## Congressman Thornberry outlines congressional work, federal budget

There should be a budget approved by the U.S. Congress by Memorial Day, according to U.S. Congressman Mac Thornberry (13th Congressional District) who visited Post last Saturday.

Thornberry also said that the 10 year projected budget shows a surplus of \$5.6 trillion, "and that's what the debate is all about ... what to do with that projected surplus," he told the five Garza County citizens who took time to meet with the congressman.

"Taxes are too high," he added, "and we're going to reduce the rate of income tax for everyone."

On education, Thornberry said he doesn't want to see more requirements placed on local districts. He favors federal funding, but wants funds to be administered by local school districts according to local needs.

The congressman also believes that there will be supplemental spending approved for agriculture.

Thornberry said that working in Washington is much better with President Bush, "He actually arrives at meetings on time," Thornberry said, "in fact, sometimes we have to get there a bit early not to miss something."

Thornberry pointed out the big difference in leadership was demonstrated recently when the Naval air crew returned from detention in China. "President Bush did not rush out there to get all the attention... he is behaving in a presidential way."

The congressman emphasized the importance of a comprehensive energy plan, and supports President Bush's recent announcement. "We are much too dependent on foreign oil supplies," he said. "We need to help our oil producers, and open up production."

Thornberry agreed that the major problem now is inadequate refinery capacity, which is a reflection of too many regulatory restrictions.

"We haven't seen a new refinery built since 1976," he opined, "and worse, several have been shut down because of environmental rules."

On redistricting, the congressman is unsure how the congressional district will look after the legislature completes its work. "We know that this is the smallest populated district in Texas," he said, "and I suspect there's going to be some changes." He was unsure as to whether or not Garza County would continue in his district.

"We (congress) have no say in the matter, it's up to the states to draw the lines for congressional districts," Thornberry said.

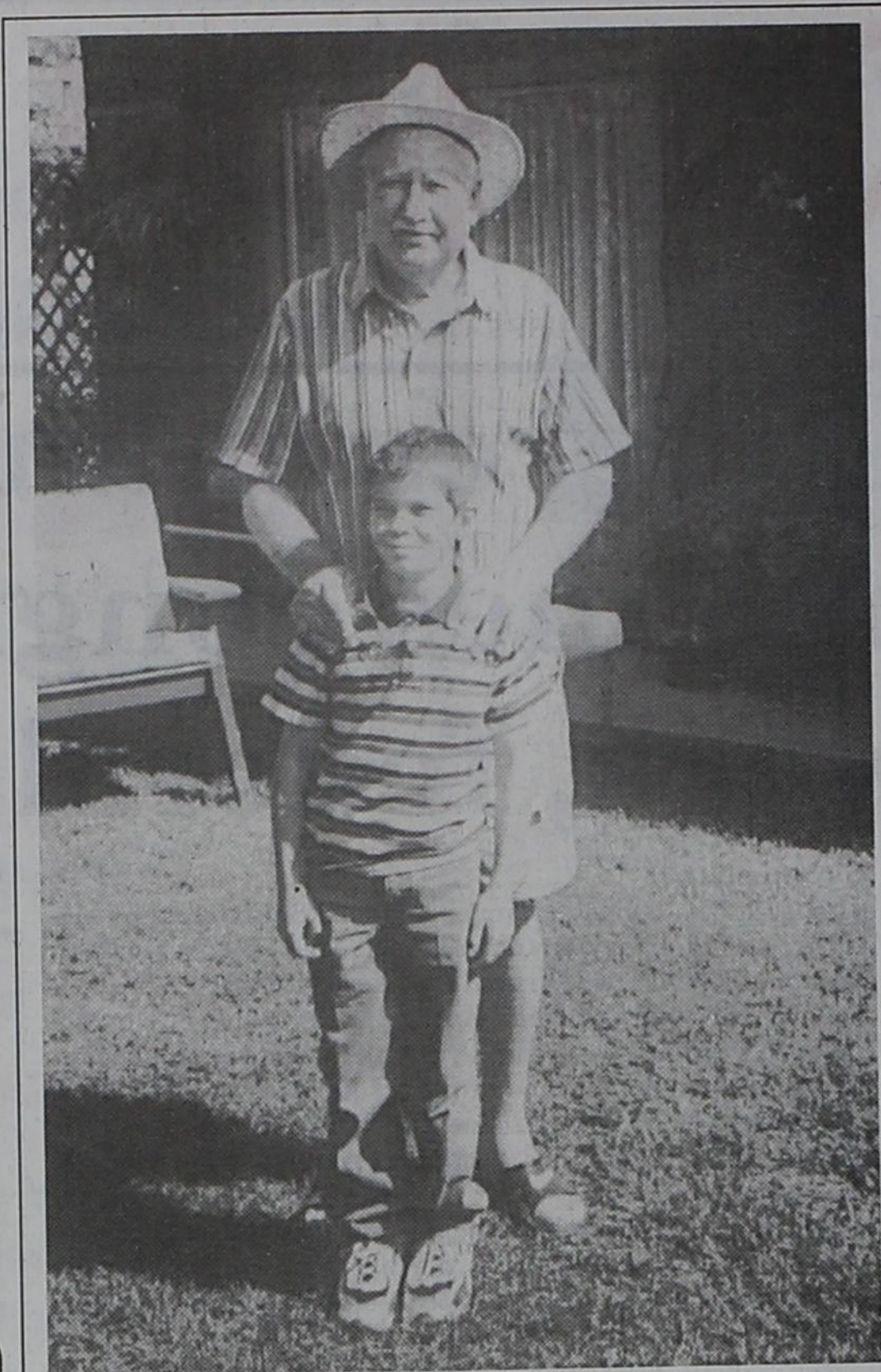

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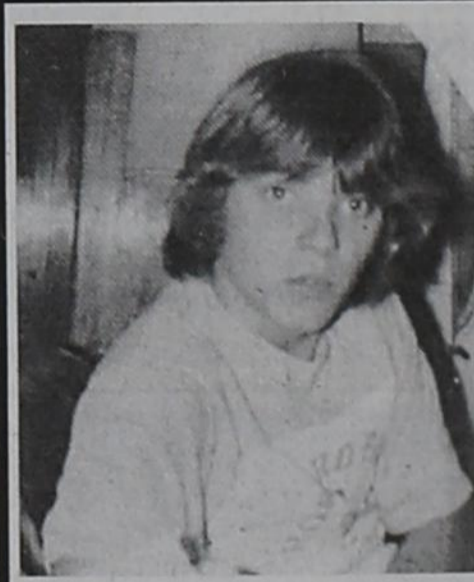

## Reduce Your Price at the Pump

I don't have to tell you that gas prices are high. Many of us are already feeling the crunch on our pocketbooks due to these high prices. Unfortunately, the forecast for lower prices looks bleak. However, there are a few things you can do to reduce your price at the pump.

1. Avoid rough roads whenever possible, because dirt or gravel can rob you of up to 30% of your gas mileage.
2. Auto air conditioners can reduce fuel economy by 10% to 20%. Heater fan, power windows, and seats increase engine load; the more you load on your engine, the less miles per gallon.
3. Remove excess weight from truck or inside of car - extra tires, backseats, unnecessary heavy parts. Extra weight reduces mileage, especially when driving up inclines.
4. Car pools reduce travel monotony and gas expense - all riders can chip in to help you buy gas.
5. Exceeding 40 mph forces your car to overcome tremendous wind resistance.
6. Never exceed legal speed limit. Primarily the are set for your traveling safety, however better gas efficiency also occurs.
7. Traveling at fast rate in low gears can consume up to 45% more fuel than needed.
8. Manual shift driven cars allow you to change to highest gear as soon as possible, thereby letting you save gas.
9. Keep windows closed when traveling at highway speeds. Open windows cause air drag, reducing your mileage by 10%.
10. Drive steadily. Slowing down or speeding up is a fuel waster.
11. Think ahead when approaching hills. If you accelerate, do it before you reach the hill, not while you're on it.
12. Avoid "revving" the engine, especially just before you switch the engine off; this wastes fuel needlessly.
13. No jack-rabbit starts. Accelerate slowly when starting from a dead stop. Don't push pedal down more and 1/4 of the total foot travel.
14. Buy gasoline during the coolest time of day - early morning or late evening is best. During these times gasoline is densest. Keep in mind - gas pumps measure volumes of gasoline, not densities of fuel concentration. You are charged according to the "volume of measurement."
15. Choose type and brand of gasoline carefully. Certain brands provide you with greater economy because of better quality. Use the brands that seem more beneficial.

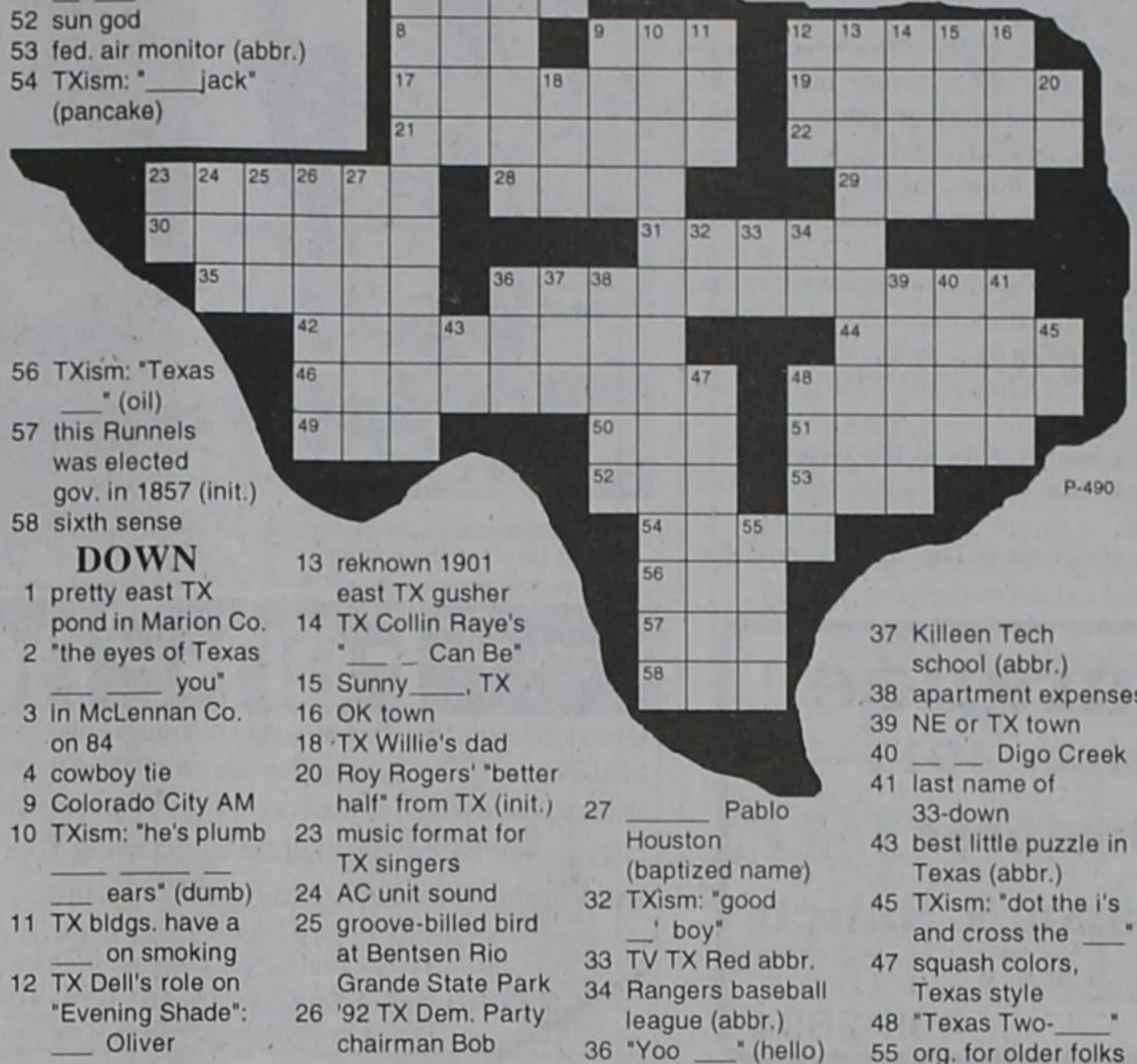

Two students from Post received departmental awards during South Plains College's recent annual Student Awards Assembly.

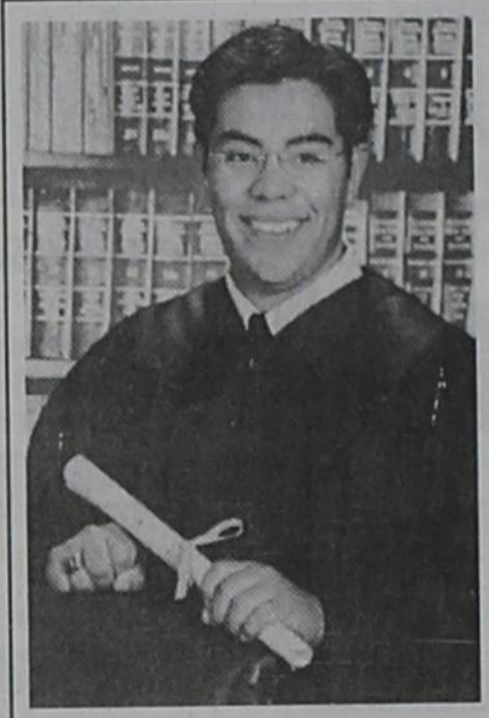

### What is the "Scope"?

Everyday, Texas Highway Patrol officers stop people who are traveling along the roads and highways. Many Texas citizens are happy with this. It offers a feeling of safety and security. But, no matter what the public's opinion is, the question must be raised, "Does the Department of Public Safety have the authority to enforce the traffic laws upon the traveling public?" The answer is "No."

The Department of Public Safety (D.P.S.) was established under the Government Code (Chapter 411), to enforce the Texas traffic laws (among others), under the Transportation Code. The Texas Highway Patrol is a division of the Texas D.P.S.

All codes are very specific as to who are required to abide by them. This is called the codes "scope." The scope of the Texas Transportation Code can be known by examining the word "transportation." Although this word is not defined in the Texas code, it is defined in the U.S. code. Another legal source is Black's Law Dictionary. I urge all your readers to use this legal jewel to learn the legal meaning of the word "transportation." After looking up this word, they will need to look up the word "carrier," which is used in defining the word "transportation."

The scope of the Texas Transportation Code includes all motor vehicles being used on roads and highways for the purpose of transportation for hire. It's that simple. The D.P.S. provides safety for the "traveling public" by regulating "transportation."

When the codes are allowed to interpret themselves, it can be seen that the citizens of Texas have been lied to by all levels of government for many decades. So much so, that both citizens and agents firmly believe the lie.

May all government agents and the judicial system meekly return to the true scope of the Transportation Code. Tim Burnett, Denton

### Beware of loose dogs

I want to express my appreciation to Judy Bush for making us more aware of the dangers of a loose dog. This could be an animal that you do not consider dangerous, but under certain conditions will bite.

It is almost daily that one or more of our city mail delivery carriers will experience some form of interference in the delivery of mails by a loose dog. This is very seldom a stray dog, but a dog that the owner knows that his/her animal is running loose.

I have been instructed that the procedure for having a dog picked up is to file a complaint on the dog owner for violation of the city ordinance. This is time consuming, and very often delays or prevents the mails from being delivered at that residence or a neighbor's residence.

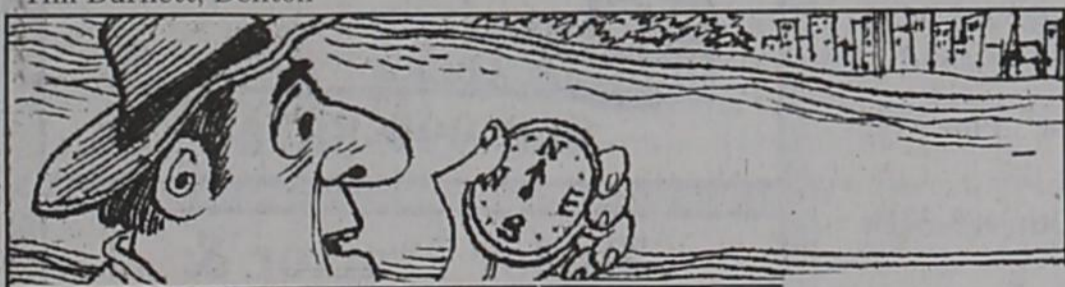
As postmaster, I am responsible for the safety of all employees in this office. I take this responsibility very seriously and at no time will I place any employee in a position of a possible dog bite situation. I have instructed all mail delivery employees to curtail the mail delivery of any residence that a dog interferes with the delivery of the mails.

This means that not only does the dog owner not receive delivery of the mails, but often causes the neighbors to also not receive delivery of the mails. Mail delivery for those addresses will be provided only after I can confirm that delivery of the mails are safe for our delivery employees.

Dog bites are not only very painful, but are very expensive to treat.

I am requesting your assistance in providing our mail delivery employees with a safe environment for the delivery of the mails by keeping your animals confined in a fence or restrained on a lease. Mail delivery will not be made at residences where a dog interferes with a mail delivery employee.

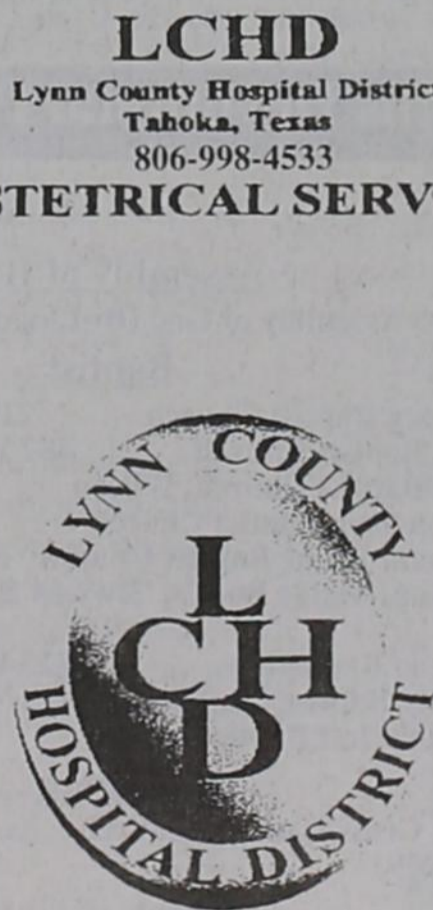
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## Sheri Lewis earns TTU degree

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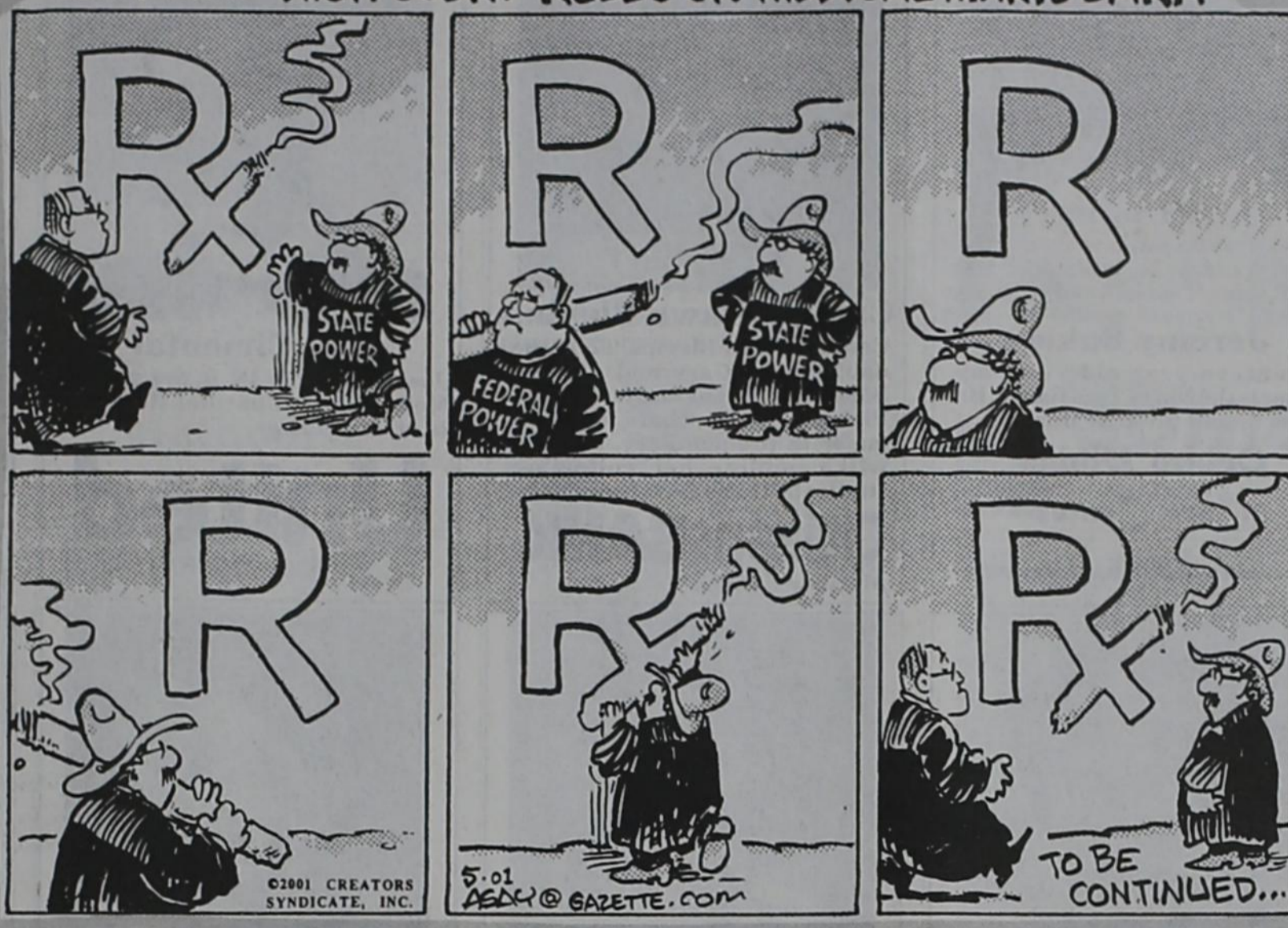

## Repeal the 16th Amendment

"America existed for nearly 140 years without an income tax," Paul concluded. "The federal government generally adhered to its strictly enumerated constitutional functions during that time, operating with modest excise revenues. When Congress introduced the 16th Amendment, it opened the door to the era of big government. This amendment would close that door." Rep. Ron Paul, R-Texas

Many Americans believe they are overtaxed, and investigations into the Internal Revenue Service in recent years have shown the agency to be abusive in the exercise of its authority to collect taxes. The tax code increasingly faces grass-roots legal challenges, and interest in flat-tax and national sales tax proposals is at an all-time high, giving Paul's proposal enormous popularity among disgruntled taxpayers and those simply weary of big government.

While there have been several legal challenges to the veracity of the 16th Amendment's ratification, all such challenges have been rejected by the courts. Plaintiffs argue then-Secretary of State Philander Knox committed fraud when he declared the amendment had been properly approved by the appropriate number of states.

The Texas congressman criticized his colleagues' frequent manipulation of the massive tax code through various exemptions, credits, deductions and the like.

"America clearly is ready for sweeping tax reform, yet Congress remains focused on rewarding certain constituencies by forever making complex small changes to the existing tax laws. The Liberty Amendment is an attempt to eliminate the system altogether, forcing Congress to find a simple and fair way to collect limited federal revenues. Most of all, the Liberty Amendment is an initiative aimed at reducing the size and scope of the federal government," he wrote.

If approved, the measure will accomplish that goal through more than elimination of the federal income tax, which is the last of four sections in the bill. Comprised of only four sentences in all, the resolution's first section prohibits the federal government from engaging in any business "except as specified in the Constitution." The measure also states that all "activities" of the U.S. government that violate the Constitution will "be liquidated and the properties and facilities affected shall be sold" within three years of the resolution's adoption.

Critics of HJR 45, however, believe the government is acting within the boundaries of the Constitution by providing public education, welfare services, foreign aid and numerous other programs. But Paul says the sweeping nature of such programs has made government too involved in the lives of individuals.

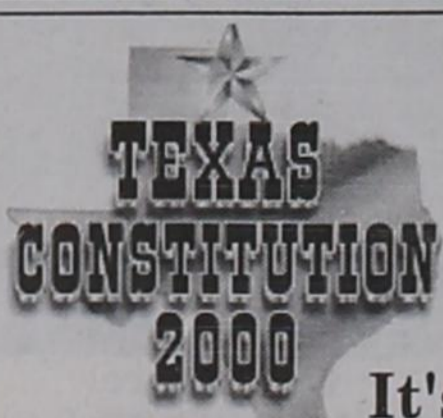
"The income tax has given government a claim on our lives," Paul stated. "It has enabled government to expand far beyond its proper limits, invade our privacy and penalize our every endeavor. The Founding Fathers never intended an income tax, and they certainly would be dismayed to know that Americans today give more than a third of their income to the federal government."

In order for HJR 45 to take effect, according to the text of the measure, the resolution must be adopted by three-fourths of the states in the Union within seven years of the date Congress adopts it. The most recent constitutional amendment, which was proposed by the First Congress on Sept. 25, 1789, and was first adopted by Maryland in December of that year, was ratified on May 18, 1792. It provided that congressional pay raises could not take effect until after the next election.

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## And thereafter, America's Amnesia

Arthur M. Schlesinger wrote in "The Disuniting of America": "History is to the nation ... as memory is to the individual."

An individual deprived of memory becomes disoriented and lost, not knowing where he has been or where he is going, so a nation denied a conception of its past will be disabled in dealing with its present and future."

Professor Stephen Bertman of the University of Windsor analyzed this threat in his article titled "Can America Remember Its Past?" which was reprinted in the December 2000 issue of Current magazine.

Ask an American why Veterans Day falls on Nov. 11 (Nov. 11, 1917, was the day the armistice was signed that ended World War I). Bertman says you'll be lucky if anyone has a clue. In a 1990 survey, almost half of college seniors couldn't locate the Civil War in the right half century.

More recently, 60 percent of American adults couldn't name the president who ordered the dropping of the first atomic bomb and over 20 percent didn't know where, or even if, the atomic bomb had ever been used. The same people didn't know who America's enemies were during World War II (Germany, Japan and Italy).

In a civics survey, more American teen-agers were able to name the Three Stooges than the three branches of the federal government (executive, legislative and judicial branches). Many Americans are similarly ignorant about our Constitution — so much so that a third of the people who were asked the origin of the statement, "From each according to his ability and to each according to his need," responded by saying it's from our Bill of Rights.

Bertman says that Americans cannot preserve our free institutions and build a better society if we've forgotten liberty's value and price. We cannot recognize that liberty is rare, precious and easily lost if we've forgotten the words and meaning of the documents upon which the American experiment was founded.



We cannot wisely choose between fighting or not fighting a war if we've forgotten war's human cost and become oblivious to the historical necessity of giving one's life in order to preserve a way of life for others. If we're ignorant of the historical sacrifices that made our liberties possible, we will be less likely to make the sacrifices again so that those liberties are preserved for future generations.

And, if we're ignorant, we won't even know when government infringes on our liberties. Moreover, we'll happily cast our votes for those who'd destroy our liberties. Thomas Jefferson summed it up best: "If a nation expects to be ignorant and free, in a state of civilization, it expects what never was and never will be."

What accounts for American amnesia? Bertman has several explanations that he says have less to do with our educational system than with the nature of today's culture and the kind of civilization America has become.

Among his explanations are: Time is the engine of forgetfulness; mankind's drive for pleasure makes us now-oriented; the rise of science and technology combines to devalue the past and undermine the importance of memory; materialism and affluence produce attitudes whereby what is old, including the past, is regarded as useless and obsolete; and, finally, since our own history is so short, we're especially susceptible to devaluation of it.

I am not sure whether Bertman's explanations accurately diagnose America's amnesia. One thing for sure is that the disease isn't even recognized, much less is a remedy being sought. Our historical amnesia doesn't bode well for our future.

As such, it makes a mockery of all the political demagoguery that we hear to justify one government program or another: We want to do it for America's children.

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## Another nadir in homicidal hair-splitting

The U.S. Supreme Court ruled Monday there is no "medical necessity exception" to the federal Controlled Substances Act.

The California-based American Medical Marijuana Association was quick to reassure concerned parties that the ruling was of sharply limited scope:

"It is important to recognize that the Supreme Court decision did not strike down or in anyway modify any state medical marijuana laws," the AMMA wrote in a press release. "The Supreme Court did not say that citizens don't have the right to cultivate and possess medical marijuana within their own state borders. All this decision said is that medical necessity is not a defense to federal law."

"Bottom line," the AMMA continued, "medical marijuana still stands in those states that have approved it. Even the medical marijuana clubs will be largely unaffected, because they will simply switch from distributing medical pot to helping patients grow their own. ..."

Maybe. But it turns out I wasn't the only person whose first response was to recall the high court's previous nadir of homicidal hair-splitting, when Justice Taney held in the infamous 1857 Dred Scott decision that black men are property, not persons entitled to the protection of the law.

The court's defenders will whine that the justices aren't supposed to "legislate from the bench"; that they were only asked whether there is a "medical necessity defense" under the federal Controlled Substances Act, whereupon they looked it up, determined there was none, and so ruled. The question of the Drug War's constitutionality wasn't answered because it was never asked. The court simply tells us what Congress intended.

Which is a black-hearted lie, of course. If Congress in a fit of madness were to enact the Nazi race laws tomorrow, would the justices sit there with straight faces, instructing us, "We cannot locate within the Act any 'religious freedom' exemption to the requirements that Jews sew yellow stars on their clothing," etc.?

Of course not. When it's the First Amendment right of religious freedom that's involved, everyone understands the court's first duty is to determine whether the law in question is constitutional on its face. If it isn't, under the great precedent of Marbury vs. Madison, the law is held to be null and void.

Besides which, attorneys for the Oakland Cannabis Buyers Cooperative et al. did assert (as Justice Thomas acknowledges) that the federal drug statute "exceeds Congress' Commerce Clause powers, violates the substantive due process rights of patients, and offends the fundamental liberties of the people under the Fifth, Ninth, and Tenth Amendments."

Fact is, the entire federal drug war is blatantly unconstitutional, and any high court obeying its oath to preserve our government of limited power would have thrown it out in its entirety the first time it got a look at it.

There are no fewer than three independently sufficient grounds on which this could and should be held. The weakest of these is the 10th Amendment, which tells us that any power not specifically delegated to the United States by the Constitution is reserved to the states or to the people. Since nowhere in the Constitution is Congress delegated any specific power to regulate what responsible adults choose to put in their own bodies, any state law (like California's successful 1996 medical marijuana proposition) supersedes federal authority.

This is the weakest argument simply because it would seem to authorize state drug wars. Now, truth be told, even state drug wars are further banned under the 14th Amendment (the second sufficient grounds for tossing out the Drug War). This amendment bans the several states from "abridging the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States."

Under the 14th, the high court could and should have thrown out California's current marijuana distribution scheme not because it allows some marijuana use, but because it places any restrictions on marijuana use, at all.

Am I saying Americans have some kind of right to drugs? Damned right, and here's where we come to the constitutional provision which even a second-year law student could hardly ignore. The Ninth Amendment advises the justices that, "The enumeration in the Constitution of certain rights shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people."

In 1787 and thenceforward, at least through 1915, did our ancestors on these shores "retain the right" to grow, produce, import, buy and sell opium, cocaine, alcohol and marijuana whenever they pleased, without federal restriction save the occasional modest excise?

Indeed they did. And the proof is that when Congress wanted to ban one of these forms of commerce, a separate constitutional amendment — the 18th, since repealed — had to be enacted to allow a federal ban on "intoxicating liquors."

So: when was the parallel and necessary constitutional amendment ratified, authorizing the War on Drugs?

Pardon me, I didn't hear that. Could you speak up?

## Lawyer issues notice to City of Lubbock

*Editor's Note: The following letters were presented at the Monday, May 14 Garza County Commissioners' Court meeting regarding development at Lake Allen Henry.*

Re: Memorandum of Agreement (the "Agreement") dated April 3, 1986,

between the City of Lubbock, Texas (the "City") and Mr. Billy Huddleston, et al.; Development at Lake Allen Henry; Capitalized terms used herein and not defined herein shall have the definitions assigned to such terms in the Agreement.

Dear Ms. Sitton:  
We are legal counsel to Mr. Billy Huddleston and this correspondence is written on behalf of, and at the request of, Mr. Huddleston.

Mr. Huddleston has informed us that he has received information which leads him to believe the following:

1. Water from Lake Allen Henry will be provided for use by persons who now own, or hereafter purchase, land within the development planned around Lake Allen Henry.
2. The access road to Lake Allen Henry (the "Access Road") has been opened to the public, the only

restriction to access being an electronic gate placed across the Access Road a short distance from the Lake headquarters. For the length of the Access Road before it reaches such gate (and at all times when such gate is open), access along the Access Road is unrestricted.

3. The Access Road will be opened for the development of, or used by persons purchasing property within, certain land under development and adjacent to Lake Allen Henry.

The foregoing breach the following provisions of the Agreement:

A) Item 1 above is in direct violation of recital A to the Agreement (and, according to Mr. Huddleston, the clear understanding of all parties to the Agreement) which reads: "The City of Lubbock, Texas ("City") desires to construct the Justiceburg Reservoir Project to provide a municipal water supply for the City (emphasis added)." Please provide assurances that no water will be sold to the developments planned around Lake Allen Henry or to any persons who now own, or hereafter acquire, land therein.

B) Items 2 and 3 above are in direct violation of Article III of the Agreement which reads (last three sentences): "Landowners, when necessary, shall provide the City, without cost, an easement for a service road to be fenced and constructed by the City, at the City's sole expense, which shall be an all-weather road fenced on both sides and accessible to the City and Landowners whose land immediately adjoins the road. Landowners shall maintain the fence after construction and the City shall maintain the service road. This road shall not be accessible to the public nor dedicated as a public roadway (emphasis added). Please provide assurances that the road will be closed to all traffic other than the City and Landowners whose land immediately adjoins the road for its entire length at all times.

Mr. Huddleston desires not to seek legal remedies for the above breaches of the Agreement. He is, however, adamant that the Agreement be adhered to by the City in all respects. Accordingly, Mr. Huddleston has directed us to inform you that if (i) the City provides water from Lake Allen Henry for the subject developments, or (ii) the City permits use of the Access Road by any persons other than "the City and Landowners whose land immediately adjoins the road," he intends to commence legal action against the City to enforce the Agreement.

Your immediate attention to this matter is required. A prompt reply would be appreciated.

Accordingly, all of the statements and claims set forth in my letter of March 20, 2001, are made herein as if fully set forth herein but on behalf of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Boren, Mr. and Mrs. John Boren Jr. and Mrs. Walter Boren.

In addition, it has come to the attention of our clients that the following additional breaches of the Agreement may have either occurred or in process:

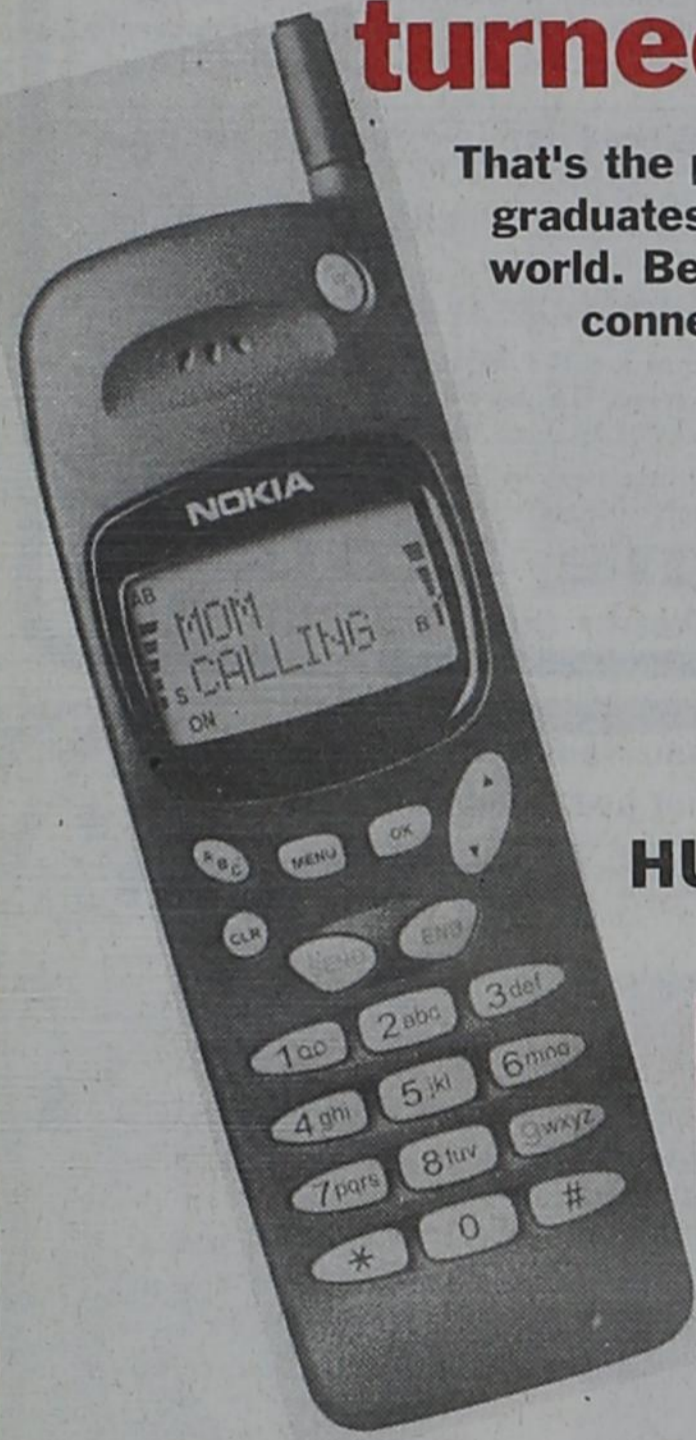
Surveying for and/or commencement of construction of a boat dock or other improvements within the area from elevation 2220 feet above mean sea level ("msl") to elevation 2245 feet msl or between elevation 2245 feet msl and 300 feet horizontal distance from 2220 msl if the 300 foot horizontal distance contains a larger area of land than is contained between 2220 msl and 2245 msl.

As I indicated in my earlier correspondence, our clients are not desirous of litigation, however, they are adamant that the Agreement be adhered to be the City in all respects. In the fifteen days since my earlier correspondence, the City has made no reply which leads us to believe that either the City does not take our clients seriously or that the City has determined to ignore the terms of the Agreement. Accordingly, you are hereby notified that my clients have instructed us to commence legal proceedings against the City within ten (10) days from the date hereof unless prior to such time we have a meaningful dialogue that we can reasonably assume will lead to an acceptable settlement of this matter.

Your immediate attention to this matter is required. A prompt reply would be appreciated.
