

Accounding to the Bicycle Manufacturers Association, there are more than 400,000 bicycle-related accidents requiring emergency room treatment every year. Of these, 40,000 are serious injuries. Also, in 1975, there were 1,000 deaths resulting from pedalcycle-motor vehicle collisions. Of these, 600 happened in urban areas and 400 happened in rural areas.


