AN AMARILLO resident wrote an interesting letter to the Amarillo Daily News, appearing in this past Sunday's edition. Since the writer said some things which are of vital interest to folks in our area, we thought we would just re-print the entire letter:

"Dear Editor: Our farmers need help but not from the government offices.

"When one of our farmers can't pay the high usury and the principal of loans because of manipulations in the industry, these farms are gobbled up by the money lenders and the quantity of them are turned into a corporation. Such action tends to lead further to the Russian-type operation.

"It is recorded, 2,000 acres of farmland near Dalhart is owned by foreigners, in Georgia 25,000; in Utah a probable 10,000; in Missouri 150,000 and the largest of Oregon-Green Villa Farms.

"The USDA seems to think we the people of America cannot make our own sales and prepare the shipments; that only their sales managers know how to get the job done. They do not want the public to know how much control foreigners have over our bulk grain sales and exports and how much at their mercy the consumer and the farmer are today, no less than 90 per cent.

"Continental Grain holds 25 per cent; Cargill 25; Cook Industries (probably now under Mitsui) 15; Bunge of Argentina 10; Drefus 10; Garnac 5 per cent. Michael Fribourg of France holds 90 per cent of the stock of Continental.

"Cargill is a Switzerland-based conglomerate, held by two families, holding 85 per cent of the stock; Bunge is an owner unknown unit; Garnac is of a Swiss holding company owners unknown; Cook Industries is reported joined with Misui, Japan's largest trading company. About 7 per cent of the grain shipment control is by cooperatives; as best known only one is American owned. The other 3 per cent is controlled by independent Americans.

"This is your starting point; you take it from here if you wish to save our nation's agricultural business and the family farm from fading into nothingness.

Reward Is Offered For Stolen Items

The pictures were taken during a break-in at the athletic department late Wednesday, January 12, or early Thursday, January 13.

Nothing else was missed from the office or dressing room area, which contained a coin-operated soft drink machine and other valuables.

Anyone having information is urged to contact school officials.

Jr. Show Is Slated On Monday

Some 184 animals are expected Monday, January 31 for the Bovina Junior Livestock Show, which is under the sponsorship of the Bovina Lions Club and the Chamber of Commerce.

Houston Bartlett will serve as the official weigher. Animals are to be weighed in between 8:30 a.m. and 12 noon. Joe Jones will serve as announcer.

The show begins at 3 p.m. with heifer judging, to be followed by steer, lamb and swine judging.

Approximately 110 barrows, eight gilts, 62 lambs, seven or eight steers and four heifers are expected for the show. Most of the animals will be entered in the Parmer County Jr. Livestock Show February 3-4-5.

Ribbons will be awarded to the first six places in each class. Breed champions will receive trophies. Grand and reserve champions will receive plaques in four divisions.

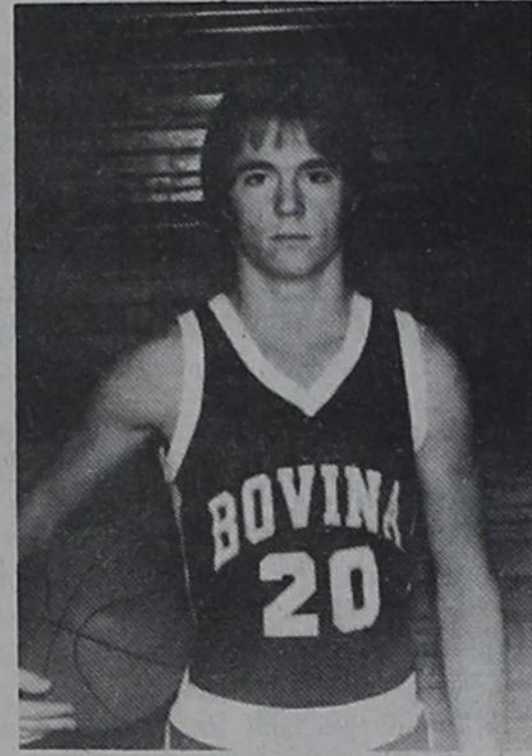

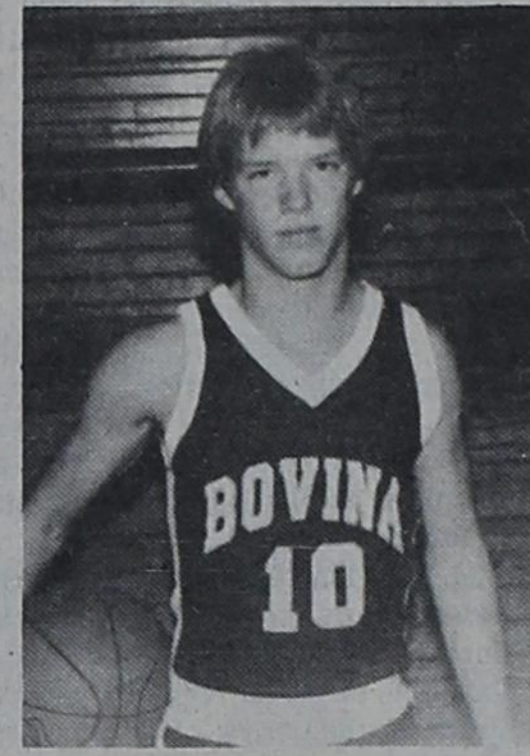

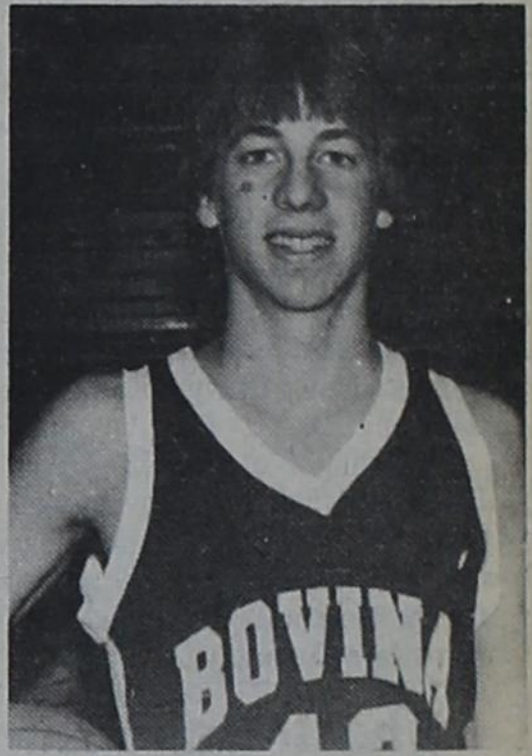

Area Receives Eleven Inch Snow

The Bovina area received its second major snowstorm within a month's time last Thursday and Friday. The winter storm closed down schools and severely hampered travel.

Snow began to fall at about mid-morning on Thursday and continued throughout the day and night. It was still snowing on Friday morning. Total accumulation was around eleven inches--an almost exact duplicate of the snow which fell in the local area on December 26.

Another similarity to the earlier snow was the fact that it fell level, and was not wind-blown, nor was there much drifting associated with the snow. It is a rare occasion when such a "perfect" snow falls in this area, much less two in succession.

Bovina schools dismissed classes on Friday, January 21. School was dismissed in every school in the county. Others dismissing were Dimmitt, Hereford, Muleshoe, Vega, Hart and Nazareth, just to name a few.

Roads in the area were open throughout the period, although travel was extremely hazardous on Friday. Snowplows worked throughout the period to keep the roads open. Bovina's basketball teams were able to get to Farwell Friday afternoon, where they played their district games beginning at 3:30 p.m.

The two big snowfalls of December and January, although not coming in the same calendar month, totalled 21 inches. The two together still would not equal the monthly record, thought to be 26 inches in 1956.

Snowfall totals for area cities included Dimmitt, 17 inches; Hereford, 13 inches; Lubbock, 17 inches; Littlefield, 11 inches; Muleshoe, ten inches, and Friona, 11 inches. Once again, the snow was expected to give the area's wheat crop a big boost. The winter moisture is much above average, with over two inches of moisture for December and January, which are usually dry months.

New Policy Is Given On Attendance

Due to an unusual problem of students having excessive absences, a policy addition has been passed by the Bovina School Administration, effective January 17.

The new policy reads as follows:

"Students who miss eleven (11) or more days in a class during a semester will not receive credit in that class. Principals can grant exceptions where legitimate illness is concerned or where circumstances merit consideration. Legitimate illness which causes a student to miss eleven (11) or more days must be verified by a licensed physician for an exception to be granted."

Danny Cochran, Bovina High School principal, said the new policy would be in addition to the Texas Education Code regarding compulsory attendance, which some students were not obeying.

The Texas Education Code regarding compulsory attendance reads as follows:

"Every child who resides in the District who is at least seven years of age, or who is less than seven years of age and has previously been enrolled in first grade, but not more than seventeen years of age, and who is not legally exempt from this requirement shall attend the public schools in the District or in some other district to which the student may legally be transferred, for at least 165 days of the regular school term."

--Education Code 21.032

"Truancy is unlawful absence from school. The parent or legal guardian is responsible for ensuring that all children who are subject to the compulsory attendance law and who are not lawfully excused from attendance do attend school."

"Any student not already exempted from the compulsory attendance law may nevertheless be excused for temporary absence resulting from personal sickness, sickness or death in the family, quarantine, weather or road conditions making travel dangerous, or any other cause acceptable to the Superintendent, or to the teacher, or principal of the school in which the student is enrolled."

"The reason for an excused absence must be stated in writing and signed by the parent or other person standing in parental relation to the student."

--Education Code 21.035(c)

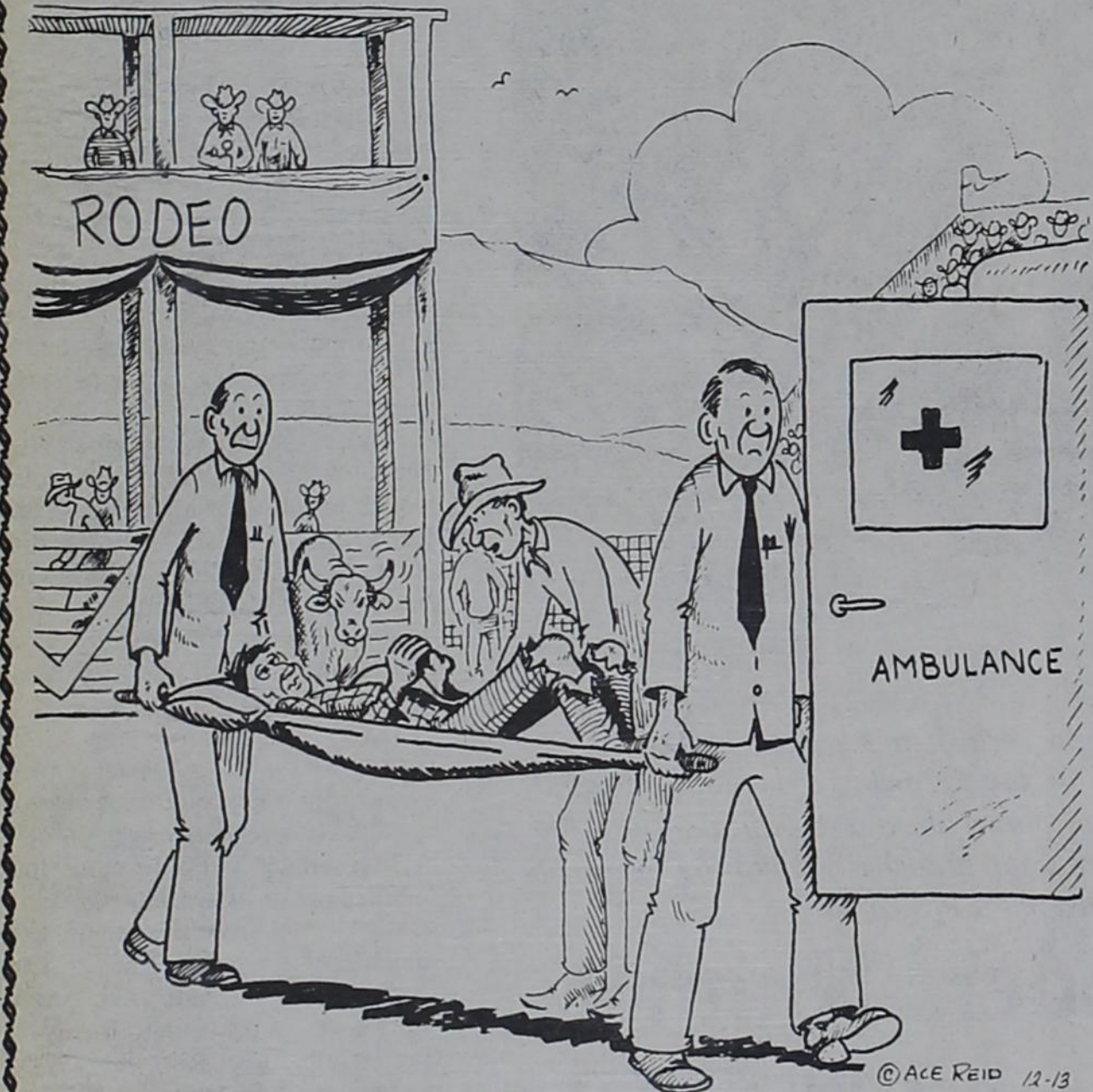

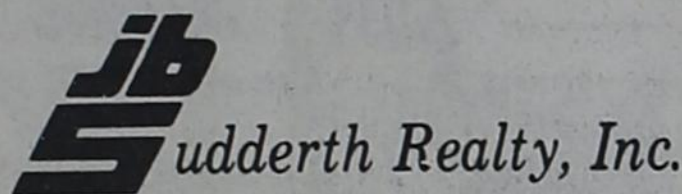

measured for their 'static' depth-to-water levels.

The District has kept records of the annual change in water levels and the rate of change of the water table in the aquifer since its creation more than 30 years ago. This data is used for making projections of water use rates, for determining the amount of water left in storage, and as a basis for the income tax depletion allowance claims on landowner's tax returns.

In 1982, the average change in depth to water in the portion of Parmer County within the District was a decline of -1.63 hundredths of a foot. Readings of the depth to the water table below surface ranged from a minimum of 78 feet to a maximum depth of 389 feet.

Preliminary results of this year's measurements will be published in February.

Lumbero was high point for Bovina with 41 of the 53 points credited to him. Rentera added six points and Espinoza had two.

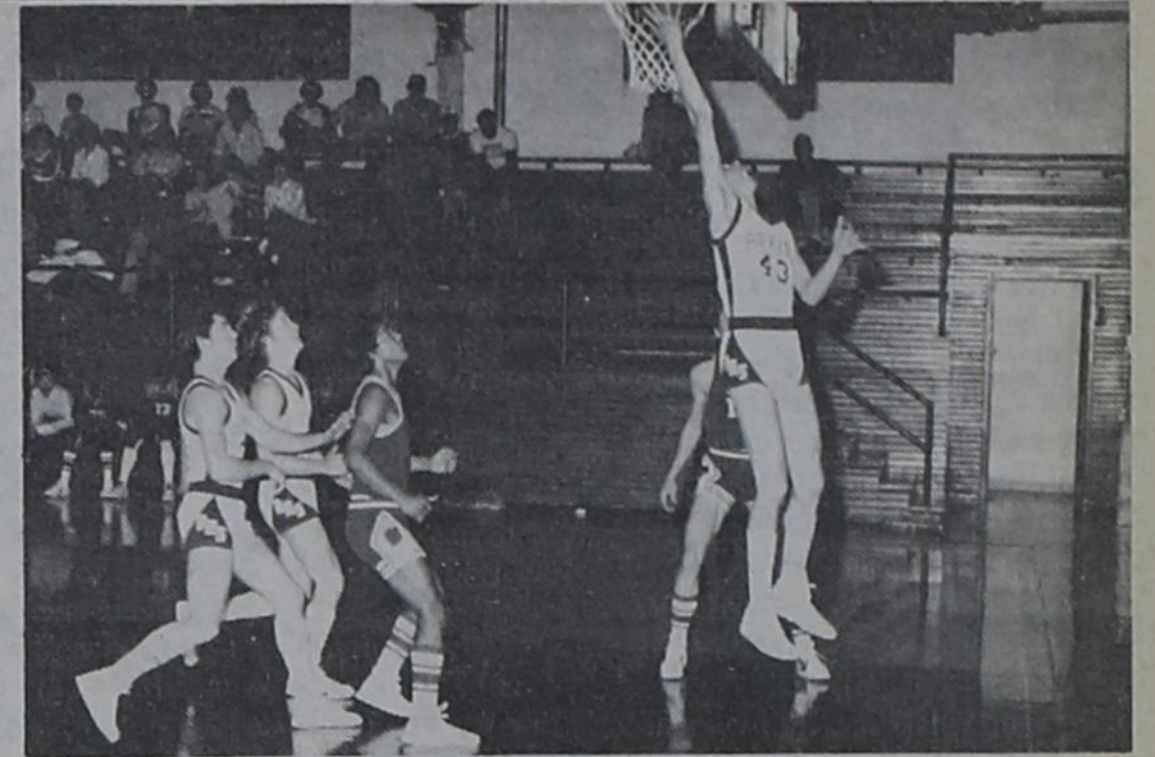
Adrian was the next opponent for the Ponies and when the final buzzer sounded Bovina had hung onto a 44-42 victory.
