County approves new agreement with Lubbock

The City of Lubbock and Garza County have come to an agreement on law enforcement at Lake Alan Henry.

During Monday's meeting of the Garza County Commissioners Court, county officials signed the interlocal agreement that provides for the county's continued provision of law enforcement at the Lubbock-owned lake. The new agreement is slated to remain in effect until Oct. 1, 2005. The maintained in good mechanical and visual repair." original agreement between the municipality and Garza County dates back to November 1999.

According to the new agreement, the county will provide a minimum of of training and maintenance of certification by dive team members. three certified peace officers to patrol the city's property at Lake Alan Henry. During the five-month period running from Oct. 1 to March 1, officers will patrol a minimum of 45 hours per week. During the seven-month period from March 1 to Oct. 1, the officers will be required to patrol at least 90 hours and/or accidents involving the vehicle or boat. per week.

and times, according to the agreement. Also, the city may, with prior verbal notification, relieve the officers from patrol. Such action, however, will not release the officers from completion of the required number of weekly patrol hours.

City Council finalizes budget

Post city officials approved the 2004-2005 budget and tax rate last week, but not without some last-minute changes.

Council members did some minor tweaking to the budget, cutting the funds to be allocated for the Recovery Center by about 50 percent. Harold Craig made the motion to make the change, with Bill Pool seconding the motion. The motion passed 4-1.

Following the formal observance of a public hearing on the budget and tax rate, a session that no members of the public attended, the council adopted the proposed budget for the general fund and the water and sewer fund.

Also earning council approval was the new tax rate, which was set at .5701 percent. That amount includes .3928 for maintenance and operation and .1773 for debt service.

The municipality's 2003 tax rate was .5828 percent.

Garza County may provide additional law enforcement personnel to assist the LAH patrol personnel in working City of Lubbock properties.

Additional stipulations included in the agreement maintain that: Garza County will provide LAH patrol officers with two four-wheel drive, marked vehicles "equipped with standard emergency equipment and

· Garza County will provide a certified underwater dive team with necessary dive equipment. The county will be responsible for the provision

• The City of Lubbock will provide a four-wheel motor vehicle and a patrolling boat for use by LAH patrol officers. Garza County will be obligated to provide the city with a written report of any and all mechanical problems

· The chief of police of the City of Lubbock "may designate specific law The City of Lubbock maintains the right to designate specific patrols days enforcement priorities upon city lands in which event county officers agree to enforce such priorities."

> Garza County will provide timely notification to city officials of "major incidents" that occur on city lands at the lake, "including, but not limited to, drownings, arsons, homicides, burglaries/damage of city property, and tornadoes." Also, the municipality shall provide timely notification to the county's constable of any such incidents that might occur when city officers are patrolling in relief of LAH patrol officers.

> · Garza County will ensure that any certified peace officer assigned to patrol the lake area has no financial interest in commercial development or property located on or within a half-mile of Lubbock-owned property. Additionally, the county must ensure that no officer assigned to the lake patrol works for anyone owning or renting property on or within a half-mile of Lubbock-owned property without the prior approval of the City of Lubbock and Garza County.

> To satisfy the agreement, Garza County will provide time and activity reports to the city each month along with invoice for payment.



County commissioners approved an intergovernmental agreement between Following the hearing, city officials selected an engineer for the grant Dickens County and Garza County regarding the housing of Garza County prisoners in the Dickens County Jail.

Garza County officials plan to give Lynn County 30 days' notice to terminate Council members also adopted a resolution supporting the SPAG/TCEQ the current housing agreement. Garza County has housed its overflow prisoners in the Lynn County facility in Tahoka since March.

Sheriff Kenny Ratke talked to the court about the savings Garza County should realize through the agreement. The provision of housing through the Dickens County facility should be less costly, the sheriff said, and Dickens County officials have agreed to cover all medical expenses and transportation costs.

Under the one-year agreement, Dickens County agrees to house Garza County's overflow prisoners if space is available in the Dickens County Jail. Garza County will pay \$37 per day per prisoner.

No change in clerk's salary

The Garza County Commissioners' Court set September 27 as the date for adopting next year's budget and tax rate following a public hearing Monday, September 13. No citizens appeared at the public hearing.

The court also accepted a report from the grievance committee, but took no action on the committee's recommendation. The issue concerned a complaint filed by county and district clerk Jerry Hays calling for the clerk's salary to be set at the same rate as the treasurer. The committee voted 5-4 in support of Hays' request, but the court was not required to take action because the vote was not a super majority.

Commissioners approved a renewal of the contract with the state Mental Health and Mental Retardation agency to continue services here.

In other matters, the court approved a request from Sheriff Kenny Ratke to terminate the contract with Lynn County for housing county prisoners, accepting a proposal from Dickens County Correctional Center.

A new contract with the City of Lubbock for providing law enforcement at Lake Alan Henry was also approved.

No action was taken in the search for a couinty emergency management coordinator or implementing a "burn-ban."

Motorcyclists injured near Southland

Two individuals were airlifted to University Medical Center in Lubbock Sunday following a motorcycle accident that occurred Sunday morning on U.S. 84 in the construction zone about 10 miles north of Post.

Garza County Deputy Eric Williams said he observed two men on the pavement when he arrived at the scene. One man was conscious and alert, although he was somewhat "skinned up," the deputy said. The other rider, approximately 27 or 28 years of age, had sustained what Williams described as an "extremely bad head injury."

Neither of the men was wearing a helmet, according to reports. They were riding separate motorcycles at the time of the accident.

Williams said he and a passer-by, who works as a nurse in Lubbock, were administering first aid to the more seriously injured rider when EMS arrived. The accident victims were on their way to Lubbock when a pair of Aerocare helicopters intercepted EMS at Southland to expedite the trip to the emergency room.

The names of the victims and their medical conditions were unavailable as of Tuesday evening; however, both are reportedly from Sweetwater, according to reports.

Although the cause of the accident remains unclear, Williams said

statements from other motorcyclists riding with the men indicate the 27or 28-year-old may have veered off the roadway, overcorrected and inadvertently struck the other rider's vehicle. Garza County Constable Eric Cravy assisted at the scene, and Crosbyton Department of Public Safety Trooper Vandergriff served as lead unavailable for comment.

Driver disappears following rollover

Authorities were called out early Saturday to investigate a one-car investigator. Vandergriff was rollover near Southland, but the driver of the vehicle was never located. The Ford automobile was traveling southbound on US 84 about half a mile south of Slaton when it apparently rolled over once, coming to rest in a cotton field. Garza County Sheriff's Deputy Eric Williams was called to the scene at about 7:30 a.m. Despite a thorough search of the field about 25 to 30 yards surrounding the vehicle, Williams said he found evidence of no one who

might have been traveling in the car.

No blood or evidence of injury was found, the deputy said, although there were footprints around the car. The vehicle also contained several alcoholic beverage containers and a loaded 9-mm magazine.

The vehicle was crushed on the rear passenger side, Williams said, which may have enabled the driver to escape the wreckage with little or no injury. It is possible the driver may have hitchhiked from the scene.

The registered owner of the vehicle. a Levelland resident, told authorities his car had been borrowed and may have been driven by either his girlfriend or one of her friends. Garza County Department of Public Safety Trooper Watson served as lead investigator on the case but was unavailable for comment.



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

Receive holy spirit ... use of Greek word "epi"

in the context of receiving holy spirit, there are at least five areas in the book of Acts that use the Biblical Greek word "epi." This word is mostly translated "to fall upon," "fall on" or simply "upon" (among other uses). In The Companion Bible, E.W. Bullinger provided the following definition of epi, "With the Accusative [case] it implies the downward pressure on that upon which a thing rests; active motion being suggested (e.g. 2Cor. 3:15. 1Tim. 5:5). Hence, it denotes any extended motion downward (Matt. 13:2; 18:12; 19:28; 27:45) from heaven to earth (Mark 4:20. Acts 11:15. 2Cor. 12:9)...epi marks the point to be reached." (Appendix 104 ix 3). Although the word epi is used many times throughout the New Testament, its uses in the context of receiving holy spirit warrant more attention.

The first usage of epi, as related to holy spirit is found John 1:33, "And I knew him not: but He that sent me to baptize with water, the same said unto me, 'Upon [epi] whom thou shalt see the spirit descending, and remaining on [epi] him, the same is he which baptizes with the Holy Ghost." Now, because Jesus is the risen Lord and Savior, it is available for holy spirit to permanently come upon anybody. This condition is unique to the period of time known as the Administration of the grace of God (Ephesians 3:2-6).

Acts 1:8, "But you shall receive [lambano] power, after that the Holy Ghost is come upon [epi] you ... ' During the past teachings it was established that to receive holy spirit means the point in time that people speak in tongues. Here, we get more information. After people start speaking in tongues,

Continuing on the subject of speaking in tongues the holy spirit is considered to be pressing downward from heaven to earth, and has truly reached its mark (see above definition of "epi").


Acts 2:3, "And there appeared unto them cloven tongues like as of fire, and it sat upon [epi] each of them." This scripture directly ties speaking in tongues with holy spirit pressing downward from heaven to earth, having reached its mark (Greek word, epi). Please notice that "epi" is not used in the context of being filled with holy spirit, but with speaking in tongues. The first 12 were first filled with holy spirit. Then they got the vision of cloven tongues sitting upon each of them, and they immediately began to speak in tongues.

Acts 8:16 "For as yet he was fallen upon [epi] none of them: only they were baptized in the name of the Lord Jesus." Seen in the context of verse 15, the word "epi" is used in direct relation to the condition of receiving [lambano] holy spirit.

Acts 10:44, "While Peter yet spoke these words, the Holy Ghost fell on [epi] all them which heard the word." How did they know this? See verse 46, "For they heard them speak with tongues.

Acts 19:6, "And when Paul had laid his hands upon them, the Holy Ghost came on [epi] them; and they spoke with tongues..." The laying on of hands was according to specific revelation from God, and was not a generally required condition for people to speak in tongues. Once again, from the context of verses 2-6, speaking in tongues is inextricably tied to the use of "epi" in the context of holy spirit.

Dozens of famous artists from as far away as New York, along with their followers, came each fall and stayed in Post or neighboring communities. Art enthusiasts and buyers from many states converged on the art show each fall.

The positive impact on local and area businesses was compounded annually by the thousands of visitors and spectators who came to Post to watch the ropings and view and purchase western art. An art show and a steer roping on a remote ranch perched miles from the nearest town was unheard of prior to the OS Ranch Steer Roping & Art Exhibit. Following the event's success, attempts were made to duplicate the combination, but none succeeded.

Perhaps one of the most amazing elements of the annual event was the formidable task of cooking barbecue outdoors for 5000 to 6000 visitors on both weekend days of the event. Dozens of volunteers pitched in each year, and supplies for the huge undertaking were purchase primarily from local and area merchants. Temporary labor was hired both prior to and immediately following the event to prepare the ranch for the invasion of spectators and clean the grounds afterwards.

It is impossible to pin a dollar amount on the economic impact the roping and art exhibit had on Post between 1971 and 1982. Nor is it possible to evaluate the importance the annual events had on the community's national reputation.

Thousands of individuals have memories of Post and the OS Ranch, and thousands more know where Post, Texas, is. They also know the citizens of Post and Garza County can do the impossible and make it look easy.


It will be of little avail to the people that the laws are made by men of their own choice if the laws be so voluminous that they cannot be read, or so incoherent that they cannot be understood; if they be repealed or revised before they are promulgated, or undergo such incessant changes that no man, who knows what the law is today, can guess what it will be tomorrow. Law is defined to be a rule of action; but how can that be a rule, which is little known, and less fixed?

Critics of American politics and elections often focus on low voter turnout in the United States. They argue that voter turnout is steadily declining largely because of voter cynicism caused by big money campaigns and negative political advertising. Voter turnout is lower than it was in the 1960s, but almost the entire decline happened between 1968 and 1974. Sophisticated and detailed studies of both public trust in government and the consequences of political advertising show that neither factor has a negative effect on voter turnout.

Turnout is lower than in other developed nations, but the United States has a different culture and history than European nations that see large majorities of their citizens go to the polls. European standards are not appropriate for judging American turnout. Critics of American politics have misunderstood voter turnout in the United States. The proposed remedies-limiting political liberty through restrictions on campaign finance and on political advertising-are neither analytically sound nor necessary for a healthy body politic.

Snack-time: Help Your Children Snack Smart

Children like to snack. In fact, most young children need to snack. Young children have a high need for calories to support their active play and growth relative to the small size of their stomachs; thus they need to eat more often. But...most of us need to re-think how we look at snacks. We need to think of snacks as a mini-meal that help provide nutrients and food energy our children need to grow, play, and learn. Most children do best when they eat four to six times a day.

Here are some tips you can use to help your children snack smart:

* Keep food group snacks handy. Stock cut raw vegetables, fruit, 100% juice, peanut butter, hard-cooked eggs, low-fat milk, cheese, and yogurt. Keep fruits and vegetables in clear storage containers at eye level in your refrigerator or in a bowl on the kitchen table where they can be easily seen. You might also try clear containers for other snacks, such as crackers, dry cereal, or raisins in your pantry (note: raisins can be a choking hazard for very young children)

Go easy on snacks with added sugars. Offer water, low-fat milk, or 100% juice. Soft drinks and other juices can crowd out vitamin- and nutrient-rich foods your child needs to grow and stay healthy.

Avoid strictly prohibiting certain foods. A little candy is okay once-inawhile. Just make food groups foods the usual snacks. Overly restricting foods can actually encourage tendencies toward overeating and overweight.

* Use snacks to fill in nutritional gaps. If your child missed having his/her 100% juice at breakfast, offer juice or fruit at snack time.

Keep snacks small. If your child is still hungry, s/he can ask for more. Let your child decide what's enough within reason.

Time snacks carefully. Have snacks two hours before meals. This will help your child be able to eat well at each meal without being filled up on snack-time foods.

* Only offer snacks to satisfy hunger. Try to skip the urge to offer snacks to quiet tears, calm a child, or reward behavior. This can lead to emotional overeating later on. Try other means to deal with emotions. If you need a reward, try stickers, pencils, special time together, hugs, etc. Note: Sometimes children will say they are hungry when they really are thirsty, want attention, or just need something to keep them busy (they're bored"). Offer a glass of water, take a little time with your child, or provide a fun activity. Your child will let you know if s/he is really hungry.

* Snack wisely yourself. It is up to parents and care providers to act as role models. Do you snack when you're stressed or bored * or just when you're hungry? What foods do you typically snack on * are they food groups foods or "Tip" of the Pyramid choices? Remember your children learn from watching you.


