

WHITTLIN'

Plainsmen are hard to please about their weather.

From October until June, we hadn't had enough rainfall here to water a frog. Then Friday afternoon, the area received a goodly amount, generally described as an inch.

When Saturday afternoon's shower, which didn't amount to much, started, Floyd Damron looked up from his domino game and exclaimed, "Well, everything'll mildew!"

Our section of the area and county was again fortunate during the weather periods Friday and Saturday to escape serious damage from the rainstorms. Friona, for instance, received some damage from high winds, said to be as much as 115 miles per hour. A few people were injured, trailer houses were overturned and the Missouri Beef Packers building's roof was damaged, according to reports which have leaked back to the southwest.

The wind here was high and bad and we have pictures of two barns which were damaged by the winds, possibly the same one which struck Friona.

However, the damage here was slight compared to the benefit from the rainfall. Little or no hail accompanied the rain and wind. Farmers here, after hearing reports of crop-damaging weather from other areas during the past couple of weeks, were about to decide they'd just as soon do without the rain as to have to chance hail.

Probably there's no good time of the year for hail, but this is an especially crucial time with the wheat just about ready for harvesting and the rowcrop just up and growing good with the time for being too late to replant fast approaching.

Travis Dyer, we remember, got credit for saying a few years ago after a late June hail, "It's not too late to plant cotton on July 4th. That's too late for the cotton to make, but it's not too late to plant it."

But up to now, this year's crop has been handicapped, weatherwise, only by a lack of moisture. The two inches or so over the weekend broke that trend. The drought of last winter and Spring is over. Maybe a new one will start, but that one is done for.

H. H. DeLozier, the certified public accountant who audits the records of the City of Bovina, was present at the last meeting of the city council to explain the audit of the past 12 months. Asked, unofficially, by a member of the council how Bovina's financial condition compared with some other towns about our big, DeLozier indicated that the situation here wasn't as bad as some.

"You're in pretty good shape," he said in the beginning of his explanation. "You owe a lot. And you can't afford to spend more than you take in. All in all, your situation looks pretty good. Lots of people are in worse shape," he explained.

The sales tax for the city, passed about a year ago, is expected to relieve a part of the financial strain --- to the tune of approximately \$10,000 a year. The tax didn't begin until October even though it was voted on in June. Thus, the city has, up until now, received only one three-month period's revenue --- October, November and December of last year. Over the long haul, that extra revenue will make for a better city.

Incidentally, a complete report of the annual audit, of the city's business for last year --- or any other year --- is available for public inspection. Citizens may see a copy of the audit at the city hall or we have the latest one here at the Blade office.

It makes for some pretty interesting reading if you're interested in local government.

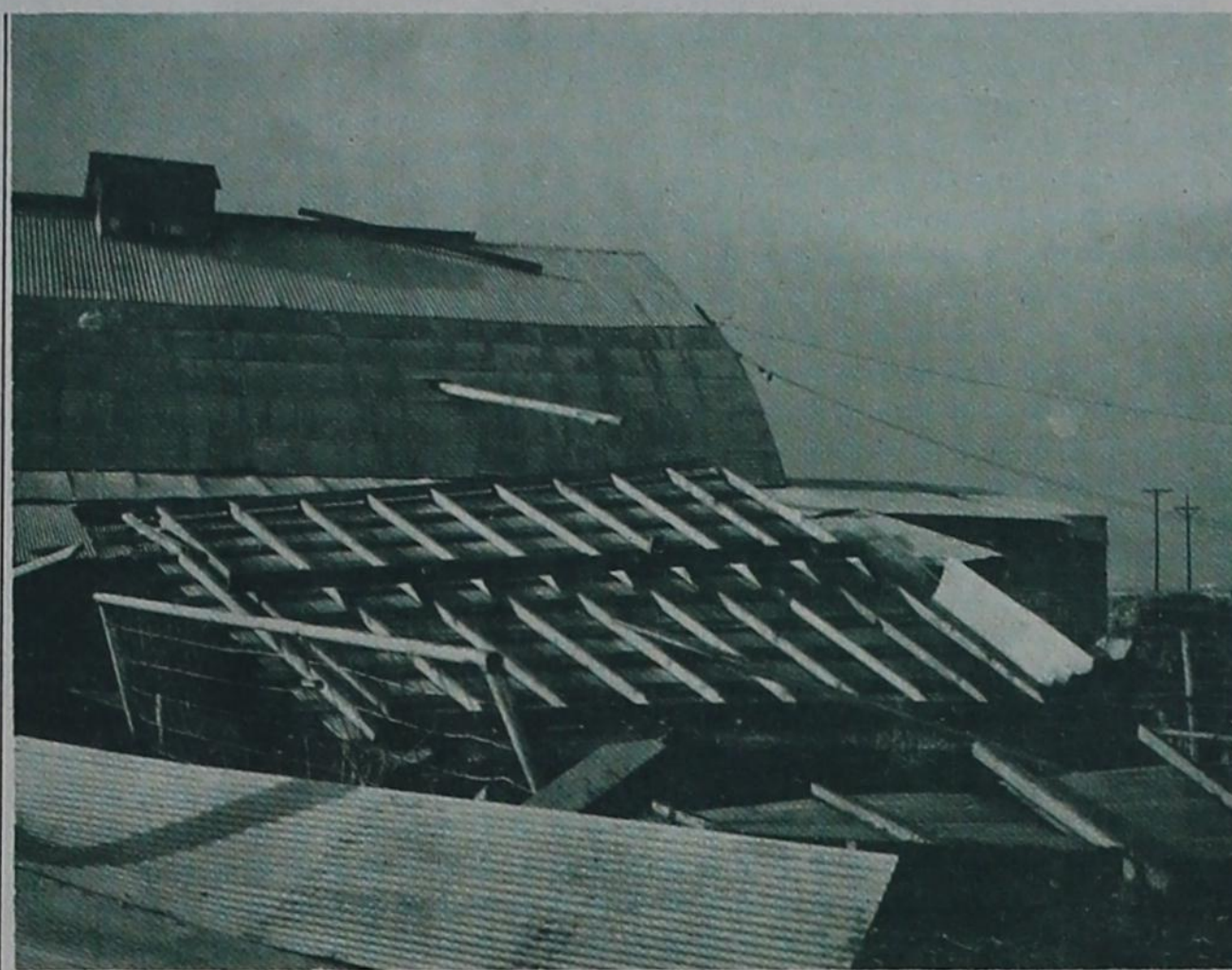
Funeral services were held Thursday afternoon in First Baptist Church of Bovina with Rev. Larry Heard, pastor, officiating. He was assisted by

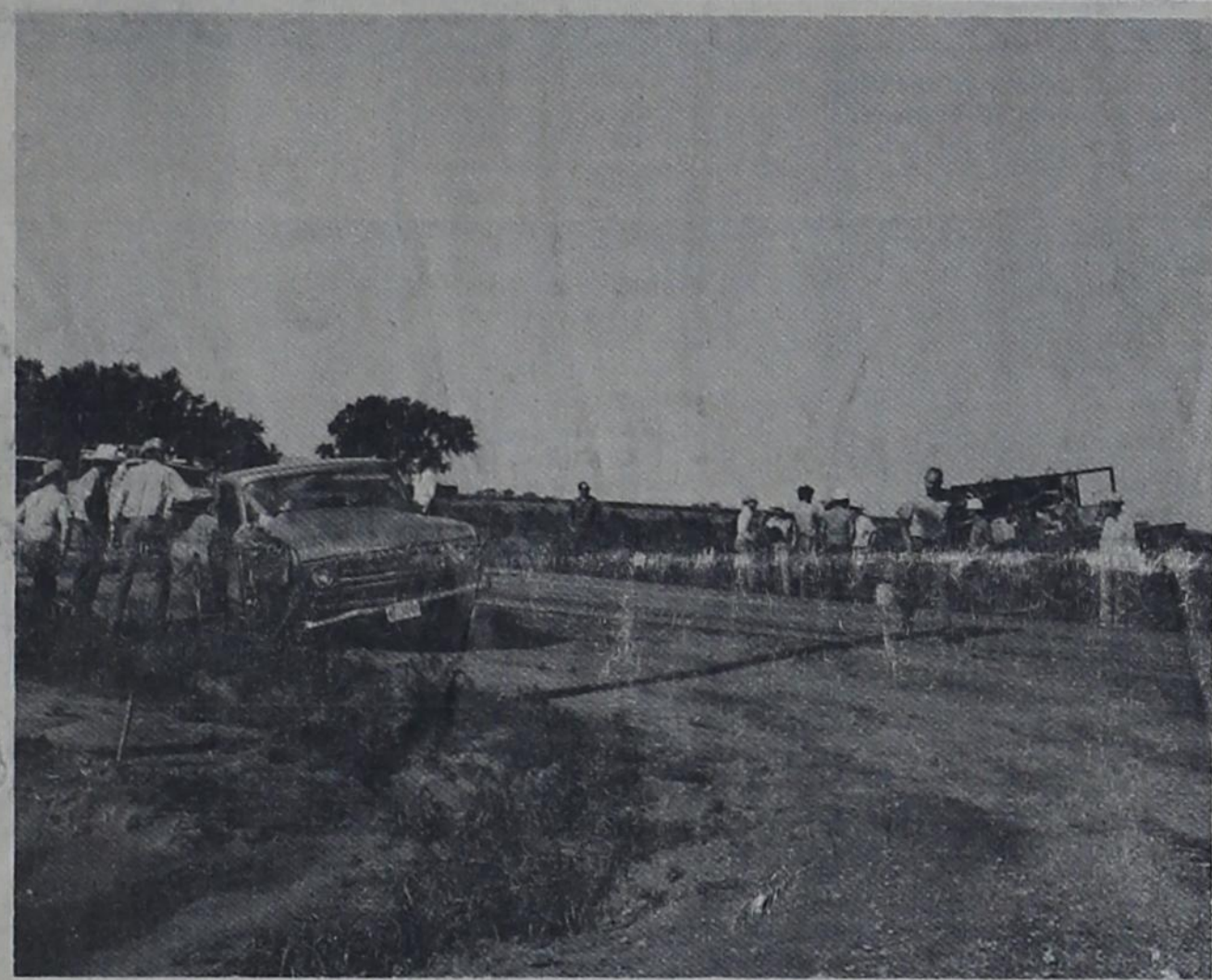

Name 3 New Teachers --

Schools Attendance Average Increases

Three new teachers for the 1971-'72 school year were hired by the board of trustees at a Monday night monthly meeting.

Those named as members of the faculty, subject to placement, were Mrs. Pat Jacobs, Mrs. Pat DiCuffa and Mrs. Vera Cox.

Mrs. DiCuffa is a former member of the teaching staff here. Mrs. Jacobs and Mrs. Cox will receive degrees this summer from West Texas State University.

Board members heard a re-

port from Superintendent L. F. Jacobs concerning average daily attendance during the past school year. The ADA increased to 619.45, which is probably the highest total in the history of Bovina Schools, according to Jacobs. The total for the previous year was 573.74. Part of the increase, 10.42, was due to a kindergarten class which was made a part of the school system for the first time last year.

In special education class, which is not figured in the overall ADA, the average was 7.9. Jacobs says the ADA in-

crease will make the school system eligible for more funds from the state for additional teachers.

Board members agreed to check into the possibility of adding more teachers to the home side of Mustang Field. A decision will be made later.

The resignation of Mrs. Cheryl Burton, who taught a first grade section last year, was accepted.

The board officially approved the transfer of several stu-

Friday Afternoon --

Storm Brings Moisture, Wind

A rainstorm struck here Friday afternoon breaking a month-long drought.

The storm, which was accompanied by high winds, produced only a small amount of hail and the damage to crops was considered nil.

The Friday afternoon storm measured approximately an inch across the area. Showers Saturday and Monday afternoons brought the total for the "rainy season" up to about an inch and a half.

The high winds Friday destroyed a horse barn on Dean McCallum's farm south of town and damaged a barn owned by Grady Sorley two miles east of town.

The roof of the Sorley barn was blown into telephone lines nearby. The lines were repaired Saturday by a Southwestern Bell Telephone crew from Amarillo Saturday.

The Bovina area missed the bulk of the wind damage, Fri-

ona, 12 miles to the northeast, wasn't as fortunate. High winds there caused damages to Missouri Beef Packers packing plant, at least four trailer houses and four people were reported injured during the storm.

Wheat harvest is expected to get into full swing the latter part of this week and next, weather permitting.

First loads of 1971 wheat were delivered to Bovina's two grain elevators last week as harvesting operations started.

Joe Wilson had the premium first load at Sherley Grain Co. The wheat was delivered Thursday. It had a moisture content of 14 per cent and a test weight of 60 pounds per bushel, according to Harry Johnson, a member of the office staff at Sherley Grain. The load was from Wilson's place north of Bovina.

Receiving the first load premium at Bovina Wheat Growers, Inc. was John Dixon. Dixon's wheat was cut from semi-dryland north of town. It had a moisture content of less than 15 per cent and a test-weight of 57 pounds per bushel.

If weather permits, the harvest of wheat is expected to be at its peak next week, the 20th to 27th. Under normal con-

ditions, the harvesting period is completed by July 4th.

Price of wheat was quoted early this week at \$1.50 per bushel.

The government loan rate is about \$1.25 net to the farmer. Thus, most of the wheat harvested here will be sold instead of being placed in the government loan.

Johnson and Jim Russell, Wheat Growers manager, agree that this year's crop will be slightly below normal.

The dry growing season is one of the reasons for this. There will be little or no dryland wheat harvested and this will cut down on the total yield.

Tom Bonds Chairman Of Bull Town Days '71

Tom Bonds, Bovina businessman, has been named chairman of Bull Town Days 1971.

Bonds' appointment was announced jointly this week by leaders of Bovina Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture and Bovina Roping Club, co-sponsors of the annual community celebration, which will be staged this year for the eighth consecutive time.

Dates of the three-day celebration are Thursday, Friday and Saturday, August 19-20-21.

Plans are well underway for the festivities, which have been highly successful in years past. Chairmen and leaders of various events of the celebration are being appointed and a schedule of events is being lined up, Bonds says. The schedule of events may be announced as early as next week.

"As a community, we have a big job ahead of us if we're to have another great celebration," Bonds said this week.

"We'll welcome suggestions and the cooperation of everyone for making this year's celebration better than ever before."

Highlights of Bull Town have traditionally been a free barbecue for everyone, a variety show, a Quarterhorse show, horsemanship activities, a parade, a queens' contest, a square

dance contest, beard growing contest and cow calling contest. Most of these events are expected to again be on the agenda.

The possibility of having a "Grand Ole Opry" type show on Thursday night in the slot formerly occupied by the variety show is being investigated, Bonds says. Details on

the show will be worked out within the next week, if possible.

Bonds is the fourth chairman to be named in the eight-year history of the celebration. Jack McCracken headed the community effort the first two years, '64 and '65; C. E. Trimble was in charge in '66 and '67, Wendol Christian was chairman in '68 and '69 and Dolph Moien was the '70 chairman.

"We'll appreciate hearing from people who have some ideas they'd like included in this year's celebration as quickly as possible," Bonds announced this week. "The more activities we have, the more people we'll please and the better the celebration will be," he says.

Additional plans are scheduled to be made at a meeting of the roping club membership Thursday night in Bovina Restaurant.

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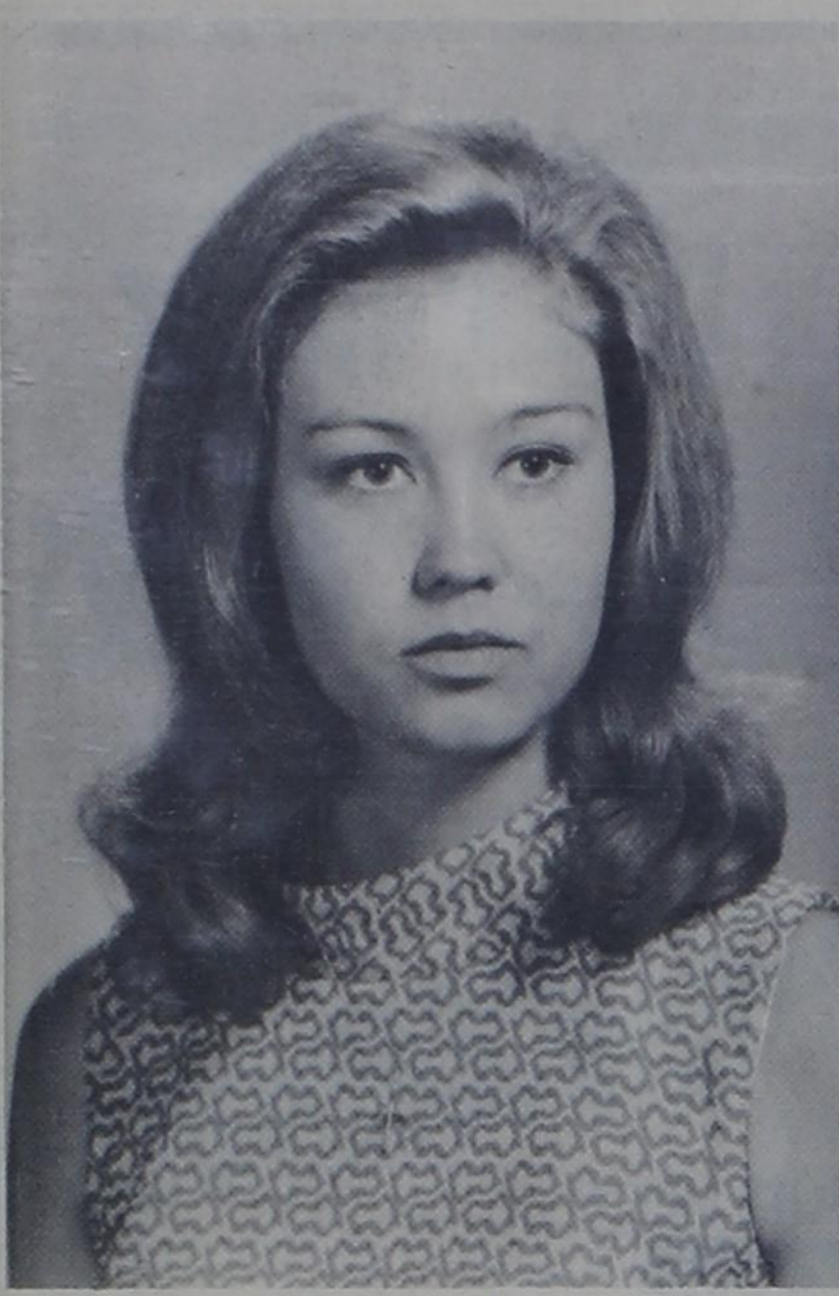
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Engagement Announced

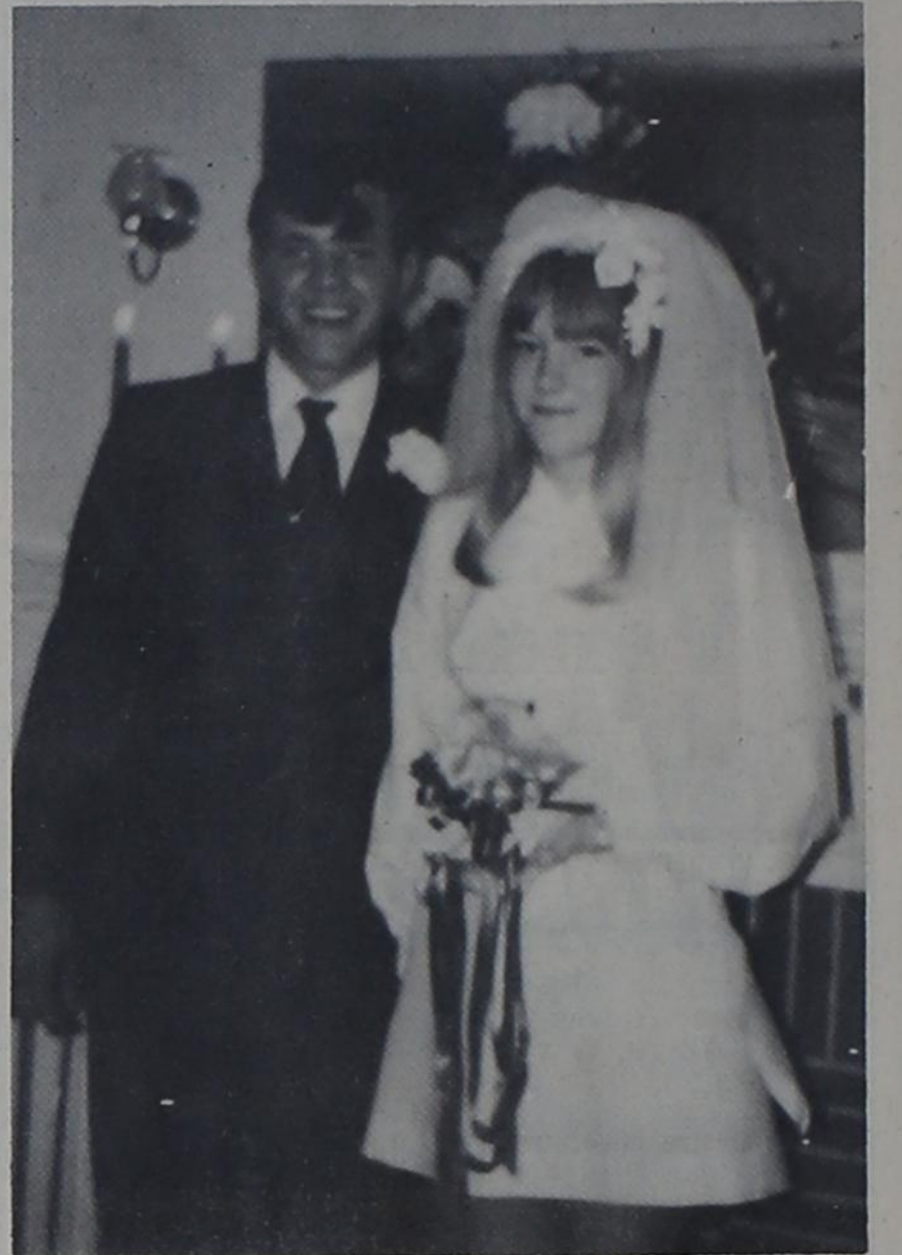
The groom's mother wore a pink knit dress, featuring a low waistline and circular skirt. She wore an orchid corsage.

On The Farm In Parmer County

By R. MACK HEALD County Agent

LACK OF NITROGEN OR IRON CAN YELLOW LAWNS Texas homeowners who have Bermudagrass lawns which are turning yellow instead of growing thick and green should look for nitrogen and iron deficiencies in their soil.

The nitrogen deficiency causes a general yellowing of the lawn while the symptoms of iron deficiencies are yellow, bleached spots in the turf. Iron deficiencies develop mainly in alkaline soil and the upper Gulf Coast and parts of East Texas are usually the only regions in the state that don't lack iron.



For the most rapid and effective correction of iron deficiencies, spray applications of iron chelates or iron sulfate on the lawn. Soil applications are also helpful, but they may not correct severe iron deficiencies.

Fertilizer containing nitrogen, phosphorus, and potassium should be applied in the early spring and again in the early fall to eliminate nitrogen deficiencies. In addition to this applications of nitrogen as ammonium nitrate or ammonium sulfate at 4-6 week intervals during the growing season.

The additional applications help to maintain vigor, color, and uniform growth of the grass.

A soil test is extremely helpful in determining exact fertilizer needs, showing the need for lime, and indicating soil

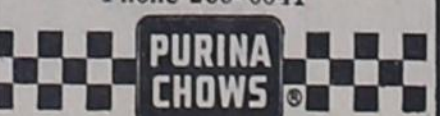

salinity problems, but there are some general guidelines to follow in fertilizing Bermuda-grass.

The applications of the complete fertilizers in early spring and fall should be made so that two pounds of nitrogen are applied per 1,000 square feet of lawn area. Examples of such applications would be 20 pounds of 10-5-5 or 17 pounds of 12-12-12 per 1,000 square feet.

The additional applications during the growing season should be made so that approximately one pound of nitrogen is applied per 1,000 square feet in each application. Examples of proper application would be five pounds of ammonium sulfate (21%) or three pounds of ammonium nitrate (33%) per 1,000 square feet of lawn area.

CROP REPORT FROM FARMERS NEEDED

In early July, some 22,000 Texas farmers will receive an acreage and production of selected crops questionnaire from Cary D. Palmer, Agricultural Statistician for the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, Austin.

This information will be the basis for determining harvested acreage and production of early harvested crops for the State of Texas and for each county. There are 254 counties in Texas and reports are needed from many farmers so that each county will be well represented. Accurate estimates are of great importance to farmers in planning production and marketing and in providing an unbiased picture of Texas Agriculture.

The Texas Legislature has provided a program of estimates for each county. Texas covers such a wide area that State totals alone do not provide adequate information on Texas' most basic industry -- agriculture. This is a cooperative effort of USDA's Statistical Reporting Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture.

"It was a real nice trip. I learned a lot about the govern-

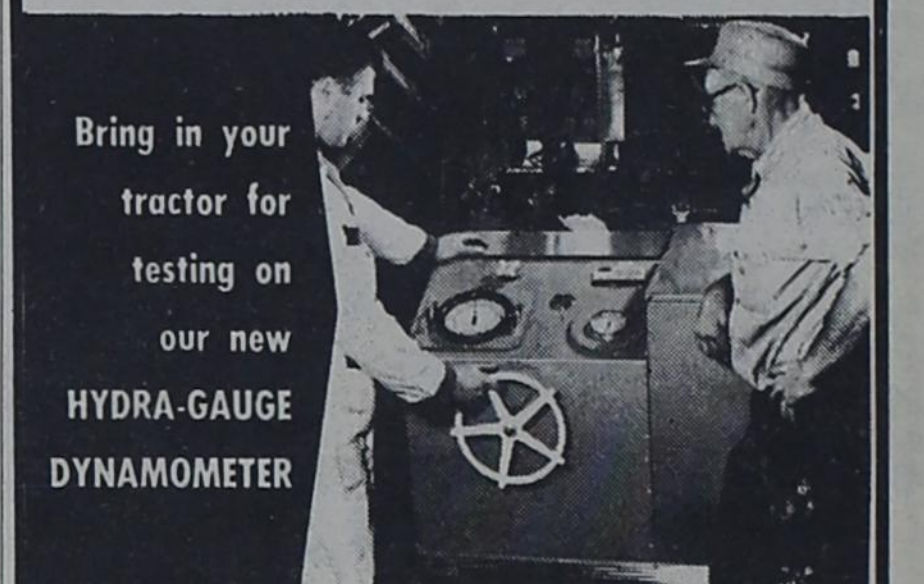
ment," Buddy commented on his experiences.

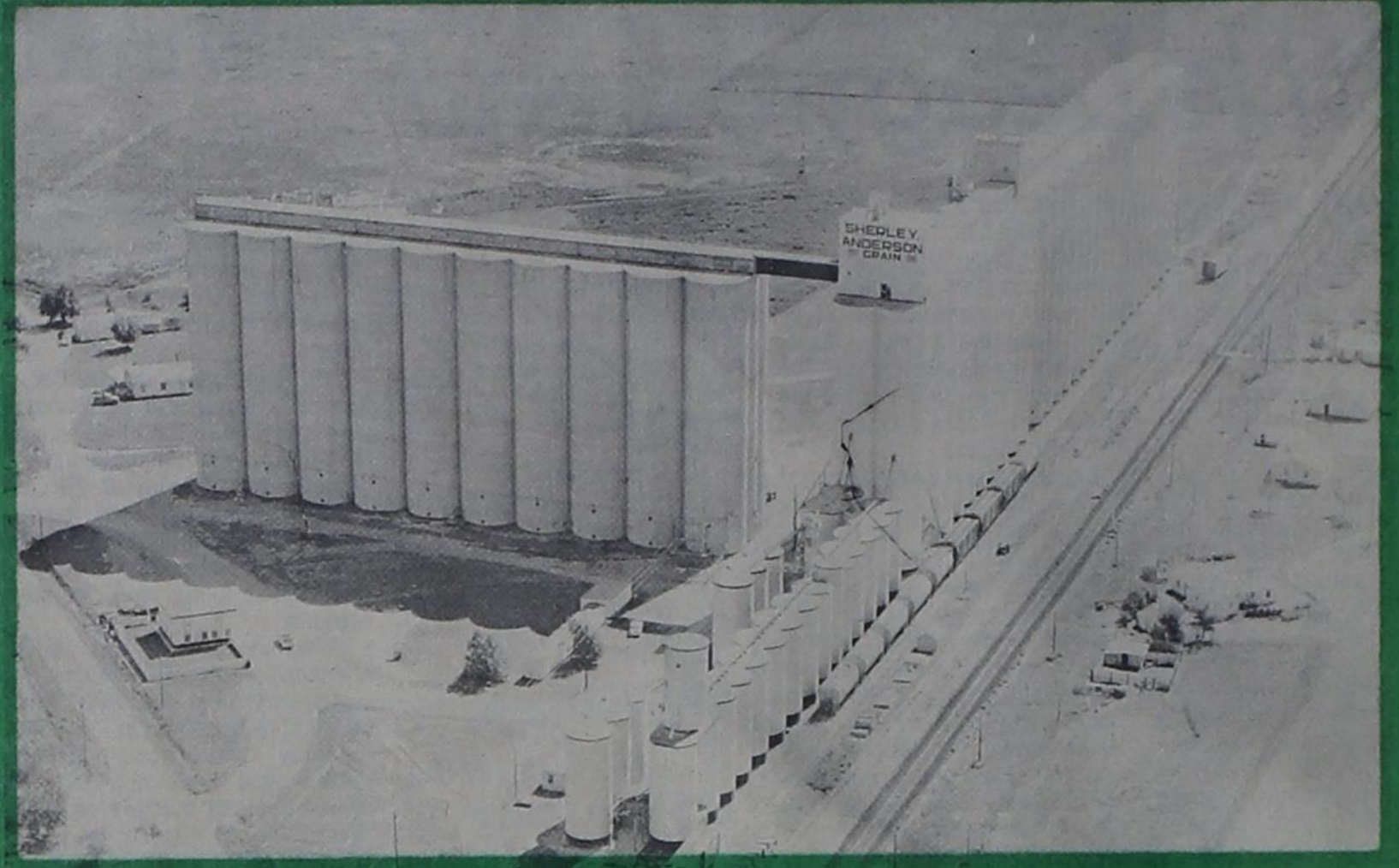
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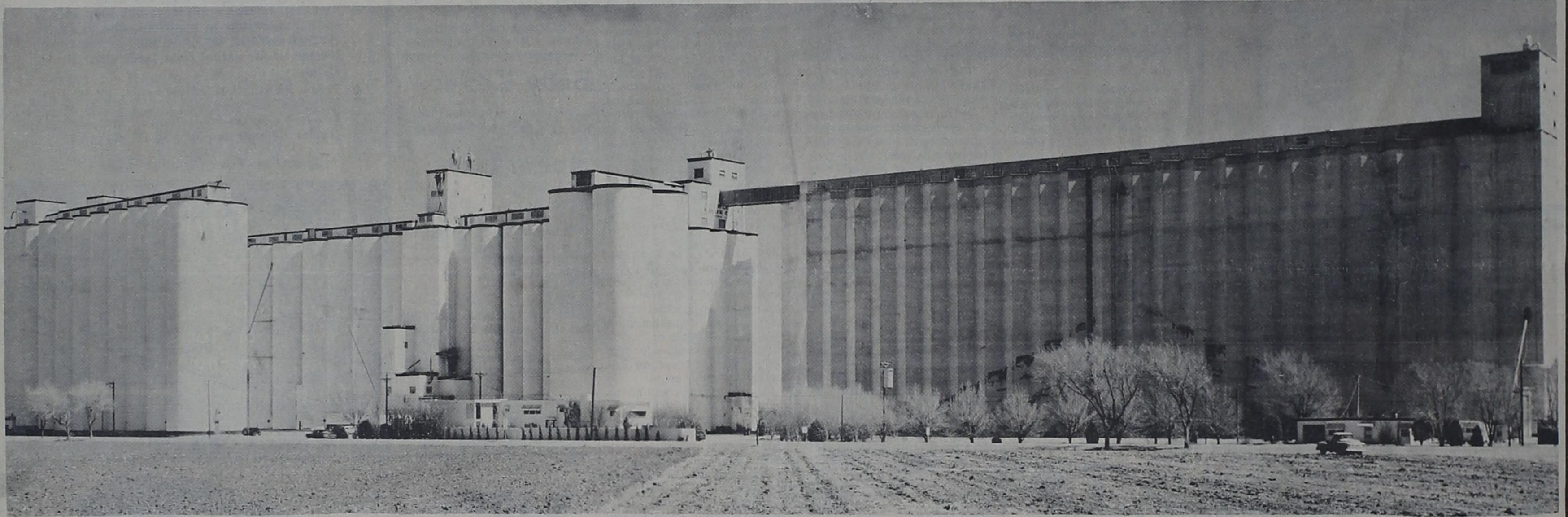


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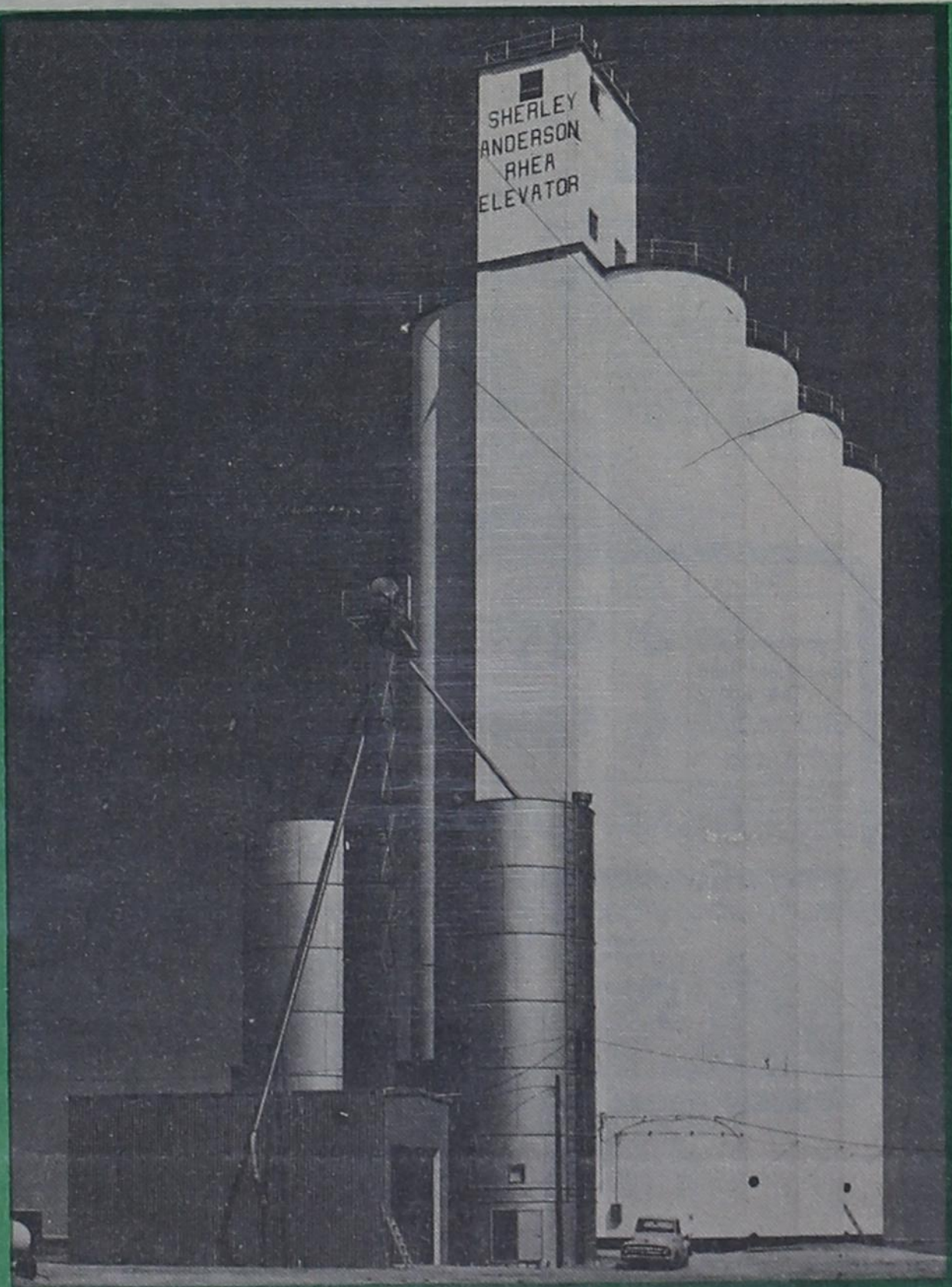


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
