A. L. Hartzog put the competitive aspect in the season when he offered worthshooting-for prizes to the hunters who brought in the longest tail feathers.

One of the things we're not an authority on is game birds. However, we don't see that the pheasant crop was damaged here by the week-long open season.

On the other hand, some of the hunters will never be the same after trying to match wits with the evasive, colorful birds which appear to be bigger than a rooster (chicken) when they rise in flight.

All the hunters we know, even the successful ones, were much worse for wear after the season closed. And we daresay there were more unsuccessful hunters than the other kind, by a huge majority.

There was some question, especially in other parts of the county as to whether it would be advisable to start hunting the birds this year. Some people felt it would be wise to wait another year or so and let the birds become better established in the area.



As has been the custom here for the past several years, December 26 will again be an official holiday. It has been so declared by Mayor Boyd Gilreath.


This act will give some firms and offices a three-day Christmas weekend since Friday is Christmas, Saturday has been proclaimed a holiday and the 27th is Sunday.

As we said, we don't know, but we can't see that any damage was done this year.

When only the cocks are legal, and dang few of them killed. the pheasant population shouldn't suffer as far as future generations are concerned.

We don't know of anyone who was unsportsman enough to shoot a hen. Naturally, a fellow who is that kind probably wouldn't admit it, but it seemed from here that the people who were doing the hunting were those who are most interested in having the birds here. Therefore, they certainly wouldn't shoot a hen.

It's doubtful that seasons can continue to be opened in years to come without some form of enforcement of the rules, Local people will, for the most part, obey the rules, but as interest in the birds here increases, and the bird population increases, hunters from other areas will be attracted here. These people won't have any interest in our pheasant crop for years to come and, we think, a few game wardens around the area will be necessary to keep things on the up-and-up.

As far as we know, there wasn't a game warden within 50 miles of here during this year's season.

Too, there's going to have to be some unwritten laws made about where hunters may practice their support. Farmers who don't want hunters on their land will have to make their wishes known or hunters will have to know not to hunt anywhere without permission.

It just won't work to have the entire countryside, made up of privately owned property, used as a shooting range. And that's an understatement!

For instance, one farm lady told us that a hunter shot a pheasant in her yard. "While I was in the yard!" she exclaimed.

Needless to say, that sort of thing needs to be eliminated before it gets started. A stunt or two such as that will cause people to "get down" on all Junior Play hunters.

of all the pretty decorations and the main attraction, can be one of the principal hazards if certain precautions are not taken, warns W. S. Allen, Extension agricultural engineer, Texas A&M University.

A freshly cut tree should be selected just a few days before Christmas. Cut the base of the tree diagonally and keep it submerged in water or wet sand. Locate it away from fireplaces, powerful electric lights, radiators or other sources of heat. Use only Underwriters Laboratories approved lights for the tree. Inspect lights which have been used before for frayed cords and damaged sockets, advises the engineer. Avoid overloading electrical circuits







MACHINE STORAGE

Whether you own a twohorsepower lawnmower or a 20-foot combine, a good job of preparing the machine for storage will pay off in longer service and lower repair bills.

Parking the machine in a building is just a small part of good winter storage. Other things need to be done, but we usually say to ourselves they are too much trouble or we overlook the importance. You need to make sure it won't rust or deteriorate while it sits idle.

No matter what kind of a machine you store there are three things you need to do to get it ready for storage: Clean it. Lubricate it, And eliminate any stress on parts.

We suggest removing trash, lint, dirt and dried grease either by washing the machine with kerosene and rinsing it with water or by steam cleaning. The machine should be lubricated and then run a few minutes. Chains and adjustment bolts should be coated with a rust preventive oil. There are eight steps for preparing a motor for storage: 1. Clean the air cleaner and fill the oil cup to the proper level with new oil.

2. Change the oil and oil filter: then idle the engine for 15 min.

7. If the motor has a clutch, depress the pedal and fasten it to keep the flywheel from sticking to the clutch plate.

8. Store the battery in a cool dry place. Do not place it on a concrete floor because cold tends to make it discharge faster.

Weather and strain hurt rubber parts. If the machine is stored in a building, release tension on belts and block up the machine to take weight off of the tires. If it is stored outside, remove all belts and place them in a cool, dry place. Although few people do it, you should remove and store tires of heavy machines that are left outside.

The last step is to make a list of needed repair parts and order them during the winter.







Food spending by consumers in the first half of 1964 topped that of a year earlier by about 4 per cent, the U.S. Department of Agriculture has just announced. Substantial income gains, population growth, increased per capita food consumption, and slightly higher retail food prices contributed to the spending increase. Considerable gains were recorded in sales in away-from-home eating places. Food spending is expected to continue about 4 per cent above last year. Consumers, at this rate, would spend about 18 1/2 per cent of their disposable income for food this year. Per capita food consumption in 1964 should rise about 1 per cent, the largest increase in five years.

Don't worry about carpet casualties during the coming holiday season. 

## **Older Citizens Have Special Market Needs**

trade name, "Golden Years," for products approved by a board of professional consultants was reached recently after a study conducted by a marketing research agency. The study went directly to people in the over 55-age group, and found:

1. There is a geriatics market.

2. Sixty-three per cent of the people involved in the study felt there is a need for products made especially for older citizens.

3. Most older citizens would buy such products, 81 per cent of those interviewed said.

4. After exposure to three institutional advertisements for the licensed trade name products, 85 per cent indicated a positive attitude toward purchase of such a special brand. As might be expected, older people tend to state a general satisfaction with products available to them, but when specific products are mentioned, "particular dissatisfactions are at a rather high level." In the study, older people were asked to indicate products which might be made especially for them, and shoes brought the biggest response--from 55 per cent of the people. Other products named were frozen food, dry ready-to-eat cereals, lowcholesterol foods, margarine, vitamins, foundation garments and hair preparations.
