Newspaper files FOI request on 1st Amendment violation

The Post Dispatch publisher Wesley W. Burnett has filed a formal request to Garza County Judge Lee Norman seeking a list of county personnel involved in the November 8, 2007 First Amendment violations by government officials.

On that day, government officials denied entry to the courthouse building to news media representatives with cameras, including The Post Dispatch photographer Timothy W. Burnett and two Lubbock television station news media

The request was submitted under the authority of the Texas Freedom of Information Act (FOIA).

"We had hoped that Judge Schildknecht (106th District Judge Carter T. Schildknecht) would have responded by now to our attorney's informal letter seeking answers to a number of questions," Burnett explained.

After calling the meeting to order at 11 a.m., County Judge Lee Norman told the court the interest rate on the bonds has not yet been determined, forcing county officials to wait until their next regular meeting (Jan. 14) to consider the certificates.

The court was to consider an order authorizing "the issuance of Garza County, Texas, combination tax and revenue certificates of obligation, Series 2008; levying an ad valorem tax and pledging a lien on certain revenues in support of the certificates; approving a paying agent/registrar agreement; and authorizing other matters related to the certificates," according to a draft of the meeting's minutes.

The certificates of obligation were the sole item on the agenda for the special meeting, which lasted approximately five



During that period of time, Strawn was part of a team responding to a HH-1N "Huey" mishap that occurred on Aug. 16, requiring him to work "extensive hours in intense heat throughout a rugged and harsh mountainous terrain in order to provide professional emergency response. "As publisher of The Post Dispatch," Burnett emphasized, "it is my duty and obligation to secure and protect the assets of the newspaper. The newspaper's most valuable asset is the First Amendment. Government agents have attacked the very core of any newspaper ... it's ability to serve as the eyes and ears of the people.

The No Solution Zone

Am I being unreasonable for wanting the presidential candidates to have solutions for the difficult problems the nation is facing? It was striking that during the Bhutto assassination news cycle, not one of the candidates put forth a solution to deal with the dangerous situation in Pakistan.

Some of the comments the candidates made were flat-out dumb. For example, Democrat Bill Richardson said this: "President Bush faced a choice with Pakistan — he needed to choose whether to support the dictator or the Pakistani people. He chose the dictator."

Please. The Pakistani people comprise about 300 different factions, many of which would lop off Richardson's head if they got the chance. So give me a break, Governor. Did you not learn anything from the Shah of Iran debacle? Did the Ayatollah Khomeini thing turn out well for the USA?

On the Republican side there was Congressman Ron Paul, who said this about Pakistan: "We don't need to be involved over there."

Sure, Congressman, good thinking. Let's just let the Islamic fundamentalists take over that government and play around with the nuclear arsenal. Swell.

Pakistan epitomizes the difficult world in which we all live. That chaotic nation is ultra-violent, divided by religion and ideology, and a complete mystery to the vast majority of Americans.

Military dictator Pervez Musharraf can't control the jihadists, so he makes deals with them. Those deals have allowed the Taliban a Pakistani sanctuary from which they can kill Americans in neighboring Afghanistan. Musharraf's double dealing also means Osama bin Laden and his murderous crew can continue living unmolested in Northwest Pakistan.

Barack Obama says we have to do something about that. But what, Senator?

Are you going to send a few American divisions into the mountains? That would mean massive casualties on both sides and a possible Pakistani civil war. Do you realize that, Senator?

The Republicans say we have to figure the whole thing out. Well, that's terrific. We've been fighting the Islamic terrorists for more than six years now — trying to "figure out" Pakistan is not exactly a plan, is it?

There are two entities at fault here: the seemingly clueless politicians and a corrupt media that is more interested in ideology than demanding cogent answers to specific questions. Here's a clue: Calling Musharraf a corrupt dictator and President Bush a dunce is not a policy.

So, permit me to put forth a strategy: Musharraf remains in power because he controls most of the guns. He retains that control because the United States sends him billions to buy military support and weaponry. If we stop sending the cash, Musharraf will go down — fast.



Hands off Pakistan

"The assassination of Benazir Bhutto was not an attack on this brave woman alone; it was an attack upon democracy, freedom and the United States." This statement by Asa Hutchinson, former undersecretary of homeland security, was typical of the reaction of the American political and media establishments.

The claim that the assassination was an attack on democracy and freedom is dubious because Bhutto's two spells as prime minister of Pakistan were not notable for either one. Whether it was an attack on the United States depends on what that means. It certainly was not an attack on the American people. How could it be construed that way, unless one has such an imperialist notion of "our interests" that nothing can happen in the world without impinging on them? But if by "United States" we mean the policies of the current administration, then indeed it was such an attack. Bhutto, after all, favored bringing U.S. military forces into Pakistan, according to Michael Scheuer, a former CIA analyst and region specialist. If that's an option President Bush planned to exercise, the loss of Bhutto is a grave blow to his policy.

It is during a crisis that the establishment hoists its true colors for all to see. With few exceptions, the most prominent voices in politics and the news media are chanting in unison that Bhutto's assassination proves that the United States needs to be more involved in Pakistan than it has been.

Could the United States be more involved? American presidents have been meddling in Pakistani politics for a long time. After the Soviet Union invaded Afghanistan in 1979 both Jimmy Carter and Ronald Reagan regarded the brutal military dictator Gen. Muhammad Zia-ul-Haq, who had come to power by overthrowing — and later executing — Bhutto's father, the elected prime minister, Zulifqar Ali Bhutto, as a key ally. Once again the U.S. government used the Cold War as an excuse to back a despot.

Shortly before the current Pakistan president, Pervez Musharraf, staged a coup and named himself chief executive, Bill Clinton had pressured then-Prime Minister Nawaz Sharif to get Musharraf, who was then the head of the army, to pull his forces out of the part of Kashmir controlled by rival India. Sharif was

nus perceived as a puppet of the United States. That could not have helped

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Since 9/11, of course, Musharraf has been crowned a key ally in Bush's "war on terror." Some \$10 billion in cash and arms has poured into the dictator's coffers. The largess did not slow down when Musharraf suspended the constitution, sacked the Supreme Court, declared martial law, and arrested

lawyers and civil-libertarians — all to fight terrorism and protect democracy. When even Bush couldn't escape the fact that the Pakistanis were outraged about Musharraf, his administration tried to engineer an unlikely political marriage between the dictator and Bhutto. Whether her death came at the hands of Musharraf's security forces, parts of which have notorious ties to radical Islamic elements, or al-Qaeda and the Taliban, the murderers' opportunity has the mark of bumbling U.S. interventionism all over it. Before someone calls this a "blame America first" point of view, note that former Bush UN ambassador John Bolton told Fox News, "We in effect helped — helped — precipitate this dynamic that led to her tragic assassination."

dynamic that led to her tragic assassination."

What is so fascinating is how impervious the political and media establishments are to the lessons of reality. After all that's happened, the dominant voices still insist that Bush redouble efforts to determine Pakistan's future. The arrogance and pretense of knowledge displayed by such people are astounding. Haven't they learned that America's political leaders can't possibly know what they would need to know to run Pakistan? Their meddling here creates one mess after another — how can they hope to succeed there?

But Pakistan is the most dangerous country in the world, we're told incessantly. If that's true, it's all the more reason for the United States to keep its hands off. Intervention only creates and provokes enemies. That endangers the American people, precisely the opposite of what the Bush administration says it wants to do.

How many times have we armed BOTH sides of a conflict because of this? There is little for us to gain from this policy, and simultaneously a lot of trouble we get ourselves into. It is not a rational or intelligent way to interact with the world.

The administration has behaved as if there are only two choices in foreign policy - sending money or sending bombs. Our founding fathers knew a better way - to talk with our neighbors, do honest business with them, cultivate friendship, allow travel and open communication. We should neither initiate violence, nor take sides in conflicts that are none of our business.

The American taxpayers are working hard chough to support their families here at home. If an American wants to send money overseas for a conflict or cause, let them, but do not slap Americans in the face by forcefully sending their children's college money abroad to subsidize despotic foreign governments. Our children should be going off to college, not going off to more senseless foreign wars.

I was deeply saddened to hear of Benazir Bhutto's death. My hope is that we can change our foreign policy moving forward and truly make strides this year toward peace on earth and goodwill toward men.

I am looking forward to walking door to door and getting better familiar with each of you.



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
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


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Post ISD board to consider superintendent's contract

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

Stroke identification: During a barbeque, a woman stumbled and took a little fall. She assured everyone that she was fine (they offered to call paramedics). She said she had just tripped over a brick because of her new shoes.

They got her cleaned up and got her a new plate of food. While she appeared a bit shaken up, she went about enjoying herself the rest of the evening.

The woman's husband called later telling everyone that his wife had been taken to the hospital and passed away. She had suffered a stroke at the barbeque.

Had they known how to identify the signs of a stroke, perhaps the woman would be with us today. Some don't die, they end up in

a helpless, hopeless condition instead. It only takes a minute to read this

A neurologist says that if he can get to a stroke victim within three hours he can totally reverse the effects of a stroke... totally. He said the trick was getting a stroke recognized, diagnosed and then getting the patient medically cared for within three hours, which is tough.

Recognizing a stroke: Thank God for the sense to remember the three steps - S.T.R. Read and learn!

Sometimes symptoms of a stroke are difficult to identify. Unfortunately, the lack of awareness spells disaster. The stroke victim may suffer severe brain damage when people nearby fail to recognize the symptoms of a stroke. Now doctors say a bystander can recognize a stroke by asking three simple questions:

· S -- Ask the individual to SMILE.

• T -- Ask the person to TALK and speak a simple coherent sentence (i.e.: It is sunny out today.)

• R -- Ask him or her to RAISE BOTH ARMS.

If he or she has trouble with any one of these tasks, call 9-1-1 immediately and describe the symptoms to the dispatcher.

New sign of a stroke: Stick out your tongue.

Another sign of a stroke is this: Ask the person to stick out his tongue. If the tongue is crooked, if it goes to one side or the other, that is also an indication of a stroke. Shirley Taylor


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

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

Mary visits Elizabeth...Luke 1:39-56

God made double sure that His child would be reared by only the best of His people. Mary's humble heart in Luke 1:38 resulted in the conception of Jesus Christ. Then Joseph meekly responded to God's word by sealing his marriage with Mary and naming their first born son according to God's will.

About six months prior to Mary's conception, Elizabeth had conceived a child from her husband Zacharias. A great deal of attention is given this fantastic story that can be found in Luke 1:5-80. In short, God sent Gabriel to Zacharias, who was to conceive a child in the womb of Elizabeth his wife. Both were righteous before God, and walked in all the commandments and ordinances of God without blame. They were advanced in years, and Elizabeth had never before conceived a child.

The records show that they were blessed greatly because Elizabeth was no longer considered barren in the eyes of all the people. During those years, according to tradition, a woman was considered to be in a state of low degree if she never conceived children by her husband. We can only imagine how abundantly blessed Elizabeth was upon the arrival of her cousin Mary. Luke 1:39-56 gives the record of Mary's visit with Elizabeth, "And Mary arose in those days, and went into the hill country with haste into a city of Juda; And entered into the house of Zacharias, and saluted Elizabeth. And it came to pass, that when Elizabeth heard the salutation of Mary, the babe leaped in her womb; and Elizabeth was filled with the Holy Ghost." Earlier in verse 35 we see that Gabriel told Mary about her cousin Elizabeth.

Soon after her conception, Mary left in haste to see Elizabeth. Upon her salutation, Elizabeth's baby lept in her womb, and she was filled with holy spirit. This fulfilled God's word relayed to Zacharias in verse 15, "...and he shall be filled with the Holy Ghost, even from his mother's womb." John was filled with holy spirit when his mother was filled with holy spirit. Moreover, according to verse 80, he came out of his mother's womb with holy spirit still in him. What is fantastically astounding about this is that God was able to teach John's heart from his earliest years. After filled with holy spirit, Elizabeth opened her mouth and began to prophesy in a loud voice. It should be noted that prophesying is always directly related to being filled with holy spirit. It is impossible to do so without holy spirit. Verses 42-55 include the record of her dynamically edifying prophecy.

In the KJV Companion Bible, E.W. Bullinger provided the following note about verse 46 where Mary supposedly began to prophesy, "From a common practice of transcribers in replacing a pronoun by the corresponding proper noun, or name, some have thought that this hymn is a continuation of Elizabeth's words. And the structure favors this idea. But there is no MS. evidence for it."

The structure of her prophecy does reveal that Elizabeth began with edification and exhortation toward Mary. Elizabeth could have then continued by glorifying God Because He "regarded the low estate of His handmaiden" (verse 48). Elizabeth was greatly blessed because she was no longer considered barren. Finally in verse 55 we read, "And Mary abode with her about three months, and returned to her own house."

There can be no doubt that Mary returned to her house built up and prepared to raise God's child to serve Him meekly.


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
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

un-n-Facts for Brain-iacs VOL 63 irates

As long as ships, loaded with valuable cargo, have traveled the ocean, there has been pirates. Pirates often sailed smaller faster ships called sloops. They used speed and surprise to overtake larger and slower cargo ships, called galleons. Sloops would pull along side a target ship and fire canons and **grenades** (clay pots filled with gunpowder). The captain

and crew of the unfortunate vessel

were ordered to lower the sails or risk

sinking into the ocean. Once the

pirates were aboard, they would

steal the cargo. The treasure they

were looking for included: gold coins,

(doubloons), silver (pieces of eight), rum, weapons and medicine. They might even decide to take the entire ship! After plundering the ship, pirates would divide up the loot, with the captain getting the largest share. Sometimes kings would hire pirates to steal from enemy ships. This "legal" pirate was called a **privateer**. Privateers carried a "letter of Marque" from the Governor or King, which gave them permission to **plunder** the cargo. Pirates lived and died by harsh codes of conduct. Stealing or murdering a shipmate may mean you were left marooned on a small island, often to die. Ship life was rough. When food ran out, pirates would eat the rats that always infested ships. Before battles they would spread sand on the deck to soak up the blood! The Golden Age of Piracy (1689-1718) marked the end for these dashing waterway criminals!

Blackbeard! Roger. Often pirates would fly a friendly country's flag to trick a passing ship into stopping. Once the ship pulled aside, the pirates would throw grapple hooks on deck to the hold ship captive. Crossword be found in underlined words.

Between 1716 and 1718, the famous pirate Blackbeard, terrorized ships in Virginia and the Carolinas. His mission was to strike fear in the hearts of the unfortunate captain, crew and passengers he encountered. He was a guy who knew how to dress for success. At 6'4" he towered over most men of his time. To add to his devilish look he braided his long scraggly black beard with rope tipped in gunpowder. During a raid, Blackbeard would set afire the dangling ropes. Wearing his crimson coat and brandishing a small arsenal of weapons, his mere presence was enough to make most sailors give up without a fight. It was a good thing too, because he was known to maroon you on a deserted island, with no more than a bit of water, if you put up a fuss. His pirating days ended when he was eventually hunted down and killed. His severed head was hung on the bow of the ship, as a warning to other would be pirates. To this day, Blackbeard's buried treasure has never been found.


