This is for OVERHEARD IN COFFEE SHOP DEPARTMENT: If a man doesn't have a new, over-and-under, \$300 shotgun, a new pickup, and a new boat and trailer, he isn't farming around Bovina.

We enjoyed a visit with Clint Formby, Hereford radio man, at Bovina's chamber banquet Thursday night.

Clint is working with his brother, Marshall Formby, in Marshall's campaign for election to governorship of Texas.

Clint says he's learned a lot during past several weeks that he's been participating in the campaign. That, we'd say, is an understatement.

He pointed out the tremendous task a state-wide candidate has in electioneering in such a vast area. It borders on being impossible unless a candidate has an unlimited campaign fund or large amounts of contributions coming in regularly.

We got the impression that Clint believes that even an area as large as Texas can be effectively covered through various advertising mediums . . . . . if funds are unlimited. He wasn't complaining; merely making an observation or two.

He said that Formby is only candidate in gubernatorial race which isn't backed by any special interest group. While that fact is admirable, it also works a hardship on such a candidate.

From backing of special interest groups, a candidate can count on a certain amount of campaign funds—depending on the group—not to mention a block of special interest voting.

Clint said that he had been under impression that a West Texan could never be elected governor. He's changed that opinion now, he says.

He left impression with us that he now feels that there is little or no prejudice against a West Texan, as such, throughout rest of the state and that a West Texan has as good a chance as next candidate—every thing else being equal.

Marshall Formby calls Plainview home.

Some two weeks before the banquet here, there was a possibility that he would attend. However, a conflict developed that made it impossible for him to be here.

While we don't think Bovina's chamber banquet should be political in nature, it would have been nice to have had a candidate for governor present.

The banquet will eventually attract political candidates, we daresay, if it continues to be as successful as it has during its first two years. And we see no reason why that success shouldn't continue.

Back to Formby's campaign: Here are some things he favors: Simpler tax laws.

No new taxes during next two years.

Raising speed limit to 70 miles per hour on four-lane divided highways in rural areas.

Amending unfair so-called car insurance laws.

Less red tape for small businessman and farmer.

Adequate doctors, hospitals and nurses.

Best schools and colleges possible.

Area political observers feel that Formby will receive the vote from this area in the Democratic primary, May 5. Many voters we talked to in Parmer County say that they will vote for Formby in first primary and then select another candidate in run-off because they feel that he won't receive enough votes to get in the run-off.

And there is a strong slate of candidates in the race.

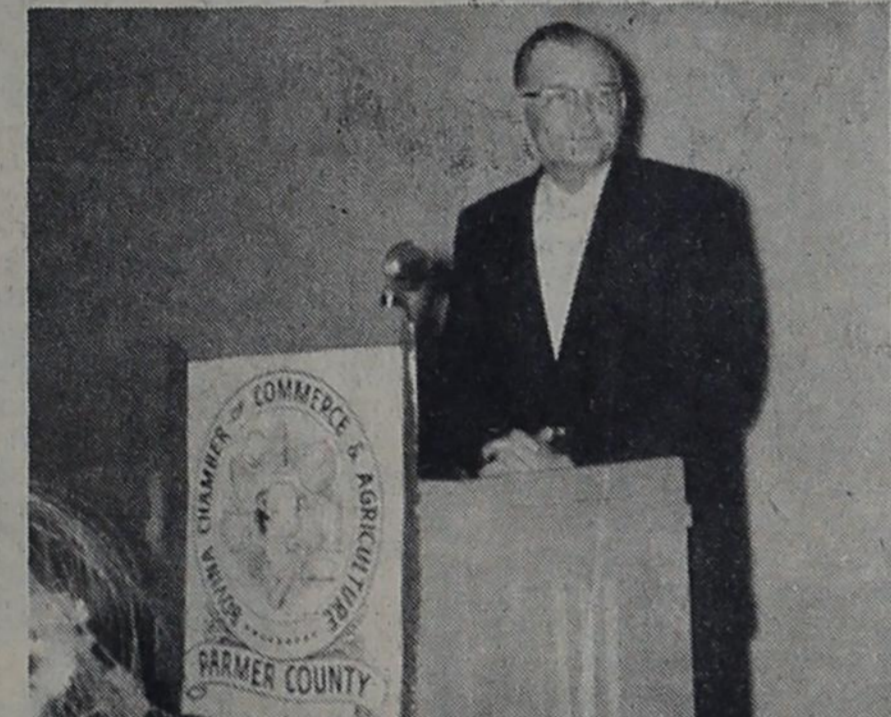
Presentation of outstanding man and woman of year (see story elsewhere) was made by Tom Bonds, president of Bovina Lions Club.

# Restitution of \$13,055 In City Funds Made

Restitution of \$13,055.21 in reportedly stolen city funds has been made.

Bovina city commission announced late Tuesday afternoon that a "satisfactory settlement" had been made in regard to that amount of money which was allegedly stolen by former Mayor Emmett Tabor during period of time from September of 1960 until early this year.

Announcement of the settlement was made following a special session of city commission yesterday with George Trimble, Bovina property owner and former resident, present. Trimble now resides at Alamogordo, N.M.

Total amount of shortage of city funds was listed in last

week's issue of The Blade as being \$13,316.00. Since that time, commission decided that four checks totaling the difference in the two amounts were legal and thus should not be considered a part of the shortage.

Tabor resigned as mayor February 9 amid considerable talk in the community about misappropriation of city funds.

He was charged with theft of city funds February 16 when a complaint was filed in regard to a \$70 check made out to Luther Vaughn, Shallowater contractor who installed water and sewer lines in Bovina's new Ridgelea Addition last fall. Vaughn told city commissioners that he did not receive the check.

Same day that charges were

filed against Tabor, he was arraigned in justice of the peace court in Farwell. He was released under \$1500 bond at that time.

Extensive checking of city records has been going on since Tabor's resignation.

Trophy will be awarded to marksman who has highest average for this shoot, which will be the one for March, and the April shoot.

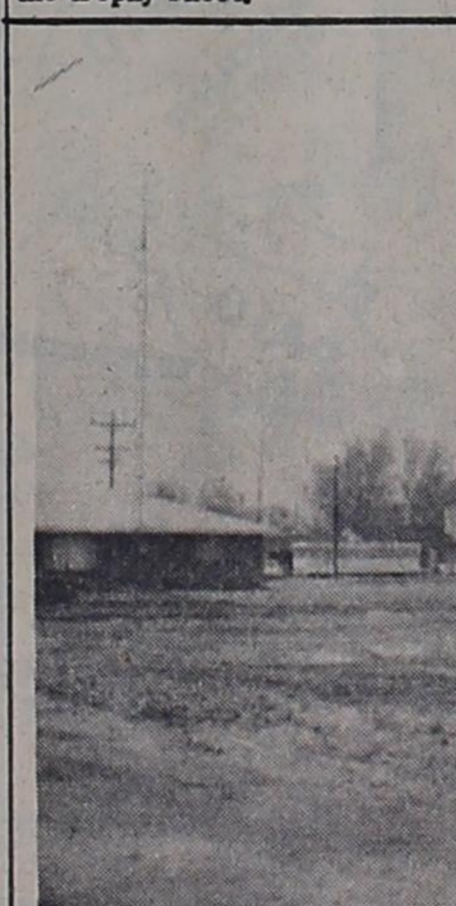
Second and third place trophies will also be awarded, Jim Russell, gun club president, says.

# Should Bovina Change Form of Government?

April 7, Bovina voters will have an opportunity to change the city's form of government from present three-member city commission to proposed six-member aldermanic.

While we don't feel that Bovina's future will be greatly affected by outcome of the election, we think that aldermanic form of government would better serve the city's needs at present and in years to come.

As we see the situation, advantages of alderman government outnumber those for commission form.

With six elected officials to tend to city business, all people will be better represented in city government. This will give all people of Bovina a better opportunity to have their wishes and needs known by the government.

With six men on the city board, there will be less chance of one member dominating that board. When such domination exists, and it can easily happen with a three-member board, government "for all" the people is handicapped.

Also, under the proposed form of government there will be greater possibilities for departmentalizing duties of elected officials. For instance, one alderman could be responsible for water and sewer, another for financing, still another for streets, etc. This borders on being impossible under the present three-member commission form of government.

Only disadvantage to alderman form that we've been able to uncover is that it's hard enough to get three good men to serve on city government, much less six. Frankly, we doubt that will be a problem in years to come as the city grows and progresses as we think it will.

Because of the aforementioned advantages, we recommend voting for change to aldermanic form of government when you go to polls April 7.

## ORDER OF ELECTION TO CHANGE FROM COMMISSION TO ALDERMANIC FORM OF GOVERNMENT

THE STATE OF TEXAS)  
COUNTY OF FARMER)  
CITY OF BOVINA)

WHEREAS, on the 3rd day of March, 1962, a petition was presented to me, signed by more than 10% of the qualified voters of the City of Bovina for an election to be held in the City of Bovina on the question of determining whether or not a majority of the legally qualified voters of the City of Bovina desire to change from the commission form of government to the aldermanic form of government.

It appearing to me that said petition is in due and legal form and is signed by more than 10% of the qualified voters of the City of Bovina, and that said city has been duly formed and created under the commission form of government.

THEREFORE, I, in my capacity as Mayor of the City of Bovina, do hereby order that an election be held on the 7th day of April, 1962, at the American Legion Hall in the City of Bovina, to determine whether or not a majority of the legally qualified voters of said City desire that the form of government be changed to aldermanic form.

I further order that said election be held at said American Legion Hall within the city limits of the City of Bovina.

I further order that A, B, Wilkinson be and he is hereby appointed presiding officer to hold said election and he shall select two judges and two clerks to assist him in holding the same, and he shall, within the time prescribed by law, make due return thereof as is provided by law.

All persons who are legally qualified voters of the State of Texas and County of Farmer and who are resident voters within the City of Bovina, shall be entitled to vote at said election and all voters who favor the proposition to change from commission form to aldermanic form shall have written or printed on their ballots the words:

"FOR CHANGE TO ALDERMANIC FORM," and those opposed to the proposition to change to aldermanic form shall have written or printed on their ballots the words:

"AGAINST CHANGE TO ALDERMANIC FORM,"

Notice of this election shall be given by publishing such notice in some newspaper within the city limits of the City of Bovina thirty (30) days, if there be one, and if none, then by posting notices of same at three public places in the City of Bovina.

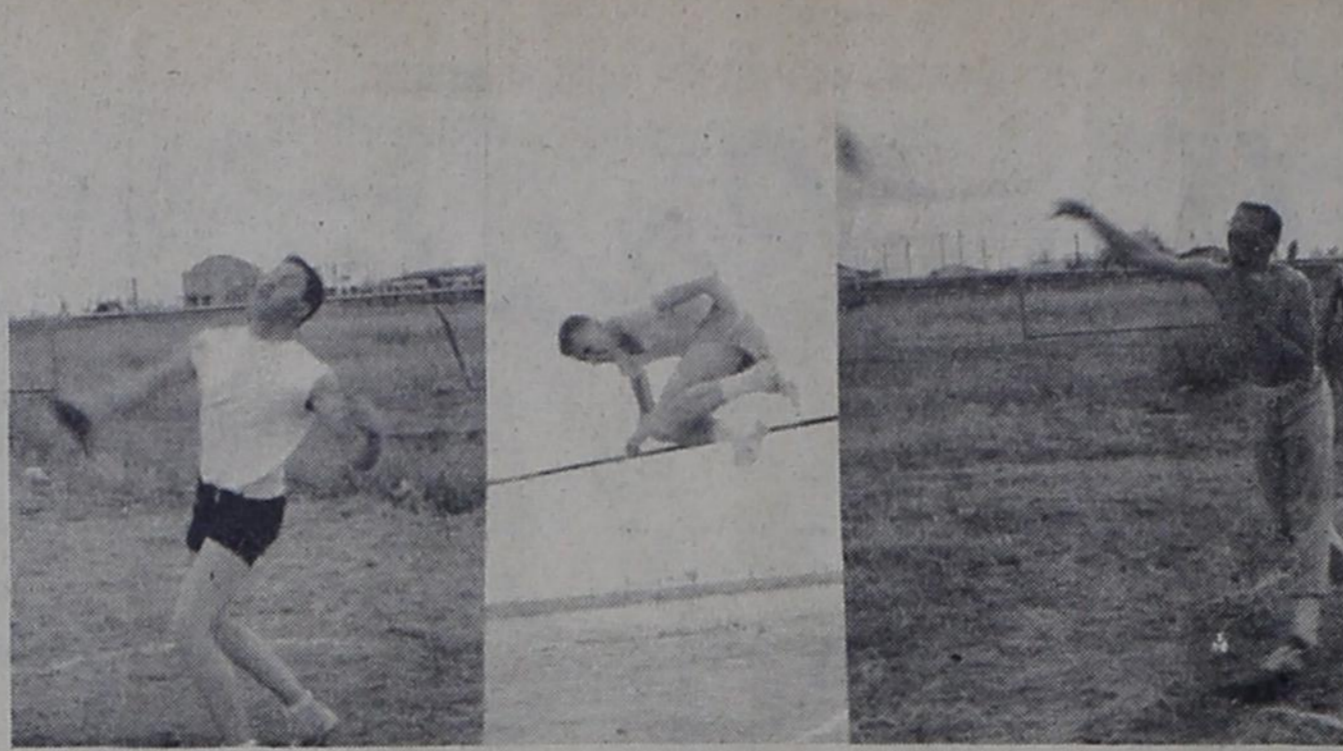

### Fire-Safe Painting

A paint brush probably figures in your Spring Clean-Up plans, so keep these fire safety pointers in mind:

1. For paint removing and brush cleaning, solvents labeled "non-flammable" are safest, the National Fire Protection Association says. If you must work with flammable ones, better do it outdoors -- but never in any area where there is open flame as from a stove or
2. Get rid of old paint and solvent containers, and those with small left-over amounts. Store paints and solvents well away from furnaces, and only in capped metal containers -- glass jars break easily, creating a definite fire hazard.
3. Safest practice with rags used to wipe up solvents or paints is to dispose of them immediately outside the house. If you must store them, use a metal container with a tight cover.

CHICAGO (UPI) — Hardwood floors are showing again, because of a trend to area rugs.

Spurring the trend is the open plan of many contemporary homes, leading to the use of area rugs to divide otherwise one-room living areas into dining nooks, music corners, etc.

With so much floor bared, interest runs high in high-styled hardwood flooring. Hardwood floor manufacturers report that plank style flooring, in particular, is fast gaining in popularity. The wide planks apparently strike an appropriate note of informality in both colonial and contemporary ranch homes.

Available in widths from three to nine inches, the hardwood planks generally are laid in random widths. Thus, a typical plank floor may be composed of pieces three, five and seven inches wide, placed alternately.

Superseding the conventional parquet hardwood is unit-block flooring. More formal in character than either strip or plank flooring, it is produced in squares and rectangles of several dimensions. A popular choice is the 9 x 9 inch square. The blocks can be laid in countless eye-catching patterns.

Most extensively used is oak. Hard maple, beech, birch and pecan are becoming increasingly popular.

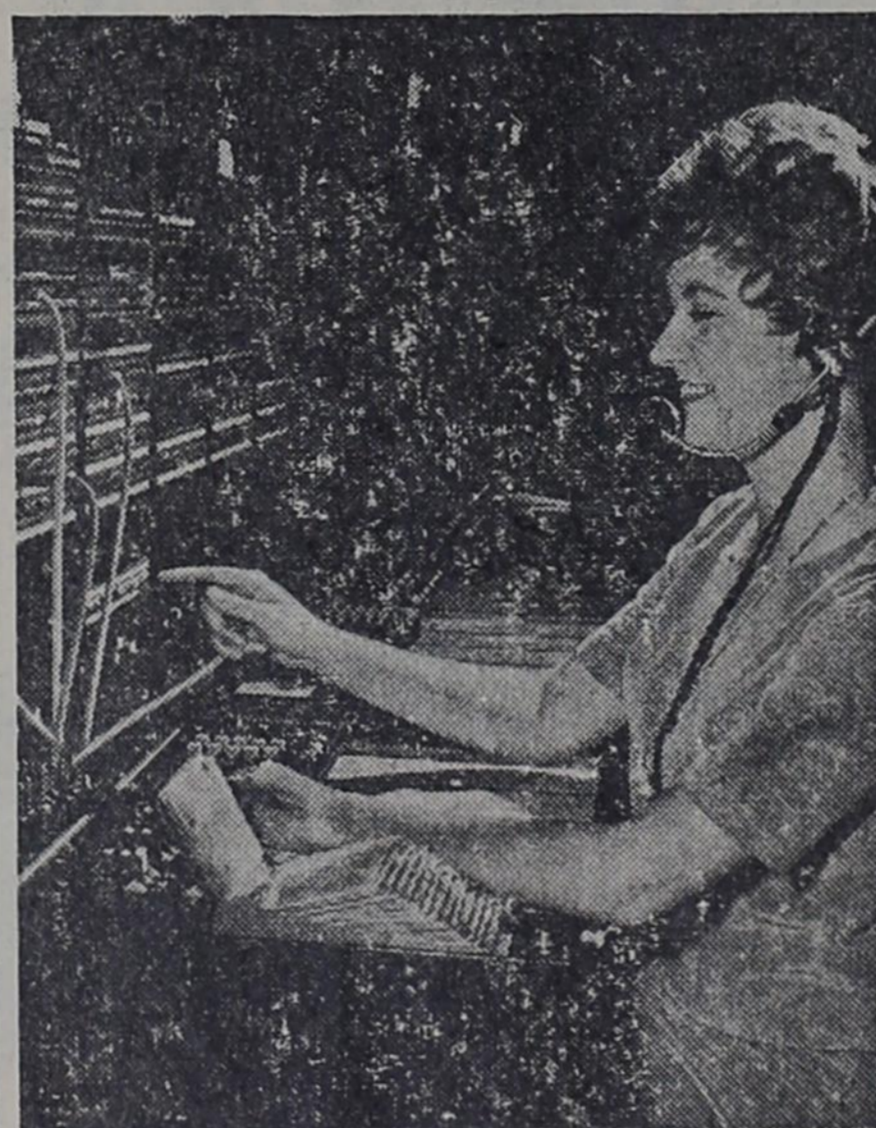

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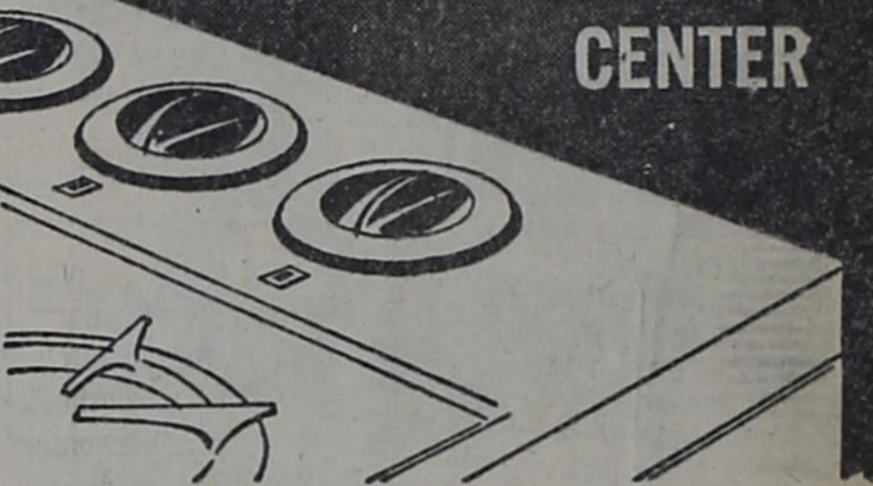
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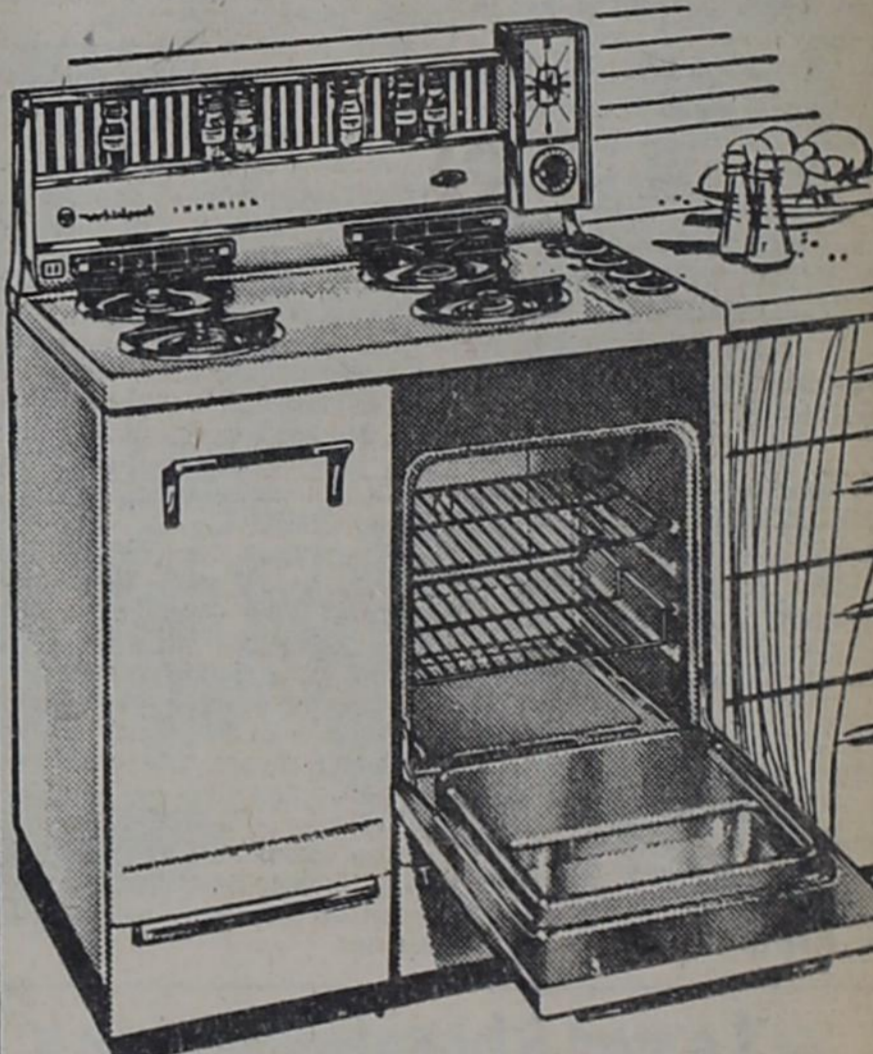

charge for children in sixth grade down.

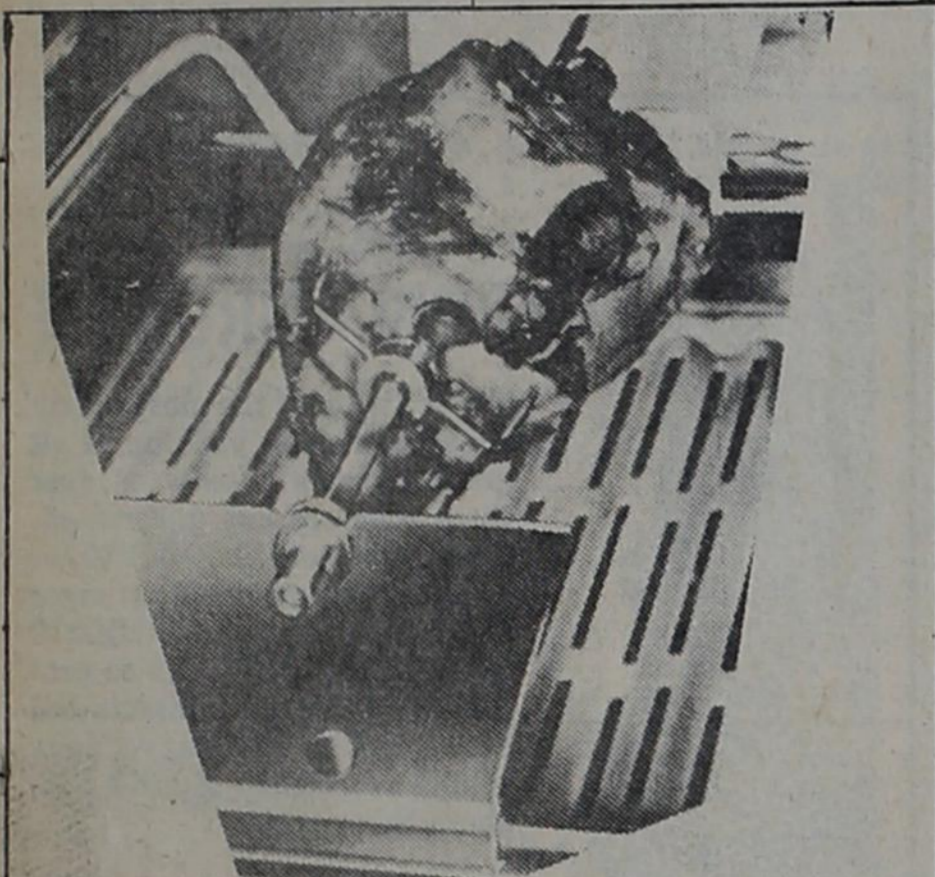
Entry fee per team is \$4.

### Florida Opens New Frontier In the Peace River Basin

(Release Friday, March 2 or after)

The new frontiers aren't all in Washington, Florida, which attracts 12 million vacationers each year and 3,000 new permanent residents each week, has had to open up previously undeveloped areas because its long-established coastal resorts are too crowded for comfort and too expensive for many Americans, especially those with families.

Since World War II, a super city-in-the-sun has developed along the 90 mile stretch of beach between Miami and Palm Beach, occupying every inch of waterfront property and stretching well into the interior. The Tampa-St. Petersburg-Sarasota area on the Gulf Coast also is highly populated and available real estate is scarce.

Thus, newcomers in search of a good vacation or the good life are pioneering the gulf coast south of Sarasota where the silver tarpon flourish and Florida's ocean cool spells hardly ever penetrate. One of the new frontiers is the Peace River basin, stretching from Central Florida's lake district south to Charlotte Harbor. This is the state's largest natural harbor and is the location of Boca Grande, world famous for its giant tarpon fishing.

The range drained by the Peace River was once the cowboy country of Florida where beef cattle of the Brahman strain were more numerous than people. One of the river towns, Arcadia, still has more flavor of the Old West than the Old South and the landscape of the area is not unlike the cattle country of Australia. Eternal summer is no idle boast here. During the recent Florida cold snap, Charlotte County was the warmest place in the nation.

Gradually the county, which embraces the mile-wide mouth of the Peace River and Charlotte Harbor, is being transformed into a gracious playground far from the bikini belt. Near the up-and-coming county seat of Punta Gorda there are three typical multi-million dollar developments—Harbour Heights, Port Charlotte and Peace River Shores—designed to attract winter residents and year-round residents from the North.

Many gulf coast residents are refugees for the aged, but Harbour Heights is a good example of a community planned for more youthful citizens with moderate incomes. Many of the residents are retired from business but still in their '40s; some still want to do part-time work and small industry is being attracted to the area. However, play—not work—is the password here and the facilities for fun are generous.

Harbour Heights, for instance, has its own country club, the former mansion of a retired general, with an azure Olympic-size pool, tennis courts and a growing marina for docking pleasure craft. A network of boat canals extends through the community of gleaming white and pastel homes.

Just beyond the marina is the beginning of a jigsaw system of islands which makes the Peace River one of the finest tidal fishing grounds in Florida. When the tarpon are running in the Spring, helicopters spot the schools and radio their locations to fishing parties. Just now mangrove snappers, snook, sea trout, channel bass, sheepshead and groupers are plentiful.

Contiguous to the fishing area is a 3,000 acre game preserve, an adjunct of Harbour Heights, for the pleasure of the small game hunter. There are a number of game preserves and state parks in the general area with camping facilities and hunting and fishing privileges during specified seasons.

Charlotte county is reachable by car via the Tamiami trail, which passes through Punta Gorda. There is regular air service to nearby Fort Myers and air taxis ply to Punta Gorda, Harbour Heights and other communities.

### Jet Plane Is a Flying Palace of the Orient

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Not too long ago, a U.S. airline official came back from the Orient and committed the ultimate sin for any airline official.

He raved about another carrier's plane.

"I've never seen an aircraft cabin interior like it," he marveled. "It's got anything in this country beat a mile."

The airliner in question was a Convair 880 jetliner, operated by Civil Air Transport (CAT)—the Formosa-based airline founded by the late Gen. Claire Chennault of Flying Tiger fame.

CAT's Convair is dubbed the "Mandarin Jet." And its unique interior has impressed more people than just the aforementioned official.

The predominant color is brushed gold. The seats are a deep black threaded with silver and gold. Above the windows, splashed in rich colors of Chinese black, red and peacock blue, is a series of murals depicting the story of Confucius' travels.

There are nine central figures in the procession ranging from a two-wheel cart to flag and pike-carrying Oriental knights.

The cabin bulkheads are decorated with authentically-styled moon-gates, dragons, lion-knobs and a Chinese Phoenix. The jet's exterior is only slightly less colorful. The big plane is painted in

# Proposed Dam Project County Meeting Topic

Proposed dam project for Running Water Draw---from Curry County, N. M., to Plainview---was discussed at a meeting Tuesday night at Hub Community Center.

F. F. Calhoun, chairman of board of supervisors of Hale County Soil Conservation District, led the discussion.

He told of a plan whereby federal government will construct "10 to 12" dams on Running Water Draw to be used basically for flood control. The dams may also be used for irrigation and recreational purposes, Calhoun pointed.

was on hand for the meeting which was called by Parmer County Soil Conservation district to explain to Parmer people details of the proposed project.

Cost estimate is \$2 and 1/2 million dollars or approximately \$250,000 per dam. This cost will be paid by government.

A local government, which will probably be county commissioners court in Parmer's case, will cooperate in the project. County government will be responsible for getting easements and rights of way for the dams and water, administering contracts for dams' construction and operation and main-

tenance of the dams after their completion.

Those present, in an informal vote following Calhoun's talk, were overwhelmingly in favor of Parmer County participating in the plan.

Calhoun pointed out that one of distinct advantages of the project was the recharging of underground water supply.

Once the dams are completed, they will be turned over to local people. If property owners grant free use of their land for the dams and lakes, they will have full benefit of the resulting body of water. They may use it for irrigation, recreation or whatever they see fit.

If it is necessary to purchase land for the project, then lakes will be controlled by the governing body which backs it financially.

Should a city, for instance, desire to have a larger dam than the plan calls for and thus impound more water it can do so by paying additional cost for larger dam. This money is available through a government agency at rate of 2.6 per cent interest, it was pointed out at the meeting.

Calhoun told his listeners that construction could begin on the project here in two or three years if there is enough local interest in the six counties which will be included in the project. Counties in the plan, other than Parmer, Curry, and Hale, Construction will begin in Curry County and continue eastward. Dams will become increasingly larger as they move downstream. According to estimates, each \$1 spent on the project will be worth \$1.25 to the area included.

Calhoun was introduced by A. L. Black, chairman of board of supervisors of Parmer County Soil Conservation District. Bob Spencer, manager of Clovis Chamber of Commerce, spoke briefly on great amount of interest which Curry County has in the project from a fish and wildlife standpoint.

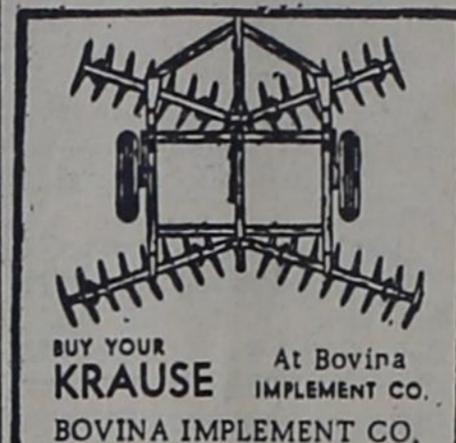

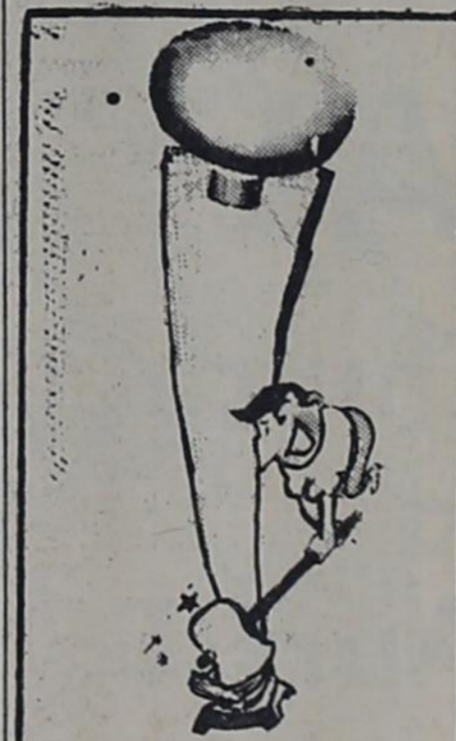

## HD Agent's Notes

BY MISS ETTIE MUSIL

Do teen-agers really care? A study was made recently in 3 New York state schools in regard to the interest teen-agers had in the use of money. Of the 339 ninth-grade students surveyed more than 100 boys and girls asked about automobiles and life insurance. Sixty-four were concerned about ways to save for retirement.

A total of ninety per cent of the boys and girls were saving money. Like our local teen-agers they spent their money for school expenses, recreation, snacks, contributions, books and magazines -- in that order. In the study they wanted to provide their share in earning their expenses.

In another study in Massachusetts by the Extension Service Agents, they interviewed 52 girls, their parents, and the management of 52 stores in 9 cities. This study was made whether teen-agers should be encouraged to start charge accounts?

They found that only 1 out of 3 girls felt that a charge account would be a valuable experience in learning to handle money. Another third of the girls said that "it depends" on an individual's judgement and on her willingness to accept the responsibility. The rest of the girls interviewed thought parental consent should be necessary. Perhaps they were thinking of who would have to pay the bills.

When the parents were interviewed they were even more cautious in starting charge accounts for their daughters. Their reasons were several. It's hard to decide what she needs and what's a luxury. This involves the ability of good

judgment of what is a need or a want. The parents did not feel that credit would teach a child to

save before buying. Parents felt that it was their duty to take care of a teenager's needs. They thought it was bad to start the habit of credit too early. Even the teen-agers aren't sure whether it's the right thing to do. In the study some of the store personnel interviewed, approached the early charge accounts with caution. In talking with you mothers and many of your sons and daughters, I know of your sincere interest in teaching them the value of money. Many of our youth have their own bank accounts and savings accounts for their college education. You may need some extra help to set up their checking accounts, how to write checks, (Continued on next page.)

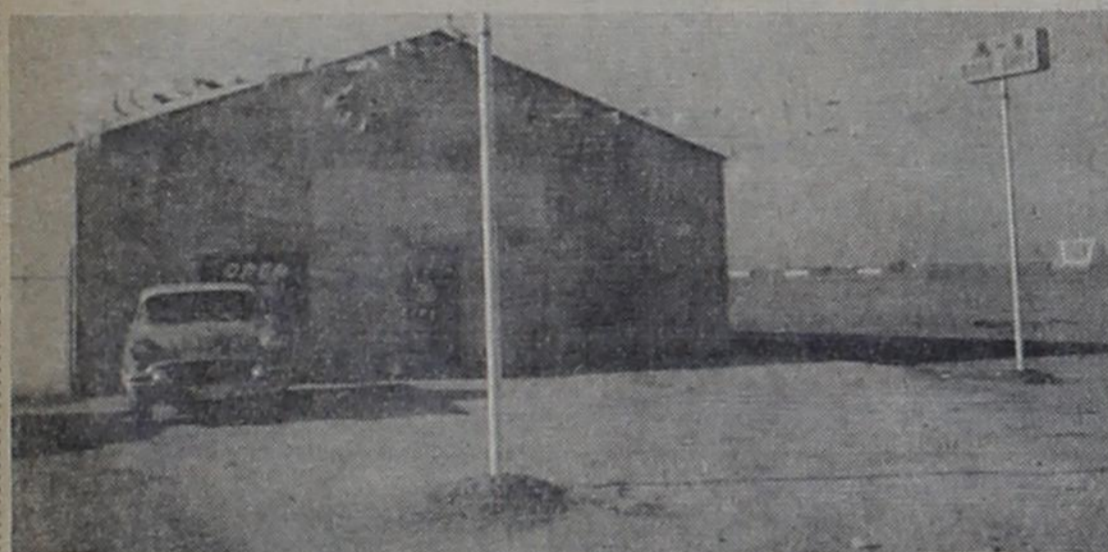

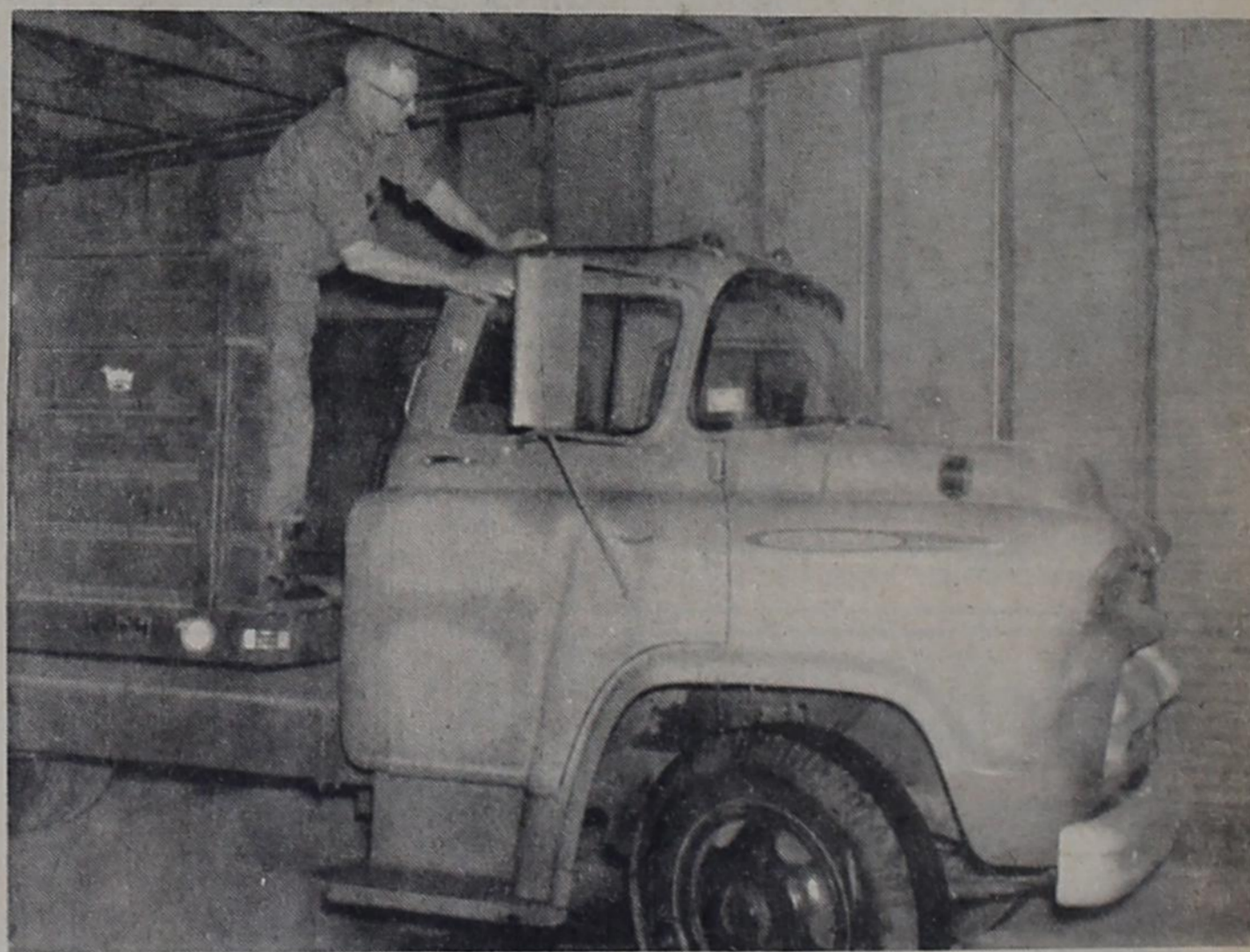

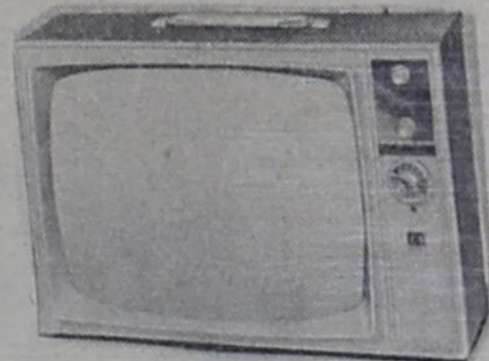

Also, if any of you have phosphorus on some of your wheat and some without phosphorus and are side by side I would like to have the results.

feed--with more valuable carcasses at slaughter time" is the major objective of the program. ## Legislative Proposals Analyzed In Amarillo

Farmers and grain dealers throughout the High Plains area will have an opportunity to hear legislation currently before Congress, analyzed by national leaders, Monday.

The information and education of Wheat Growers and the Grain Sorghum Producers As-

The "Projected Economic Outlook and Need for Effective Farm Policy" will be discussed by the head of the Department of Agricultural Economics at Texas Technological College, Dr. J. Wayland Bennett.

The presidents of the two sponsoring organizations, Mr. Frank Moore of Plainview and Mr. Kenneth Kendrick of Stratford, stress that there will be ample time for discussion of comments and questions from the floor. They urge that anyone seeking further information about current farm programs take full advantage of the opportunity to receive first-hand information from these nationally known experts who will be at the meeting.

Directors of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association will hold their regular annual meeting and election of an Executive Committee at 1:30 p.m. also on Monday, at the Herring Hotel.

The third is one of the nation's best known research

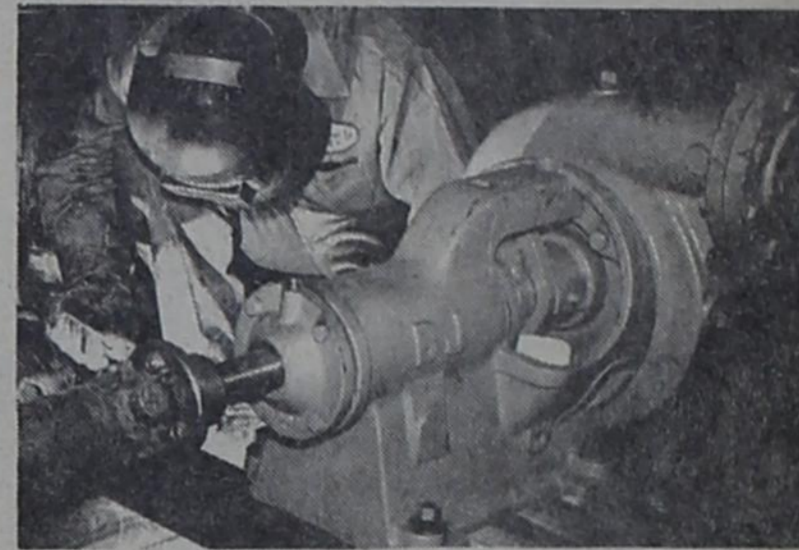
workers on swine breeding, Dr. J. A. Whatley from Oklahoma State University.
