#### Torres has perfect week

Liz Torres of Muleshoe won first place in the *Journal's* seventh weekly football contest last week by not missing a single game.

Her feat continued the overall domination of the contest by female entrants.

Tying for second with only one game missed were Sharli Crawford of Lazbuddie, who missed Texas A&M vs. Iowa State, and Adam Graves of Canyon (with games graciously picked by dad John Graves of Muleshoe), who missed only Portales vs. Lovington.

They both guessed a combined score of 50 points on the Texas Tech-Kansas State game, and the actual scores totaled 51.

Veronica Gonzales of Muleshoe also missed only one game — and was close on the tiebreaker, with a guess of 54 points.

Entrants who missed two games, along with their guess on the tiebreaker score, were Nathan Crawford of Lazbuddie (52), Phillip Gonzales of Muleshoe (49), Harold Pollard of Enochs and J.C. Orozco of Muleshoe (each 53), Alma Orozco of Muleshoe (54), Richard Orozco of Muleshoe (56), Vicki Gonzales of Muleshoe (44), Claire Brown of Muleshoe (43), Vickie Groneman of Muleshoe (42), Mac McFarland of Crane (62) and Frances Stegall of Muleshoe (66).

By far the most missed game of the week was Oregon State at UCLA, missed by 31 of the 47 players.

Also sticky was Big Spring at Plainview, which 21 people missed.

On the other hand, contestants were more than 85 percent accurate on games shown in the third row across in last week's game. Of the 141 possible guess (three games times 47 contestants), there were only 19 misses.

The experts may have had doubts about Farwell's ability to beat Bovina, but the contest entrants did not. And on Muleshoe vs. Littlefield, only Violet Nicolas of Farwell picked Littlefield.

## Mules win after spotting Shallowater 14 points

The District 2-3A game of the week took place Friday night in Shallowater.

The Mules and the Mustangs both came in with 2-0 district records, and the Mules outlasted Shallowater in a game that will be remembered and discussed for years to come.

Coach Ralph Mason told the Mules after the game, "Twenty-five years from now, coach (David) Wood and I will be talking. One of us will say, 'Coach, do you remember back in 2000, when we went to Shallowater and spotted them 14 points, and then came back to preserve an undefeated season?'"

The opening quarter truly was a disaster for the Mules. On the opening drive of the game, Shallowater mixed three passes with nine running plays to cover 90 yards, and Keenan Kitchens score the game's first touchdown. The kick was good, and with 6:04 remaining in the first quarter, the Mules were behind for only the second time this season.

Shallowater's kickoff was taken by Chris Vela at the 10 and returned to the 29, but the Mules couldn't get their offense started.

After three plays with no gain, Lincoln Riley punted the ball to Shallowater's 28-yard line. Aaron Morris promptly took it up the sideline to the 45.

After the Mustangs gained a first down because of an offside by Muleshoe, they set up a third and one situation. Kiel Kitchens, as a wingback, took a pitch and threw it to Micah Simmons all alone on the Mule six-yard line; he entered the end zone untouched, and another kick made it 14-0 Shallowater before the end of the first quarter.

The packed Muleshoe stands became very quiet: The Mustangs had taken 18 snaps from center and the Mules had hardly handled the ball.

After the kickoff, the Mules still couldn't get untracked and had to give the ball back again.

But early in the second quarter, the Mule defense started to come to life. Darrell Lewis made back-to-back tackles on Johnathan

Marburger and Justin Stone, leaving Shallowater with a third and 16 situation.

After Keenan Kitchens was feeling some pressure while attempting to pass, Danny Ramirez picked off the pass at the Shallowater 35 and the Mule defensive unit began to block everything in sight. Ramirez cut the Mustang lead by six points.

D.J. Dominguez's kick split the uprights and with 9:09 left in the second quarter, the Mules were behind only 14-7.

Both teams then had to kick the ball away before a Lincoln Riley pass was intercepted at the Mustang 45-yard line. On the Mustangs' first play from scrimmage, though, Keenan Kitchens' pitch to Stone fell to the ground and

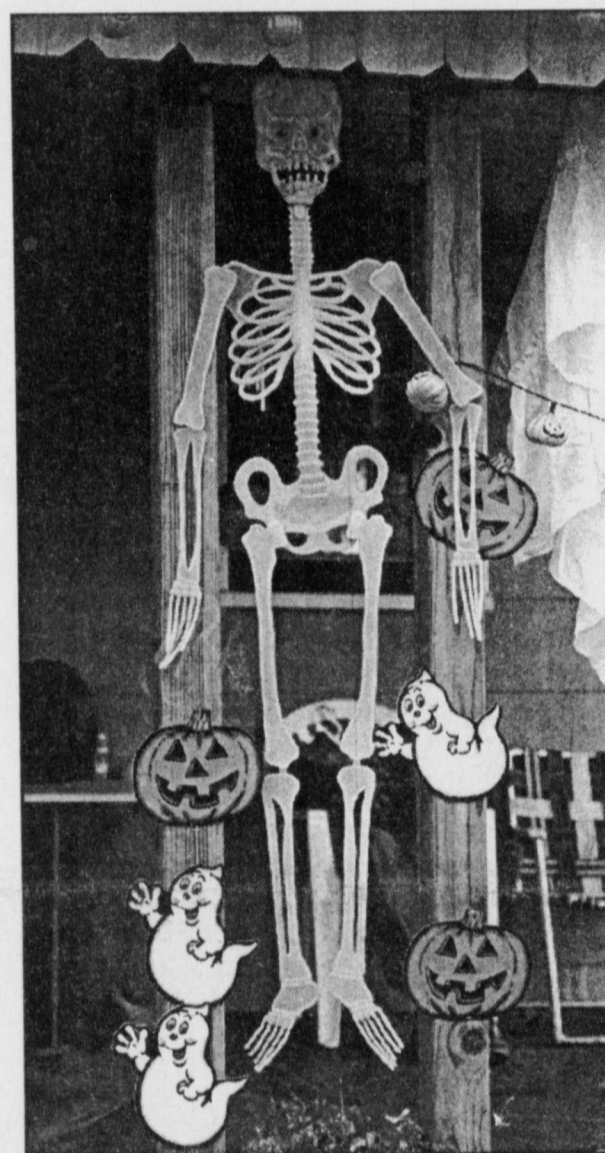
Daniel Johnson was there to claim the fumble for the Mules.

Good runs by Ramirez and Lewis put the Mules at the one-yard line with less than a minute to go in the half.

The "Hammer" was the call, and the Mule line blew the Mustangs off the line of scrimmage. Ramirez skipped through the hole in the left for another six points. With 37 seconds left in the first half, Dominguez's kick evened the score at 14-all.

On the second play from scrimmage in the second half, Travis Tunnell faked the dive the Lewis and scampered around his right end for 74

## Muleshoe bone-marrow donors to be sought at Nov. 1 event

The Amarillo Bone Marrow Donor Program is sponsoring an event in Muleshoe from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. Nov. 1 to recruit residents to sign up as marrow donors.

The event, in the Muleshoe State Bank Community Room, is important because of its potential to save the lives of cancer and blood-

disease patients.

When someone needs a bone-marrow transplant, the chances of finding a matching donor are small because so few people have been tested that the donor bank is comparatively small.

Common causes of the need for marrow transplants are aplastic anemia and the various types of

leukemia.

After the patient's own bone marrow has been destroyed through chemotherapy or radiation, the donor's marrow is given intravenously, much like a blood transfusion. New marrow then grows from the donated cells.

Cindy Coberley of Muleshoe, who was diagnosed earlier this year

with renal-cell carcinoma, said recently that she did not yet know whether doctors will advise a marrow transplant for her.

Coberley said that when a transplant is needed, the odds of an Anglo finding a suitable donor are 1 in 20,000. For Hispanics and

## '64 valedictorian honored for design

The valedictorian of Muleshoe High School's class of 1964 was scheduled to receive a design award Saturday from the Texas Society of Architects, according to his father, J.K. Adams of Muleshoe.

Joe Adams, now president of Adams Architects Inc. of Houston, was being recognized for his work in designing a type of community center for Fredericksburg, Texas, using the timber frame from a 150-year-old Amish barn moved from central Ohio.

The Kairos Celebration Barn uses a steel outer shell that stands apart from the heavy white-oak beams of the old building, allowing the framework to "be viewed in the round — an open

sculpture on display," according to one article written about the building.

The new barn is used for events both religious and secular. It sits on a manmade hill overlooking a small lake, among hay fields and pecan orchards.

Concealed within the hill is a basement containing all the barn's mechanical systems, among them 35 tons of air-conditioning equipment.

Adams' design was selected for the TSA Honor Award by a panel containing architects from New York, Boston and Portland, Ore. Construction was completed in June 1999.

The designer has said that "the spirit of this project is meant to be the absolute opposite of whatever glitzy is."

## Second annual CraneFest flying into Muleshoe on Nov. 3-4

Muleshoe's second annual CraneFest is scheduled for Nov. 3-4 at various locations in town and at Muleshoe National Wildlife Refuge.

The public part of the festival kicks off Friday night with pie, coffee and a program in the Muleshoe High School cafeteria. Rick Vanderpool, a Texas folklorist and author, will share some

crane facts and fiction (and earlier in the day will show Watson Junior High students how to make cranes with origami, the ancient Japanese art of paper-folding).

Mark Klym of Texas Parks and Wildlife will give a presentation on hummingbirds and Kim Shafter of Muleshoe will speak on ideas for plantings to help attract hummingbirds to local yards.

Jennyslippers will be serving the

refreshments. Tickets are \$3 and may be purchased at the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce office or from members of the CraneFest Committee.

Saturday activities begin with a 6 a.m. to 7:30 a.m. breakfast at the picnic overlook on Texas 214 at the refuge. The all-you-can-eat meal will be cooked by Clifford Black and sponsored by the Bailey County Child Welfare Board. Tick-

ets are \$5 and are available from board members.

Thousands of cranes should be leaving the lakes on the wildlife refuge during the breakfast.

Tours of the refuge on Saturday will be led by members of the Friends of Bosque del Apache National Wildlife Refuge in New Mexico, which has a crane festival

# Paulownias can be spectacular — with luck

Most of the more spectacular flowering trees used in landscaping present a dilemma in our climate: They bloom early in the spring.

Now, at first glance, that might seem an advantage — most everybody is ready for spring by the time it gets here, and a bright-flowered can lift spirits dulled by the drabness of winter.

But, in the real world we live in, spring in our area means wind — and often blowing sand. Petals burned to crinkly brown by blowing sand are not nearly so uplifting!

The buds of redbud trees are tough enough that they usually aren't bothered by either frosts or blowing sand. Other than that, the list (as far as I know) isn't a long one.

But many people want to try something different, and I always encourage that as long as they find out what pitfalls they're "stepping into."

I am occasionally asked about growing the paulownia or empress tree (*Paulownia tomentosa*). The answer: During a spring when they're beautiful (which will be often), they're going to be very beautiful. During a spring that's disastrous for them, you'll want to divert your eyes — it will be painful to look.

For those not familiar with the empress tree, let me say that in late spring the plant is a cloud of pale lilac flowers (the mature tree, anyway — they don't bloom much for the first few years).

These flowers are unusual for a tree outside the tropics in that they grow in spikes — the ap-



pearance is somewhat like a short spike of foxglove flowers. There are some pale yellow streaks in the throat.

The buds present the first chance for disaster, however. They form in the fall even though they don't open until late spring. Many familiar plants, such as lilacs, also have this trait, so it's nothing unusual. But in one of those quirks that constantly confront us in nature, the empress tree itself is cold-hardy to perhaps 20 below zero, while its buds are fairly sensitive to frost and sometimes will be damaged when we have a spring cold snap.

There is a white-flowered form called 'Georgia Princess,' but it is not being propagated commercially unless this is a very recent thing.

Another potential pitfall is that the tree has extremely large leaves (up to 10 inches long and very wide) — probably the biggest of any tree that will survive our winters. The overall appearance is similar to the more common catalpa. The leaves don't emerge early in spring, so they would usually escape the worst of our winds but there is still the potential (even in midsummer) for wind to shred them. This doesn't seem to hurt the tree, but can make it less attractive.

The other danger from wind is a function of the tree's rapid

growth. The branches are fairly brittle, as is usual with fast-growing trees, and a swirling wind can break them. Not a good idea to plant one where it will grow over a delicate gazebo or anything like that. The trees grow so fast that they quickly cover up any places where limbs break, but you need to be aware that there could be a falling branch and some pruning required where it broke.

Therefore, my advice is to plant paulownia trees where the display can be seen from a roadway but not so close that the wind-tattered foliage would be noticeable, and with as much shelter from the wind as you can give them.

They don't present many other problems — they are even drought-tolerant, which is very rare in a plant with big leaves.

They need a soil that is neutral (7.0) to acidic, so some gardeners around Portales and possibly even Muleshoe might need to make some soil modification each year. (Your county Extension office can arrange for a soil pH test.)

They generally grow into trees 30 to 50 feet tall, which is one reason the flowers are so spectacular. The growth is so rapid that if the tree does freeze back in the winter, it can be cut to the ground and grow back 8 to 10 feet in one season.

Despite its somewhat weedy growth, Britain's Royal Horticultural Society rates the empress tree as one of the extremely desirable plants in horticulture.

Michael A. Dirr, the renowned horticulturist at the University of Georgia, is less enthusiastic but says he is "always reluctant to

criticize the tree after seeing them in flower."

A related species is *Paulownia fargesii*, which is not as easily found at nurseries — partly because we live at the northern extreme of its hardiness range. It has a strange quirk of its own, however: Even though it is not hardy much below zero, the flower buds are not as easily damaged by frost as its better-known cousin. Therefore, the display of flowers is less likely to be damaged by late spring freezes.

The flowers are a somewhat darker violet color, and have streaks of dark purple in them.

This tree gets considerably taller than the empress tree — to 60 or 70 feet — so its display of flowers is a beacon from a considerable distance away.

In general, it is just as tough as its better-known relative.

The *Hillier Gardener's Guide to Trees and Shrubs* describes both species as "among the grandest of ornamental flowering trees."

Both species do need a fairly rich soil because of their rapid growth. Adding manure, compost and any type of organic matter is encouraged.

blacks, the odds are much higher — so high, in fact, that it is unlikely a donor can be found in time to save the patient's life.

For that reason and others, she said, she hopes that Muleshoe's sizable Hispanic population will turn out to register Wednesday.

All that is required is to allow the drawing of blood and the filling out of a form. The National Marrow Donor Program wants to register anyone between the ages of 18 and 60 who is in general good health.

"Most people that can give blood can become a donor," said Tammy Drees, coordinator of the Amarillo program. According to material pro-

vided by the program, it matches volunteer donors with transplant patients, arranges collection and transportation of stem cells, and manages support and research programs.

The same information

stresses again the importance of donors from ethnic minorities.

When a match is identified, that specific donor may be the only person who can save the life of the needy patient, according to the program.

Tickets (available from the chamber office or CraneFest members) are \$7 and (for children under the age of 10) \$3.

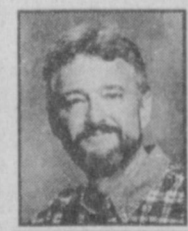

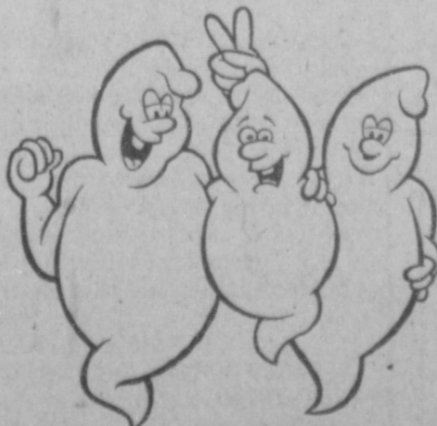
