IF YE EDITOR has to wake up to the howling sound of the wind blowing just one more time this spring, we're considering one of two alternatives.

One would be a move to Acapulco.

The other would be requesting a padded cell in some institution, where we surely couldn't hear the wind blowing.

After having a fairly mild month of March in the wind department, it has more than made up for it during April and May, as the wind factory has cranked up virtually every day the past two months.

And the nice moisture received from the big snows of the past winter has virtually all dried up, as the moisture completely turned off.

If the area doesn't receive its regular "end of school rain" this year, then things are going to really be serious.

Several farmers have commented that seeds have been planted which will require a rain to get to come up.

We seem to go from one extreme to the other in the Panhandle of Texas. As one area farmer put it: "This country can promise you more, and then give you less, than any other section of the country possibly could."

However, the local area has not been all alone in the category of weather extremes.

The winter and early spring brought devastating floods to the West Coast, as well as in Louisiana. We heard Monday that London, England had had rain for the 30th consecutive day. The residents of England were thinking about building an ark.

At least to this point (knock on wood), the severe weather, including tornadoes, has missed the immediate area, but has wrecked havoc on spots in the Midwest and the Southeastern portions of the country.

Some weather experts have blamed the drastic changes in weather patterns on such things as volcanoes. Mount St. Helens, in Washington State, spewed so much smoke and volcanic ash into the atmosphere, for example, that it was felt that this affected weather patterns across a big section of the country.

And there are still volcanoes active today, in Sicily and Hawaii.

OUR FRIEND Nelson Lewis had a suggestion for the problem of disposing of nuclear wastes, with which the Department of Energy is threatening our area.

Since nobody wants the nuclear wastes, and more particularly in a populated area, and one on which the nation depends for a large percentage of its foodstuff products, Lewis has the following suggestion:

"Why not dispose of the nuclear wastes in the frozen North? That would be out of everyone's way, and if the material did happen to generate some heat, maybe it would melt some of the ice-cap and help our diminishing water supply," Lewis says.

This may be a facetious solution to the problem, but it makes as much sense as anything the government and its bureaucracy has come up with

Court Approves More ROW Expenses

More right-of-way expenses were approved by the Parmer County Commissioners at their regular session Monday, May 9.

Approved was a bill from Deaf Smith REC in the amount of \$14,669.84, for clearing electric lines from the right-of-way on Proposed FM 3333.

Friona City Manager Jerry Lewis met with the court asking them to consider assistance for his city's trash dump, which is heavily used by rural residents.

Lewis explained the problems faced by the City of Friona in relation to its dump ground, and pointed out the amount of trash being hauled to the dump site from rural areas in the county.

Sheriff Bill Morgan met with the court once again, in regard to a freezer which his department had requested, in order to be able to store at least a week's supply of food for jail inmates.

The court opened bids on the requested freezer from Reeve Chevrolet-Olds, Wilhelm TV & Appliance, and White's Auto, all of Friona. Motion was passed to purchase the unit from White's Auto for the amount of \$487.00.

Sheriff Morgan stated that funds would be available from the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission through the criminal justice program applications for additional needed equipment. The county and the PRPC would split the co st on a 50-50 basis through this program, and the county has a chance to get over \$6,250 worth of equipment at a cost of \$3,128, Morgan said. Funds for the purchases are expected to be available in September.

Requests from Laura Jacobs and Seth Ralston, county extension agents, to attend one-hour summer classes this summer at Eastern New Mexico University were approved.

graduation exercises.


Whitten, in addition to compiling the top scholastic average in the class, has been very active in extracurricular activities. He has attended school all 12 years in the Bovina

City Sets Rate Hike On Service

The City of Bovina, after discussing the situation for over a month, has decided to raise the price of trash and sewer services to city residents and businesses, in order to pay for needed improvements in the city's sanitation department.

The city is needing to dig a new pit at its dump ground, in order to be able to dispose of collected trash. Also, the city's trash truck is needing an overhaul job which will be expensive.

A spokesman for the city council said that the decision had been made to raise the price of sewer and trash service \$2.50 per month, each. The new rates will go into effect on July 1.

The city was faced with the decision of either raising prices on its service, or raising property tax. By putting the increase on every water meter, the increased cost will be spread around to more people, and not just the property owners.

Present cost of sewer service is \$3.00 per month, and the trash charge is \$5.00 (minimum) per month. Each will increase by \$2.50 on July 1.



Memorial Day signals the end of school and the beginning of summer vacations. There will be an increase in the number of vehicles on our streets and highways, according to Major Vernon Cawthon, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Cawthon stated, "Countless lives would be saved if drivers would not disregard their own safety and the safety of others. Speeding, drinking drivers and carelessness will account for the greatest percentage of deaths this Memorial Day weekend."

DPS records show that 58 persons died in traffic accidents on Texas streets and highways during the Memorial Day weekend last year, and the DPS Commander pointed out that, "One drinking driver or speeding motorist has destroyed an entire family."

Cawthon said, "Holiday or vacation trips should be planned and a rest stop should be made every two hours to allow drivers and passengers a chance to get out and stretch to help eliminate stress and fatigue."

Major Cawthon added, "Drivers who think ahead, stay alert, wear their seat belt, avoid the use of alcohol while driving, and obey speed limits can have a safe trip and a great vacation."

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SPS Employees Get Promotions

Two longtime Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS) employees have been named chief engineers and added to the SPS management committee.

James B. Matthews of 3713 Teckla, Amarillo, and W.T. Seitz of 6009 Hanson, Amarillo, were promoted May 1.

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Matthews was named chief engineer, generation plant design and construction. He had been group manager of the generation plant design group at SPS since March 1978.

Seitz became chief engineer, general engineering. He had been general engineering group manager since March 1978.

The two join fifteen others on the SPS management committee.

Southwestern Public Service is a publicly traded utility company that primarily provides electrical power to more than one million people in a nearly 70,000-square-mile area in the Panhandle and South Plains of Texas, eastern and southeastern New Mexico, the Oklahoma Panhandle and southwestern Kansas.

The company is one of two in the United States whose power generation plants are designed completely by in-house engineers who also oversee turnkey construction of the generation plants.

Matthews is a native of Vera, Okla. He attended Shidler, Okla. schools and was graduated from the Edmond, Okla. high school. He attended Central State College at Edmond, and received a bachelor of science in mechanical engineering in 1949 from Oklahoma State

University at Stillwater. Matthews joined SPS in August 1949 as a maintenance mechanic's helper and auxiliary operator at the Moore County, Texas power plant. He became Moore County Plant engineer in 1950, and was assistant plant manager from 1951 until 1957. In 1957, Matthews was made plant manager at the Cunningham Station near Hobbs, New Mexico.

He was a project engineer consultant for SPS from 1968 until 1972, when he was named chief engineer, generation plant design, a position he held until 1974. He was manager of engineering, generation plant design, from May 1974 until March 1978.

Matthews is a registered professional engineer in Texas, and a member of the Texas Society of Professional Engineers, the National Society of Professional Engineers, and the American Society of Mechanical Engineers.

He served in the United States Air Force as a pilot from 1942 to 1946, attaining the rank of captain.

Matthews and his wife Betty Jane have four children, Susan, Sallie, Marc and Paul.

Seitz was born at Mobeetie, Texas. He received a bachelor of science in electrical engineering in 1951 from Texas Tech University at Lubbock. He joined Southwestern Public Service in June 1951 as a junior engineer, and was promoted to engineer in March 1954. In January 1956 he became a poweer sales engineer, in 1965 senior design engineer, and in 1968 senior operations engineer. He was named division superintendent in 1973; in May 1974, he became manager, planning, a position he held until March 1978.

He is a registered professional engineer in Texas, and is a past chairman of the Texas Panhandle chapter of the Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers.

Seitz is a member of First Baptist Church, Amarillo, and is a past board member of the Amarillo


Steve Talkington, Parmer County Trooper, reports that for the month of April the Texas Highway Patrol Troopers investigated a total of eleven accidents in this county.







Excell Opening **Boxed Beef Plant**

Excell Corporation announced Thursday it will begin operating a new boxed beef fabrication plant adjacent to its modern facilities in Dodge City, Kansas on Monday, May

When fully operational in December, the new boxed beef plant will employ 600 workers in two shifts, and process 3,800 cattle carcasses daily into vacuum-sealed beef, trimmed of excess fat and bone, said William G. Fielding, president of

At that time, Excell's Dodge City employment will be about 1,100, he said. The fabrication plant currently employs about 300 people in a single shift, and the slaughter plant has about 500 employees.

"To be a major, competitive factor in beef processing today, slaughter and fabrication facilities have to be adjacent to one another and located near the cattle supply. The new fabrication plant in Dodge City enables us to serve customers more efficiently and to bid more competitively for cattle. The new plant's location also fulfills a commitment Excell made to the community when we dedicated our slaughter facility in March of 1980," Fielding said.

He said the new facility will provide jobs for about 300 to 350 residents of the Dodge City area. Fielding said 180 of the 450 workers expected by the company's decision to eliminate the second shift at its Wichita fabrication plant have transferred to Dodge City. In addition, spouses of 50 transferred workers will be employed at the new fabrication plant.

Prior to the opening of the Dodge City plant, all cattle slaughtered there were shipped to Wichita for fabrication.

Excell announced in March that it would eliminate 450 jobs at the Wichita plant when the new Dodge City boxed beef plant began operation.

The Wichita fabrication plant now employs 500 workers to process specialty beef products. The 220,000square foot Dodge City fabrication plant features advanced automation and computerization in its processing system, which make it one of the residing in Houston.







Around The House

The United States Department of Agriculture this week released new processing recommendations for tomatoes and tomato juice, applesauce, fruit purees and pumpkin.

To prevent food borne illness and the loss of valuable home canned foods, specialists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service are urging home canners to follow the new USDA guidelines.

The USDA now recommends the following:

*The one-step, cold pack method for canning tomatoes should no longer be

*The hot pack processing time for canning tomatoes should be increased to 35 minutes for pint jars and No. 2 cans, and to 45 minutes for quart jars and No. 21/2 cans.

*The hot pack processing time for canning tomato juice should be increased to 35 minutes for pint and quart jars, and for No. 2 and 21/2

*Strained (pureed) pumpkin and winter squash should not be canned at home. Instead, cubed pumpkin and squash may be canned using a processing time of 55 minutes for pint jars and 90 minutes for quart

*The processing times for applesauce and fruit puree should be increased to 20 minutes for pints, quarts, No. 2 and 21/2 cans.

According to Marilyn Haggard, a foods and nutrition specialist with the Extension Service, the changes in canning recommendations are based on research conducted at land-grant universities and the Eastern Regional Research Center of the USDA. "The recommendation to more than triple hot-pack processing times for tomatoes was based on research which indicated that shorter times could be insufficient under certain conditions," says Haggard. Insufficient processing could allow botulism organisms to survive the heat treatment, grow and produce harmful toxins, she explained.



-- How would you enjoy a watermelon that is "all heart''? Well, thanks to advances in plant breeding seedless watermelons are currently available. An obvious question that arises when one discusses seedless watermelons is where do you get the seed to produce a seedless watermelon. Seedless watermelons are the result of genetic manipulation and the use of chromosone doubling chemicals that results in a plant that produces watermelon fruit without seed. So, if spitting watermelon seeds is not one of your favorite past times, be on the look out for

seedless varieties. -- Do you know the difference between sweet corn and field corn? There is actually very little difference except that sweet corn has a genetic factor which prevents the conversion of sugar to starch which results in sweeter tasting kernels. Today, plant breeders across the U.S. are utilizing this characteristic to produce even sweeter tasting corn. If you've had problems growing corn chances are it is due to lack of good pollination. Each kernel on the cob requires pollination. Each kernel has its own silk which protrudes from the ear of corn. A pollen grain must land on each silk and travel down the silk to pollinate the immature kernel. If this process is not complete then poorly filled ears of corn will result. If you are growing corn in your garden you can start the water boiling about 21 days after silking occurs.

-- Can you name a vegetable that harvests itself? The answer is cantaloupe, or as it should accurately be called, the muskmelon. When it is ripe, it slips off the vine. The cantaloupe or muskmelon origiated in Persia and must be considered as one of the most flavorable and tasty vegetables. Contrary to commonly described by and salads as the last course.

gardeners is not due to the fact that it crossed with cucumbers or some other vining crop but rather due to poor growing conditions. Poor flavor is most commonly caused by excessive moisture during the last seven to ten days of its ripening which gives the fruit a bland, unflavorable taste. -- Can you name a vege-

table that continues to grow and enlarge after being

harvested? Well, asparagus does. The asparagus spears after being harvested continue to lengthen. Therefore, when grown commercially and harvested for shipment and sale, the spears are placed in containers considerably longer than their length. When they arrive at their final destination the containers are completely filled with the tasty and nutritious asparagus. Another unique fact about asparagus is that it is one of the few vegetables that has both male and female plants. Obviously both produce spears, but female plants also bear berries. Asparagus is also one of the few vegetables that can tolerate high levels of salt in and around the growing plant. Years ago, and it is still recommended somewhat today, table salt is used for weed control around garden grown asparagus.


