Grass fires keep firemen busy, 'burn ban' extended

The "burn ban" in Garza County will continue indefinitely. The decision was made Monday morning at the Garza County Commissioners' Court regular meeting. County Judge Giles W. Dalby emphasized the critically dry conditions, citing a recent communication with the Texas Forest Service.

"The grass may look green," Judge Dalby said, "but when a spark hits it, we've got potential problems, especially with the high winds we've been having.

In other matters, commissioners accepted a report from Post-Garza County Airport Board members Drew Kirkpatrick and Jeff Lott (see separate story in this edition of The Post Dispatch). Kirkpatrick explained that the board operates with approximately \$7,000 per year and requested that next year's county budget include an increase from the current \$3,000 per year to \$5,000. Kirkpatrick said the board would be requesting a similar increase

District Administrator Shirley ceeds; instead, the board agreed Taylor said the board is in "the very beginning" of the process.

The proposal to construct a new facility initially was raised last year as the district's board was working to bring a physician into the clinic. In the board's agreement that brought Dr. Ben Edwards into the community, board members agreed that once the clinic was on solid financial ground and was "self sustaining," the district officials would address the issue of providing a better physical space for the clinic's operation.

In recent months, district officials have reported that the clinic has made great financial strides, generating profits in most months.

According to a report delivered to the board last week, the clinic realized a profit of \$4,326 for the month of April, with 676 visits and 1,136 procedures.

"Right now we're managing with what we have," Kirkpatrick said, "but we've got some expenses that have to be covered." He specifically pointed out the need for removing weeds on the runway, electricity costs and replacement of a 40 year old tractor for mowing. "We really don't want to put any money into repairing that old tractor," Lott added.

Kirkpatrick said the airport could borrow a county tractor once a month. Precinct One commissioner Gary McDaniel said that the airport board could borrow a tractor for that purpose from Precinct One.

Kirkpatrick and Lott both expressed praise to the Post Volunteer Fire Department. The praise was in response to this weekend's extra hours and effort by the volunteer firemen on various wildfires in the county.

Line item budget adjustments were approved the court for Precinct 1 and the constables' office.

The court authorized Lee Norman to prepare recommendations for zoning ordinance revisions to include recreational vehicles and smaller manufactured homes. Norman reported to the court that the current ordinance doesn't address those two categories.

Judge Dalby requested commissioners to nominate citizens to serve on the Garza County Variance Committee. He suggested five members for the committee. The matter is to be on the agenda for a future meeting.

Dalby also informed the court that preliminary property valuations indicate a 20 percent increase from last year, with a 25 percent increase in mineral values. He suggested that the court begin budget considerations in June.


OMTD to observe extended hours



Texas Department of Transportation, completed several airport improvements in 2005, according to a report delivered to county officials Monday. According to Drew Kirkpatrick, the tetrahedron, which shows

pilots the direction of the wind, has been renovated and painted. An attractive rock-and-pipe entrance was built, and the fence running Palong Hwy. 380 was rebuilt, along with fences on both sides of the road entering the airport.





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

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Pride of Post Band earns 'gold' rating

His father, James Maines, and uncles formed the original Maines Brothers Band in the late 1950s, and James' young sons often accompanied him to performances. Kenny Maines was only seven when the Little Maines Boys began performing and had to use a wooden soft drink crate to stand on to reach the microphone.

Over the years, the Little Maines Boys honed their tones and tunes and eventually became the new generation Maines Brothers Band, forging their own style of West Texas music.

During the mid-1970s, the brothers disbanded for a few years, and Kenny Maines headed to Las Vegas where he worked as a bass player in a show band for several years. There his musical and entertainment Survivors include one daughter, Judy Bush of Post; one son, skills were sharpened. When he returned to Lubbock, the Maines Brothsound that later would be labeled "aggressive country."


> The band recorded eight albums, including a pair for Mercury Records in Nashville. > Maines was elected Lubbock County commissioner in 1992, a post he held for 12 years, but he continued to write songs and perform in and around the Lubbock area. In 2004, he left the political arena to return to the music scene.

> Since that time, Maines has recorded two CDs, including his debut release, "Kenny Maines," which is a collection of songs written by him and other West Texas songwriters. Also included are such music classics as Jimmy Driftwood's "Tennessee Stud" and Bruce Springsteen's

> Maines also has recorded an acoustic Christian CD, "Out of Control," which is an assortment of original praise songs.

Today, Maines performs as an acoustic solo act.

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On God's Word

The Gospel of Jesus Christ pierces hearts...Acts 2:34-37

Peter declared that God raised Jesus from the dead. With great boldness, he also reminded the Jewish leaders that they killed Jesus Christ. We continue with Acts 2:34 - 37, For David is not ascended into the heavens. But he said himself, "The Lord said unto my Lord, you sit on My right hand, until I make your enemies to be your footstool." Therefore let all the house of Israel know assuredly that God has made that same Jesus, whom you have crucified, both Lord and Christ. Now when they heard this, they were pricked in their heart, and said unto Peter and to the rest of the apostles, "Men and brethren, what shall we do?"

There is so much to be learned from this one section of scripture. Peter reminded the others that David did not ascend into heaven. Even to this day, David is not in heaven. One of the popular beliefs among the confused Jewish people was that the saints of the old went to heaven after they died. This school of thought came from long standing ideas of other religions. The same general thinking has been passed from generation to generation even to the present time.

Peter spoke from Psalms where David said, "The Lord said unto my Lord..." Here Peter clearly distinguishes between God who is "the Lord" and Jesus Christ who is "my Lord." This by itself sits like a jewel in the bigger study of who Jesus Christ really is.. By referring to "my Lord sit on my right hand," David foresaw the ascension of Jesus Christ.

Next Peter told all the house of Israel that God made the same Jesus whom they crucified, both

Last week we looked at Acts 2:22-33 where Lord and Christ (Acts 2:36). God's word does not change unless He redefines it. Prior to this time there was only one Lord, that being the Lord God. During the time that Jesus Christ walked on earth, people referred to him as "Lord" only because they recognized his position. Land owners are also referred to as Lords. Even Jesus declared his Father to be the only true master and Lord over all. When we see the word "Lord" used in the Epistles it must be understood according to the context of the area where it appears. It either refers to our Lord Jesus Christ, or it refers to God in heaven. More often than not, it refers to our Lord Jesus Christ.

What happened? God redefined who was to be considered "Lord." During this present administration of the great and notable day of the Lord, people must consider Jesus to be the Lord who will return on the Lord's Day. It is also important to consider Jesus the living Christ who is seated at the right hand of his Father's complete authority, and will return to gather God's children together in the clouds. God has made him both Lord and Christ!

When the people heard what Peter said, they were pierced through their heart and asked, "what shall we do?" The same people who democratically rallied around the crucifixion of Jesus were suddenly pierced in their hearts by the truth. 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
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

Avoiding war with Iran

In recent weeks the Bush administration has stated its willingness to use diplomacy in dealing with Iran, which is a welcome change from previous

policy. Letis hope itis more than just a change in tone. With ongoing wars in Iraq and Afghanistan costing more than \$5 billion per week, record levels of federal spending and debt, and oil hovering around \$70 per barrel, American taxpayers certainly cannot afford another war. Iran, like Iraq, is a major source of global oil. For all our posturing, the truth is that worldwide crude prices would spike rapidly if we attacked

With summer coming, demand will increase and gas prices at the pump will be over \$3 for most of the nation. Airlines are raising ticket prices to compensate for jet fuel prices that have nearly doubled in a year. A strike on Iran in coming months would create serious trouble for an American economy that is already struggling with high energy prices.

Itis time for a foreign policy based on reality, a foreign policy that serves the interests of ordinary Americans. The reality is that we will continue to use oil as a major source of energy in this country for the foreseeable future, and therefore the health of our economy will be affected by the price of oil.

Like it or not, some of that oil will continue to come from the Middle East even if we get serious about tapping domestic sources. The US has not used diplomacy with Iran for nearly 26 years, since the hostage crisis of the

But this ino negotiationî stance hasnît worked: Iranîs defiant behavior continues, and its uranium enrichment program has not been dismantled. Is Iran a nuclear threat? Not according to our own CIA, which says Iran is years away from developing nuclear weapons.

Middle East. But we shouldnit allow war hawks to wildly overstate the threat posed by Iran, as they did with Iraq. Since 2001 we have spent over

Weire poorer but certainly not safer for it. We removed the Taliban from power in Afghanistan -- much to the delight of the Iranians, who consider the Taliban an arch enemy. Warlords now control the country, operating a larger drug trade than ever before.

Similarly in Iraq, our ouster of Saddam Hussein will allow the majority Shia to claim leadership title if Iraqis election actually leads to an organized government. This delights the Iranians, who are close allies of the Iraqi

Talk about unintended consequences! This war has produced chaos, civil war, death and destruction, and huge financial costs. It has eliminated two of Iranis worst enemies, and placed power in Iraq with Iranis best friends.

What will it take for us to learn from our failures? Government power in Iran is divided, and President Ahmadinejadóthe man responsible for

of Iranis National Security Council, who has made several reasonable statements about the US and shows a desire to have direct diplomatic talks. Discussions with Iran are not appeasement.

This is not to say we should sit back as nuclear weapons proliferate in the

\$300 billion occupying Afghanistan and Iraq.

Even this apparent failure of policy does nothing to restrain the current march toward a similar confrontation with Iran.

On the contrary, dialogue is needed to explain clearly that Americais objectives of non-proliferation and peace in the Middle East will not be compromised. 25 years of isolating Iran has moved us farther from, not closer to, achieving those objectives.

Neo-Monarchy of George W. Bush

The Bush administration, without court authorization, collects our telephone records and eavesdrops on calls involving U.S. residents to and from foreigners. It refuses to rule out wiretapping of fully domestic calls. Meanwhile, the administration is building military bases in Iraq and throughout the Persian Gulf. And now the president is about to formally militarize the southern border, the better to keep out Mexicans seeking economic opportunity.

To underscore grounds for concern, the administration has pronounced a theory of presidential power that should alarm anyone who wants government power limited. Under the Unitary Executive doctrine of the Bush Justice Department and many conservative legal theorists, the executive branch has enough implied and inherent powers during wartime to negate the checks and balances ordinarily provided by Congress and the courts. Considering that the Bush administration's "war on terror" is vague enough to last indefinitely and assumes a global battlefield, the Unitary Executive doctrine is a blueprint for despotism that Napoleon would have envied.

As Gene Healy and Timothy Lynch write in a new Cato Institute study, "Power Surge: The Constitutional Record of George W. Bush;" "The Bush administration's view of executive power ... amounts to the view that, in time of war, the president is the law, and no treaty, no statute, no coordinate branch of the U.S. government can stand in the president's way when, by his lights,

he is acting to preserve national security." Thus the president can order the "interrogation" of prisoners in any manner, regardless of what laws and treaties Congress has approved. This is declared in the infamous "torture memos" generated by Justice and Defense Department officials a few years ago. In addition, the president can seize anyone, including American citizens, on American soil, declare him an enemy combatant, and hold him indefinitely without charge or judicial review.

As if this weren't enough, the president reserves the right to ignore Congress when it passes any other kind of legislation, despite his constitutional obligation "to take Care that the Laws be faithfully executed." According to the Boston Globe, on more than 750 occasions, far more than all previous presidents combined, President Bush has attached a "signing statement" to legislation he has signed, declaring that he is not bound by provisions he regards as unconstitutional. So instead of vetoing bills he thinks are constitutionally flawed and giving Congress an opportunity to override his action, Bush asserts the right to pretend the laws were not enacted. As Bruce Fein, a conservative constitutional scholar with integrity, said, "This is an attempt by the president to have the final word on his own constitutional powers, which eliminates the checks and balances that keep the country a democracy. There is no way for an independent judiciary to check his assertions of power, and Congress isn't doing it, either. So this is moving us toward an unlimited executive power."

Moreover, those who argue that the president has complete discretion in the conduct of foreign policy and war make short shrift of Congress's explicit power to declare war. They also ignore other congressional powers enumerated in the Constitution that relate to the military. So although the Constitution designates the president commander in chief, it also gives Congress the power to "make Rules concerning Captures on Land and Water" and "to make Rules for the Government and Regulation of the land and naval Forces."

Presidential power is hardly unlimited.

Yet, admittedly, the case is not a slam-dunk for limits on presidential power. This debate can and will go on indefinitely -- which only shows that perhaps the late-eighteenth-century anti-Federalist skeptics about the Constitution, who warned of the presidency's neo-monarchical powers, were on to something. 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Guarding the border

Sen. Chuck Hagel, a Republican from Nebraska, says the National Guard is not the right outfit to back up the Border Patrol on the Mexican border. So my question is a simple one: The organization is called the National Guard, is it not? Aren't they supposed to guard us if need be? Well, need be is here.

Right now there are more than 100,000 illegal aliens imprisoned for committing felonies in the USA. The governmental cost of illegal immigration per year is north of 68 billion taxpayer dollars. While some companies are making money exploiting cheap illegal labor, legal workers, you and I, are paying fantastic sums of money because the federal government will not stop the flood of foreigners illegally entering the country.

So finally President Bush does something, ordering a few thousand National Guardsmen to the border, and the chorus of naysayers begins their extremely annoying bray.

So why doesn't Sen. Hagel truly want to stop the invasion? I don't know. For Republicans like Hagel, law and order is usually a core issue.

On the left, the focus is clearer. On Oct. 12, 1986, The New York Times editorial page celebrated the amnesty Ronald Reagan gave almost three million illegal aliens by writing: "The new law won't work miracles, but it will induce most employers to pay attention, to turn off the magnets, to slow the tide." Of course, the Times editorial people turned out to be completely wrong. The Reagan amnesty led to the chaos we have today.

But has the Times learned from their mistaken analysis? To quote John Belushi: "Nooooooooooooooo."

In response to deploying the National Guard to the border, The New York Times stated: "It was a victory for the fear-stricken fringe of the debate." Interesting comment in light of a CNN poll showing 75 percent of Americans support the Guard deployment. Could it be The New York Times is on the fringe? Just asking.

I believe the Times and other committed left-wing organizations want as many foreign nationals as possible to become U.S. citizens. 

Dr Ben Edwards offers personal care at local clinic

Remember the old adage 'an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure'?' Dr. Ben Edwards and the staff at the Garza County Health Clinic are firm believers in the proverb. In fact, routine health maintenance is one of the primary focuses of Edwards' practice.

"We wouldn't drive 100,000 miles in our cards without checking the oil or rotating the tires," Edwards said. "It's a good idea to come in once a year, maybe when you're not so busy in the spring or summer. One day when you're well."

Everyone needs to have a "good overall checkup" on a regular basis, he said. He recommends regular checkups for individuals of all ages, particularly those who have diseases - hypertension or any type of cancer, for example that run in their families.

Blood pressure and cholesterol are among those things that should be regularly monitored. For individuals who are "otherwise healthy," a wellrounded checkup should be "a quick visit," the doctor said - probably about

It is not at all uncommon for physicians to catch diseases early as a result of regular checkups.

"It's much better to catch these things early," Edwards said.

Some screenings, such as those for prostate cancer, cervical cancer, breast cancer and colon cancer, also should be included in the routine health maintenance schedule. Some of these screenings, such as a colon cancer screening, don't have to be performed annually. In fact, a colon cancer screening should be conducted once every 10 years.

Edwards said it is his goal that colon cancer screening is a routine part of every Garza County resident's health maintenance plan.

"No one in Garza County should have to have colon cancer," he said. The spring and summer months, when school is out and the pace is a bit slower, is a great time to schedule checkups for each member of the family.

"We have more time at the clinic as things slow down a little," Edwards said. The Garza County Health Clinic, which offers its services to individuals of all ages, is open Mondays through Fridays from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. The clinic's telephone number is 495-2853.

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


The groundwater conservation districts in GMA #2 include the Garza County Underground and Fresh Water Conservation District, the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District, the Llano Estacado Underground Water Conservation District, the Mesa Underground Water Conservation District, the Permian Basin Underground Water Conservation District, the Sandy Land Underground Water Conservation District and the South Plains Underground Water Conservation District.

GMA #2 includes the following counties: Garza, Andrews, Bailey, Borden, Briscoe, Castro, Cochran, Crosby, Dawson, Deaf Smith, Gaines, Floyd, Hale, Hockley, Howard, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Martin, Parmer, Swisher, Terry and Yoakum.

SB 2 (2001) required the Texas Water Development Board in Austin to designate groundwater management area covering all major and minor aquifers in the state. HB 1763 (2005) facilitated joint planning among water districts in each GMA that share all or part of the same aquifer. In addition, each GMA is required to set a Desired Future Condition for the aquifer they manage.

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

Start time will be 6 a.m., or first safe light. Weigh-in will be at 3:30 p.m. on the crappie dock.





Applications Due Sept. 15 for Family Farm & Ranch Program

The Family Land Heritage Program recognizes farms and ranches that have been kept in continuous agricultural production by the same family for 100, 150, and 200 years or more. Applications for the Family Land Heritage Program are due to the Texas Department of Agriculture by Friday, September 15, 2006. Since the program started in 1974, more than 4.120 farms and ranches in 229 counties have been honored.

"This unique program honors the agricultural contributions of countless generations of Texans," said Agricultural Commissioner Susan Combs. "These men and women have held onto their ancestors' land over the decade4s, enduring some challenging times."

Applications are being accepted for farms or ranches established in 1906 and earlier that are still owned and operated by the decedents of the founder, either through blood, marriage, or adoption. The land must also fit the old U. S. Census definition of a farm: 10 acres or more with agricultural sales of \$50 or more a year; or if less than 10 acres, sales of at least \$250 a year.

The owners must reside in Texas and be actively managing the everyday operation of the farm or ranch. If all the land has ever been rented or leased to someone outside of the family, it will not qualify. If only a portion was leased, and as much as 10 acres were retained in the family for agricultural production with sales of at least \$50 annually, the property will still qualify. There is no cost to apply for the recognition.

Fayette County has the most Family Land Heritage honorees with 124 properties, Houston County is next with 85 properties, Austin and Gillespie counties are tied with 82 properties each, Medina County has 81 properties and De Witt County has 80 properties.


