Council challenges Energas Co. proposed rate increase

Post City Council members, at the regular monthly meeting Tuesday evening, approved a resolution to stall implementation of an Energas Company rate increase for 90 days, and agreed to join a municipal cooperative effort to negotiate the proposed 5.3 percent increase in rates.

Energas has notified area cities of their intent to raise the rates, which have not been increased since 1996. The council accepted the invitation from Midland city manager Mike McGregor who explained in a letter plans for holding a cooperative city meeting in Lubbock August 9.

Blood drive today

Construction completed on new prison facility

Administrators for the newly-built correctional facility moved into their new offices last week, Warden Terry Bartlett said Tuesday afternoon.

The facility is "substantially complete," he said, and the unit's "skeleton crew" moved into offices last Thursday and Friday. However, the facility still has no contract, and no date has been set as to when prisoners will be brought in.

The facility was built to house state prisoners, but the state backed out on its verbal obligations in May, Bartlett said. Since then, officials have been working diligently on "Plan B," negotiating with several other entities that might be able to utilize the unit's space.

To date, officials have worked closely with the Federal Bureau of Prisons and several other states.

Bartlett said federal officials visited the site slightly more than a month ago and seemed "excited and pleased" about the possibilities.

"We should know something soon," he said.

When a contract is landed, it will take an additional 60 days for facility officials to complete the hiring and mandatory training process.

Bartlett said a best-case scenario would see a contract hammered out in the next three to four weeks, followed by the 60-day hiring/training period.

Completion of the correctional facility was delayed this summer when recent hailstorms knocked out most of the building's skylights and destroyed the air conditioner condenser units on the roof.

Boren, who is trying to sell the lot, asked for detailed information about what restrictions there will be, so that he can properly inform those interested in buying the property. Local realtor Anne Sims was with Boren and explained that a potential buyer needs to know what restrictions are expected. Boren agreed to meet with city manager Fred Stephens to clarify the requirements.

The council approved a resolution in support of a grant application by the Caprock Cultural Association for preservation work on the old Algerita Hotel building. Mayor Archie Gill and Stephens emphasized that the resolution only expresses support, and that all matching funds will be from private sources. "We are not allowed and will not put any tax funds into this project," Gill added.

CCA's JoAnn Mock explained that the project would include exterior repairs, "which are badly needed." The grant will come from a Texas Department of Transportation administered program.

The council approved the first reading of a repeal of portions of the cemetery ordinance. The council also approved the use of a form and rate for the purchase of cemetery lots.

No action was taken on the budget, but the council agreed to conduct budget workshops on August 17 and 24, with both meetings to begin a 6:30 p.m. at city hall.

"It looks like it's going to be a tight budget," Gill said, "but we don't know yet what the appraised values are."

Attending the meeting were council members Bill Pool, Dickie Odum, Juanita Pantoja, Harold Craig, Mayor Gill, city secretary WYvonne Kennedy and Morton.

Freda Kelly explains Y2K potential problems at Rotary Club program

Nineteen Rotarians and one guest attending the July 27 Post Rotary Club meeting enjoyed a presentation by Freda Kelly, registered nurse with Covenant Home Health Care and wife of one of the organization's members. Mrs. Kelly pointed out that some implanted medical devices, such as pacemakers, internal defibrillators and nerve stimulators, could be affected by the Y2K problem if such devices contain computer chips. Additionally, it is possible that home medical equipment like glucometer monitors, ventilators and telephone transmissions of EKG rhythms which have electronic connections to computers may also be affected. If you are concerned, contact Mrs. Kelly for a guide to help you find out if your medical device or equipment will work correctly in the year 2000.

Rotary International has been involved for many years in funding Polio Plus, a world-wide campaign to conquer polio forever. Last year, 450 million children were vaccinated against polio and elimination of the disease is "achingly close," reports United Nation Children's Fund Executive Director Carol Bellamy. 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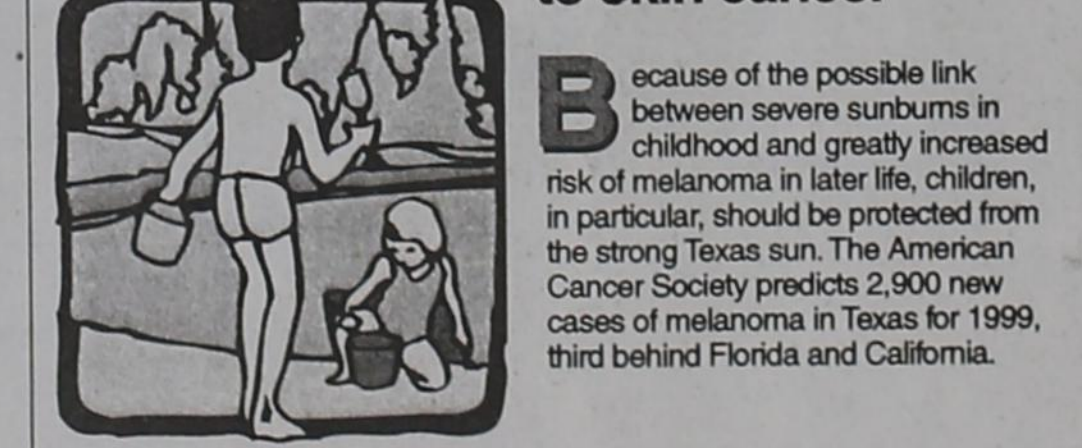
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Georgiana Fuentez honored at Quinceanera

Roths For Everyone

Roth IRAs offer such a terrific savings opportunity-tax free earnings with no age limits on contributions or withdrawals-that investors are opening them for anyone who can qualify.

Anyone with earned income can invest it, up to \$2,000 a year, into a Roth IRA, as long as the AGI is below \$95,000 (\$150,000 for couples). Reduced contributions are allowed for incomes up to \$110,000 for singles, \$160,000 for couples. In addition, a working spouse can open a Roth for his or her nonworking partner.

Roth IRAs are super vehicles for youngsters with earned income from baby-sitting or a paper route. A regular IRA's deduction isn't worth much now, and they have years for that tax-free interest to grow. If a youngster hasn't saved enough a parent or grandparent can help. It's even legal to use money from a custodial account.

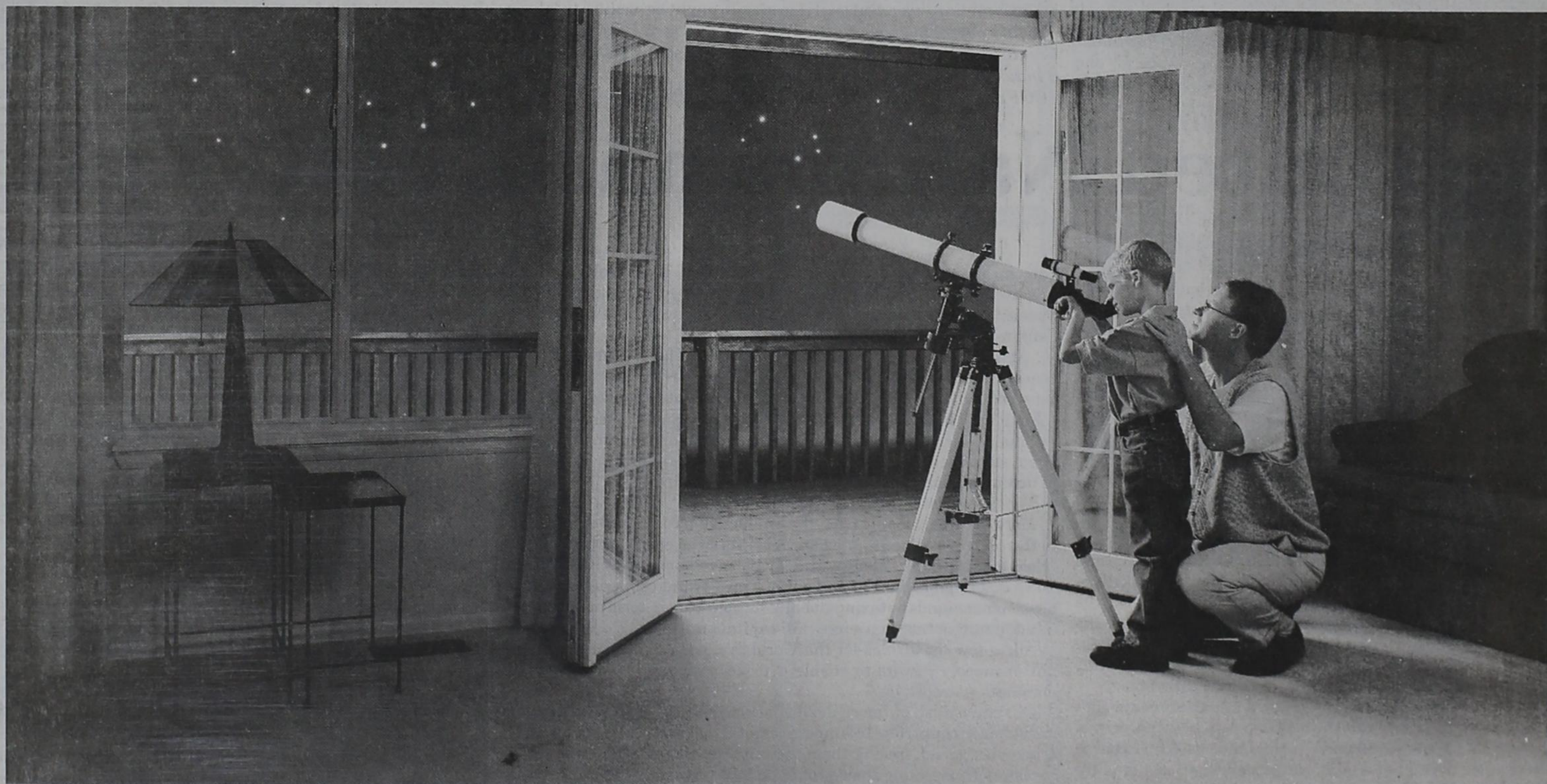
