"Failure to respond will constitute a separate violation for which a separate civil penalty may be assessed," the notification states.

"The complaint alleges that you failed to include a political advertising disclosure statement on political advertising in violation of Section 255.001 of the election Code and that you represented in a campaign communication that you held a public office that you did not hold at the time the representation was made in violation of Section 255.006," the Ethics Commission notification said.

"The complaint also alleges that you failed to fully disclose campaign expenditures or contributions you made or received in December and January for advertising in a newspaper in violation of Section 254.031 of the Election Code," the Ethics Commission notification added.

The meeting lasted about an hour and a half.

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
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

Gentiles first receive the holy ghost...Acts 10:44-46

God teaches His people to not steal except to give to others.

Ephesians 4:28


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
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Looking at the scripture related receiving the holy ghost we now move to Acts 10-11. Up to this time, only people in the tribes of Israel received the holy ghost. Here is the first record of Gentiles doing the same. God's rightly divided word teaches us exactly what they did to receive the holy ghost. In this study it will be seen that the Gentiles did the exact same thing as the apostles did in Acts 2:4 and Acts 8:15-17.

To set the scene, Peter was staying with a man named Simon in the town of Joppa. At the same time a man named Cornelius from Caesarea was praying. Cornelius was a centurion, or a Roman captain over 100 soldiers. The word says he was a devout man who reverenced God with everybody in his home.

While in Joppa, Peter had a routine of meditating and praying on the roof of Simon's house. This time God gave him a vision of different kinds of animals gathered in a blanket. He was very hungry at the time. After noticing the vision, God said to him, "Rise, Peter kill and eat" (Acts 10:13). Peter told God that he would not eat, and that he had never eaten any thing that was common and unclean. God replied, "What God has cleansed, call not common." God was telling Peter something that was very different from what he understood his whole life. God repeated this three times. When God gets our attention about something three times, it is completely established.

Cornelius was praying when an angel from God came with orders to send for Peter. As a centurion he understood the importance of following orders, and he did so meekly. He sent his best soldiers who arrived to Simon's home, called for Peter and told his story. The next day Peter returned to Caesarea. When he arrived to Cornelius' house, everybody was ready to hear God's word. This is a great example of how

we can approach God's word. Just completely focused, ready to listen and go back to study what we learned.

Peter and Cornelius shared their stories about how God talked to them. After that Peter said, "Of a truth I perceive that God is no respecter of persons" (Acts 10:34). This was huge! What did he do next? He taught about Jesus Christ. How God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with holy spirit and with powerful authority. He taught that Jesus did good by healing all that were oppressed of the devil. Peter went on to explain that he and his companions were witnesses to all the things Jesus did in the land of Judah and in Jerusalem. Next he taught that Jesus was crucified and on the third day and night God raised him up from the dead showing him openly to certain chosen people.

Next he said, "Öthrough his name whoever believes in him shall receive remission of sins" (Acts 10:43). Does this sound familiar? He said the same thing in Acts 2:38. It then says that while he spoke, "the holy ghost fell on all them which heard the word." Now we see in Acts 10:44 that the holy ghost "fell on" the gentiles too. It says everybody who came with Peter were astonished. Why were they so astonished? The answer is in verse 46, "For they heard them speak with tongues, and magnify God." To dispel any doubt, go to Acts 11:15 where Peter was telling his story to other believers. He said, "And as I began to speak, the holy ghost fell on them, as on us at the beginning." At "the beginning" the apostles were filled with holy spirit unto remission of sins, and received the holy ghost when they began to speak in tongues (Acts 2:4 & 38).

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
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
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Indoctrination of our youth

Let's start off with a few quotations, then a question. In reference to the president's State of the Union: "Sounds a lot like the things Adolf Hitler used to say." "Bush is threatening the whole planet." "[The] U.S. wants to keep the world divided." Then the speaker asks, "Who is probably the most violent nation on the planet?" and shouts "The United States!"

What's the source of these statements? Were they made in the heat of a political campaign? Was it a yet-to-be captured leader of al Qaeda? Was it French Prime Minister Dominique de Villepin? Any "yes" answer would miss the true source by a mile. All of those statements were made by Mr. Jay Bennish, a teacher at Overland High School in Aurora, Colo.

During this class session, Mr. Bennish peppered his 10th-grade geography class with other statements like: The U.S. has engaged in "7,000 terrorist attacks against Cuba." In his discussion of capitalism, he told his students, "Capitalism is at odds with humanity, at odds with caring and compassion and at odds with human rights."

Regardless of whether you're pro-Bush or anti-Bush, pro-American or anti-American, I'd like to know whether there's anyone who believes that the teacher's remarks were appropriate for any classroom setting, much less a high school geography class. It's clear the students aren't being taught geography. They're getting socialist lies and propaganda. According to one of the parents, on the first day of class, the teacher said Karl Marx's "Communist Manifesto" was going to be a part of the curriculum.

This kind of indoctrination is by no means restricted to Overland High School. School teachers, at all grades, often use their classroom for environmental, anti-war, anti-capitalist and anti-parent propaganda. Some get their students to write letters to political figures condemning public policy the teacher doesn't like. Dr. Thomas Sowell's "Inside American Education" documents numerous ways teachers attack parental authority. Teachers have asked third-graders, "How many of you ever wanted to beat up your parents?" In a high school health class, students were asked, "How many of you hate your parents?"

Public education propaganda is often a precursor for what youngsters might encounter in college. UCLA's Bruin Standard newspaper documents campus propaganda. Mary Corey, UCLA history professor, instructed her class, "Capitalism isn't a lie on purpose. It's just a lie," she continued, "[Capitalists] are swine. . . . They're bastard people." Professor Andrew Hewitt, chairman of UCLA's Department of Germanic Languages, told his class, "Bush is a moron, a simpleton, and an idiot." His opinion of the rest of us: "American consumerism is a very unique thing; I don't think anyone else lusts after money in such a greedy fashion." Rod Swanson, economics professor, told his class, "The United States of America, backed by facts, is the greediest and most selfish country in the world." Terri Anderson, a sociology professor, assigned her class to go out cross-dressed in a public setting for four hours. Photos or videotape were required as proof of having completed the assignment.

The Bruin Alumni Association caused quite a stir when it offered to pay students for recordings of classroom proselytizing. The UCLA administration, wishing to conceal professorial misconduct, threatened legal action against the group. Some professors labeled the Bruin Alumni Association's actions as McCarthyism and attacks on academic freedom. These professors simply want a free hand to proselytize students.

Brainwashing and proselytization is by no means unique to UCLA. Taxpayers ought to de-fund, and donors should cut off contributions to colleges where administrators condone or support academic dishonesty. At the K-12 schools, parents should show up at schools, PTAs and board of education meetings demanding that teachers teach reading, writing and arithmetic and leave indoctrination to parents. The most promising tool in the fight against teacher proselytization is the micro-technology available that can expose the academic misconduct.

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The Conservative Reform Game

Here we go again. The reform game. In the wake of the federal government is disastrous response to Hurricane Katrina, Homeland Security Secretary Michael Chertoff is unveiling ireforms that will ensure that such federal disasters never happen again.

This is par-for-the-course conservatism. Engage in the never-ending game of criticizing federal paternalistic programs for being iinefficientî or for having iwaste, fraud, and abuseî and then calling for ireform,î always in the perpetual but futile quest to make such programs succeed.

Another example of this conservative reform verbiage is a recent op-ed entitled iThe Junkets You Fundî by noted conservative columnist Michelle Malkin which appeared in the Washington Times. In her article Malkin detailed millions of dollars of taxpayer-funded iwaste, fraud, and abuseî in federal junkets, those nice ispring-break-style trips,î as Malkin calls them, that congressmen and federal bureaucrats take at U.S. taxpayer expense.

Guess what Malkin suggested needed to be done to solve the problem. You got it: iReform.î Just cut out the iwaste, fraud, and abuseî from these federal junkets. Why, Malkin even shows us where to start!

Conservative think tanks love the reform game too because they know that by calling only for reform, rather than elimination, of government paternalism, a steady and perpetual stream of donor money is guaranteed to flow into the organization. Donor-funded studies, and then calls for reform. And then again, more donor-funded studies and more calls for reform. The game is never-ending because the paternalistic program never goes out of existence and, therefore, is always subject to being ireformed,î no matter how many times it has been ireformedî in the past.

At the risk of belaboring the obvious, if the paternalistic program were abolished, there would be no more need for studies or calls for reform and, therefore, no more need for solicitation of donations to fund more studies and more calls for reform.

Government paternalism is one of the things, of course, that distinguishes libertarians from both conservatives and liberals. Unlike conservatives and liberals, libertarians believe that the federal government has no more business taking care of people who suffer natural disasters than it does taking care of people who are elderly, sick, poor, or terrified.


Unlike conservatives and liberals, we libertarians believe in ourselves, in others, in freedom, and in the free market. While we believe that a free society nurtures such values as compassion, charity, and responsibility, we

also hold that freedom entails the right to be uncaring, uncompassionate, and irresponsible, as long as a person doesnit violate the rights of others. That is what genuine freedom is all about of the right to make peaceful choices. That is why we libertarians want to end, not reform, all such paternalistic programs, along with the thousands of departments and agencies that administer them and the ever-burdensome taxes that fund them.

Spectacular movies often make tons of money, but they do not advance any cause. Gone are the days when "Gone With the Wind" type entertainment ruled the Hollywood day.


So how should we process the current Hollywood award process? Well, I don't have a problem with it. Certainly, it is wrong that some gay Americans, especially teenagers, are made to suffer because of their predilections. Every American should be able to pursue happiness on an equal basis, including gays.

But I also think the entertainment industry should be upfront in explaining what films it values and why it finds them especially worthy. in particular Title 15 of the Election Code Chapters 251 through 258 The Texas Ethics Commission provides forms and detailed instructions for gathering and reporting contributions and expenditures

A candidate or anyone else can obtain this information by going to the official web site www.ethics.state.tx.us/index.html

If they have any questions they can call the Ethics Commission at 1-800-325-8506 and speak to one of the attorneys

Any benefit received by a candidate must be classified and valued at the time it is received and should be reported in the next Candidate/ Officeholder Report.

Sec.254.0312 of the Election Code requires that a candidate use his best effort to obtain, maintain and report all contributions, loans and expenditures

You published a political advertisement for Lee Norman in the December 15, 2005 issue of the Gazette and he should have asked you to value the ad, listed it and reported it in his January 17,2006 C/OH

The failure of Lee to accumulate and accurately report information in a timely manner is a violation of the election code and is a Class A

The ethics commission is very clear that the responsibility to accumulate, maintain and report information rests ultimately with the candidate. You should immediately meet with Lee and prepare a list of each and every ad you have run and provide a fair market value so he can report them in his next C/OH report.



The total number of traffic stops made by Garza County Sheriffis Department representatives increased significantly in 2005, according to a report delivered to the Commissioners Court Monday.

In his Mandated Racial Profiling Report for 2005, Sheriff Cliff Laws reported that a total of 815 stops were made by his department during the year, compared to 590 in the previous year and 616 in 2003.

Most of last year's traffic stops ñ 503 -- were made within the city limits. A total of 312 were made in the county.

In his report, a traffic stop is defined as an action that iresulted in the issuance of a citation and/or an arrest being




