#### New Wrinkles in Cafeteria Plans

Traditionally, "cafeteria" plans to pay for medical coverage, dependent-care expenses and the like with pretax dollars are set up in the beginning of the year. Each employee needs to decide how much income to put aside to cover these costs. The hard part: any money set aside and unused is lost

The medical expense plan covers future expenses only. One sole proprietor adopted a plan in mid-December to cover workers' out-of-pocket medical expenses for the entire year; he even hired his wife and covered her expenses. An audit and the tax court said no.

Up to now, some midyear changes were allowed in case of marriage, divorce, the birth or adoption of a child, or such. Now, more changes will be allowed - when a health plan option is added, for instance, or when employees switch to a different provider of dependent care, or if one half of a couple who are in different plans with different election periods chooses new







One political question we have to answer is whether George W. Bush or Albert Gore shall be president, and just which party will control the House of Representatives and the Senate.

But I'd suggest that there's a far more important long-run question we must answer: If one group of people prefers government control and management

of people's lives, and another prefers liberty and a desire to be left alone, should they be required to fight, antagonize one another, and risk bloodshed and loss of life in order to impose their preferences,

Like a marriage that has gone bad, I believe there are enough irreconcilable differences between those who want to control and those want to be left alone that divorce is the only peaceable alternative. Just as in a marriage, where vows are broken, our human rights protections guaranteed by the U.S. Constitution have

been grossly violated by a government instituted to protect them. abrogation have no intention of mending their ways. Let's look at just some of the magnitude of the violations. Article 1, Section 8 of our Constitution enumerates the activities for which Congress is

authorized to tax and spend. James Madison, the acknowledged father of the Constitution, explained it in The Federalist Papers: "The powers delegated by the proposed Constitution to the federal government are few and defined. Those which are to remain in the State governments are numerous and indefinite. The former will be exercised principally on external objects, as war, peace, negotiation and foreign commerce. ... The powers reserved to the several States will extend to all the objects which in the ordinary course of affairs, concern the lives and liberties, and properties of the people, and the internal order, improvement and prosperity of the State."

Neither is there authority for Congress' mandates to the states and people about how they may use their land, the speed at which they can drive, whether a library has wheelchair ramps and the gallons of water used per toilet flush.

Americans who wish to live free have two options: We can resist, fight and risk bloodshed to force America's tyrants to respect our liberties and human rights, or we or should they be able to peaceably part company and go their can seek a peaceful resolution of our irreconcilable differences by

That can be done by peopling several states, say Texas and Louisiana, controlling their legislatures and then issuing a unilateral declaration of independence just as the Founders did in 1776. You say, "Williams, nobody has to go that far, just get involved in the political process and vote for the right person."

That's nonsense. Liberty shouldn't require a vote. It's a God-given Americans who are responsible for and support constitutional or natural right. Some independence or secessionists movements, such as our 1776 war with England and our 1861 War Between the States, have been violent, but they need not be.

In 1905, Norway seceded from Sweden, Panama seceded from Columbia (1903), and West Virginia from Virginia (1863) Nonetheless, violent secession can lead to great friendships. England is probably our greatest ally and we have fought three major wars

There is no reason why Texiana (Texas and Louisiana) couldn't peaceably secede, be an ally and have strong economic ties with United States. The bottom line question for all of us is should we part company or continue trying to forcibly impose our wills on one another?



# County, state get \$31,259 from travelers in August

in Garza County netted the county and state a total of \$31,259.23 according to reports from the two expense of defending the right of Justice of the Peace courts here.

The year-to-date total collections from corporate code violators on Garza County highways is \$229,199.27.

JP 1 court records show a total of \$17,958.15 collected from 134 victims in August, compared to \$13,301.08 in JP 2 from 67 violators.

Most, if not all of these victims of highway theft, have no idea that they are part of a gigantic legislative scheme, which considers all who travel to be doing so within certain boundaries of an incorporated area, therefore the "subjects" are required to follow the corporation's rules.

The "Transporation Code" is not even a law, not having the constitutionally required enabling act as part of the statute. Of course, there's a good reason for that omission, there is no constitutional authority for corporate government to enforce corporate rules in violation of basic constitutional guarantees, such as liberty, the right of travel from one place to another.

Although most Texans think of themselves as free to move about as they wish, they discover their true status as corporate "citizens" once they become victimized by the to be an "operator of a motor vehicle." corporation's policy enforcers.

Because of the extortionate travel in the corporation's court system, most Texans meekly submit to the extortion and voluntarily gave up their right of travel by declaring themselves "motor vehicle" operators, through applications for certificates of title as well as "motor vehicle" licenses.

Although the Texas transportation code technically applies only to those people involved in commercial use of producing program. the highways, it is obvious that the vast majority of "criminals" tagged in highway traffic fines were paid by "volunteers." Very few, if any, of those victims realize that the cars and trucks they drive are not included in the regulations related to the transportation code, unless the original owner voluntarily submitted to the corporation policy.

The Texas Transportation Code defines commercial use of the highways as those carrying passengers or property for hire. Cars and trucks, which are not used for hire in carrying property or passengers, are not "motor vehicles" as defined by the code.


