TEA rates PHS as "Exemplary"

Post ISD gets good news

Post Independent School District board members received some good news last week in the form of Texas Education Agency (TEA) accountability reports.

At the board's regular monthly meeting on Aug. 14, trustees learned the TEA's accountability rating for Post High School was

"exemplary," while the ratings for the elementary and middle schools were recorded as "recognized."

Overall, the Post ISD was awarded a "recognized" status. Superintendent Dr. Bobby Bain noted this is not the first time the district has received such acco-

lades. The Post ISD has been honored with the TEA's "recognized" status several times in the past few years, including in 1996, 1997, 1999, 2000 and now in 2001.

In other business, trustees:

- Heard from school nurse Marianne Hart concerning the proposed appointment of a District Health Advisory Committee. Appointments were made, and the committee will be charged with looking into health issues relating to the Post ISD.

- Approved the teacher appraisal calendar and list of appraisers for the new school year.

Update on emergency radio equipment repairs

As you may know, there has been some controversy over the present condition of the Garza County Sheriff Department radio system. It has been discussed extensively in Garza County Commissioners Court and the City Council. The present system, which is approximately 21 years old, has caused some communication problems in the past, due to lack of proper maintenance. Discussion as to replacing the system with a new digital radio system has been addressed. The new digital system has been reported to cost several hundred thousand dollars to install.

As recently as last month Rad-Comm Radio of Lubbock made some tuning adjustments to the present Garza County Sheriff Department radio repeater with very positive results. Along with the adjustments a radio signal amplifier has been added to the system which has increased coverage range.

The technician for Rad-Comm Radio stressed the point that the present repeater system is still in good operational condition and doesn't need replacing. Communications with officers on Lake Alan Henry has been a very serious concern which has been improved with the previous mentioned adjustments and the addition of a link relay type radio system.

The link system consists of the addition of two commercial ICOM (brand name) radios one operating on a UHF frequency and the other operating on a VHF, or in other words, a cross band radio system.

The addition of a third ICOM radio at the Garza County Sheriff Department repeater site receives the radio signal from Lake Alan Henry then transfers it to the Sheriff's Department dispatcher or other mobile units. When a radio is keyed up at Lake Alan Henry

the VHF signal is received by the UHF radio located at the lake then the signal is sent to the UHF radio at the Sheriff's Department repeater site where it is converted back to a VHF signal.

It is my opinion that the present system has been greatly improved and is operating efficiently with a savings of several hundred thousand dollars of tax payers money.

Travellers get stiffed for \$22,546

Highway travelers in Garza County continue to fork over money to county and state code enforcers, in July totalling \$22,546.22. According to reports from the two Justice of the Peace courts, the new monies bring the 2001 total to \$216,968.75.

State and county code enforcement officers believe they are "doing their jobs" by enforcing the traffic code, although that code was originally written to regulate commercial transportation. What was sold to the public in the 1920s for "safe" roads, is now a huge money-making machine for corporate governments.

Freedom of travel has a whole different meaning when it comes to the pocket book. It's a wonder travelers bother to use the highways here, considering the high cost of travel in Garza County.

Most, if not all of these victims of highway theft, have no idea that they are part of a gigantic legislative scheme, which considers all who travel to be doing so within certain boundaries of an incorporated area, therefore the "subjects" are required to follow the corporation's rules.

The traffic code is one example of the corporate form of government imposed on Texans, in violation of the guarantee of a republic form of government.

The "Transportation Code" is not even a law, it does not have the constitutionally required Secretary of State certification of publication as part of the statute. Perhaps that omission is based on the fact that there is no constitutional authority for corporate government to enforce corporate rules in violation of basic constitutional guarantees, such as liberty, the right of travel from one place to another.

Although most Texans think of themselves as free to move about as they wish, they discover their true status as corporate "citizens" once they become victimized by the corporation's policy enforcers.

The Texas transportation code is nothing more than a corporate policy, and since the State of Texas is a corporate subdivision of the incorporated U.S., then all who live or travel inside those boundaries are considered corporate subjects, bound to obey corporate policies.

One of those policies is the registration of privately owned modes of travel, such as cars and trucks. Once an individual voluntarily signs over ownership to the corporation (state), the driver or owner automatically agrees to abide by the rules of the real owner of the car or truck.

Notice that when you register your car or truck, you get a "certificate of title," not an actual title or manufacturer's certificate of origin. The real title is held by the real owner, in a vault somewhere in Austin.

Because of the extortionate expense of defending the right of travel in the corporation's court system, most Texans meekly submit to the extortion and voluntarily gave up their right of travel by declaring themselves "motor vehicle" operators, through applications for certificates of title as well as "motor vehicle" licenses.

Although the Texas transportation code applies only to those people involved in commercial use of the highways, it is obvious that the vast majority of "criminals" tagged in highway traffic fines were paid by "volunteers." Very few, if any, of those victims realize that the cars and trucks they drive are not included in the regulations related to the transportation code, unless the original owner voluntarily submitted to the corporation policy.

The Texas Transportation Code defines commercial use of the highways as those carrying passengers or property for hire. Cars and

Post's, Roscoe's and Stanton's junior varsity and varsity football teams will scrimmage Thursday beginning at 5 p.m. in Stanton.

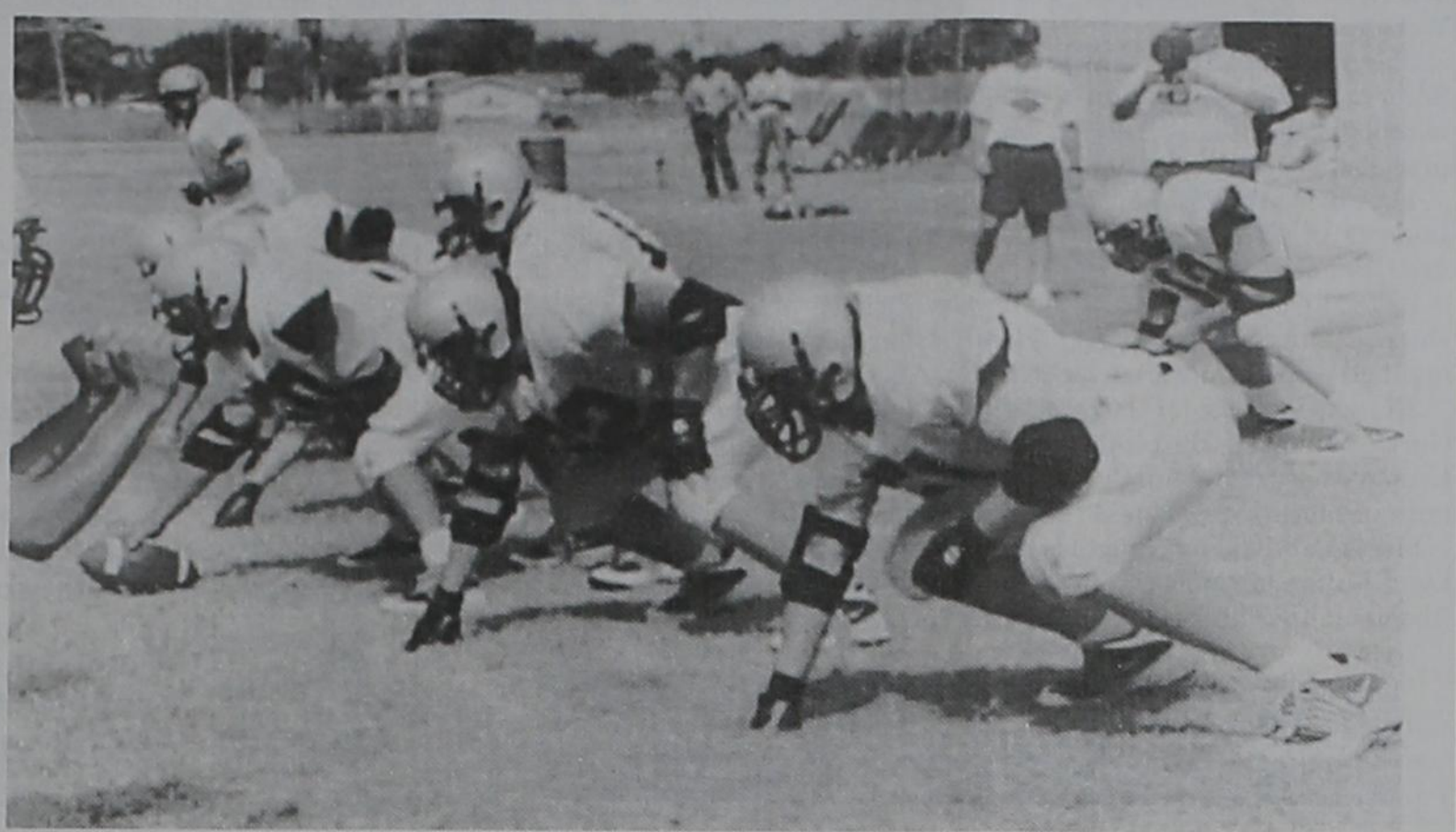

Fifteen plays will be allowed in each set; no continuation. Four-down territory inside the 30-yard line.

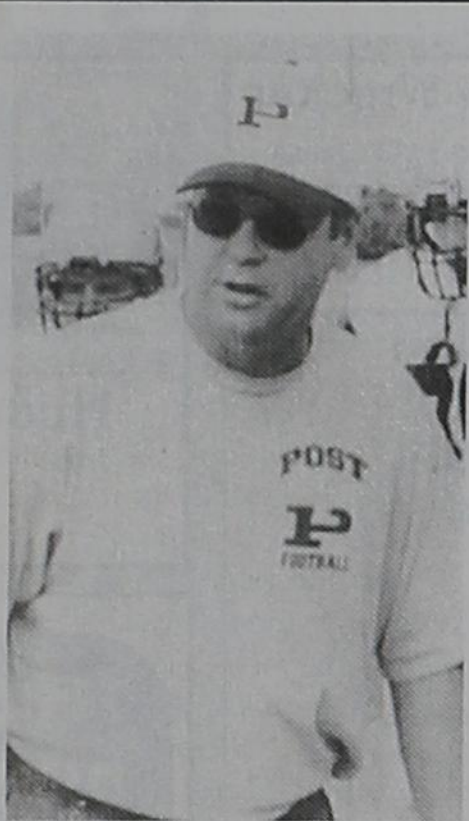

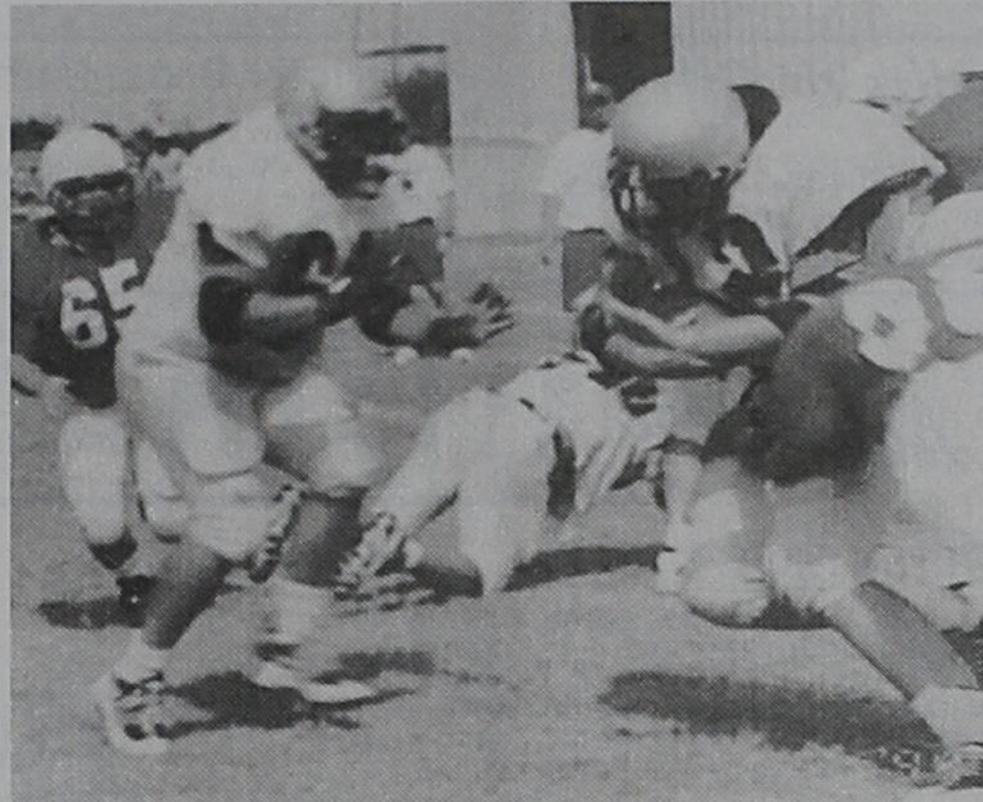

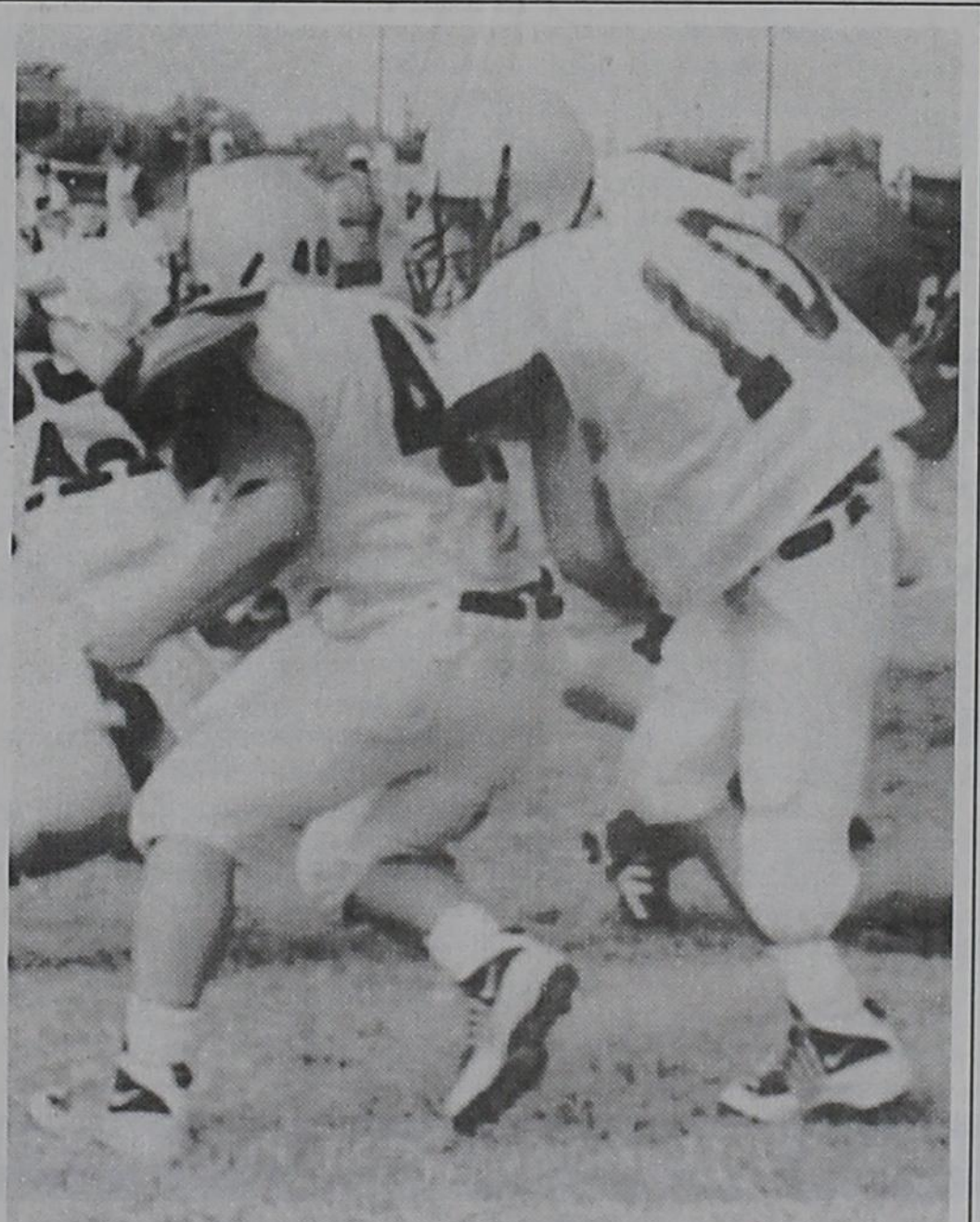

Lois B Herring

Graveside Services for Lois B Herring, 85, of Georgetown and formerly of Post were held Monday August 20, 2001 11 a.m. at the Terrace Cemetery. Paul D. Jones, minister, Post Church of Christ officiated. Burial was under the personal care of Justice-Mason Funeral Home of Post.

Mrs. Herring died on Friday August 17, 2001 at the Scott & White Hospital, Temple.

She was born on November 2, 1915 to Harrison A. and Icee Cora (Cates) Watson at Orr, Oklahoma. She moved to Lubbock where her Dad had Watson Furniture.

She graduated from Texas Tech University and was a member of the Theta Sorority. After graduation she taught art and music in Brownfield. She married Clint Paul Herring on September 12, 1937 in Lubbock. He preceded her in death January 20, 1989.

They moved to Post and founded Herring's Department Store and Danish Imports in 1938. They operated both until 1968 when they closed the department store.

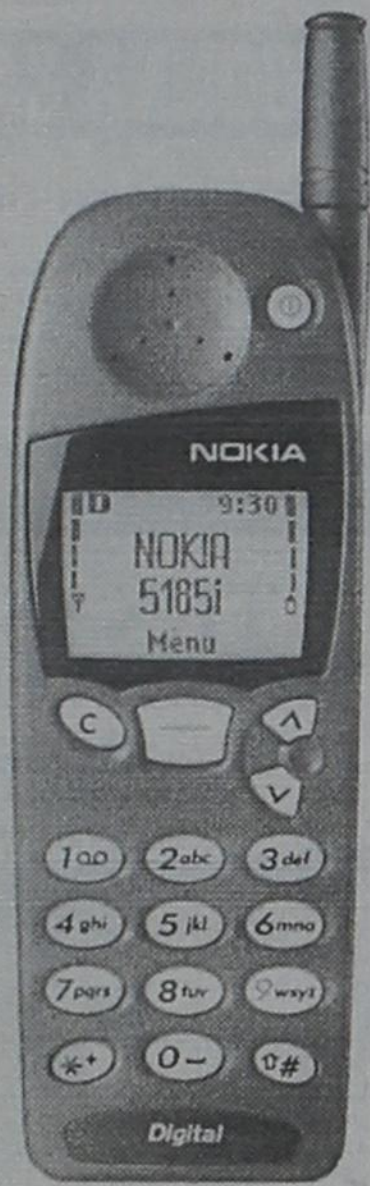

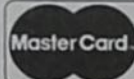

 trucks, which are not used for hire in carrying property or passengers, are not "motor vehicles" as defined by the code.
 Carrying around a state driver's license is also a severe limit on freedom and liberty... that little piece of paper wrapped in plastic declares the holder to be an "operator of a motor vehicle."

So, when citizens voluntarily apply for a certificate of title to their "motor vehicle," they have placed themselves under the jurisdiction of the corporate (state) traffic laws, which can constitutionally only apply to those who voluntarily declare themselves owners of "motor vehicles."
 The system is perpetuated by ignorance and the expensive fees required to defend against the high-

way theft program. Those who enforce the corporate rules have the full backing of legislative thieves and a judicial system that puts corporate rules above constitutional guarantees of individual rights.
 Under the current Texas legal system, it's a "no-win" situation for most people, except those who wear a corporate badge and those who live off the regular highway revenue producing program.
