## Sheriff hands prison contract complaints to Texas Rangers

Complaints relating to the handling of the management and operations contract for the Giles W. Dalby Correctional Facility were lodged against several individuals, including the Garza County judge and two commissioners, last week.

Local resident Jon Smith leveled the allegations in a statement made July 21 to Sheriff Kenny Ratke.

According to the sheriff, Smith cited several "areas of concern," including:

- "Some sort of threat conveyed about" Smith, allegedly during a shift change at the correctional facility, on or about April 16.
  - Smith's request to file criminal charges of fraud against Joe Rasberry, warden of the Dalby unit, and J.C. Connor, a corporate official with MTC, the firm contracted to operate the prison. Smith alleged that during contract negotiations with the Garza County Commissioners, Rasberry gave false information regarding the number of employees at the Dalby unit, while Connor falsely reported that MTC had no civil litigation pending.
  - A complaint against the Commissioners Court, particularly Judge Giles Dalby and Commissioners Mason McClellan and John Valdez, for violation of the state's Local Government Code as it relates to conflicts of interest.
- Smith told The Dispatch he has received "hate mail" and threatening phone calls, sustained a break-in and had obscenities spray-painted on his door in recent months. He also said he has been the subject of a "terroristic threat," and some local residents have organized a boycott of the store he manages.

Smith's complaints against Rasberry and Connor stem from their appearances before the Commissioners Court earlier this year. Rasberry misrepresented the number of Dalby Unit personnel in order to secure the new management contract, Smith said, while Connor "lied to the court" when he advised that MTC was not involved in any pending litigation.

"The complaints against the judge has to do with 'overseeing the proceedings knowing (the two commissioners) have a financial interest," Smith said. He maintains that because McClellan's spouse and Valdez's son are employed by MTC, the two commissioners have an interest in the financial success of MTC and should not have taken part in the handling of contractual

negotiations and decisions involving the firm.

Ratke, who has turned the allegations over to the Texas Rangers for review, said that despite Smith's request that criminal charges be filed, no evidence of criminal wrongdoing was presented.

"I'm having (these matters) looked into," Ratke said Tuesday morning, "but I don't know if there is a criminal case here. At best, some of this may be a matter of civil litigation."

Smith, who earlier this year filed complaints about the handling of the Dalby unit management contract with the FBI, the Department of Justice and the state attorney general's office, said he will continue working to correct what he sees as wrongs.

"I guess I'm like a pit bull," he said. "When there's something wrong, I stay after it until it's right."

Ratke said Tuesday he has not been contacted by any agency "state or federal" regarding any of Smith's allegations.

## Commissioners to consider prison contract at Thursday morning meeting

A mistake made earlier this year, coupled with absences recorded at a Garza County Commissioners Court meeting earlier this week, will force commissioners into last-minute action on the operations and management contract for the Giles W. Dalby Correctional Facility.

Commissioners met briefly Monday morning to work a 13-item agenda, but two of the five members - Judge Giles Dalby and Precinct 1 Commissioner Lee Norman - were unable to attend the session. After approving the minutes from a previous meeting and handling accounts payable, the quorum shelved remaining agenda items for a meeting called for 9 a.m. today, July 29.

Among items listed for consideration at Monday's meeting and bumped to today's agenda was discussion and approval of the operations and management contract for the Dalby unit.

The current contract is due to expire Saturday.

A new contract was awarded to the current Dalby unit operator, MTC, on March 29, but in May county officials retracted the action, citing an error in their handling of the RFP (request for proposals). The handling of proposals was not in accordance with Local Government Code, Section 351.102, which states the "commissioners court may not award a contract under this section unless the commissioners court requests proposals by public notice and not less than 30 days from such notice receives a proposal that meets or exceeds the requirements specified in the request for proposals." The county's deadline for receipt of the proposals was March 18, just 21 days after publication of the RFP.

The county has since reissued its public notice and complied with timing stipulations outlined by the state.

In addition to consideration of the contract for management and operation of the Dalby unit, commissioners also are slated to:

- Review the county's annual road report.
- Receive an update on Fuller Road.
- Discuss a proposed "change to Garza County credit cards."
- Consider funding for Trailblazers.
- Consider bids on lots from a sheriff's sale.
- Consider specifications for use of the county's mini-van.
- Consider employee health insurance rates for 2004-2005.
- Consider changes to an employee policy on health insurance.
- Conduct a budget work session.

## Scott Metsgar, Bryan Taylor killed in Borden County pickup roll-over

Two Post residents were killed and a third injured in a single-vehicle accident that occurred July 21 in Borden County. Scott Metsgar, 24, and Bryan Taylor, 41, were killed in the early morning accident, according to reports. The pickup's driver, Wayne Duncan, sustained minor injuries.

Although Department of Public Safety reports were unavailable at press time, reports indicate the vehicle rolled just west of Gail on Hwy. 180 as the three men were returning to their jobs with Patterson Oil Co. in New Mexico. Duncan was wearing his seatbelt at the time of the rollover, while the other two men were not.

Duncan was transported to the hospital in Snyder where he was treated and released the following day.

The accident was worked by DPS officials from Lamesa.

## Grant puts laptops at Post Middle School

On Wednesday, July 21, Post Middle School was notified by the Texas Education Agency that it was selected to receive a grant in excess of \$350,000 through the agency's Technology Immersion Pilot (TIP) project.

The purpose of the project is to explore the impact of technology immersion on student progress by providing each student with a wireless mobile computing device and integrating software, online resources, and other appropriate learning technologies that have been shown to improve student achievement.

A technology immersed campus would involve the development of a comprehensive education technology environment that provide for the acquisition, development, interconnection, implementation, improvement and maintenance of an effective educational technology infrastructure.

The overall goal of the TIP initiative is to increase student achievement in the core subject areas of reading/language arts, mathematics, science and social studies.

This project is part of a groundbreaking research study commissioned by the US Department of Education to study the impact of technology immersion on student achievement.

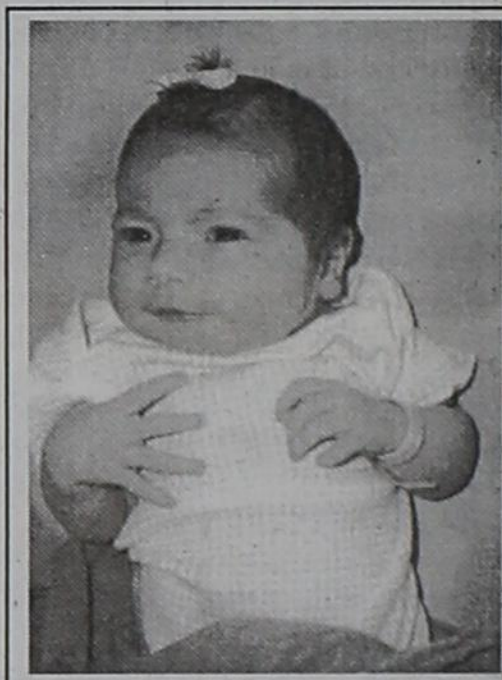

### Canned & Frozen Vegetables Getting the Most Nutrition for Your Money

Canned and frozen vegetables are nutritious. They are naturally low in fat, unless packaged in butter, cream sauces, or with fat-containing foods. Salt is often added to canned vegetables, but low salt (sodium) products are available.

Canned or frozen vegetables can be substituted for fresh produce if fresh vegetables are not available or are poor in quality.

The U.S.D.A. Food Guide Pyramid suggests that we eat three to five servings of vegetables a day. A serving equals 1 cup of cooked vegetables or 3/4 cup vegetable juice.

#### Shop Smart!

The cost of canned and frozen vegetables depends on many factors, including brand name and style (whole versus cut).

Brand \* Consumers often relate brand to quality. The producers of nationally known products spend great amounts of money and effort to make sure that the quality of their product stays the same from year to year.

While it may be easy to spot the brand names, don't forget about the store and generic brands of vegetables. They often taste just a good

as the national brands and usually cost less. Make an effort to try one store brand canned or frozen vegetable each month. The cost of

canned and frozen vegetables depends on many factors, including brand name and style (whole versus cut).

Style (whole versus cut) \* A vegetable that is packed whole often will cost more than the same vegetable that is packed cut, diced or chopped. This is because the vegetables that are packed whole are specially chosen for their appearance.

To save money, choose cut or chopped vegetables instead of whole especially when the vegetable is planned for use in casseroles, soups or stews.

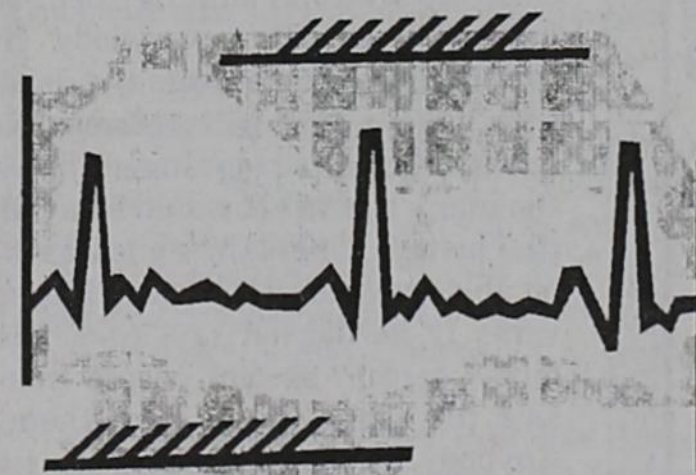
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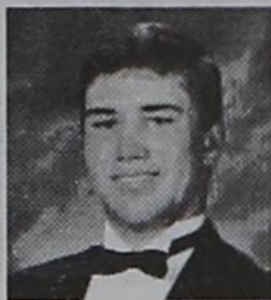

#### Speaking in Tongues ... Acts 2:4

During the Gospels period, Jesus Christ prophesied of speaking in tongues. After he was raised from the dead he appeared to the eleven disciples. According to Mark 16:15-18 he said to them, "Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature. He that believes and is baptized shall be saved; but he that believes not shall be damned. ## Texas Straight Talk

The US House passed the Marriage Protection Act last week, a bill designed to ensure that the "full faith and credit" clause of the Constitution is not used to impose gay marriage on Texas or any other state.

You may remember Congress passed the Defense of Marriage Act in 1996, which explicitly authorizes states to refuse recognition of gay marriages performed in other states. However, the lack of respect federal judges show for the plain language of the Constitution necessitated further congressional action.

The Act underscores an important legal point: Marbury vs. Madison did not alter the congressional power to regulate and limit federal court jurisdiction, which is plainly stated in Article III. The drafters of the Constitution gave Congress the power to limit federal jurisdiction to provide a check on out-of-control federal judges.

In other words, the federalist concept of checks and balances applies to the judiciary just as it does to the legislative and executive branches. The Marriage Protection Act represents a long-overdue exercise of the congressional power to limit and define federal court jurisdiction.

Americans need to better understand the role of federal courts. The Supreme Court is supreme only over the lower federal courts; it is not supreme over the other branches of government. The judicial branch is co-equal under our federal system, nothing more and nothing less.

Yet we've allowed federal judges to pursue a social agenda that is at odds with a majority of Americans, in essence converting our courthouses into legislatures. In the process average people have lost even more power to affect the laws under which they must live. The Founders never intended for a handful of unelected,

unaccountable federal judges to decide social policy for the entire nation.

Just as Texas is not required to recognize medical licenses, law licenses, or driving licenses from other states, it ought not be forced to recognize gay marriage licenses granted elsewhere.

Already some same-sex couples have sued in federal court to force the nationwide recognition of their marriages, so the Marriage Protection Act is needed to preserve states' rights. Federal judges have flouted the will of the American people for too long, acting as imperial legislators instead of jurists.

The definition of marriage— a union between a man and a woman— can be found in any dictionary. It's sad that we need government to define an institution that has existed for centuries.

The best approach to complex social problems, as always, is to follow the Constitution. This means Congress should restrict federal court jurisdiction when necessary, and social matters should be left up to states under the Ninth and Tenth amendments.

Since the Marriage Protection Act requires only a majority vote in both houses of Congress and the president's signature to become law, it is a more practical way to deal with the gay marriage issue than the time-consuming process of passing a constitutional amendment.

In fact, since the Defense of Marriage Act overwhelmingly passed both houses, there is no reason why the Marriage Protection Act cannot become law this year.

Congress has a constitutional responsibility to stop rogue federal judges from using a flawed interpretation of the Constitution to rewrite the laws and traditions governing marriage.

The Marriage Protection Act, if passed by the Senate and signed by the President, will protect the people of Texas from having marriage defined by federal judges rather than the Texas legislature.

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## Abolish FCC

*In the rush to grant the FCC greater control over broadcasters, no one has noticed that the FCC's very existence is a violation of free speech.*

 Since the infamous "wardrobe malfunction" at the Super Bowl, there have been strident demands for a crackdown by a tougher, stricter Federal Communication Commission.

The FCC's various commissioners now call for the power to regulate cable television, in addition to broadcast media. In June Congress voted to increase the maximum fine the FCC can impose "tenfold", from \$27,500 to \$275,000. Commissioner Michael Copps has vowed that he will not be satisfied until "I see us send one or two... cases for license revocation."

In this headlong rush to expand the government's authority over the media, no one has paused to consider whether the government should have such authority in the first place. No one has noticed that the very existence of the FCC is a flagrant violation of the right to free speech.

Throughout history the norm was tyranny over the mind. Men were allowed to speak only by government imprimatur, until America's first amendment established freedom of speech as a central premise of our nation.

The first amendment declares that "Congress shall pass no law... abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press." This language could not be clearer, or more absolute: no matter who disagrees with you or considers your speech offensive, the government may not abridge your right to say it.

Free speech is the protection of the rational mind and its literary, intellectual, and scientific products. It means the absolute right to express one's views, so long as one does not violate the rights of others. Free speech means no American should fear the fate of Galileo, persecuted for daring to assert scientific truths that contradicted the official Church's doctrines, nor that of Socrates, put to death for offending the state.

Yet the FCC exists to dictate what can be said on-air. Each year since the early days of radio, every broadcast station must apply to the FCC for permission to use the airwaves. In exchange for their licenses, broadcasters must promise to serve the "public interest." Stations that the FCC regards as having failed to do so can be fined, or even shut down, at the FCC's sole discretion.

The putative justification for the FCC's regulation of broadcasters is that the airwaves are public property. But just as the government does not own—and so has no legitimate control over—the presses of the New York Times, so it has no business regulating what may be broadcast over airwaves.

The airwaves, which would be useless without the transmission networks created by radio and television stations, belong to the individuals and companies that developed them. Broadcasters should not have to plead to the authorities for annual licenses, any more than a homeowner should have to beg for an annual license to use the patch of land he has developed.

No other media in America is subjected to such persecution. If the New York Times or Barnes & Noble publishes and distributes content some members of the public disapprove of, the government cannot threaten them with fines or penalties. But let Howard Stern offend a listener, and Clear Channel is hammered with over a million dollars in fines.

So far, only "indecent" has been targeted by the FCC's crackdown—but politicians on both sides of the aisle have begun whispering demands to censor PBS or the Fox News Channel, on the grounds that their alleged biases violate the "public interest." Both the liberals, with their political correctness, and the conservatives, with their puritanical religious ethic, claim to speak for the "public interest." Can it be long before the two sides begin the battle over which ideas and values Americans are allowed to see and hear on-air?

As the FCC wields its club ever more fiercely, broadcasters are running scared. Clear Channel has canceled its "shock-jock" programs. Skittish station-managers have bleeped out words like "urinate," "damn," and "orgy" from the Rush Limbaugh program. Most ominous, The National Association of Broadcasters convened a "Summit on Responsible Programming" to define industry-wide standards of self-censorship.

America was founded on the freedom of speech—on the right and responsibility of the individual to decide what to say, and what to listen to. Yet in the name of protecting ourselves from being offended—and almost without noticing it—we are well on the way to surrendering that crucial right to the control of the omnipotent state.

## Free Martha! Free Bobby!

The U.S. government has moved closer to nabbing two prized catches. Martha Stewart has been sentenced to five months in prison, five months under house arrest, and a \$30,000 fine for lying about noncriminal activity. She will remain free while appealing her convictions. Former world chess champion Bobby Fischer may be turned over to U.S. authorities by the Japanese government for his 1992 defiance of a ban on travel to Yugoslavia, site of his rematch with Russian chess great Boris Spassky. Fischer faces 10 years in prison and a \$50,000 fine.

Neither Stewart nor Fischer, however unattractive their private lives may be, should be facing prison time or other legal sanctions.

Stewart was convicted of lying to government investigators. According to the indictment, she told investigators that she sold about 4,000 shares in a pharmaceutical company in 2001 because she had arranged with her stock broker to sell when the price fell below a certain level. The government persuaded a jury that in fact she sold because her broker tipped her off that the company's CEO was suddenly trying to sell all his shares. (The CEO had gotten advance word that the Food and Drug Administration was about to turn down his application for an anticancer drug. The FDA has since changed its mind about the drug.)

Stewart's case is often reported as involving insider trading. But Stewart was not an insider, and the government never brought that charge against her. Thus she was charged with lying, while not under oath, about something she did that was not illegal. For this she is facing nearly half a year in prison, followed by confinement at home, and a fine.

U.S. attorneys possess powers that would put the Inquisition and Star Chamber to shame. Insider trading is a hopelessly vague legal concept that has been applied in bizarre cases. Whether or not Stewart lied when she spoke to investigators, it is certain that she knew she was entering a legal Twilight Zone in which anything she said could be used against her. She would have been better off saying nothing, but that does not change the fact

that the government has the abusive power to go on fishing expeditions. It can question people in search of charges and then hit them with an "obstruction of justice" charge for their answers even though no evidence of actual wrongdoing is turned up. The Stewart case is a travesty of justice.

Fischer's case, if anything, is even worse. In 1992 the eccentric Fischer, who is given to making morally outrageous statements about Jews and the 9/11 attacks, traveled to Yugoslavia to play a chess match against the man he beat for the championship 20 years earlier, Boris Spassky. (He won again.) At the time, the United Nations had U.S.-supported sanctions in place against Yugoslavia, which was ruled by Slobodan Milosevic and was in the midst of civil war. Fischer was charged with trading with the enemy. As the U.S. government put it in a letter to him in 1992, "We consider your presence in Yugoslavia for this purpose to be an exportation of services to Yugoslavia in the sense that the Yugoslav sponsor is benefiting from the use of your name and reputation." For this he may face a decade behind bars.

In a free society, the government may not tell people where they can travel. Fischer did not go to Yugoslavia to plot attacks against Americans. He went to play chess. Neither the U.S. government nor the UN had legitimate authority to interfere.

Once again we have a case in which the government refuses to let peaceful citizens alone. Whatever one thinks of Fischer's past conduct or inflammatory statements, he has done nothing deserving of criminal indictment and imprisonment.

If we measure a society's decency by how much or little its government harasses people who have not aggressed against others, the United States is hurtling in an ominous direction.

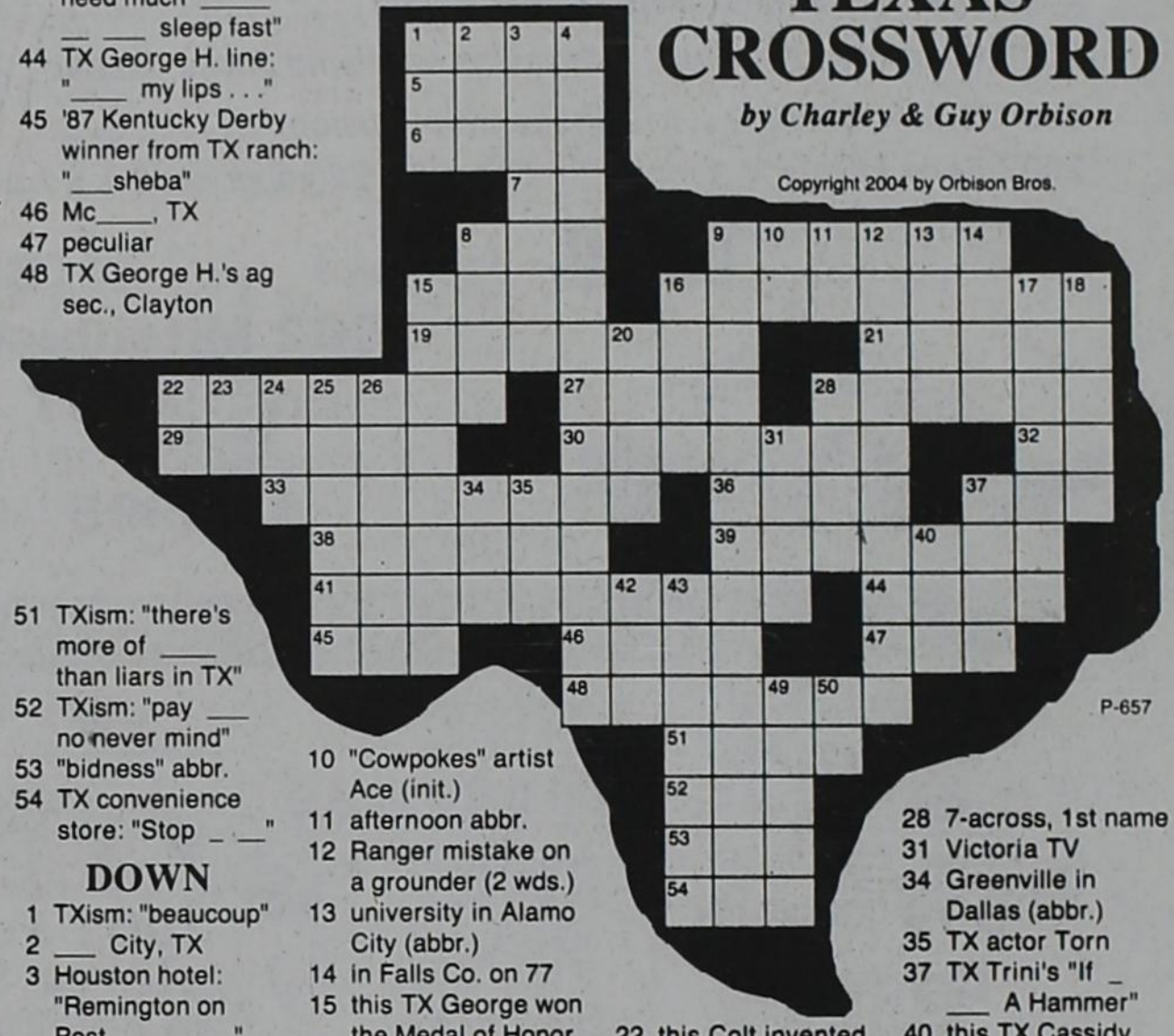

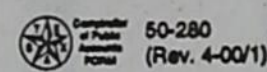

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## Post High School students reminded about Dress and Grooming Code

Post High School and Post Middle School students are expected to dress in a manner appropriate for school. Even though certain styles may be fashionable in a general sense, this does not mean current styles or fads are proper for school. Research indicates that student dress often sets the pattern for classroom behavior. Therefore, students are expected to dress neatly. Clothing should not be so revealing or in such a state of disrepair as to distract others from their schoolwork.

Some specific points: Students participating in an extracurricular activity are subject to additional requirements set forth by the sponsor or coach.

No facial hair is acceptable except for a trimmed mustache which does not extend below the corners of the mouth.

Hems of skirts or dresses must fall below the point halfway between the middle of the thigh and the middle of the knee. When kneeling, the hem of

the skirt or dress may be no higher than 5 inches from the floor.

The middle of the thigh may be used as a reference point for shorts. Hems of shorts must be no higher than the middle of the thigh.

Some types of dress that are prohibited:

Open midriffs, net blouses, backless outfits, spaghetti straps, tank tops and spandex tights.

Clothing with any visible undergarments. Strapless or single strap tops on girls are prohibited. This includes tops that have short sleeves or straps that fall at the edge of the shoulder or lower. Straps on tops should be at least 2 1/2 wide. Boys may not wear sleeveless shirts.

Caps, hats or sunglasses.

Boys may not wear earrings. Shirts with armholes large enough to expose undergarments or the chest area.

Ripped garments, excessively frayed hems, coaching shorts, mesh fabric, wind shorts, athletic shorts,

spandex or compression shorts.

Clothes displaying obscenities, alcohol or drug related messages or pictures, suggestive wording, holes, gang insignia, violence or other things deemed inappropriate.

Chains that are not considered part of an acceptable wardrobe.

Bandanas.

Visible body piercing with the exception of girls' earrings.

Excessively baggy or sagging pants.

Excessively revealing clothing (whether due to tightness or other reasons).

Due to constantly changing fashions and fads, it is impossible to foresee all clothing alternatives or options. Therefore, the administration reserves the right to determine acceptability regarding items that may or may not be addressed in this handbook. Dress deemed inappropriate is not negotiable.

Students unable to obtain proper clothing may be assigned to an isolated area for the remainder of the day or may be required to wear clothing provided by the school.

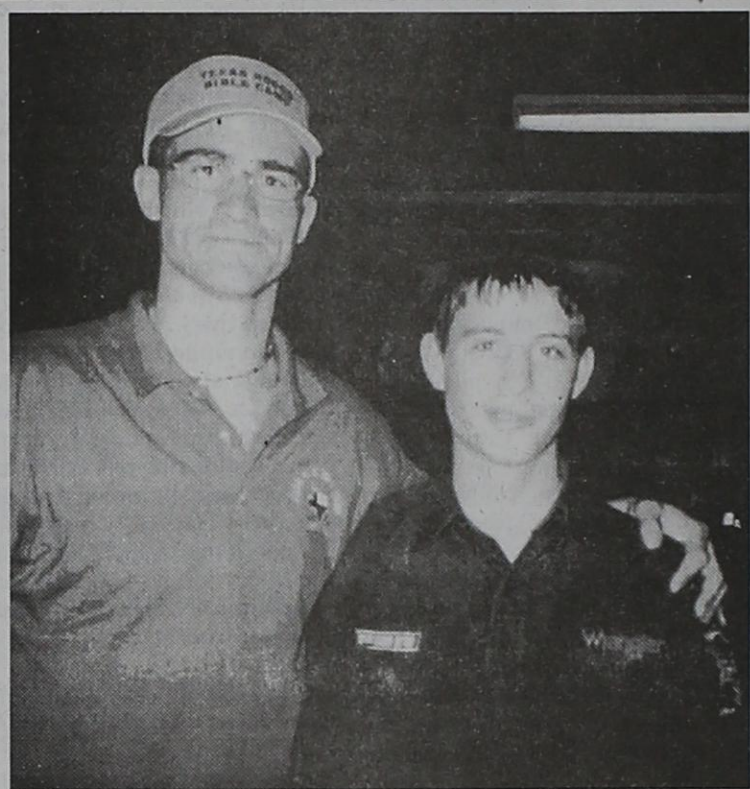
## Camille Payne earns degree at TTUHSC

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


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
