Dianna Naegle Is Football Winner

After having tie games for the last two weeks this week slipped by with no ties and the scores running about average in the Bovina Blade's Football Contest.

> The games missed by most of the contestants were the Baylor-Illinois and Texas A&M-Houston games.

From the 165 contestants entering the fourth week, five people picked eleven correctly out of the possible fourteen games. Twelve people picked ten games correctly. One person got a total of two games out of fourteen correct. The majority of the contestants picked Bovina to win over Lubbock Christian on the tie-breaker game.

Winning first place and \$7.50 in the weekly contest was Dianna Naegle, another high school student. This is the third week for a high school student to take the honors. Dianna missed the tie-breaker by eight points. She picked Bovina to win by a score of 14 to 12.

Other winners in the contest were Jeanne Kerby taking second, missing the tie-breaker by nine points. She picked Bovina over Lubbock Christian by a score of 16 to 13. Third place winner was Ricky Castaneda of Hereford, missing the score by sixteen points.

A Friona man, Bobby Drake, has the highest overall total number of points with 39. Next in line with 38 points is Mary Jane Wilson and Kenny Estes. H.W. Roberts follows closely with 37 points.

Contest standings are found elsewhere in the paper. Contestants are shooting for the grand prize of \$100 at the end of a thirteen-week contest.


Open House Slated For Nursing Home



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Bus Loading Laws

"This school year, as in the past, the School Bus Loading Laws confuse many drivers," states Major C.W. Bell, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

The Uniform Vehicle Code in Texas states that the driver of a vehicle, meeting or overtaking from either direction a school bus displaying red flashing warning lights that is in the process of loading or unloading passengers, shall stop until the school bus starts moving, the red lights are no longer flashing, or the bus driver directs

motorists to proceed. "Freeways and divided highways add to the drivers' confusion," Major Bell added. "If a bus is on an access road, only the traffic on the access road must stop. However, if the bus is on a divided highway and pedestrian traffic does not normally cross the median or barrier then only the traffic on the portion of the roadway occupied by the bus must

stop. It is most important that drivers observe the School Bus Loading Laws for the protection of our school children.

SERNA HURT LCHS Adds Injury To Insult, 20-14

The Bovina Mustangs lost a heartbreaker to the Lubbock Christian Eagles last Friday night after a Mustang touchdown was called back by a technicality.

A flanker lined up too close to the line of scrimmage constituting an ineligible receiver downfield.

"We didn't play nearly as well as we should have," said Mustang head coach Joe Christian. "We also had a key player hurt (Tommy Serna), which caused us to do a lot of shifting on both offense and defense."

The Eagles kicked to the Mustangs to open the contest.

The ball changed hands five times in the first quarter with neither team able to get any numbers on the scoreboard.

The Mustangs were tagged with three penalties the first quarter for a total of 25 yards and sophomore quarterback Ronnie Cary was intercepted once.

The Mustangs finally got the ball with good field position at the beginning of the second quarter. They took over on Lubbock's 45, but were immediately penalized five yards on their first play from scrimmage for illegal procedure.

The next two plays amounted to losses of two and eight yards, forcing the Mustangs to punt after an off tackle run on third and 25 came up short, resulting in only eight yards. Ronnie Cary boomed a 39 yard punt and Lubbock took over on their own 15.

Ten plays later the Eagles had the ball on Bovina's four yard line. Mark Kiker punched in from there to make it 6-0 with 4:15 left in the first half. Dennis Smith kicked the PAT to give the Eagles the slight edge. The Mustangs got the ball after

the Eagle kickoff on their own 44 and were forced to give the ball up on downs.

The ball changed hands with LCHS driving to their 42, when the Eagle quarterback was sacked for a seven yard loss.

Bovina took the ball on their own 25 yard line and countered with an electrifying 80-yard pass play from Ronnie Cary to Ruben Salazar. Cary kicked the PAT to tie the game at 7-7.

The third quarter belonged to the Eagles as quarterback Mike Wharton scampered for 37 yards to set up a Lubbock touchdown-a two yard scoring plunge by Hutch Haley. Smith kicked the PAT.

Bovina held the ball until the quarter ended with the Mustangs trailing 14-7.

The game see-sawed until Lubbock scored with 5:03 left to make it 20-7. Kiker scored the winning TD on a 42-yard run with the PAT failing.

Bovina set up with good field position after a 15 yard penalty was assessed to the Eagles for unnecessary roughness. From there they took it all the way with Gerald Shelby capping the drive with a 1-yard plunge to make it 20-13. Cary kicked the AT for a 20-14 final score.

Both teams now hold identical 2-2 records.

October 1 will be an open date for the Mustangs as they try to regroup from the injuries suffered in last Friday's game. Tommy Serna, senior tailback and offensive and defensive starter, will be out for the season as he was operated on the following Saturday morning due to an injury sustained during Friday night's game.

Bovina's next opponent will be Amherst on October 8 as they begin district play.


