Hospital district renews insurance coverage with Blue Cross/Blue Shield

Directors for the Garza County Hospital District voted to renew the employee health insurance policy and amend a recently approved general liability insurance policy during their Feb. 17 meeting.

Following a lengthy discussion, the board voted in favor of renewing its Blue Cross/Blue Shield policy. Board members discussed whether to include maternity coverage in the policy, but opted to maintain the current full coverage provided to district employees.

The board also voted to upgrade its general liability insurance coverage to \$1 million aggregate/\$500,000 per occurrence. The upgraded policy carried the same price tag as the previous policy.

In other business, board members:

• Received the Garza County Health Clinic report for the month ending Jan. 31. According to the report, 671 visits were recorded during the month, up almost 50 from the previous month. Charges for the month totaled \$51,673, a figure that also was higher than that posted in December. Patient collections also were on the rise, with \$25,900 posted in January. Expenses were almost \$8,000 higher than the previous month, largely due to several one-time expenses incurred during January. The clinic's monthly deficit was \$15,500.

• Received and approved the annual audit report for the fiscal year ending Sept. 30. CPA Larry Anderson presented the report, noting that the district had earned a "standard clean opinion."

• Called for a board of directors election for May 7. The election will fill board positions for Precincts 3 and 4. Filing deadline is March 7. Early

Commissioners Court hears audit report

Garza County Commissioners dedicated the bulk of their Feb. 14 meeting to a review of the annual audit of county records ending Sept. 30, 2004. CPAJoe Hays of Brownfield gave the county a "clean opinion" and told the court Garza County is "very sound financially."

According to Hays' report, the county's total assets were slightly more than \$1.8, while liabilities totaled \$330,210. Total net assets were \$1,482,856.

Program expenses broke down as follows: \$407,435 for administration and \$495,245 for roads and bridges; \$150,464 for the county clerk's office; \$23,705 for county programs; \$616,657 for judicial administration; \$77,213 for the treasurer's office; \$110,136 for the tax assessor/collector's office; and \$153,852 for building maintenance. Public safety/sheriff cost \$691,279, while public services/probation cost \$109,398. Social services totaled \$210,507.

Net program expense was almost \$3.4 million, according to the report. General revenues were as follows: property taxes, almost \$1.9 million; licenses, fees and registration, \$422,507; and fines and forfeitures, \$213,246. Commissions included \$462,639 for the Giles W. Dalby Correctional Facility, \$88,532 for MTC inmate housing reimbursement and \$65,455 for MTC excess bond revenue.

Total general revenues were \$3,785,379.

In other business, commissioners:
• Approved the closure of the Close City voting building because of low voter turnout. The move is subject to U.S. Department of Justice clearance.

Voters who previously cast ballots at that site will likely be asked to vote at the Presbyterian Church, according to county officials.

• Approved name changes for the roads in the Two Draw area to simplify rural addressing procedures and make it easier for emergency vehicles trying to locate area residences. The road previously known as East Two Draw Road will now be known as Two Draw Road. What was previously called North and West Two Draw Road will be named Two Draw Circle. County officials will be readdressing residences in the area using east/west ranges to avoid duplication.

• Received the county attorney's annual activity report.

• Received the Cornerstone Accessibility Services Electrical Inspection report.

 Discussed an ongoing update of the 2005 boundary and annexation survey for the U.S. Census Bureau. The county judge asked commissioners to review their respective precinct maps and make necessary modifications.

• Approved the total county-maintained road mileage for 2005. The total to date is 251 miles, according to reports.

Local May elections set for city, school, hospital district

Upcoming elections for area school districts, the City of Post and the Garza County Hospital District are beginning to take shape.

In the Post Independent School District, two candidates—the incumbents—have filed for the open positions. Mark Kirkpatrick and Barbara Hardin each will seek to return to the Post ISD board of trustees.

In the Southland Independent School District, there are three seats to be filled – two full terms and a single

election.

Voters in the City of Post will be asked to fill three open municipal posts this year, including that of mayor and Ward 1 and Ward 2 councilmen. Dick Odom has filed for re-election to his Ward 2 post, but no candidates have filed for the remaining council seat or the

God Protects His Child...Matthew 2:12-23

Last week we looked at the arrival of the Magi so they could pay homage to the "King of the Jews." While enroute to Bethlehem they were filled with great joy because they saw "his star" (Jupiter) reach its highest ecliptic point just over where Jesus lived. Upon their arrival they saw the "young child" in a house with his mother, Mary. As predetermined, they gave gifts to Jesus and paid him proper homage as a King. We now continue with Matthew 2:12-23. 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
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
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

The Oil-for-Food Smokescreen

Are you familiar with the "big shock" that neoconservatives have experienced over the financial scandal arising out of the infamous "oilfor-food" program, which was the subject of an investigative report recently issued by former Federal Reserve Chairman Paul Volker?

The oil-for-food program was the government program established in 1995 by U.S. officials and UN officials to alleviate the horrific suffering of the Iraqi people arising out of the brutal system of sanctions that the U.S. government and the UN imposed against the Iraqi people in 1991 and which lasted for more than a decade.

While the ostensible goal of the sanctions was to "disarm" Saddam Hussein of the weapons of mass destruction that the United States and other Western countries had furnished him during the 1980s, the real reason for the sanctions was to oust Saddam from power and replace his regime with one more palatable to the U.S. government. As the New York Times reported on May 21, 1991, "President Bush said today that the United States would oppose the lifting of the worldwide ban of children because of the sanctions, have been forced to pay the price against trading with Iraq until President Saddam Hussein is forced for their dictator's supposed intransigence? out of power in Baghdad."

After months of investigation, Volker has concluded that the oil-forfood program was "riddled with political favoritism and mismanagement," which apparently has shocked and outraged people within neoconservative circles. The neocons are surprised to learn that Saddam Hussein was a corrupt dictator, one who misappropriated resources from the oil-for-food program and from illegal sales of oil rather than use them to buy food and medicine for the many children who were dying as a result of the sanctions.

However, there's an interesting oddity that has recently developed. It turns out that after the U.S. government ousted Saddam Hussein from power in the recent invasion, finally achieving the regime change that the sanctions had failed to achieve, and took over the running of Iraq through what was called the Coalition Provisional Authority, the U.S. government itself brought about the "disappearance" of some \$9 billion in Iraqi monies. Yes, that's "billion" with a "b." Poof! Gone! Vanished! Nine billion dollars! Tell me: How does anyone lose 9 billion dollars?

Yet, for some odd reason, the neocons don't seem as shocked, outraged, and appalled over the disappearance of that money as they are over Saddam Hussein's "waste, fraud, and abuse" in the oil-for-food scandal. Why, they even seem to be ignoring the distinct but uncomfortable possibility, if you'll excuse me for being blunt, that a few of those billions have been used as bribes to line the pockets of people in Iraq, perhaps even including some high Iraqi interim-government officials who are have been endorsing an indefinite U.S. military occupation of

Let's face it: The U.S. government should never have imposed the brutal sanctions system against the Iraqi people as a way to force them to oust their dictator from office or even as a means to persuade their dictator to "disarm" Iraq of the infamous WMD that the U.S. government had furnished him just a few years before to use against the Iranian people. Why should the people of Iraq, who lost hundreds of thousands

Moreover, when it became clear that the use of sanctions to achieve "regime change" had failed, U.S. officials and UN officials should have immediately lifted the sanctions that were continuing to squeeze the life out of Iraqi children rather than implement a government oil-forfood program that entrusted oil-for-food resources in the hands of someone everyone knew was a brutal and untrustworthy dictator.

The truth, albeit painful, is that all the hullabalooh about the "waste, fraud, and abuse" in the infamous oil-for-food program is nothing more than a smokescreen to avoid focusing on the moral culpability for the massive number of deaths of the Iraqi children arising out of the brutal sanctions that the U.S. government and the UN enforced against the Iraqi people for more than ten years and the horrific anger and hatred among people in the Middle East that those deaths generated against the United States prior to 9/11.

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Destiny in America

Destiny Ashe was an American citizen for just five weeks before her mother savagely beat her to death in Atlanta. The baby died in December of 1998, but the woman who killed her, Carisa Ashe, was not arrested and the case was "dead docketed," that is put aside, for two years.

Finally, Fulton Country District Attorney Paul Howard took Destiny's case off the shelf and charged Carisa Ashe with murder. Again, she was not arrested, nor was she incarcerated. Ashe simply walked around free doing what she had done her entire adult life: getting pregnant.

Incredibly, after killing Destiny, Ashe managed to give birth to two more children, bringing the total number she has to eight. Authorities say multiple men fathered the children but will not say how many men. Ashe is not married, nor does she have much support for the

Of the seven remaining children, one is missing (authorities believe she ran away but don't know for sure), four are in foster care, and two are being raised by Ashe's mother. There is no question that Carisa Ashe is a grossly irresponsible human being who has killed one baby and put seven other children at risk.

But the Fulton County authorities don't seem to care much about that. They obviously took their sweet time getting around to dealing with Carisa Ashe. It was almost six years before DA Howard finally approached Judge Rowland Barnes with his solution to the case: Ashe would avoid jail time if she agreed to undergo a tubal ligation and become sterilized.

Carisa Ashe, facing 20 years in prison, jumped at the offer, and the deal was sealed. So now we have a dead baby in the ground while her killer continues walking around living free. By the way, the taxpayers of Georgia will pay for Ashe's sterilization operation.

Let me ask you a few questions. If this had been a white baby born to an affluent mother, do you think Howard, who is black, would have cut this deal? And what if Carisa Ashe had brutally murdered a 10-year-old girl, would the woman have avoided jail time? So

what's the difference between a baby and a 10-year-old? The harsh truth is that America doesn't care about babies like Destiny; few are looking out for them. DA Howard couldn't care less, the case was a nuisance to him. Jesse Jackson and the other race hustlers are invisible because there's no money in the situation and a black man, Howard, is the villain.

White America is not engaged, and one of the reasons is because the national news operations have ignored Destiny's case. Why bother with a poor murdered baby when Michael Jackson might be sent to prison for child molestation? There's no money in Destiny Ashe for the media, but plenty of bucks in the Jackson exposition.

The sad and brutal plight of Destiny Ashe spotlights the dark side of America. This is truly racism and classism at its worst. Carisa Ashe is allowed to murder her baby and pay a minimal price six years after the fact. That's justice?

Societies are judged by how they treat their most defenseless citizens. Destiny Ashe was denied life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness, and a powerful district attorney let it happen. No one can justify this. There once was Destiny in America but no longer. This terrible situation taints us all.

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



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Emergency farm loans now available

loans for losses caused by hail that occurred on Oct. 9, 2004, are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency office located in Lubbock.

Garza County is one of eight Texas counties recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Mike Johanns eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the hail.

FSA Farm Loan Manager Craig said. Simpson said farmers may be eligible

Applications for emergency farm for loans of up to 100 percent of the actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue the agricultural business, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from interest rate is 3.75 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FSA emergency loan," Simpson

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until Oct. 3, 2005, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could private commercial lenders, the create backlogs in processing, with possible delays into the new farming season."

FSA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who meet U.S. citizenship requirements and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizenship requirements are met by individuals holding a majority interest.

The FSA office in Lubbock is open from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. weekdays.
