# Free Texas Tech home game football tickets

The Post Dispatch and KPOS Radio will give away two Texas Tech football home game tickets throughout the 2003 season. ### **Newsstand price increase**

For the first time in more than 20 years, the single copy cost of The Post Dispatch will be increased, effective with the September 4, 2003 edition. The single copy price will be 75 cents.

"When the current single copy price was set," Post Dispatch publisher Wesley W. Burnett said, "the price of a cup of coffee was 25 cents, a gallon of gas was about 80 cents. Everywhere you turn, costs have continued to rise every year. All of the necessary materials and services for publishing a newspaper have more than doubled since the early 1980s."

Mailed subscription rates are not affected by the newsstand single copy price.

Burnett emphasized that the hometown newspaper offers its readers a wide variety of "free" services, in additional to local news and photos, including a full color magazine (American Profile), the popular Texas Crossword Puzzle, Yesteryears, free card of thanks for deaths, hospitalization and other emergencies, free engagement and wedding announcements, free obituary notices, free letters to

### Youth probation funding questioned

The city could see a cutback in services offered by the Garza County Juvenile Probation Dept. if city council members decide to

trim their budget in that area. Last month, city council members discussed deleting from the city budget funding earmarked to pay the city's portion of the benefits for the juvenile probation officer's position. The council hoped to save approximately \$3,000 in the new fiscal year bud-

get as a result of the move. In a letter dated July 29, Brandt Taylor, chief juvenile probation officer, said that such a decision would prevent his office from providing services such as community service monitoring, alcohol and tobacco education classes, etc., to juveniles ages 10-17 receiving Class C citations in the local municipal court. The change would be effective Oct. 1 or earlier if city officials choose to cut funding prior to that date.

"If, in the future, this line item is restored, we will gladly resume services for the municipal court," the letter states.

The change would not, however, affect services to juveniles determined by the municipal court to have been in "delinquent conduct" (Class B misdemeanor or above, Taylor's letter states. Council members received and

reviewed the letter at their Aug. 5 meeting, but no action was taken.

### State, county collect \$29,436 from travelers by Wes Burnett

Garza County and the State of Texas agents collected \$29,436.27 in July for highway travel fines issued here, according to reports of the two Justices of the Peace courts. The fund raising program, operated by county and state agents, takes advantage of travel victims who violate state commercial transportation codes. JP Court 1 reported \$14,980.75 in July from 54 cases. JP Court 2 reported 14,455.52 for June from 36 cases. Jimmy Valdez (lover right) was first on the scene. chine for corporate governments.

But the question about the lawful nature of the transportation code needs a bit of exploring. The following research is offered for the reader's consideration:

People can learn the exact jurisdictional limits (scope) of the Texas Transportation Code by allowing it to interpret itself according to its strict construction.

The scope of the Code can be known by its title, "Transportation." Since this term is not defined in the Code, then it must be defined according to the United States Transportation Code and Black's Law Dictionary. These sources reveal that the term "Transportation" means transportation by a carrier for hire.


Use of the roads and highways for purposes of "transportation for hire by carriers" is what falls under the scope of the Code. The Code protects the traveling public by regulating the vehicles using the roads for the purpose of "Transportation."

So why do we see Department of Public Safety Officers (DPS), county and city officers enforcing the Code upon the traveling public who show no appearances of using the roads for "transportation" purposes?


The answer rests upon the registration of vehicles with the State of Texas. The scope of the registration requirement falls under "Transportation." So all motor vehicles using the roads for purposes of "transportation" are required to be registered with the State. But guess what?

Any automobile, registered with the State, falls within the scope of the Code. The registration sticker and the license plate are the identifiers by which the DPS can determine whether or not a vehicle falls within their jurisdictional limits.

Question for thought: Does the DPS have the authority to enforce the Code upon travelers, not involved with "transportation," who have voluntarily chosen not to register their automobiles with the State?



### August is National Immunization Month

The month of August has been esignated as National Immunizaion Month to spotlight the imporance of keeping childhood immuizations up-to-date. With the beinning of the school year just round the corner, now is a good ime to review a child's medical ecords to ensure that school-age hildren have received all of the equired vaccinations and boostrs.

Immunizations are one of the most ffective ways by which parents can rotect their children against serius diseases. Vaccines can prevent 2 diseases including chicken pox, easles, polio and hepatitis A and . Since 1992, the immunization ate for toddlers has increased from 5 percent to 76 percent, exceeding 0 percent for polio, measles and etanus. However, even with this ncreasing rate of success approxiately 900,000 two-year-olds are ot fully protected against the most reventable diseases.

Children must be vaccinated at n early age in order to be fully rotected. Children are most vulerable to deadly diseases before they reach their second birthday. The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services recommends that 20 different vaccines be administered before a child reaches age two.

Vaccines not only protect the individual who is vaccinated from developing a potentially serious disease, but immunizations also help protect the entire community by reducing the spread of infectious agents. In addition, immunizations represent one of the most cost effective means of disease prevention. For every dollar spent on vaccines, society saves up to \$27 dollars in medical and related societal costs. Vaccines contain a weakened or dead disease germ or inactivated disease toxins. They are usually administered in the form of a shot, as a liquid or through inhalation by aerosol. When introduced into the

bloodstream the human body makes antibodies against the weakened or dead germs in the vaccine. Once developed, these antibodies usually stay in a person's immune system for a lifetime and can fight the real disease germs if they are encountered later in life.





Post independent School District announces its policy for providing free and reduced price meals for children served under the National School Lunch Program. Each school and/or the central administration office has a copy of the policy, which may be reviewed by any interested party.

The household size and income criteria identified below will be used to determine eligibility for free and reduced price benefits. Children from households whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced price meals. Foster children that are the legal responsibility of a welfare agency or court are also eligible for benefits regardless of the income of the household with whom they reside. Eligibility for the foster child is based on the child's income.



Application forms are being distributed to households with a letter informing households of the availability of free and reduced price meals for their children. Applications also are available at the principal's office in each school. To apply for free and reduced price meals, households must fill out the application and resurn it to the school. Applications may be submitted anythme during the school year.

For school officials to determine eligibility for free and reduced price benefits, households receiving food stampe or TANF only have to list their child's name, food stamp or TANF case number and an adult household member must sign the application. Households who do not list a food stamp or TANF case number must list the names of all household members, the amount and source of the income received by each household member who signs the application. If neither household member has a social security number, the household member must indicate that a social security number is not available. The application must be signed by an adult household member.

Under the provisions of the free and reduced price meal policy, principals will review applications and determine eligibility. Parents or guardians dissatisfied with the rolling of the official may wish to make a formal appeal for a hearing on the decision and may make a request either orally or in writing to the principal.

Households that list a food stamp or TANF case number must report when the household no longer receive these benefits. Other households approved for benefits based on income information must report increases in household income of over \$50 per month or \$600 per year and decreases in household size. Also, W a household member becomes unemployed or if the household size increases, the household should contact the school. Such changes may make the children of the household eligible for benefits if the household income falls at or below the levels shown above.






Garza County Health Care District will use rules and procedures found in the County Indigent Health Care Program Handbook published by the Texas Department of Health. In summary, these rules are:

1. Application forms must be completely filled out, signed and dated.

2. Verification of income is required. Verification of residence, household composition, and resources is required, if questionable.

4. Total countable resources and assets cannot exceed \$2000 or \$3000 if the household contains a relative who is aged or disabled. The value of a car greater than \$4,650 is counted against the \$2000 limit. Personal possessions and homestead are exempt assets.

5. Eligible persons must be a resident of Garza County.

6. Applicants must provide all information and documentation that is requested.


7. Applicants must apply for any other program for which they are potentially eligible. The county program is payer of last resort.

8. Applicants have the right to appeal denials.






