

Four vehicles burn at LAH Saturday

Four vehicles were totaled and another sustained substantial damage in a fire that occurred Saturday in the Lake Alan Henry public ramp parking lot.

The incident was reported at about 3:25 p.m., and Constable Daniel Yarbro said officers were on the scene in approximately two minutes. There they found a 1996 Ford Bronco with flames coming from its motor compartment. A fire extinguisher was used, but the officers were unable to contain the blaze.

In a matter of minutes, the fire spread to four nearby vehicles - a 2004 Chevy Tahoe, a 2000 four-door Dodge pickup, a 2005 Nissan Tundra and a 2004 Cadillac Escalade.

The Post Fire Department was called, but because of the distance to the lake it took almost 30 minutes for responding units to arrive. Once they were on site, firefighters were able to control the fire in approximately eight minutes, Yarbro

An investigation into the cause of the fire determined it most likely started as an electrical short in the Bronco's wiring system, Yarbro said. The vehicle had been parked at the

There were about 40 to 45 vehicles in the parking lot where the fire occurred, Yarbro said. The affected vehicles were parked side by side on the front row of the lot. Some individuals whose vehicles were parked in the lot raced to move their autos once smoke began billowing from the fire.

"If that'd been back in May or June (when lake traffic is much heavier), no telling how many (vehicles) we'd have lost," the constable said.

No one was injured in the fire, but an 11-year-old whose asthma medication was in one of the affected vehicles required medical attention at the scene, Yarbro said.

Constable still searching for body

It's been more than six months since a Brownfield man disappeared in the murky waters of Lake Alan Henry, but the search for him is ongoing.

Constable Daniel Yarbro said Tuesday he has not given up hope of finding 45year-old Aaron Smith's remains or "artifacts" that may have belonged to the twice the size of the current missing man.

Smith disappeared during the afternoon hours of April 17 after the boat he and another Brownfield man were traveling in collided with a boat in that area of the lake known as the mouth of Little Great Creek. Two of the five people involved in the collision sustained injuries, but Smith disappeared in the water and was never located, according to reports.

Several agencies and many pieces of specialized equipment have been utilized in the search for Smith. When asked to estimate the number of man-hours spent on the search to date, Yarbro put the figure at "several hundred, if not thousands."

Recently, boat-to-shore searches have been conducted, but searches have been unable to find anything.

Yarbro said he would like to see the use of a side-scan sonar in the area by the dam and the spillway "one more time," but the possibility of that happening soon remains unlikely. There is only one such piece of equipment in the state that he knows of, Yarbro said, and as long as there are tropical storms and hurricanes in the Gulf, it is unlikely it will be available for use in this area.

But here is the saddest part it was the girls they were hanging out with that disturbed me most. I've never, in all of my life, seen such poverty- stricken girls. These girls had the opposite problem of the guys. They all had to wear their little sisters clothes. Their jeans were about 5 sizes too small! I don't know how they could put them on, let alone button them up. Their jeans barely went over their hipbones. Most also had on their little sister's top; it hardly covered their midsections. Oh, they were trying to hold their heads up with pride, but it was a sad sight to see these almost grown women wearing children's

However, it was their underwear that bothered me most. They, like the boys, because of the improper fitting of their clothes, had their underwear exposed. I never saw anything like it. It looked like their underwear was only held together by a single piece of string. I know it saddens your heart to receive this report on condition of our American teenagers.

While I go to bed every night with a closet full of clothes nearby, there are millions of "Shopping center girls" who barely have enough material to keep it together. I think their "poorness" is why these 2 groups gather at the Shopping center, boys with their short daddies' ripped jeans, and girls wearing their younger sisters' clothes.

The Shopping centre is one place where they can find acceptance. So, next time you are at the Shopping center, doing your shopping, and you pass by some of these poor teenagers, would you say a prayer for them? And one more thing.. Will you pray the guys' pants won't fall down, an girls' strings won't break!!!

"Blithe Spirit" opens Friday at Garza Theatre

Noel Coward subtitled 'Blithe Spirit' "an improbable farce," and it is not only because it asks the audience to believe in the supernatural, but also because its humor turns on the idea that the super-

natural work has a pattern of manners much like ours. Charles Condomine (Stan Tucker), a

novelist, and his wife, Ruth (Laura Bryan), invite their friends, Dr. and Mrs. Bradman (Mark Martin and Karen Dolter), to join them for drinks and dinner with a local clairvoyant, Madame Arcati (played by Christy Morris). Charles is planning a novel about a spiritualist and wants to observe the behavior of Arcati during a séance after dinner.

The Bradmans arrive and the four friends discuss Madame Arcati, sure that she will be a harmless fraud. They are interrupted when Arcati arrives, dinner

is served and the séance begins. Much to the surprise of the two couples, there are supernatural manifestations the table trembles, Madame Arcati falls into a trance and Charles hears the voice of Elvira, his first wife whom he loved dearly, but who died several years ago. Elvira (played by Lori Holt) is not merely a believable ghost, she is a ghost who pouts, teases, whines, manipulates - in short, does exactly what she did when

she was alive. When the party breaks up, in walks Elvira. Only Charles can see and hear her, and he and Ruth immediately begin to quarrel about Elvira's presence. The next morning at breakfast, Ruth is cool to Charles and insists that he had too much to drink the night before. When he insists that he had a hallucination, Ruth attributes it to indigestion. The bickering continues until Elvira enters, carrying roses. When Charles sees her, a comical miscommunication begins, with Ruth unable to see or hear Elvira and feeling certain that Charles' unpleasant remarks

are meant for her. Ruth becomes convinced that her husband is mad and tries to soothe him and go for a doctor. Charles, frantic to be believed, enlists Elvira's help, and she

Suspending disbelief comes early to audiences of this play. The playgoer knows from the opening moments when the Condomines and Bradmans are so sure that ghosts cannot appear that almost certainly something will happen to prove them wrong.

Madame Arcati is a trustworthy link between "here" and "the other side." She is so much more down-to-earth, for all of her clairvoyance and bizarre dress, than the rather superficial and over-sophisticated Condomines. She rides a bicycle, likes to eat and openly shows enthusiasm. If such a woman believes in ghosts, it would be hard for a self-respecting

audience not to play along. This belief is central to the play's humor - the butts of the jokes often are the

in the presence of Elvira.

foolish characters who refuse to believe





Post ISD new fiscal year budget switches to 14 months for adjustments

At first glance, the current Post Independent School District budget may look a bit inflated. That's what happens when officials schedule spending for a 14-month fiscal "year."

School district officials planned a 14-month budget for 2005-2006 in the hope that an adjustment to the fiscal year schedule will enable them to do better financial planning with the most updated information available from the appraisal district. Once the current fiscal year is completed, the Post ISD will be on a fiscal year schedule parallel to that of the appraisal district. That, in turn, should enable district officials to "better estimate the tax base," Supt. Marlin Marcum said.

In August, the board adopted a 14month budget of \$11,655,045, Marcum said, but the 12-month portion of that budget shows a marked decrease from the previous year's spending plan.

In addition to a decrease in overall spending, district officials also approved a decrease in the tax rate for the new fiscal year. Trustees voted to adopt a tax rate of \$1.3616 per \$100 valuation. Last year's tax rate was \$1.41 per \$100 valuation.

The drop in the tax rate was made possible by increased property values across the district.

An overview of the overall budget for 2005-2006, according to an Oct. 13 Post ISD document, is as follows: • Instruction — \$5,618,722, or

48.21 percent of the budget · Instructional resource and media library - \$261,862, or 2.25 percent of the budget

· Curriculum and staff development - \$178,195, or 1.53 percent of the budget



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
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Post citizens assist church in Honduras

"Hey, Dad, I'm finally able to check e-mail. We have been pulling more than doubles lately. The elections for the Iraqi constitution were yesterday. So we have been providing security for the local towns. Luckily nothing has

"Last week the insurgents came into town right after we left and pulled the imam out of the mosque and killed him for promoting the elections and people standing up for themselves. Well, it seems that a lot of people liked him. So the last couple of days the local have been giving us all kinds of info on insurgents and weapon caches. We found enough stuff two days ago to completely arm two platoons with weapons and bombs.

"What really surprised us was that after the insurgents killed the imam, they went around town and told people that they had better not vote or they would be killed. On election day, my platoon was in the town center overwatching the election poll site. The town sheik got scared and would not open the school for elections. So after 10:30 a.m. prayer, the town's people just gathered together and walked about a mile and a half to the next town to vote there: It was kind of cool.

"If I hadn't learned it before, I know how much I appreciate living in our country and the closeness of family and friends."

And thereafter, blaming Bush

President Bush, in his post-Hurricane Katrina address to the nation, said, "And to the extent that the federal government didn't fully do its job right, I take responsibility." Accepting the blame for the federal response is one thing, but I hope he doesn't shoulder the blame for the hurricane itself.

In a Sept. 9th speech to the National Sierra Club Convention in San Francisco, former Vice President Al Gore told the audience that Hurricane Katrina and global warming are related. He warned, "We will face a string of terrible catastrophes unless we act to prepare ourselves and deal with the underlying causes of global

Our European allies, most of whom have signed the Kyoto Protocol, have been scathing in their attacks on President Bush. "Katrina Should Be a Lesson to the U.S. on Global Warming," read a headline of the German magazine Der Spiegel. Jurgen Tritten, Germany's environment minister and a Green Party member, said, "The American president is closing his eyes to the economic and human costs his land and the world economy are suffering under natural catastrophes like Katrina."

hurricane that struck Louisiana yesterday was nicknamed Katrina by the National Weather Service. Its real name is global warming." President Bush, according to Gelbspan, is to blame because he's taken his environmental policy from "big oil and Camidae Camanationa Chur

Major categories 3, 4 and 5 hurricanes are relatively rare. If you check out the website of the National Hurricane Center (www.nhc.noaa.gov/pastdec.shtml?), you'll find that the most active hurricane decade was 1941-50 — recording 24 hurricanes, with 10 of them being giant category 3, 4 and 5 hurricanes. The peak for major hurricanes (categories 3, 45) came in the decades of the 1890s, 1930s and 1940s — an average of nine per decade. Of the 92 giant hurricanes that have struck

the U.S. mainland between 1851 and 2004, 61 of them occurred before 1950, long before global warming was an issue.

Six noted tropical cyclone experts wrote a paper in the Bulletin of the American Meteorological Society titled "Hurricanes and Global Warming." Their three main points were: No connection has been established between greenhouse gas emissions and the observed behavior of hurricanes. The scientific consensus is that any future changes in hurricane intensities will likely be small and within the context of observed natural variability. Finally, the politics of linking hurricanes to global warming threatens to undermine support for legitimate climate research and could result in ineffective hurricane policies.

Stanley Goldenberg, a meteorologist at the Hurricane Research Division of the National Oceanic & Atmospheric Administration, says, "Katrina is part of a welldocumented, multidecadal scale fluctuation in hurricane activity. This cycle was described in a heavily cited article printed in the journal Science in 2001." His colleague Chris Landsea agrees, saying, "If you look at the raw hurricane data itself, there is no global warming signal. What we see instead is a strong cycling of activity. Writing in the Aug. 30th edition of the Boston Globe, Ross Gelbspan said, "The There are periods of 25 to 40 years where it's very busy and then periods of 25 to 40 years when it's very quiet."

About the connection between hurricanes and global warming, Goldenberg concludes, "I speak for many hurricane climate researchers in saying such claims are nonsense." The bottom line for President Bush is that unless he's God, he shouldn't accept the blame for Hurricane Katrina.

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More Bush insults

Everybody is good at something, and George Bush is good at insulting our

As if he hasn't provided enough evidence, he recently obliged with two more demonstrations.

First came his nomination of White House counsel Harriet Miers to the U.S. Supreme Court. By picking Miers he is telling the American people she is the most qualified person in the country to join the court. Oh really?

"I know her heart. I know her character," the president said of his one-time personal attorney. But what does "heart" mean in this context? She's a good person? What's that got to do with ruling on big constitutional questions? And character, while a necessary condition for a good nominee, is hardly a sufficient condition.

Bush threw in the obligatory boilerplate: she has an "unwavering devotion to the Constitution and laws of our country" (hmm, all of them?) and will not "legislate from the bench." Yeah, yeah, that's what they all say. But where's the evidence? There is none because Miers has apparently devoted her legal career to everything but contemplation of the Constitution.

Bush insists that Miers is a good constitutionalist. But consider the source. This is the same man who gave us No Child Left Behind, who signed McCain-Feingold, and who claims the power to imprison American citizens indefinitely without charge just by branding them, without appeal, enemy combatants.

Richard Land of the Southern Baptist Convention and a Bush and Miers supporter said, "If Harriet Miers didn't rule the way George W. Bush thought she would, he would see that as an act of betrayal and so would she." That is not comforting.

A constitutional debate has been raging in this country for many years, with at least three sides going at it. In general the Left sees the Constitution as a fluid license for judges to interfere with people's peaceful activities in the name of "social justice." (The Left essentially read property rights out of the Constitution 70 years ago.) The Right sees it as a virtual blank check for Congress and the state legislatures to do anything, constrained only by the narrowest reading of the Bill of Rights. (The Ninth Amendment protection of unenumerated rights doesn't exist for the Right.) Finally, libertarians see the Constitution as Jefferson saw it, as a way to cage all branches of

government and let individual freedom - including property rights - flourish. No one expected Bush to nominate a libertarian, but at least a thoughtful conservative legal scholar would have stimulated an open discussion of some vital issues. It won't happen with Miers.

Bush's second insult to our intelligence came in his big speech seeking to jumpstart support for his "war on terror." He said, "Some have also argued that extremism has been strengthened by the actions of our coalition in Iraq, claiming that our presence in that country has somehow caused or triggered the rage of radicals. I would remind them that we were not in Iraq on September the 11th, 2001 - and al-Qaeda attacked us anyway. The hatred of the radicals existed before Iraq was an issue, and it will exist after Iraq is no longer an excuse."

To be fair, we can't be sure if Bush presumes we are morons or if he is sincerely ignorant. For Muslims, Arabs, and many Americans, U.S. intervention in Iraq had been an issue for 10 years before September 11, 2001. The U.S. air force routinely bombed the country and killed innocent people, while a U.S.-led embargo took hundreds of thousands of children's lives and created great hardship.

Whether insult or ignorance, this really has to stop.


All of that is likely to come true if the far left has its way on Iraq. Their "vision"

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




D.J. Baiza (2) takes down an Idalou ball carrier as James Griffin (30) arrives to help in the tackle during last Friday's game in Post.

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
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Congratulations Post

'Lopes dominate line of scrimmage, control game in 25-14 win over Idalou

As Post Antelope head coach Tim James predicted, last Fridayis district rivalry with Idalou was one giant battle O and mistakes were key ingredients for the Post Antelope 25-14 wins. But to my observation, the most significant factors for the ëAntelope success were an inspired and aggressive defense, combined with a brilliantly executed offensive plan.

Keeping the ball away from the potentially explosive Idalou offense gave the ëLopes a big advantageO and they accomplished that task with a swarming defensive charge, a dominating offensive line and sharply executed plays by the quarterback, running backs and receivers.

The ëLope advantage was evident early in the game as the defense lowered the boom on Idalouis highly rated running back Weston Sales, forcing a ithree and outi punt after the opening kickoff.

The Antelopes and Wildcats both had four possessions in the first half, but the ëLopes scored twice, while the Wildcats only managed one score. In the second half the ëLopes again dominated at the line of scrimmage, allowing the visitors only three possessions, while the home team held the ball four

Each team recorded four penalties during the contest. The Antelopes turned over two fumbles to the Wildcats, while recovering one Wildcat

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mounted consistent long drives on the majority of their possessions. First Half Action

Edgar Garay, Eric Reyna and D.J. Rivera led the defensive charge against Idalouís first possession, forcing a punt on fourth down from the Idalou 23.

The Post offense went to work, hammering from the Post 34 yard line to the Idalou 43. On second down, Wilson Cash took the hand off over right guard and lost control of the football, giving the ball to the Wildcats at their

It didnit take the ëLopes long to regain possession. Lope defenders Jace Pollard, Zach Sanchez and Rivera pulled Sales down at the 44. A penalty put the Wildcats back to the 26. then on second down quarterback Jared Dewbre threw a pass over the middle to Travis Isom, the ball was bit high, Isom tipped it and Colter Creech alertly grabbed the ball, returning the interception to the Idalou 23.

With 6:03 on the first quarter clock, the ëLopes mounted their first touchdown drive.

Offensive linemen Reyna, Pollard, Nichols, Israel Beggs and Zach Witcher opened up huge gaps for running backs Roosevelt Brown and Wilson Cash. But the Wildcats set the ëLopes back on two consecutive plays, knifing through to sack Cash at the 19, then trapped quarterback Sterling Smith around right end at the 20.

On fourth down Smith barked the signals from the shotgun formation, then zipped a pass across the middle to Kenneth Garay in the end zone for a six point advantage. The extra point kick by Sanchez put the ëLopes out front 7-0 with 2:37 left in the first quarter.

Idalou ran into a buzz saw with their next possession, as Sales was hammered by Cash and Garay, Dewbre was trapped by Nichols and a bad snap from center created havoc as Rivera and Sanchez pounced on Dewbre recovering the loose ball at the Idalou 29. That forced a fourth down punt, which rolled dead at the Post 34 yard line.

The eLopes took the ball at the opening of the second quarter, ramming the ball down the field in 12 plays, leaving only 4:32 on the second quarter clock.

Once again, the offensive line pounded Idalou defenders as Cash and Brown took advantage of the gaps. A key play in the drive came on fourth down from the Idalou 34, when Smith faked a hand off inside to Cash, then raced around his right end to the 19 for ianother Post Antelope first down.î

Cash carried twice to the 12, then Brown got the call to the eight behind Witcher and Nichols. Three plays later Dewbre found Isom in the end zone for a touchdown pass. Following the extra point kick, the ëLope lead was trimmed to 13-7.

"In order to bring that trophy home, we've got to play our remaining games as if each game is a playoff game," he adds. "We're focusing on each game, one game at a time."




