Justice of the Peace Precinct 1 collected \$12,739.50 on 51 cases while JP Court Precinct 2 reported \$21,178.75 on 48 cases.

State and county code enforcement officers are "just doing their jobs" by enforcing the traffic code, but what was sold to the public in the 1920s for "safe" roads, is now a huge money making scheme for corporate governments.

The State of Texas gradually shifted the scope of the Code so that all travelers appear required to register their automobiles with the State of Texas. A study into the underlying scope of the Texas Transportation Code has revealed exactly who is required to register their automobiles with the State.

The exact jurisdictional limit (scope) of the Texas Transportation Code was discovered by allowing it to narrowly interpret itself according to its strict construction. The scope of the Transportation Code is "Transportation."

The term "Transportation" was not defined in the Texas Code. According to the United States Transportation Code and Black's Law Dictionary, the term "Transportation" was defined as transportation by a carrier for hire.

Use of the roads and highways for the purpose of "transportation for hire by carriers" was what fell under the scope of the Code. Even to this day, the Code protects the traveling public by regulating vehicles using the roads for the purpose of "Transportation."

It was further discovered that the State and County enforces the Code upon all travelers who use vehicles that are registered with the State. The registration stickers and license plates were found to be the identifiers by which enforcers could determine whether or not vehicles fell under their jurisdictional limits of enforcement.

#### Speaking in Tongues ... John 4:22-24

During one of Jesus' journeys, he left Galilee because it was necessary for him to go through Samaria. Upon his arrival to Samaria he stopped to rest near the parcel of land that Jacob gave to his son Joseph. About six hours into the day he was weary and sat on Jacob's well. A woman from Samaria came to draw water out of the well and found Jesus sitting there. He asked her to give him some water. At the time he was alone because his disciples had left to the city for food. The woman rightly asked Jesus how it was that he, being a Jew, would ask her to give him water. This was because the Jews had no dealings with the Samaritans. Jesus began to lovingly open her heart up concerning the living water that would be available in the future. What wonderful scripture we find in John 4:1-42. Notice how he meekly served his Daddy by opening the heart of this Samaritan woman. Remember that the Samaritans were outcasts in the eyes of the Jews. The same woman meekly went and shared the truth with the others in Samaria and according to verse 39, "many of the Samaritans of that city believed on him" because of what the woman told them. Let's look at what Jesus taught them in the context of God's word in the Epistles.

In verse 10 Jesus said to the woman, "if you knew the gift of God, and who it is that says to you, 'Give me a drink,' you would have asked of him, and he would have given you living water." What is the "gift of God" and "living water?" The gift is defined in Acts 2:38, "Then Peter said unto them, 'Repent, and be baptized every on of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins, and receive the gift of the Holy Ghost." The words "the Holy Ghost" refer to "holy spirit." The gift is holy spirit.


Living water is also referred to in John 7:38, "He

that believes on me, as the scripture has said, 'Out of his belly shall flow rivers of living water.'" Psalms 1:3 says about the blessed man, "and he shall be like a tree planted by the rivers of water, that brings forth his fruit in his season." In Matthew 3:11 The prophet John compared earthly water with spiritual water, "I indeed baptize you with water unto repentance, but he that comes after me...shall baptize you with [holy spirit], and with fire." The living water can only be holy spirit.

Skip to John 4:20-24 and see how the subject of "worship" is introduced. The woman rightly explained to Jesus that all were to worship God on a certain mountain. Jesus then revealed to her that the time would come when they would neither worship God in this mountain, nor at Jerusalem. In verses 23-24 he plainly stated, "But the hour comes, and now is, when the true worshippers shall worship the Father in spirit and in truth for the Father seeks such to worship Him. God is spirit: and they that worship Him must worship Him in spirit and in truth?" The words "in spirit and in truth" are a figure of speech which meant truly by the spirit, or truly spiritual. If we understand that to "worship" is the same as to "pray," we can see how God defines spiritual worship in 1Corinthians 14:14-15, "For if I pray in an unknown tongue, my spirit prays...What is it then? I will pray with the spirit, and I will pray with the understanding also."

#### **Ron Paul's The War on Drugs Texas Straight Talk** is a War on Doctors A Weekly Column

When we talk about the federal war on drugs, most people conjure up visions of sinister South American drug cartels or violent urban street gangs. The emerging face of the drug war, however, is not a gangster or a junkie: It's your friendly personal physician in a white warriors. coat.

Faced with their ongoing failure to curtail the illegal drug trade, federal drug agencies have found an easier target in ordinary doctors whose only crime is prescribing perfectly legal pain medication. By applying federal statutes intended for drug dealers, federal prosecutors are waging a senseless and destructive war on doctors. The real victims of the new campaign are not only doctors, but their patients as well

Dr. Cecil Knox of Virginia is one recent victim of federal authorities, who cannot abide physicians using their own judgment when prescribing pain medication. Dr . Knox faces federal criminal charges for prescribing legal pain drugs, and tragically has been forced to spend several hundred thousand dollars defending himself.

Virginia state authorities have neither charged him with a crime nor revoked his medical license, yet the federal government- which constitutionally has no authority to usurp state drug laws-perversely

seeks to imprison Dr. Knox for life! Even if Dr. Knox is acquitted of all charges, his life will never be the same. His professional reputation and clientele cannot be easily

restored, and the enormous legal bills cannot be easily repaid. So whether federal prosecutors obtain a conviction of Dr. Knox or not, the message sent to other doctors is chillingly clear: prescribe the wrong drugs and we will destroy you.

#### The end result is that doctors become afraid to prescribe pain medication, no matter how appropriate for a patient. The judgment of doctors has been replaced by the judgment of federal drug

Those who support the war on drugs may well change their views if one day they find themselves experiencing serious pain because of an accident or old age. By creating an atmosphere that regards all powerful pain medication as suspect, the drug warriors have forced countless Americans to live degraded, bedridden lives.

Even elderly deathbed patients sometimes are denied adequate pain relief from reluctant doctors and nurses. It's one thing to support a faraway drug campaign in Colombia or Afghanistan, but it's quite another to watch a loved one suffering acute pain that could be treated.

A sane, compassionate society views advances in medical scienceparticularly advances that relieve great suffering- as heroic. Instead, our barbaric drug war treats pain patients the same way it treats street junkies.

Doctors are not slaves, and they will not continue practicing medicine forever if the federal government insists on monitoring, harassing, fining, and even jailing them.

Congress should take action to rein in overzealous prosecutors and law enforcement officials, and stop the harassment of legitimate physicians who act in good faith when prescribing pain relief drugs. Doctors should not be prosecuted for using their best medical judgment, nor should they be prosecuted for the misdeeds of their patients.

It exists to defend the United States: its territorial integrity and national sovereignty, the population, and the liberties that underlie the American way of life. So whether Iraq was in violation of Resolution 1441 is irrelevant. The real question is whether Iraq represented a direct and imminent threat to the United States that could not otherwise be deterred.

If that was the case, then preemptive self-defense, like Israel's military action against Egypt, Syria, Jordan, and Iraq in the 1967 Six Day War, would have been warranted. And if Iraq was not a threat, especially in terms of

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Ever since the attacks of 9/11, unsanctioned alternative explanations Not very much. Yes, bipartisan blue-ribbon commissions are often of what happened and why have been in ample supply. What are the American people to make of these explanations? That depends on the alternative offered. My purpose here is not to lend credence to any of them, but rather to examine the attitude that official dom expects of us. According to the opinion molders inside and outside the government, we regular people are supposed to scoff, with melodramatic flourish if possible, at any suggestion that the Official Version of events is, shall we say, incomplete. The implied principle is that the government and the mainstream media couldn't possibly have gotten things wrong, either intentionally or inadvertently. That's the principle I wish to question. Governments regularly get things wrong, either because their knowledge is imperfect or because they have an interest in getting them wrong.

I certainly accept the maxim that the burden of proof rests on the one offering an assertion. Without that maxim, we are at the mercy of any arbitrary claim that comes down the pike. Until you get an answer to the question "What's your evidence?" you have no obligation to consider the assertion at all.

Most people who proffer conspiracy theories are eager to offer what in their eyes constitutes evidence. It may turn out to be bad evidence, but at least they see their responsibilities. They give the rest of us something to grab hold of, scrutinize, chew over, and accept or discard as we see fit.

That's more than we can say for the Loyal Order of Defenders of the Official Version of Things. They rarely deign to rebut the evidence provided by the devotees of alternative versions, for to do so would be to give those versions attention; and to do that would be to suggest they are worthy of attention. That, the Loyal Defenders cannot afford to do. Better to portray anyone who entertains a nonstandard, unsanctioned theory as a lunatic.

impaneled, comprising prominent members of the power establishment. Yet the last thing anyone expects of such commissions is a bombshell implicating high officeholders in gross negligence or malfeasance. Instead there is the obligatory boilerplate about the pointlessness of recrimination. The 9/11 commission is a good example. I've never understood why recrimination is considered pointless.

This arrangement looks suspiciously like a rigged game, and it should concern anyone who worries about the threat to liberty from power. As things are now set up, government is in a fine position to get away with murder and assorted lesser crimes. All it need do is hand down its exculpatory account, which will be dutifully conveyed by the news media, and have its agents impugn the motives or sanity of dissenters. That will be enough to keep most respectable people away.

We are asked, in other words, to put our trust in the state. But no collection of men is less deserving of trust than the state, A casual look at its history is all that is necessary to substantiate that claim. States have been committing horrendous crimes on a mass scale for ages. "Democratic" states are not exempt from that judgment. The U.S. government has much to answer for, from the Trail of Tears in 1838 to Atlanta in 1864 to the Japanese internment in 1942 to Ruby Ridge in 1992 to Waco in 1993. And that's only some of its domestic offenses. We could bring up the Philippines, Dresden, Tokyo, Hiroshima, Nagasaki, Beirut, and others.

I am not saying that any particular conspiracy theory is accurate. Dispatch nor its staff. All I am saying is that governments ought to be held to the same standard of proof as everyone else.

## **The Free Market is The High Road**

Nothing could raise our standard of living more than freeing the economy from our meddling government. When people are able to live free of government regulation, they prosper — goods become cheaper, standards of living go up, and individual liberty is expanded.

Today, government regulates almost every aspect of our lives, including how we educate our children, what we build on our land, how chicken is packaged, how much gas our cars use, what we use for money, what we spray in our gardens, what countries we visit, what we ingest, what we're paid for our work, how many and what kind of fish we can catch, where we protest, how much money we give to politicians, sex, marriage, and just about every other facet of life that should be no one's business but our own. This is costly, not only in terms of liberty but also in terms of prosperity. Free markets maximize both.

Succinctly put, regulated markets are not efficient - they misdirect and waste resources by distorting the price system. A rise in the price of a good tells both sellers and buyers that, for whatever reason, conditions are different than they were before, and that the good is now harder to obtain. When the government blocks this process, buyers and sellers receive 'distorted or even false information.

A recent study by the Mercatus Center (see www.mercatus.org/ regulatorystudies/article.php?id=558&print=1) found that government regulation costs the average household \$8,000 per year. That is not chump change. Most people would have a different outlook on the regulatory state if they were given the stark choice between keeping their \$8,000 and providing the 25 feet of shelf space that is required to hold the current Federal Register.

Though the financial benefits of ending regulation are enormous, they are not the most important reason for freeing the economy. A free market is superior to a regulated one because individual liberty is the only moral foundation on which to base a society.

If the government is going to regulate the economy, it cannot do so without violating people's rights. If I am willing to work for a prospective employer for \$2 per hour, that is my right. The government has no authority to prevent me from doing so through a mandatory minimumwage law. If I wish to inject heroin into my veins, that is my right. Even though it might not be good for me, it is morally wrong for the government to stop me, for I am not violating anyone else's rights in the process. If I desire to build a golf course on the wetlands in my backyard, it is my right as long as mutually agreed-upon covenants do not prevent me from doing

aiding and abetting Al Qaeda, then the United States fought a needless war against a phantom menace.

In the final analysis, the war against Iraq was the wrong war. Not because the United States used preemptive military force-preemptive self-defense would have been justified in the face of a truly imminent threat.

Not because the United States acted without the consent of the United Nations-no country should surrender its defense to a vote of other nations And not because Iraq had weapons of mass destruction (WMD)-none has been discovered and, even if they existed, they were not a threat.

The war against Iraq was the wrong war because the enemy at the gates was, and continues to be, Al Qaeda.

Not only was Iraq not a direct military threat to the United States (even if it possessed WMD, which was a fair assumption), but there is no good evidence to support the claim that Saddam Hussein was in league with Al Qaeda and would have given the group WMD to be used against the United States.

In fact, all the evidence suggests the contrary. Hussein was a secular Muslim ruler, and bin Laden is a radical Muslim fundamentalist-their ideological views are hardly compatible.

Ironically, President Bush provided his own indictment of the Iraq war when he addressed the United Nations General Assembly in September 2003: "No government should ignore the threat of terror, because to look the other way gives terrorists the chance to regroup and recruit and prepare." But that is exactly what the United States did by going to war against Iraq. To make matters even worse, the American taxpayer is stuck with the bill for the war and postwar reconstruction.

• Rent controls cause the construction of new rental units to decrease, causing shortages of apartments and increased construction of luxury homes.

• Mandating more fuel-efficient cars raises the price of new automobiles, pricing low-income people out of the market and keeping older cars on the road longer.

• Imposing import quotas on sugar increases the price of sugar and any product that contains sugar. Did you know that the American consumer pays about double the world price for sugar because of government regulation?

This is the central idea on which our country was founded — that the purpose of government is to protect, not regulate or destroy, the fundamental and inherent rights of the people. The individual would be left alone so long as he did not violate the rights of others and, for the most part, that was the role of the federal government for the first 100 years after the country's founding. With the tragic exception of slavery, the United States was a bastion of freedom in that golden age, with the government overseeing very little of the private lives of citizens. The result was an explosion of ideas and a creation of wealth that the world had never seen before. It is that philosophy that we have abandoned.

Government regulation is the result of the majority violating the rights of the minority. This is nothing more than tyranny. The moral path is to let people live in peace so long as they do not violate the rights of others. This is the essence of a free-market society, it is the path to prosperity, and it is the only honorable way to live with one another.




