RFP complaint sent to FBI

A complaint concerning the county's handling of proposals for the Giles W. Dalby Correctional Facility operations contract has cleared a State Commission on Judicial Conduct review but soon may come under federal scrutiny.

On May 10, local resident Jon Smith contacted the FBI office in Dallas after receiving a correspondence from the state commission dismissing his original complaint.

"We appreciate the concerns raised in your letter," the commission's May 5 letter to Smith reads. "However, after thoroughly reviewing your information, it was determined that... you stated no allegations of judicial misconduct covered by the Code of Judicial Conduct.... Since your complaint is regarding a criminal matter, we are referring you to the Federal Bureau of Investigation."

The state commission's involvement was a result of complaints filed by Smith last month with the Department of Justice, the Texas Attorney General and the Lubbock FBI. Those complaints focused on County Judge Giles Dalby's handling of the contract proposals prior to the March 22 commissioners court meeting.

The DOJ forwarded the complaint to the State Commission on Judicial Conduct, Smith said.

In his original complaint, Smith charged Dalby with "opening bids prior to the opening date" and "contacting one of the bidders and advising them that their bid needed to be adjusted or fixed."

During the March 22 commissioners court meeting, Dalby said that when he opened the prison contract proposals on March 18, he found the MTC proposal contained no specific financial information. He immediately phoned the warden at the Dalby unit, which is presently operated by MTC, and advised him the MTC bid was incomplete.

Dalby said he was contacted by he advised MTC to "get me something by 2 o'clock," the advertised deadline for proposals. MTC met that deadline.

On March 29, the Garza County was on the ballot and drew 28 votes, Commissioners awarded MTC the Dalby unit management contract; however, in a May 3 letter to The Post Dispatch, Dalby indicated an error made in the county's request for proposal (RFP) public notice would negate the contract and require the county to repeat the entire process.

The rewritten public notice, seeking RFPs from firms interested in operating the Dalby unit in accordance with Texas Local Government Code 351.102, was published in last week's Dispatch. Deadline for the new RFPs is set for June 14.

So with Garza County officials scrapping the initial contract and readdressing the contract process, why is Smith moving forward with his complaint?

"It all boils down to opening the bids prior to the deadline... and the judge calling (MTC) and telling them to fix it or adjust it," Smith said Monday morning.


Smith's original complaint specified actions he claims Dalby should not have taken in handling the RFPs; however, his new complaint mailed to the FBI office in Dallas lodges protests against not only the county judge, but also each of the county commissioners and the sheriff.

The judge and three of the four commissioners reviewed the RFPs prior to the March 22 commissioners court meeting at which the documents were to have been considered, Smith said. Additionally, a conflict of interest appears to exist between Garza County and MTC-the spouses of one of the commissioners and the sheriff are employed by the prison management firm.

"I'm primarily upset with the process involved and not so much with the individuals," Smith said. "I don't want it isolated that I'm just going after the judge. I'm not here to crucify anybody...."

When contacted by The Dispatch Monday, Dalby declined comment on the matter. MTC's current contract with Garza

County expires July 31.

the term "Transportation" was defined as transportation by a carrier for hire.


Use of the roads and highways for the purpose of "transportation for hire by carriers" was what fell under the scope of the Code. Even to this day, the Code protects the traveling the roads for the purpose of "Transportation.

It was further discovered that the State and County enforces the Code upon all travelers who use vehicles that are registered with the State. The registration stickers and license plates were found to be the identifiers by which enforcers could determine whether or not vehicles fell under their jurisdictional limits of enforcement.

On-going research continues on the simple question of whether the State and County have the authority to enforce the Transportation Code upon those who do not fall within its scope, and have not voluntarily registered their automobiles with the State.





On God's Word

The Love of God...1Corinthians 13:1-13

1Corinthians chapter 12 covered a great deal of spiritual information concerning the various gifts for the body of Christ, as well as what is available for all who are filled with holy spirit. This one chapter is packed with fantastic spiritual knowledge from God. When we allow God's word to interpret itself there is no more confusion. All who are filled with holy spirit have the complete package with nine different ways to profit from its manifestation. Next God put great emphasis upon the sort of relationship between the members of the body. All the members were baptized by the same spirit from God, and not one member has any authority from God to show more or less respect and honor toward other members because of their level of honor. Those members who seem to be less useful in the body, are to be considered necessary (1Corinthians 12:22). Yet according to verse 31 there is a more excellent way. For it was God who so loved the world that He gave His only begotten son that whosoever believes on him shall not perish, but have everlasting life (John 3:16). Since Adam's initial disobedience, all his descendents have been in a perishable state. According to Romans 5:12, because of Adam's disobedience, death passed upon all men. Then the second Adam, who is our Lord Jesus Christ, demonstrated God's love by willfully and voluntarily giving his own life as the final blood sacrifice for all of mankind. Mankind did not deserve this wonderful love from God. Yet He gave it to all who would believe with the heart that God raised Jesus from the dead (Romans 10:9-10). The epistle of 1John covers this subject beautifully, "My little children let us not love in word, neither in tongue, but in deed and in truth (1John 3:18)." To love in deed and in truth figuratively means to love in true deeds, or in deed truly. This word "deed" is also used in Luke 24:19, "... Concerning Jesus of Nazareth, which was a prophet mighty in deed and word before God and all the people." The Gospels of Jesus Christ and the book of Acts are packed with examples of how to show God's love. It will be seen that God's love can only be shown by those who walk by the spirit that is from God. Now we can dive in to 1Corinthians chapter 13 with a better understanding of God's love toward mankind. We can speak in tongues until we are blue in the face, but it will be meaningless if we are holding back the love of God. We can excel in prophicy, understand all mysteries and knowledge, and believe even unto removing a mountain if God gives the word, and yet even all this is nothing when God's love is being restrained in our lives. We can burn ourselves out feeding the poor, but without God's love it is of no profit. The love of God suffers long. It is with kindness, and without envy. It is not with self-boasting and selfinflating. The love of God never results in failure. We come to verse 13, "And now abides faith, hope, and charity, these three. But the greatest of these is

charity." We can believe God's word for dynamic results in our lives. We have the hope of the return of Christ for all the members of his body. And we have the love of God. The greatest and strongest of these is God's love toward mankind.



Educational ineptitude II

Several weeks ago, my column "Teacher Ineptitude" was about the sorry state of teacher quality and concluded that while teacher ineptitude is neither flattering nor comfortable to confront, confront it we education.

It's the same story when education majors finish college and take point average of 3.0 or higher. tests for admission to graduate schools. In the case of the Graduate Record Examination (GRE), education majors have an average score that's the lowest (467) of all majors except for sociology majors (434). Our nation has a serious education problem that easily threatens our future well-being. Corrective action requires that we acknowledge and correct deficiencies no matter how painful and embarrassing they might be. A good start in that direction is to examine The unflattering fact that we must own up to is that many, perhaps successful teacher-training programs and see if we have the guts to

Interventionist policies

From Richard Clarke to Condoleezza Rice, the security establishment agrees on one thing: the attacks of September 11, 2001, could not have been prevented by counterterrorist measures.

Maybe, maybe not. But if that is correct, it doesn't get the Bush administration and its predecessors off the hook. The very inability to prevent terrorism is a powerful argument against the interventionist polices they followed for decades.

If there is no way to stop a decentralized network of suicidal killers from murdering innocent civilians using low-tech means, that is all the more reason to stay out of foreign hornets' nests. The Founders of this country were right. Intervention leads to trouble.

Is that the lesson being learned from the work of the 9/11 commission? Of course not. Nothing can be permitted to impede America's mission to reform the Muslim world and even the religion of Islam itself.

Americans will not learn the anti-interventionist lesson from their "leaders." So they'll have to learn it themselves. Their lives may depend on it.

For many decades American presidents have thought that they could bring order to the world, particularly the Middle East. This would have been a problem even if U.S. administrations had tried to be neutral. But they were never neutral. They always had agendas. Whether it was the Israel-Palestinian conflict or other frictions in the region, U.S. administrations sought outcomes that satisfied their own politically motivated projects. Justice had nothing to do with the matter. As a result, the United States has a record of helping to overthrow elected leaders in favor of despots, of arming ruthless autocrats, and of bolstering the occupation of property taken from Palestinians. The Middle East is a region rife with injustice — and U.S. policy has been allied with much of it.

Who would not expect such a record to incite hatred against those responsible for it? And it was always to be expected — though not condoned — that fanatical elements among the aggrieved would

take their wrath out on innocent Americans.

What makes the terrorist threat so frustrating is that it was entirely foreseeable. Anti-interventionists warned about it for many years. But the overseers of the imperial agenda smugly believed they could pursue their objectives with impunity. When the big attack

finally came, they made the best of it: they used it to augment their power and to intervene even more aggressively. The very consequences of their program became grounds for redoubling their illadvised efforts.

Part of their propaganda campaign is the claim that the Islamists hate us because "we love freedom." If they did, they would say so. Instead, whenever they explain their hatred, they specify U.S. intervention in their societies. There is no reason to believe they would be attacking a free and noninterventionist America.

The question now is, when will the American people understand? The crimes of 9/11 should have focused attention on the policies that made Arabs willing to commit such heinous acts here. But the Bush administration — and the "bipartisan" political establishment as a whole — made sure that Americans would draw only lessons that did not threaten the interventionist program. Anyone who attempted to point the finger at those policies was stigmatized as an appeaser or terrorist sympathizer. By and large, the news media fell into line.

Let's take the administration at its word. The horrors at the World Trade Center could not have been prevented by actions taken between January 20 and September 11, 2001. The real issue is whether they could have been prevented had U.S. administrations followed the noninterventionist advice of the Founding Fathers. The answer is obvious.



Let's hear it for the good guys

For once, let's hear it for the good guys. If every country in the world fought terrorism as aggressively as the USA and Great Britain, the truly bad guys would be beaten down, perhaps for

But hoping that the nations of the world will respond cohesively to the savagery and potential mass destruction of modern terror is a lost cause. We live in a world of denial and selfinterest. You have as much chance of finding the Wizard of Oz as you do persuading some timid and misguided countries to join the fight against the Islama-fascists.

Even countries like Canada are no longer dependable allies. According to a Maclean's poll, 38 percent of Canadians say their attitude toward the USA has worsened since 9-11. Almost half of our friends to the north see America as arrogant, bullying or dangerous.

To be sure, the Bush administration's non-compromising stance in Iraq and insistence that terror-enabling states be confronted (Axis of Evil) have put off many foreigners who embrace a far more passive approach toward terrorism. But the Canadian situation exemplifies what is truly going on in this world.

Over the past two decades, Canada has become committed to secularism and government entitlements. Subsidized medical care, decriminalization of marijuana, gay marriage, extensive welfare for newly arrived immigrants and an aggressively liberal Canadian Broadcasting Company have all become part of the culture. The eastern Canadian press is especially anti-American and delights in hammering their more traditional American neighbors.

Thus it should not have come as a surprise when some high school hockey players from Massachusetts were booed at a match in Montreal. Many Americans were annoyed but quickly forgot the incident. Now, however, our Canadian ally has a far more serious situation on its hands.

Last January, Army Private Jeremy Hinzman deserted from 82nd Airborne Division and fled to Canada. In March, he was followed by another 82nd Airborne private, Brandon Hughey. Both had voluntarily enlisted in the U.S. military and split only after their unit was ordered to Iraq. They have been granted temporary residence in Canada, and hearings will be held on their cases this summer.

But here's the salt in the wound: The Canadian Broadcasting Company (CBC) and the Toronto Globe and Mail have reported on the deserters and put them in a sympathetic light. The CBC reporter, Gillian Findlay, said Hughey wanted no part of "George Bush's war." Her words, not Hughey's. And the Globe and Mail columnist Heather Mallick says the two guys are "fine American men."

Canada has an extradition treaty with the USA, and its law says that political asylum can only be granted to those who could be executed or persecuted if returned to their home countries. Since Iraq is not a declared war, Hinzman and Hughey cannot be executed and, if returned to the U.S. they would most likely face five years in prison — hardly a persecution for

a crime as serious as desertion. Most Canadian observers believe the two will be extradited to the USA. but if they are not, a serious situation will erupt. A country harboring deserters would undermine the U.S. war on terror and demonstrate outright hostility toward America.

These deserters should have been detained and their cases quickly heard. Instead they have Web sites, media sympathy and a forum in which to bash their country. This circus is insulting to America, and especially to those American soldiers who have lost their lives fighting terrorists and supporters of the brutal dictators Mullah Omar and Saddam Hussein.

On my television program I have advised the Canadian government that if the deserters are not returned post-haste, I will no longer buy Canadian products or visit the country. I believe many Americans will take the same stance.

A true friend does not hurt you even if he or she disagrees with something you do. Canada may reject the Iraq strategy, and we respect its dissent. But actively undermining the U.S. military is quite something else. Ottawa should best remember that cold fronts can originate from the south as well.

Lopes hammer Eldorado 16-3

The Post Antelopes methodically continue to march through the Class 2A playoffs with decisive victories in a best two-out-of-three series win against the Eldorado Eagles last Friday and Saturday, winning Friday 6-3 and Saturday by a whopping 16-3 in five innings.

Taking home the Area Championship trophy, the 'Lope wins featured timely hitting, sharp base running, above-average defense (three total errors) and competent pitching from brothers Joseph and Andrew Espinoza.

Game One Joseph Espinoza, the lone senior pitching starter for the Post baseball team, wanted to show his young teammates how it is done. Espinoza struck out three and limited Eldorado to three runs over seven innings Friday as Post won 6-3 in the first game of the area championship series in Midland.

In Friday's game, the 'Lopes started early, fast-scoring four runs in the first inning after a 1-2-3 Eldorado top of the first. However, Post cooled considerably, allowing Eldorado to score three runs over three innings before slamming the door on the Eagles' hopes by plating two solo runs in the fifth and sixth innings respectively.

Mitchell Mills singled, following a Randon Blacklock strikeout to open the Antelope first inning. Coby Jones followed with a single. Jett Lott broke the scoring drought with a 2-RBI double. Coco Valdez lined an RBI single, as did David Rivera to allow Post to grab a quick 4-0 lead after the first inning.

Eldorado had three opening singles to game at Christensen Stadium on Satplate on run in the second inning with urday. Post had a 1-2-3 inning.

Eldorado plated another lone run on an Alan Dykstra RBI single following a Frankie Ariste triple. Post went down again 1-2-3 to close out the third inning.

Eldorado scored another lone run in the fourth while Post was shut out for the third consecutive inning.

Post, holding a slim 4-3 lead, allowed Andrew Espinoza, who had trouble Eldorado one base runner in the next inning while Mills had an RBI single to score Blacklock and jump to a 5-3 lead after five full innings.

Defensively, the 'Lopes held Eldorado to 11 atbats over the last three innings, with no runs scored. The Antelope defense came up huge behind Joseph Espinoza, holding Eldorado to 30 at-bats total - nine over the minimum. Eldorado finished with seven hits, but just two in the final three innings.

Game Two

One day after they scored just six runs in the opener of a Class 2A area-round playoff series, the Antelopes erupted for 16 runs on 16 hits to clinch the second

in the first inning, the Antelopes were first to plate a run. Blacklock, on base via a walk, trotted across home on an errant pickoff play at third by the Eldorado pitcher. Lott later lined an RBI single, scoring Mills. Things started rough for Post starting pitcher finding the plate early as he walked two batters and allowed two hits. Eldorado took advantage of the free base runners, using an Ariste double The Bold Gold baseball team closed out and a Joey Hernandez single to forge a 2-2 first-inning tie.

For Eldorado (17-7), it was a case of game. 
> Offensively Post's top five batters went 9-for-15 with four walks and scored 12 times. The 'Lopes got spectacular pitching outings from Joseph Espinoza


