

Council Hears Protest From Post Merchants

During a regularly scheduled meeting March 10, a representative of the Post Merchants Association presented reasons why the group feels a Hwy. 380 bypass around Main Street would be a mistake. Although several members of the merchant's group attended the meeting, Curtis Hudman addressed the council stating that the merchants "have really deep concerns about the bypass."

Hudman introduced Clark Self, a former businessman in Slaton, who then explained the problems created in that community because of a highway bypass to the west of Slaton. "A bypass in a small town has a negative impact no matter how you plan," Self said. "A bypass eliminates home owned merchants because

Hudman, who owns a furniture store on Main Street, continued his presentation by stating, "If you drop my sales by 20%, you're not going to drop your sales tax revenue by 20%. Taxes will drop 100% because you will get me below the level at which I can make a profit. I quit and those 5 jobs [at the furniture store] are gone. And they are gone for good." He suggested that the Council "fix the streets and deal with it. But don't deal with it by killing your downtown. Don't bypass it. Once it goes around it doesn't come back."

The Post businessman concluded by stating that he didn't want Post to have the problem of a vacant downtown that many area towns have. "We've been blessed with one heck of a loca-

A dozen men and women clad in traditional Native American dress perform the ceremony surrounded by authentic "teepee" structures. The clan includes members from Garza County, McLennan County, Tarrant County, and Lubbock County.

Legend holds that if the wind is out of the east or northeast, a very good year is ahead; north or northwest translates into a fair year; wind from the west or southwest indicates a poor year; and south or southeast predicts a bad year. During the past 30 years, the prediction of the Sunrise Wind ceremony has been 92% correct.

At the time that "Post City" was taking shape over one hundred years ago, early settlers who moved here found a wild and desolate area. These newcomers were not familiar with weather conditions and didn't know which crops would survive. The barren land had never been cultivated and the precious seeds that

Know Your Turkey Parts
By Russell A. Graves

A primer on snoods, dewlaps and other fleshy appendages

Ask any turkey hunter about the sport and they will wax eloquent. Turkey hunting fulfills many senses, from the tactile to the cerebral - it's a complete sport. Therefore, it's no wonder people are so crazy about chasing the big birds.

But how much do you know about turkeys? As you might expect, turkeys have many distinctive features that aren't found on other birds. Although females share some of the same components as their male companions, the male turkey, or tom, really puts on a show to highlight his features. Here's a rundown:

1. Spurs - Both sexes have spurs, although on females, the keratinized appendages are no more than small buttons protruding from the back of the leg a few inches above the foot. On males, spurs serve as a way to fend off other males when they spar for dominance when gathering a harem of hens. Spurs grow at

the rate of about 1/4 to 1/2 inch a year and usually top off at about an inch and a half at 4 years of age.

2. Fan - A turkey's fan is a prominent feature you'll see when a tom struts. Made up of 18 tail feathers 12 to 15 inches long, toms display the fans to attract females during the breeding season. In juvenile males (also known as jakes), the middle tail feathers are longer than the rest of the tail feathers, but adult males have tail feathers uniform

The tail feathers that make up the fan also aid in identifying the subspecies of turkey. On eastern wild turkeys, brown tips the tail feathers while the tips of Rio Grande turkeys' tails are buff-colored.

3. Beard - Hanging down anywhere from an inch to more than 10 inches from a tom's chest, the beard is

actually a modified feather, even though it appears to be part of the turkey's skin. The beard is coarse like a horse tail and grows three to five inches a year. A three-

year-old bird would possibly have a nine-inch beard, and beards over 11 inches are rare. 4. Snood - The snood is a fleshy appendage that attaches just above the beak. When the tom relaxes, the

snood is short — maybe half an inch long. When the tom struts, the snood engorges with blood and extends to hang down over the beak. According to the National Wild Turkey Federation, the snood has no known

5. Caruncles - On both the sexes, the caruncles are fleshy, bulbous bumps that grow over the head and neck. Even though they are less pronounced on females, the caruncles on a male turkey grow large and are especially pronounced on the lower portion of the neck. Usually pale in color, the caruncles engorge with blood and turn to bright red when the turkey struts or becomes aggressive.

6. Dewlap - Connecting the neck to the head just under the beak, the dewlap is present on both males and females but is more prominent on males. Like the caruncles and snood, the dewlap turns bright red when the tom gets excited.

7. Wing Feathers - When a turkey flies, the wing feathers push an enormous amount of air to lift the heavy birds. While strutting, the tom drags his wing feathers on the ground as he puffs out his breast feathers and fans his tail. Savvy turkey hunters can read the tracks and see the drag marks from where a turkey's been strutting and know if there are males in the area. When toms drag their wing feathers, the tips become worn and frayed.



Texas Drought Losses Approach \$1 Billion

state's ongoing drought has cost the state's farmers and ranchers nearly \$1 billion, and losses could continue to mount this spring if sufficient rainfall isn't received for forage or row crops, Texas AgriLife Extension Service economists report.

Rainfall this week over much of Texas was too little too late as ongoing drought has cost livestock producers \$569 million since November. Cattle producers have spent substantial amounts on hay and supplemental feed, according to agriculture officials, and the drought losses also include failed wheat crops usually used for grazing.

When totaling losses already sustained since November, AgriLife Extension economists said the ongoing drought has cost Texas \$829 million to date. Those losses will likely surpass the \$1 billion mark in the next 60 days as livestock producers continue to make supplemental feed purchases or sell cattle and calves in a declining market, said Dr. David Anderson, AgriLife Extension livestock marketing economist.

"The lack of rain has reduced grazing production, resulting in less forage available and lost income from grazing," Anderson said.

"Texas is the largest beef cow producing state in the United States with more than five million head. More than 60 percent of the state's beef cows are located in counties categorized as being in severe to exceptional drought.

"The effects of drought on livestock go well beyond the immediate year. Drought results in reduced conception rates and calf crops the next year. The lack of feed results in lower cattle sale weights. Range and pasture recovery from drought can take multiple years and can result in reduced stocking rates while ranges recover."

Dry conditions across the state began in 2008 and have continued into early spring. Late rains that came in August of last year were too late for crop farmers, but did "grant a reprieve for ranchers in some parts of Texas," said Dr. Mark Welch, AgriLife Extension small grains specialist.

"That reprieve was shortlived as dry weather returned and has remained throughout winter," he said.

Last fall, Texas farmers planted 5.9 million acres of winter wheat. Over the course

COLLEGE STATION - The of the winter, the condition of that wheat crop has deteriorated, Welch said. According to the Texas Department of Agriculture, about two-thirds of the Texas wheat crop is rated as being in "very poor" to "poor condition."

"These are the worst wheat

drought of 2006 - a year when only 25 percent of planted wheat acres were harvested and the yield on those acres averaged 24 bushels," Welch said. "The longterm average wheat yield in Texas is 30 bushels per acre."

Meanwhile, Texas' crop condition ratings since the planting continues to be bleak due a year ago.


