

## "MY TURN"

ONE OF THE best-attended annual functions in Friona for the past few years, has been the local Science Fair in conjunction with open house at the schools during Public School Week. I am always amazed by the variety of excellent science projects which are created by the students each year.

Teachers, bless their little old hearts! They have to put up with a lot from all of our off-spring for 12 or 13 years. We should give them a lot of credit for causing some thought-processes to be activated in the brains of our reluctant youngsters.

High-technology is taking over in the work-place across our country. It is necessary now, more than at any other time in our history, for us to turn out well-educated young people from our high schools. However, the sad fact is, that prospective employers can no longer assume that just because someone comes in with a high school diploma, that he or she is going to be prepared to do an adequate job.

I believe that the schools in our local area turn out a fair majority of students who are well above average. However, one out of every three adults in this country lack the reading and writing skills they need to hold a job.

This poorly educated work force is costing the business world hundreds of billions of dollars in waste. For example, instances have been documented in which employees misordered millions of dollars in parts, overpaid bills and claims and endangered work-place safety. In one case, a feedlot operator misread a label which ended up killing a pen of cattle when they were fed poison instead of feed grain. Costs of this nature always end up filtering down to be eventually paid by, guess who, YOU the consumer.

District Attorney Johnny Actkinson told a group at Lions Club Ladies Night last year that the one thing that 80 per cent of all criminals in jails across the state of Texas had in common was a lack of education. He pointed out that the majority of those prisoners had no more than a seventh grade education.

I haven't seen any figures, but I'll bet the U.S. spends more on educating its children than practically any other country in the world. So why, then, are we turning out so many young adults who are totally inadequate to function in society?

A lot of folks have been blaming the educational system in general for this sad fact. I don't think that is exactly fair. My father used to have an old saying that went like this... "You can lead a horse to water, but you can't make him drink." We are leading a lot of children to the fountain of knowledge, but they simply aren't drinking in very much of it. They seem to exhibit a rather large lack of interest in learning. Why?

This generation of youngsters seems to feel that they should be entertained at every waking moment. Well, some amount of education can be made entertaining. I am sure that most of our teachers work toward making their respective courses as interesting as possible for the students. But the children need to be made to understand that, from ages 5 through 18, it is their JOB to learn, whether it happens to be entertaining or not.

We need to impress our children with the fact, at a very young age, that they will some day be expected to go to work and earn a paycheck. You cannot earn a paycheck by watching TV, playing video games, or "hanging out."

Times have changed. Jobs are different. But one thing remains the same. You can't get ahead in life without an education and you can't hold down a job if you don't know your "three R's."

## Doctor Leaving Local Clinic

Dr. Michael Woollends announced this week that effective the end of March he was ceasing his arrangement with the Bovina Medical Clinic.

Dr. Woollends cited the low patient level but said that the main factor instrumental in his decision was the existence of federally-subsidized clinics belonging to an entity known as South Plains Health Provider Organization (SPHPO).

The SPHPO has clinics in Hereford, Dimmitt and Muleshoe, among other places, and are capable of giving subsidized primary medical care to those unable to pay for it.

"I have spent a great deal of time and research into obtaining funds for an equivalent system of federal subsidization for patients in the Bovina area, and I feel that I have exhausted all reasonable attempts with no success," Dr. Woollends said.

"I must commend and thank the board of Bovina Medical Clinic for all the tremendous assistance that it has given me. My wife and I have enjoyed the genuine warmth and

hospitality of this community," the doctor said.

He said that he was negotiating with the hospital in Amherst to establish his primary office there, and if that worked out, he might be able to render medical assistance to Bovina Medical Clinic on a part-time basis until Bovina is able to obtain the services of a full-time physician.

"We hate to see Dr. Woollends go, and we will begin immediately looking to find a replacement for him," said Billy Whitecotton, spokesman for the Bovina Clinic board.

"Personally and professionally, I feel that the granting of financial assistance to subsidize medical care to those unable to pay for it is meritorious; however, I feel that the decision of the federal agency funding SPHPO not to fund assistance within this county is unfair and discriminatory, especially in view of the severe economic recession this region has experienced," Dr. Woollends said.
