expansion of the four-siren municipal alert system that primarily served as a tornado warning d
back to as far as the 1940 s.
Officials opted to revamp the warning system to ensure complete coverage of the growing community and to replace components that had deteriorated and were nonfunctional. The city and county agreed to split the total cost of the upgrade, approximately $\$ 6,000$. Saturday's test signals will ensure that the new system is operational and can be trusted to alert all residents of Post.
Local officials want area residents to be aware that the sirens es sentially can relay two distinct messages - "alert," which is signisentially can relay two distinct messages - "alert," which is signi-
fied by a steady three-minute warning sound, and "take cover," which fied by a steady three-minute warning sound, a
is conveyed by a three-minute wailing signal The "alert" message is used when a tornado warning has been issued for Garza County (when a funnel cloud has been spotted, a downburst is occurring in the area or a severe thunderstorm with winds in excess of 70 mph is approaching). In the event the "alert" message is heard, local residents should turn on their televisions or radios for additional severe weather-related information.

Getting an ambulance is about to get quicker in Garza County.

locally as the Post EMS, will formally join the emergency communications system operated out of the Garza County sheriff's office. The move, according to Sheriff Keny Ratke and ambulane ser all emergency medical response capability countr-wide by teamin the countys ambulance operations with the exis
gency dispatching system at the sheriffs office.
This marriage of emergency communications and services became a reailty following the update of the sheniffs departments emer
gency communications system during the past year Also the am bulance service was able to purchase the radio equipment neces. sary to tie each emergency medical tectnician
the sheriffs departments $9-1-1$ dispatch center
To enhance the process, sheriffs department dispatchers received the training to become state certififed emergency medical dispatchshould allow the $9-1-1$ dispatch center at the sheriffs department
to better handle the critical communications functions necessary in
all types of emergency activities, according to a press release issued Monday.
The most immediate and obvious result the public can expect to
see with this change is a reduced time between the first call for see with this change is a reduced time between the first call for
medical help and the arrival of an ambulance at the scene, the press release states. Quicker response times are possible because individual EMTs have direct radio contact with sheriff's da
"This direct communication should eliminate vital minutes in de lays getting the ambulance started toward the scene at a time
those minutes can be critical to the health and safety of the citizen in need of emergency medical care," stated the release, which was submitted by Bartlett and Ratke. "Additionally, with their new certifications as emergency medical dispatchers, the 9-1-1 dispatchers the initial care of the person in need while awaiting the arrival of the ambulance on the scene "
The system also allows the dispatchers to provide ambulance crews so EMTs are better informed unont the medical situation at han "Garza County has been blessed for many y

## And thereafter, poverty in America


#### Abstract

If you're a poor adult in America, for the most part, you're black, white, brown or polka dot According to the definition the U.S. Bureau of Census uses, a family of four with an income over $\$ 18,244$ is not poor. The poverty cutoff for a single-person household is $\$ 9,359$, and that for a two-person household is $\$ 12,000$. With those definitions, the poverty rate was 11.7 percent, or about 33 million Americans living in poverty in 2001. The greatest percentage of poverty is found in femalepoverty in 2001. The headed households. Over 70 percent of female-headed households are poor. A large over 70 percent of female-headed households are poor. A large percentage of poor people are children ( 17 percent); fully 85 percent of lack children living in poverty reside in a female-headed household full time at a minimum-wage job that pays $\$ 5.15$ per hour, would earn an annual income of $\$ 20,600$. Keep in mind that few adults earn wages as low as the minimum - wage and those who do earn a higher wage after a few months on the job. If a married couple both working at the minimum wage had no children, they would not be poor; if they had two children, they wouldn't be living in the lap of luxury, but neither would they be below the poverty threshold. Let's look at poverty in female-headed households. Divorce and death of the father might explain a small part of why there're so many female-headed households. But the bulk of it is explained by people having children and not getting married in the first place. Having children is not an act of God. ## Patriot Act II: The Sequel, Why It's Even

 Scarier than the First Patriot Act by Anita Ramasastry by Anita RaiSoon after the terronist acts of September 11, Congress passed the government. Now John Ashcroft and his scribes at the Justice
Department have been working secretly tocreate new, 120 -page draft egislation that, if enacted, would expand greatly upon these already

- sweeping powers.

This daring sequel to the USA Patriot Act is known internally as the Domestic Security Enhancement Act. It is also nicknamed Patriot II (the name by which 111 refer toit here), or Son of Patriot. On February
7 of this year, a January 9 draft of Patriot II was revealed to the public - but not by the government. It was made public only through a leak. - but not by the government. It was made public only through a leak. Even Congress iself, striking, appears to have played ittle or no
part in Patriot IIs drating thhugh it seems that Speaker of the
House Hastert was, at least, given the opportunity to review the draft last month, as was Vice President Cheney.).

enacted in a matter of weeks. The Senate Judiciary Committee had only a brief, one-and-a-half-hour hearing on the Act, in which Attorney General Ashcroft testified but took no questions. In the House, meanwhile, there was no estimony from opponents of the bill.
After September 11 , there was at least some rationale for this expedited consideration. Now, however, there is far less exigency. If the introduction of Patriot II in Congress coincides wits the Irraq war,

TIA as a tool against US citizens. Nevertheless, Patriot II, as draft by the Attorney General and his staff, would begin to make TIA the law. For instance, under Patriot II, federal agents would not need a

reports. This provision would open the wedge for TIA tobe implemented through a huge database

Court, which issues warrants more easily than federal district courts
The FISA Court is meant toaddress international terrorism, involving mostly noncitizens. Patriot II, however collapses the distinction between domestic and international terrorism, treating wholly
domestic criminal acts as subject to the same, looser legal rules that apply to foreign intelligence gathering.
