Federal officials made a visit to the Giles W. Dalby Correctional
Facility last week following what has been described as a "small disturbance" in the unit's population. Representatives of the Federal Bureau of Prisons visited the prison, a move interim Warden J.C. Conner described as "standard procedure... following an incident."
The "incident" occurred early last week and involved the use of

in the kitchen where three inmates who were working "weren't doing something right" and got into a disàgreement with a security ing someth

"Things were totally under control the entire time," Conner said, adding that there was never any danger to inmates or employees. No inmates were injured in the disturbance, the warden said. One officer was injured afterwards when he slipped in a puddle of water and hurt his knee,

the incident was unavailable, Conner said seven have been "charged with infractions of the rules of the facility." "These men will be sub-
ject to disciplinary measures - the loss of "good time," placement

## EPISTAXIS

A fancy word for a nosebleed, epistaxis is an equal opportunity problem that can strike any age group, of both sexes, at any time. While a majority of nosebleeds have a
common cusse, there are times when epistaxis may indicate common cause, there are times when epistaxis may indicate a medical condition and on occasion, a serious one. The main culprit of nosebleeds is the overeagerness to keep the nose clean. To be more blunt that means nose blowing and nose picking. However there are other causes.
Allergies, low humidity certain over the Allergies, low humidity, certain over the counter and prescription medications like decongestants and
antihistamines can cause epistaxis. More serious causes antihistamines can cause epistaxis. More erious causes include high blood pressure, some bleeding disorders and
tumors. tumors.
There are two types of nosebleeds, anterior and posterior. Although both can be caused by the same problem, the most treated at home, while posterior bleeds need medical treated at
attention.
attention. hard, right where the tissue stops and the bone begins. Do this while sitting up and for at least 10 minutes, without letting go. If this is not successful, blow the nose forcefully to expel any clots and spray the nostril with a decongestant and again hold pressure for 10 minutes. These maneuvers will again hold pressure for 10 minutes. These mat
stop all but the most stubborn anterior bleed.
A humidifier, some vaseline in the nose and sensible use of medications will go a long way to preventing epistaxis, but if a nose bled continues to reoccur, see your medical provider to rule out a more serious caus
