wild bull riding. A couple of hours in the yard or garden or a good 30 -
45 minute walk will do wonders for your attitude, your waistline and your health.
Limit your sun exposure, use sunscreen, a hat and long sleeve shirt. If you get a suspicious skin lesion, get it looked at before it gets big and
ugly. Even if it costs you money, go see a medical provider at least every
