IF WE THINK that we are beset by government regulations in this country, perhaps we should look around at some of the places who have a lot less freedom than we enjoy in the U.S.A.

For example, a little item we saw this week points out that while some people want to ban nuclear weapons, and others want to outlaw handguns, the government in Romania wants to restrict typewriters.

We have always heard that the pen is mightier than the sword. Perhaps the Romanian officials have modernized this old saying, to substitute the word "typewriter" for "pen."

At any rate, in an effort to stamp out anti-government leaflets, President Nicolae Ceausescu of Romania has signed a decree outlawing possession or use of typewriters by ex-convicts or anyone else who poses "a danger to public order or state security."

Beginning in April, Romanians were required to register their typewriters with the police, and also to submit a sample of their machines' type print.

Anyone wishing to buy a new typewriter in that country must now get state permission.

The press in communist countries is already government controlled, and the news release did not even refer to type-setting equipment or printing presses. These apparently are already under the thumb of "big brother."

We take a lot of things for granted in the United States. Not the least of which is the fact that if we choose to write a scathing editorial in opposition to government policies, we can do so, without the fear of having both arms broken and our printing equipment confiscated.

Maybe those "annual dues" we mailed a couple of weeks ago weren't so badly spent, after all.

GENERAL TELEPHONE Company has asked the Public Utility Commission for rate increases totalling \$84.5 million. However, the PUC, after considering the request, has offered GTE \$34 million in increases.

Meanwhile, the Texas Municipal League has agreed on only \$28.5 million in increases for the telephone company, and GTE has said it would accept \$32.5 million. The entities involved are still attempting to iron out the differences.

If you have telephone problems you would like for the city to know about in fighting to keep your telephone bill as low as possible, it behooves you to contact the city hall and let your problems be known.

Signup Period Passes; "PIK" Details Given

With the signup period past for the Payment in Kind (PIK) program, farmers in Parmer County are beginning to learn the details concerning the layout program for 1983.

The ASCS reports that total participation in the PIK program in the county amounts to 45 per cent of the base acres.

A news release from the Parmer County ASCS stated that it was determined that each county would be allowed to divert no more than 45 per cent of any commodity base.

After the county ASCS office had compiled all acreages diverted under the acreage reduction program and the 10-30 PIK enrollment, the county had exceeded the 45 per cent limitation on all commodities except wheat.

Therefore, the ASCS office was unable to accept any whole base bids on feed grains and cotton, and only 59 bids on wheat.

Martin Chandler, county executive director for the ASCS, points out that the final date to certify fall and spring seeded small grains has been changed to May 25, 1983. By this date, all seeded barley, oats, rye and wheat, including any volunteer crop the farmer intends to harvest, must be reported.

"Remember, you need to measure and report your irrigated and dryland acreages separately," Chandler says.

Small grain cover crops on CUA (Conservation Use Acreage) must also be reported by May 25.

Chandler announced that the ASCS office is prepared to accept

farmers' applications for measurement service. The rate for aerial observation is \$10 for the first plot plus \$5 for each additional plot, minimum charge of \$40.

In the event where an aerial observation would not show a definite line, ground measurements will have to be done. Rates for ground measurements are \$30 for the first plot and \$5 for each additional plot.

AAM Set Meeting On May 6

The American Agriculture Movement of Texas, Districts I and II, are having a joint meeting in Amarillo on May 6 beginning at 7:30 p.m. The meeting will be held at the Ramada Inn on I-40 East. There will be a dutch treat meal available with the business meeting to follow.

Tommy Willis of Brownsville, Tennessee, the newly-elected national chairman for the American Agriculture Movement, Inc. will speak at this meeting. He will discuss the present crisis in the agriculture segment of our nation, and how the American Agriculture Movement is trying to meet some of these problems.

There will be a legislative update from Washington by V.B. Morris, national secretary for AAM and delegate for District I of Texas.

Vandals Hit Five Locations Monday

Bovina law officers were investigating five break-ins within the city on Monday night. Places vandalized were the Spudnut Shop, Dairy Freeze, Bovina Wheat Growers Station, the junior high school and Woodrow's Snooker Parlour.

Mel Clark, Bovina City Marshall, said that whoever perpetrated the acts seemed more bent on destruction than stealing, as some vandalism was evident at each place.

At Bovina Wheat Growers, for example, the vandals took an object and broke windshield and headlights on vehicles in the station, including a motorcycle. They also completely demolished a stereo system.

At Bovina Junior High, a vending machine was broken into. However, very little money was missed, or even available, at any of the places.

"We would appreciate the assistance of anyone having information that might help us solve the cases. We will be glad to talk to anyone who has anything to offer," Clark said.

USDA Gets Grain For PIK Acres

The U.S. Department of Agriculture today announced it had arranged to acquire approximately 735 million bushels of corn, 145 million bushels (81 million hundredweight) of sorghum and 210 million bushels of wheat to satisfy Payment-in-kind (PIK) program needs.

March 29, USDA invited farmers with these commodities under Commodity Credit Corporation loan to submit bids during the period April 4-15.

Deputy Secretary of Agriculture Richard Lyng said USDA accepted all bids which did not request more than 20 per cent of compensation in like grain.

In addition, Lyng said, for 1981 and older crops of wheat, bids between 20 and 25 per cent were accepted to help meet program needs. Since reserve entry price levels for these crops of wheat were significantly lower than the current level, the higher per cent of compensation paid is cost-effective, Lyng said.

Farmers offered approximately 1 billion bushels of corn, 205 million bushels (115 million hundredweight) of sorghum and 210 million bushels of wheat, Lyng said.

"We accepted sufficient quantities of corn and sorghum to meet our expected needs," Lyng said, "but an insufficient amount of wheat."

"USDA will exercise its previously announced option requiring some wheat producers to obtain CCC loans on their 1983-crop wheat to satisfy the remainder of the PIK program needs."

Conservation Week Scheduled May 8-15

The Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District will join the nationwide celebration of Soil Stewardship Week to take place on May 8-15, according to an announcement by Troy Christian. The theme of this year's celebration is "Living Waters." The National Association of Conservation Districts (NACD) has sponsored Soil Stewardship Week since 1955, in cooperation with the nation's nearly 3,000 soil and water conservation districts.

"If our water management practices in the past have been adequate, we may ignore the rising population, the increased industrialization, and expanded irrigation, all of which require more water from our reservoirs," cites NACD in the 16-page Soil Stewardship Week booklet. "One of our more compelling social and economic needs is for a full appreciation of the true value of our abundant supply of water. It is time to think seriously about conservation, pollution, priority usage and our dependence upon it."

Informative material on the Soil Stewardship Week theme is distributed each year through local conservation districts to clergymen, lay leaders, churches, civic and educational organizations and to individuals participating in the

observance. "If we are to make certain that supplies will be adequate for present and future needs, we are obligated to abide by the universal laws and to help, rather than hinder, the process by which the constant supply of water is recycled and repurified," according to NACD.

This concluded the business and the meeting adjourned.

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





**CAPITOL
 UPDATE**

The devaluation of the peso and the economic crisis in Mexico has had a disastrous impact upon our cities and communities along the U.S.-Mexican border -- an impact which has been felt keenly in South Texas where unemployment estimates now range from 20 to 50 percent, where retail sales and wholesale trade are down 25 to 40 percent, and where illegal immigration into the U.S. from Mexico is up 50 percent.

This past fall, when Mexico's economic crisis became apparent, I was impressed by the well-coordinated, government-wide Mexican rescue plan where the Departments of the Treasury, State and Agriculture acted quickly and efficiently to ward off a major international crisis. Yet this same degree of coordination and commitment seems lacking in government to help our nation's border communities deal with a situation which is becoming noticeably worse as each day passes.

For this reason, I have asked President Reagan to appoint a special task force to visit South Texas, evaluate the situation and design workable solutions which can be implemented immediately by administrative means.

In addition to asking the President for this special task force, I plan to take action in Congress to help our border cities.

Last year, when the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that school districts must provide free public education to illegal alien children, I sponsored legislation which would have made the federal government share this financial burden. I plan to reintroduce that legislation because I feel it is unfair for local school districts to shoulder the full burden of a problem created by the federal government's inability to enforce our nation's immigration policies, and which promises to become even greater as the number of illegal entrants into the U.S. continue to escalate as a result of the economic conditions in Mexico.

Another of my legislative initiatives would affect the loans made to many border businesses by the Small Business Administration (SBA). Last fall the SBA made a number of loans to South Texas businesses, and since then has deferred interest and principal payments on some of these loans for a period of up to six months. Some of the businesses needed the loans to cover their Mexican accounts. My legislation would defer the SBA loan payments on the portion of the loan which covers an account with a Mexican business.

I also plan to work with the Secretary of Commerce to get top administrative priority to processing applications for foreign trade zones in the areas impacted by the peso devaluation. Currently there are three applications from the Texas border area -- Laredo, Eagle Pass and Brownsville -- either pending or about to be filed. I believe it is important that these applications be given top priority so that these cities do not experience the same type of delays experienced by Houston's application which was hung up in Commerce for over a year and was finally dislodged by my intervention.

Additionally, I plan to introduce legislation directing the Secretary of the Department of Housing and Urban Development to make technical assistance grants to help small cities along the border in designing, applying for and implementing Urban Development Action Grants (UDAG). Too often the UDAG program builds only hotel projects and the related amenities. Although hotels are sources of tourism revenues and service sector jobs, many border cities would prefer to see more UDAG dollars spent for attracting non-service sector employment, such as manufacturing and wholesaling.

Obviously, all the problems faced by our border communities will not be immediately solved. However, I believe we cannot afford to continue ignoring the problems in hopes that they will immediately vanish. These proposals are just a few of the ones I plan to introduce in the coming months to help our border communities.


