bill Talley had a good group of starters and lettermen returning, and will be basically a junior-senior team.

Talley is expecting from 15 to 19 lettermen back from his 1986

team, which will include nine starters on offense and eight on defense.

Where in the past, the Mustangs have been mostly a freshman-sophomore team, at the present time the starters are mainly juniors and seniors.

"If we played a game this week, we would have only two sophomores on the field. That's

quite a change from the past two years," Coach Talley said.

As of Monday, Bovina had 21 boys out for football. Four of the 19 lettermen had not reported prior to Monday evening's workout, and Talley thought that they have had jobs out of town and may yet join the team.

Those reporting are in excellent physical condition, Talley said.

"We haven't had a cramp yet. We're way ahead of the point we've been at for the past two years," said the Mustang coach, evidencing an excitement for the upcoming season.

Talley said that the team had had excellent practices. "Even the first day in pads, last Friday, was a real sharp workout."

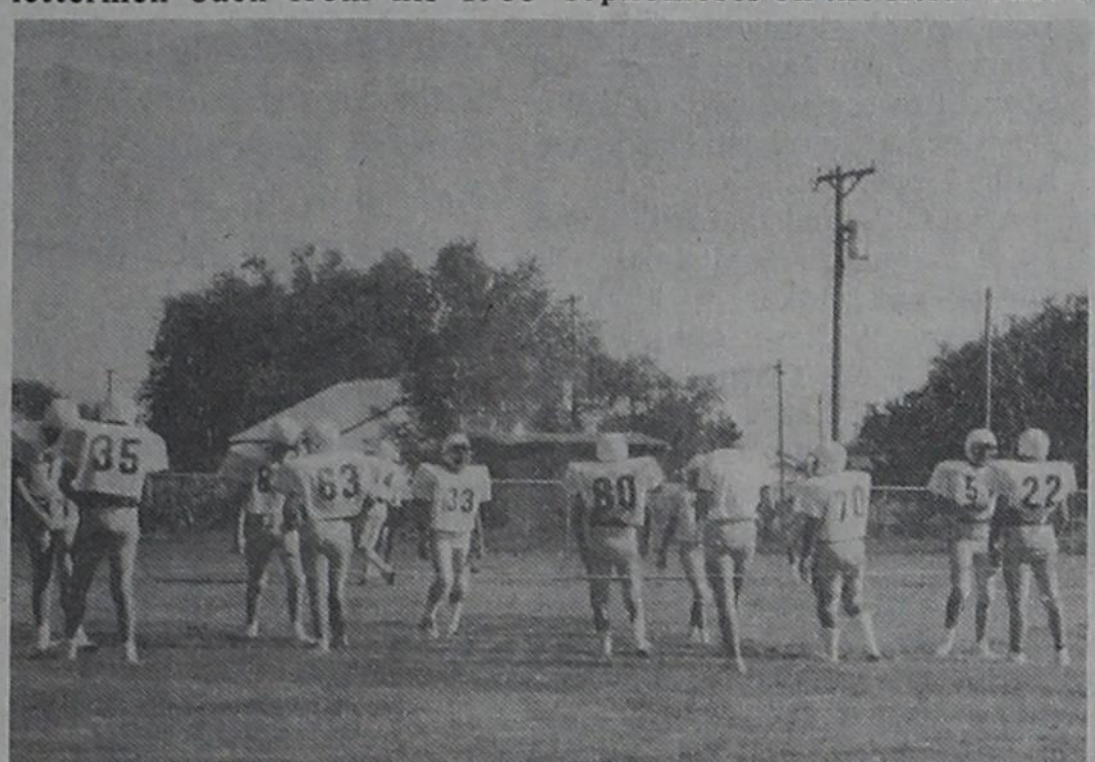
For the most part, Bovina is being picked third in their seven team district, but have been picked as low as fifth by one poll.

Talley says he feels that Bovina will have the opportunity of winning their share of the games, which is a new feeling. This depends on if the team can avoid key injuries.

"We have been real fortunate the past two years on injuries. This is due in a great part to being in good physical condition. We can't afford lost time to injuries," the Mustang coach concluded.

Petersburg and Anton are picked one-two in Bovina's district. Bovina will have four of its toughest games, against Farwell, Sudan, Anton and Petersburg, all at home, something that should help considerably.

The Mustangs open their schedule with a pair of games away from home, against Happy and Melrose, before returning home to play Hale Center on September 25. Bovina has an open date between its first and second games.

School Begins September 1

The first day of school will be September 1. Grades Pre-K through sixth grade will register on the first day of school in their home room. Grades Pre-K, K and one will be housed at Ridgelea. All other grades will be at the Bovina Elementary campus.

To be eligible for pre-kindergarten, a student must be at least four years of age on or before September 1, 1987 and unable to speak and comprehend the English language or from a family whose income, according to standards set by the State Board of Education, is at or below subsistence level.

Pre-kindergarten students must have birth certificates and immunization records to enroll in school. Pre-kindergarten students will attend class during the morning.

Kindergarten students must be five years of age on or before September 1, 1987. Kindergarten

students that have not previously attended school are required to have birth certificates and immunization records upon entering school.

Secondary students, grades 7-12, who are new to the Bovina district or who did not pre-register last spring should come to the High School Office to pre-register on Monday, August 31 between the hours of 1:00 and 3:00 p.m.

On Tuesday, September 1, all secondary students should report to the auditorium at 8:20 a.m. for orientation.

All students that are new to the Bovina district must be accompanied by a parent so that the necessary paperwork can be completed. Students that have attended other schools should have a report card or withdrawal papers from the previous school with them so that proper placement can be made.

School will begin at 8:20 a.m.

Ex-School Official's Rites Held

Services for Warren Morton, 70, Tyler, former superintendent of schools in Bovina, were held Monday, August 10 in Tyler.

Morton died Friday evening at his residence after a lengthy illness.

He was born November 4, 1916 in Eastland. He was a 1934 graduate of Abilene High School, a graduate of McMurry College, Hardin-Simmons University, and attended Texas Tech University and The University of Texas.

From 1976-1985 he was a reporter and religion editor for the Tyler Morning Telegraph. He was later employed at Burks-Walker-Tippit Funeral Home. He lived in Tyler eleven years.

He was a retired school administrator who, during 35 years in public education, served as superintendent of Smyer, Union and Bovina independent school districts. He received the 1963 Bovina "Man of the Year" award. He was a member of Pleasant Retreat Methodist Church and a veteran of World War II, serving in the Army Air Corps.

Morton was formerly employed by Lakeview Methodist Assembly in Palestine where he served as registrar.

He was a Mason and member of the Lions and Toastmaster clubs. He lived in Bovina during the years 1956-1964.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Alice Jeanette Morton of Tyler; a son, Daniel B. Morton, Fountain Valley, California; a daughter, Janice Smith of Temple; six brothers, Grady Morton of Bowie, Weldon Morton of Palestine, Duke Morton of Henderson, Tom Morton of Winston Salem, North Carolina, Baker Morton of Austin and Glenn Morton of Raleigh, North Carolina; a sister, Freda Moore of Jacksonville, Florida; and three grandchildren.

J. Pierce Wins State, Regional

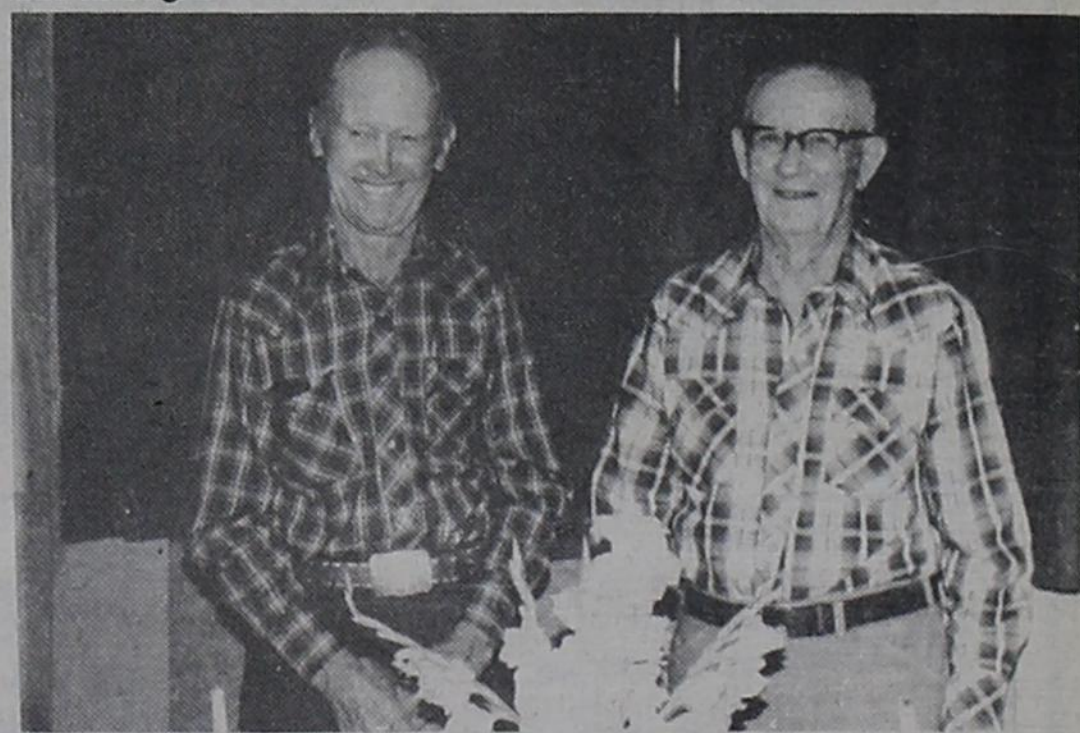

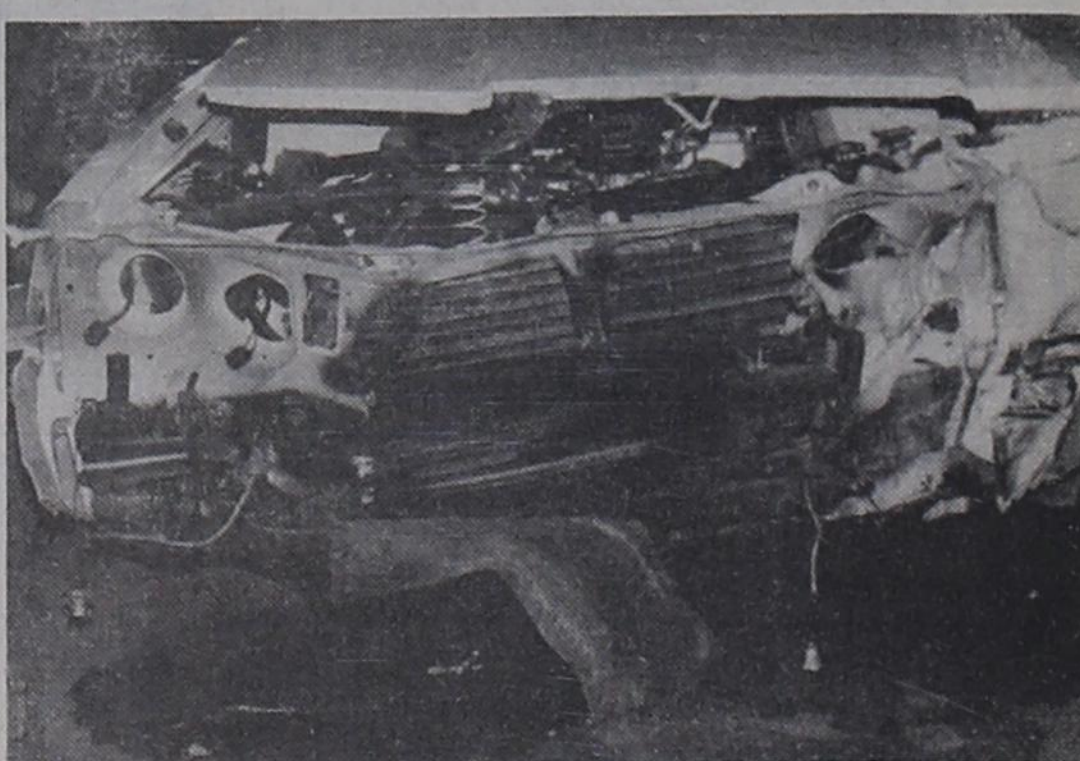
Ms. Pierce's efforts support a major Texas Agricultural Extension Service program priority of building individual and family strengths.

We would like to thank the Assembly of God Church for holding our church services last Sunday. This Sunday, the Friona United Methodist Church will hold our church services at 4 p.m.

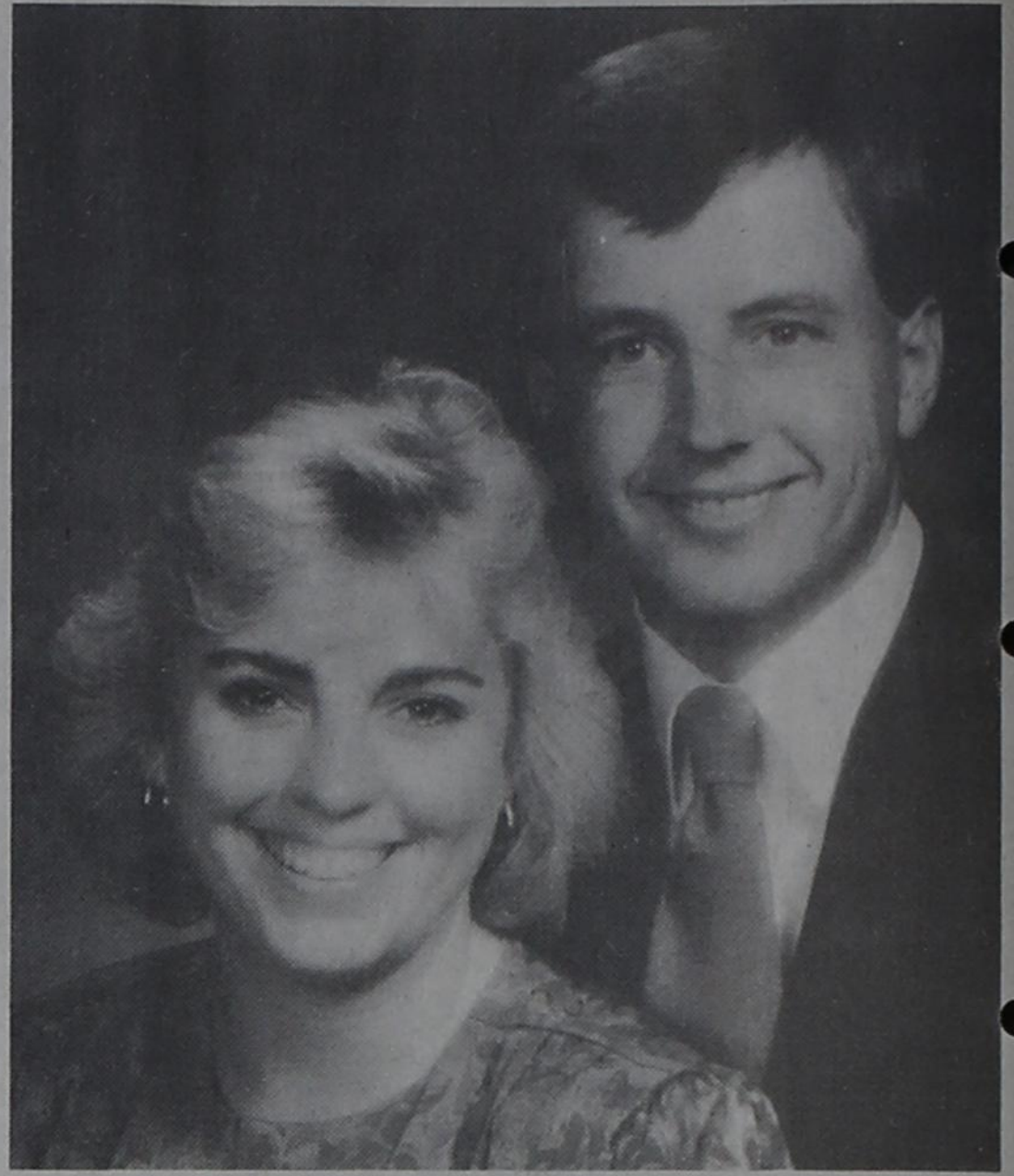
We had some green beans donated to us from Myrtis Evans. The residents snapped them and said they are delicious.

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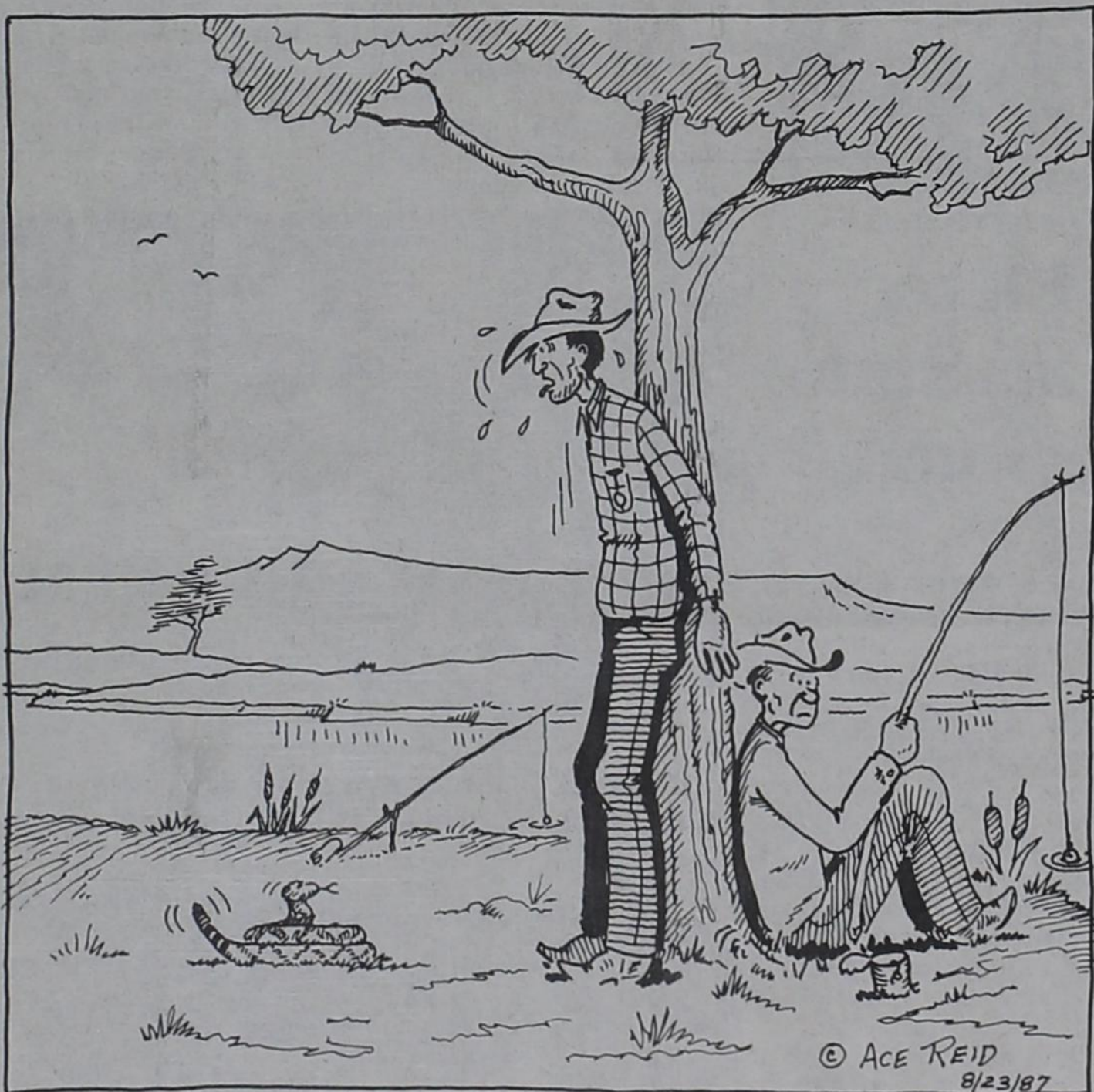
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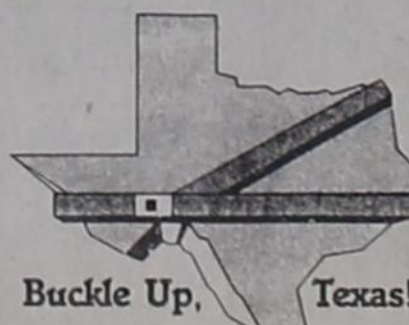

The ladies from the First Baptist Church were in Mexico teaching a week of Vacation Bible School. The girls taught in three different locations and over one hundred youngsters attended the school.

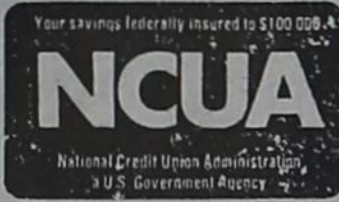

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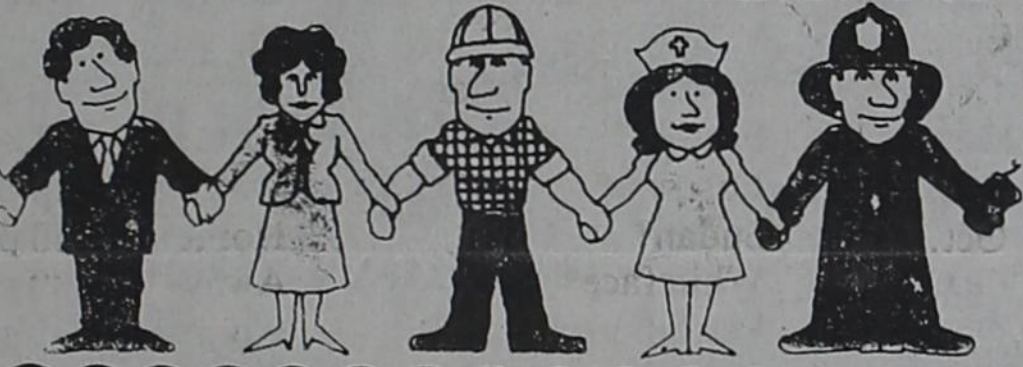

LEGAL NOTICE

CITY OF BOVINA, INC.

Amendment to Ordinance 78-12

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF BOVINA, PARMER COUNTY, TEXAS, THAT ORDINANCE 78-12 BE AMENDED AS FOLLOWS:

AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED "DISCARDED APPLIANCES OR CABINETS" PROVIDING FOR A DECLARATION OF PUBLIC NUISANCE; PROVIDING FOR UNLAWFUL ACT IN MAINTAINING A PUBLIC NUISANCE; PROVIDING FOR NOTICE AND ORDER TO ABATE NUISANCE; PROVIDING FOR DISPOSITION OF DISCARDED APPLIANCES OR CABINETS; PROVIDING FOR PENALTY; PROVIDING A SAVING CLAUSE; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY

SECTION 1: Definitions

Discarded Appliance or Cabinet shall mean any stove, clothes washer, clothes dryer, dishwasher, refrigerator, freezer or any cabinet that is no longer being used for the purpose or purposes for which it was designed and manufactured, and which cannot be opened from the inside when closed, unless same is kept in a locked and completely enclosed building.

SECTION 2: Public Nuisance Declared

Any discarded stove, clothes washer, clothes dryer, dishwasher, refrigerator, freezer or cabinet as defined in Section 1 is a public nuisance since it is an attractive nuisance that could cause a human being, especially a minor, to become trapped inside and suffocate.

SECTION 3: Public Nuisance-Unlawful to Maintain

It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, partnership, association or corporation to leave or permit to remain upon any public property, public right-of-way, or upon any lot or tract of land within the City of Bovina, any discarded stove, clothes washer, clothes dryer, dishwasher, refrigerator, freezer or cabinet as defined in Section 1.

SECTION 4: Notice of Public Nuisance and Order to Abate

When ever any such public nuisance, as defined in Sections 1 and 2, exists in the City, the City Manager, City Clerk or other designated city employee shall send written notice by Certified or Registered Mail, with a 5-day return requested, to the owner or occupant of the premises whereupon such nuisance exists or abuts the public property, to abate and remove such public nuisance. Such notice shall state the nature

of the public nuisance and specify that the nuisance must be abated and removed within ten (10) days after the delivery date of the notice. If the notice is returned undelivered by the United States Post Office, official action by the City of Bovina to abate said nuisance to a date not less than ten (10) days from the date of such return.

SECTION 5: Disposition of Discarded Appliances or Cabinets

In the event such discarded stove, clothes washer, clothes dryer, dishwasher, refrigerator, freezer or cabinet as defined in Section 1, after due notice and expiration of time set forth, has not been removed or the nuisance abated, then the City of Bovina shall remove said nuisance and make needed adjustments to render it harmless. Said nuisance shall not be made operational but used only as salvage material.

SECTION 6: Penalty

Any person, firm, association, or corporation violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and conviction thereof shall be punishable by a fine not to exceed Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) per each day such violation occurs.

SECTION 7: Savings Clause

Should any section, paragraph, sentence, clause, phrase or word of this Ordinance be declared unconstitutional or invalid for any reason, the remainder of this Ordinance shall not be affected thereby.

SECTION 8: Emergency

The Board of Alderman of the City of Bovina are hereby authorized to cause publication of the descriptive caption of this Ordinance as an alternative method provided by law; and furthermore, the Board of Aldermen declare an emergency and this ordinance becomes effective upon passage;

AND IT IS SO ORDERED.

Passed by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Bovina this 6th day of August, 1987 by unanimous vote.

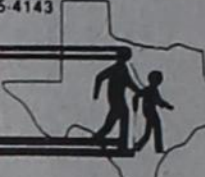

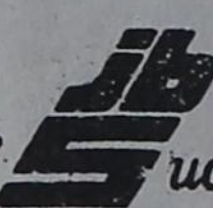

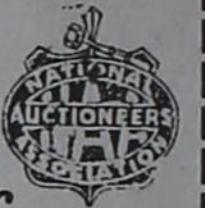
