Garza County 4-H youth recognized at Achievement Banquet

"An American Tradition, Celebrating 100 Years of 4-H" was the theme of the 2002 Garza County 4-H Achievement Banquet held on August 27th honoring 4-H'ers, supporters, and leaders of Garza County 4-H. Members of the County Council were in charge of the program, recognizing youth, leaders, individuals, and organizations who participated and supported various activities throughout the 2001-2002 4-H year.

The "I Dare You Award" Leadership Award recognizes those youth who demonstrate personal integrity, lead well-rounded lives, and possess a willingness to assume responsibility. Breann Heckaman was the recipient of this award. She is the daughter of Bobby and Nita Jo Heckaman and has been a member of 4-H for seven years. She has served as President of the Golden Clover 4-H Club, Vice President of the Garza County 4-H Council, and a member of the Extension Program Council Youth Committee. Breann has also acted as a teen leader in various 4-H projects and she received the "Gold Star" 4-H award the past year.

4-H Record Books represent a great deal of time in planning and preparation. Record Books also demonstrate a youth's determination to set project goals, complete these goals, and record it in a record book. Achievement pins and District Ribbons were presented to the following:

Junior 1 - Jarrett Blevins- Beef Achievement Pin; 1st place Ribbon for Swine Record Book. Jarrett also received a certificate from the Texas

Pork Producers Association.

Junior 2 - Allison Blevins- Beef Achievement Pin; Recognition Ribbon for Shooting Sports Record Book. Dionn Heckaman- Swine Achievement Pin; Recognition Ribbon for Swine Record Book. She also received a certificate from the Texas Pork Producers Association.

Senior - Breann Heckaman- Citizenship Achievement Pin; 2nd Place Ribbon for Leadership and Personal Development Record Book.

Achievement Certificates were awarded and presented to the 4-H'er who completed a Record Book and has the highest judged score on their first Record Book. This year's winner was Kevin Strube.

The Progress Award is presented to a 4-H'er with an outstanding Record Book but is not a first year book. This year's winners were Jarrett Blevins in the Junior 1 division and Dionn Heckaman in the Junior 2 division.

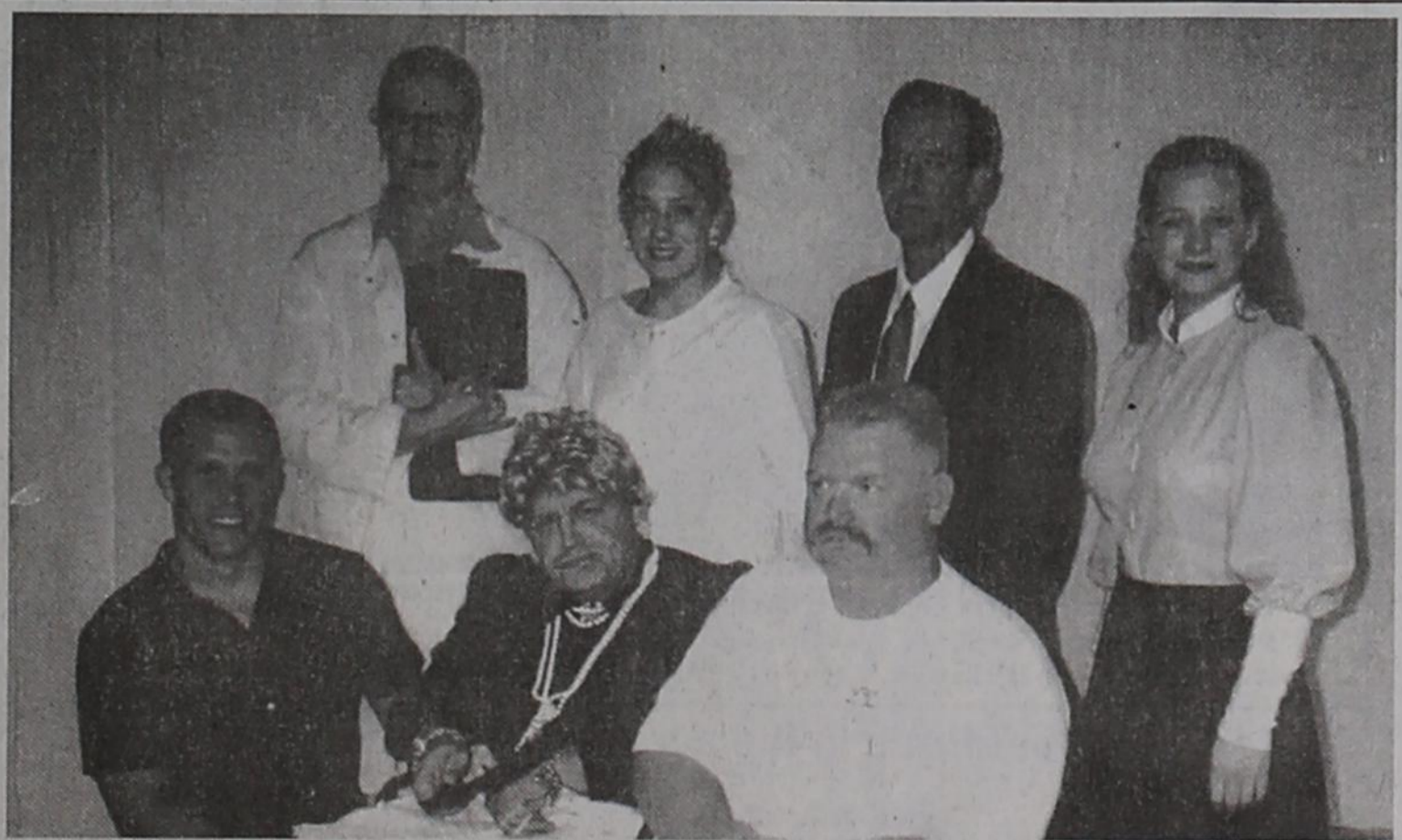

Ministerial Alliance begins campaign to distribute "Jesus Video" here

The Ministerial Alliance of Garza County, which is made up of participating local churches, will begin its biggest campaign to date next week with the introduction of the "Jesus Video Project."

Beginning next week, more than 1,800 Garza County homes will be receiving copies of the "Jesus" video, a product of the Campus Crusade for Christ International.

Through the video, which has been translated into more than 600

languages and has been viewed by more than 3.6 million individuals, the Ministerial Alliance hopes to raise awareness of who Jesus Christ is; reach out to the needy in the community; and relate to the community by offering worship opportunities, ministry projects and educational programming about Christ and local church ministries.

In the past, the Ministerial Alliance has attempted to meet these goals through the Easter sunrise services,

Founders Day services, construction teams and Post Cares. The "Jesus Video Project" campaign, however, promises to be the organization's largest undertaking to date.

"What this means is Jesus is coming to Texas," said the Rev. Billie S. Smith, pastor of Trinity Baptist Church and one of the project's leaders.

Those who receive a video should note that there are no costs associated with the videotape.

"It's yours at no cost, and we hope you watch it as many times as you like," Smith said. "Then, pass it on to someone who may not have received one or keep it to show to family and friends that visit."

Following the massive mailing, representatives of the Ministerial Alliance will be fanning throughout local neighborhoods for brief visits with those who have received the video. The purpose of the visits is to answer any questions viewers might have after viewing the "Jesus" video.

Anyone who watches the video who has questions about it should contact one of the local churches, Smith said.

"Get yourself involved in a local church as soon as you can to help you continue to grow in Christ or continue to receive answers to questions or support and spiritual guidance," he said.

For individuals who want to respond to the video and/or the project and its purpose, a survey card will accompany the video. The card should be completed and returned to the address provided or to the pastor of any local participating church.

Those who are not interested in the video or its contents are asked to pass the tape on to someone else or drop it off at one of the local churches so it can be passed on to another household.

"The 'Jesus' video has been a blessing and will be a tremendous blessing to you and our community," Smith said. "It might even change our community forever. The people of Garza County deserve to know about Jesus Christ and the hope is life communications."

Capt. Radle completes USAF school

Captain Michael Radle, a 1991 Post High School graduate and a 1996 graduate of Texas Tech, recently completed Squadron Officer School at Maxwell Air Force Base in Montgomery, Ala.

The school trains Air Force captains as part of the preparation to become majors. There were four squadrons of captains, with each divided into eight flight groups of 12 to 15 men. Each captain was given many opportunities to lead his group through various tasks, all in competition with the other squadrons.

Radle's B-25 squadron led all other groups for the entire five-week training period and was awarded the Chief of Staff Flight — the highest award and honor given at SOS training.

Radle is a flight commander of 30 flight crew members for AWACS at the 964th Airborne Air Control Squadron at Tinker Air Force Base, Okla. Currently he is deployed to Saudi Arabia for Operation Southern Watch, enforcing the UN-sanctioned no-fly zone over Iraq.

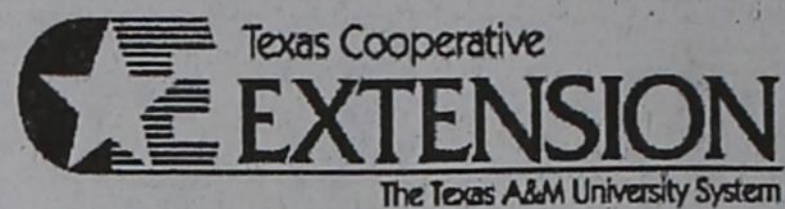

Truths and Myths About Weather and Your Vehicle

For many Texans, routine daily activities requires us to spend a great deal of time in a passenger vehicle, whether it be an automobile, SUV, or pickup. But are we safe? More importantly, are we safe from weather? Lets take a look.

Lightning has been described as the underrated killer. In the U.S. lightning causes an average of 80 fatalities each year. In Texas, the yearly average is four, ranking us behind Florida and the Southeast.

Myth: The rubber tires on a vehicle protect us from being struck by lightning.

Truth: Rubber tires provide NO protection from lightning. The steel frame of a hard topped vehicle provides increased protection as long as metal is not touched. Although one may be injured if lightning should strike the vehicle, it is safer inside a vehicle than outside.

Flash floods account for more deaths nationally, 66 on the average, than tornadoes and hurricanes combined. In Texas, the number is 15, almost a third of the national average which makes our state the "flash flood capitol of the country."

Myth: If caught in rapidly-flowing water while in a vehicle, it is better to stay in it and ride it out.

Truth: The National Weather Service recommends abandoning a vehicle and moving to higher ground if it can be done safely. If the water is already to high, or flowing to swiftly, it is suggested to stay in the vehicle with the windows rolled up and all doors tightly closed until it is safe to escape or rescue occurs. What is the best advice of all? Don't even think about driving into or through flooded low-water crossings, creeks, or roadways in the first place.

It's been said there are two seasons in Texas, summer and the second week of January, or so it seems. Heat or hot weather accounts for more deaths each year in the U.S. and Texas than any of the other weather hazards, and is often referred to as "the silent killer."

Myth: One is not as likely to be affected by heat in a vehicle or SUV as in a pickup.

Truth: Heat is heat, no matter whether it is in a vehicle, house, or outside. Inside a vehicle 150 degrees is just the same as 150 degrees outside or in a sauna. And 150 degrees is what the temperature can rise to in an enclosed vehicle in summer. People, especially the elderly and very young, and pets can be permanently injured, even die, in a matter of minutes and because of the effects of high temperatures in an enclosed vehicle.

Application can be requested at 608 WEST 6TH STREET. Assistance in completing the application will be provided if needed. Contact MELINDA A. QUINTANA for assistance.

GARZA CO. HEALTH CARE will use rules and procedures found in the County Indigent Health Care Program Handbook published by the Texas Department of Health. In summary, these rules are:

1. Application forms must be completely filled out, signed and dated.
2. Verification of income is required. Verification of residence, household composition, and resources is required, if questionable.
3. Maximum Countable income cannot exceed:

4. Total countable resources and assets cannot exceed \$2000 or \$3000 if the household contains a relative who is aged or disabled. The value of a car greater than \$4,650 is counted against the \$2000 limit. Personal possessions and homestead are exempt assets.

5. Eligible persons must be a resident of GARZA COUNTY.

6. Applicants must provide all information and documentation that is requested.

7. Applicants must apply for any other program for which they are potentially eligible. The county program is payer of last resort.

8. Applicants have the right to appeal denials.

And thereafter, death by government

Wyeth-Ayerst Laboratories has developed an injectable antibiotic called Tigecycline. It can be used to treat resistant pathogens — bacteria that are immune to standard antibiotics. However, the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has changed the rules for measuring drug efficiency in trials of antibiotics.



unsafe drug, they are attacked by the media and patient groups, and investigated by Congress. Their victims, sick and dead people, are highly visible. If FDA officials err on the side of over-caution, keeping a safe and effective drug off the market, who's to know? The victims are invisible.

It has ordered Wyeth-Ayerst Laboratories to double the number of patients in trials from 4,000 to 8,000. Wyeth-Ayerst has already conducted two human studies, and was planning a third and final one. Because of the massive increase in cost, in order to comply with the FDA mandate, the company has put further development of Tigecycline on hold.

Another example of keeping drugs off the market is FDA's denial of approval of a vaccine to prevent meningitis C. This is a bacteria that infects thousands of Americans and kills hundreds each year. No conjugated vaccine (one comprised of linked components) is approved for use in the United States. Three such products are available in Canada and Europe, where 20 million doses of the vaccine have already been administered.

As a turf-protecting measure, our FDA refuses to recognize foreign drug approvals. So what's the story? Is the FDA out to deliberately kill Americans? No, but the end result is the same. Dr. Henry Miller, a physician, a Hoover Institution fellow and former FDA official, explains in the June 15 Washington Time. FDA officials can make two kinds of errors.

They can approve a drug that has unanticipated, dangerous side effects that might cause illness and death. Or, they can err by either not approving or causing huge delays in the use of a safe and effective drug. Statistically, these are known as Type I and Type II errors. What are the FDA incentives?

If FDA officials err on the side of under-caution in approving an

For example, neither the Americans who get sick or die from meningitis C this year, nor their loved ones, will know that their illness or death could have been prevented had it not been for errors by FDA officials. It's a no-brainer to figure out which error FDA officials prefer to make. If you conclude they have a bias toward errors that create invisible victims, who don't know whom to blame for their illness or death, step to the head of the class.

By the way, FDA conduct demonstrates that the admonition, "One can never be too safe," is something we should take with a grain of salt. Sometimes, drug companies produce a drug that's safe and effective, but the disease it treats is rare. There aren't enough patients available to go through the FDA's costly approval procedure to make the drug economically worthwhile.

Those drugs are designated "orphan drugs." Prior to the Reagan administration's steps to correct this situation, thousands of people suffered or died needlessly. It's estimated that the 216 orphan drugs approved since 1983 are estimated to have prevented 108,000 deaths from rare diseases. Right now, there are scores of "orphan drugs" unavailable to physicians for treatment options.

In addition to FDA policy that leads to the illness and deaths of untold numbers of Americans is the issue of drug costs. I'm disgusted whenever I hear politicians pontificating about high drug costs and the need for prescription-drug handouts. Congress, the FDA and the courts are largely responsible for the escalating costs of drugs.

Why is the Self a Lesser Cause?

War increases the burdens of government. If you seek evidence, look around. Government does not grow only in obvious ways, for example by gaining the power to hold individuals without charge or to monitor their lawful activities. It also grows through the promotion of a culture of sacrifice. In war, more than at other times, people are expected to serve the state's purposes.

That quintessential court "intellectual," David Gergen, whose sacrifice consists in working for anyone who possesses supreme power, recently chided President Bush in a New York Times op-ed for not asking more of the American people. He called for "the creation of a new sense of purpose in our national life." I don't know about Gergen, but most of the people I know already have a sense of purpose in their lives.

As for purpose in our "national life," in America that can only mean a dedication to leaving us free to pursue our own happiness. But that's not what Gergen has in mind. What he does have in mind is revealing, because his call for bigger government is only vaguely associated with fighting terrorism. The war just makes the sacrifice easier to justify.

He writes, "Mr. Bush can still demonstrate [wartime] leadership by linking present sacrifice with a better future in several ways. He can, for example, roll back his tax cuts and propose that the savings be redirected toward a broad social cause like improving the lives of children. If the war is about securing their safety, after all, why should we not be equally concerned about securing their health and education?"

Could anything be more out of spirit with what America was to be about? The Founders' vision was one in which governance was limited to protecting life, liberty, and property. That vision did not include plundering people to finance transfer programs (which inevitably fail anyway), because the Founders understood that the best path to health, education, and the other good things in life was freedom and the resulting prosperity.

Gergen wants more than a tax increase. He said Bush should "embrace universal service" in a military or civilian capacity. That doesn't really mean everyone, though. His proposal does not include the drafting of middle-aged university professors/magazine editors/former presidential counselors whose salary and speaking fees would easily absorb the tax hike he favors.

Only 18-to-24-year-olds would be so honored — whether they liked it or not. When politicians and their sycophants talk about sacrifice, they always mean coercion. Why, then, are the solemn pronouncements of those who would so cheerfully dispose of other people's lives received with such respect? If Gergen wants to see someone make sacrifices, who's stopping him?

Unfortunately, the president shares Gergen's view. In a

commencement address at Ohio State University, he endorsed the ethic of self-sacrifice and condemned "selfishness," a red-herring term that can cover everything from what the ancient Greeks called the "good life" to the felonious ways of a thug. (Novelist Ayn Rand found it curious that victimizing others is typically regarded as being in one's self-interest.)

Bush urged the graduates to "serve our country, and a cause greater than self." But hold on. Hasn't every leader who ever wished to accumulate power urged people to serve their country and a cause greater than the self? I can't think of one who told them to be free and to achieve their own happiness. The call to sacrifice always precedes usurpation and tyranny. Why is the self always regarded as a lesser cause?

Everyone gets one precious life, and making it into something extraordinary is a demanding moral cause. Moreover, when people develop themselves into happy and productive individuals they inevitably help to improve the lives of others. In a market economy, one gets rich by enriching others with better goods and services.

To be sure, benevolence is admirable. Helping others when possible is what a good neighbor does. But that's a far cry from an ethic of self-sacrifice. The president's message is that only service to others can validate one's life. That is wrong. One's life is an end itself.

It requires no justification beyond itself. Beware the call for sacrifice.

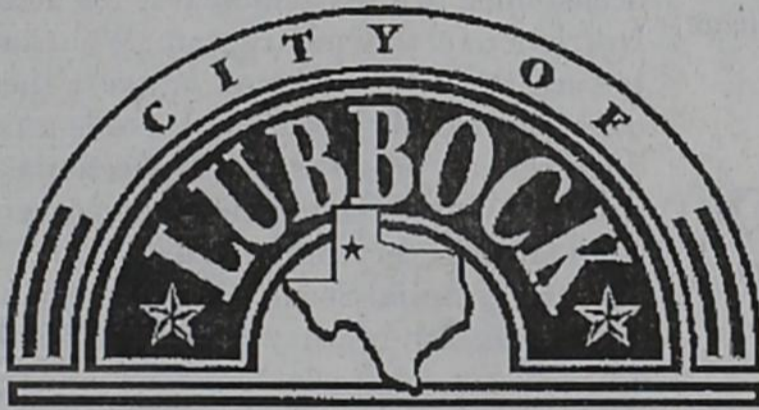

'Lopes hammer Mustangs in 33-14 win here

The Post Antelopes set the stage for another run at the state championship in their 33-14 convincing win over the visiting Class AAA Denver City Mustangs. From start to finish, it was classic football with very few mistakes.

The running game gobbled up huge chunks of time off the clock, with the first drive of the game going 94 yards in nine minutes. That opening drive featured crisp blocking by the offensive line and determined running by fullback Mitchell Mills and tailback Jett Lott.

Mills was credited with 28 carries for 179 yards, with Lott picking up 88 yards on 17 carries during the game. "All the backs blocked well for each other," Antelope head coach Richard Gorman said, "and what most people don't see is the excellent blocking down field by our receivers."

"The Antelope defense was solid across the field, socking the Mustangs with five, "three-and-out" possessions.

At half-time the Lopes held a 22-0 lead. The Mustangs finally got on the board late in the game, scoring twice in the fourth quarter with time running out.

It wasn't anything real fancy, just downright solid football throughout the contest for the Antelopes.

Gorman praised the team effort, pointing out that offensive linemen Mark McCallister, Bryan Looney, Jon Eilenberger, Noah Gutierrez and Chessauf Garcia were key to the team's success.

"Of course, we've got to keep on improving, because we've got a very tough schedule ahead of us," Gorman emphasized.

The Antelopes travel to Roscoe Friday for a 7:30 p.m. kickoff with the number three ranked Class A Plowboys. "They are a very good football team," Gorman explained.

The Plowboys are bolstered by 10 returners on offense and defense. "They operate a wishbone offense," Gorman said, "and that's going to be hard on our defense, we're going to have to play tough and smart."

On defense the Plowboys use a seven man front, "that's going to be a real challenge for us," Gorman added. "They've got good team speed and they're good at what they do."

It's the first home game for the Plowboys and the first out of town game for the Lopes.

After the game, the Antelopes will stop at the Shack in Snyder for a meal, with fans invited to join them. The Shack has agreed to open late for Post Antelope fans

and the team. Management at the Shack has requested fans to call (915) 573-4921 so the staff can be prepared. "They are normally closed at that time, so they'll need to know about how many chicken fried steaks to prepare," Gorman explained.
