Bike Safety Program Slated On Saturday

The Bovina Jaycees will be holding a Bike Safety program this Saturday, May 26. The program will be held at the St. Ann's Catholic Church parking lot at 2 p.m.

The program will include a skill rodeo course, bike safety inspection, and safe riding course.

Accounting to the Bicycle Manufacturers Association, there are more than 400,000 bicycle-related accidents requiring emergency room treatment every year. Of these, 40,000 are serious injuries. Also, in 1975, there were 1,000 deaths resulting from pedalcycle-motor vehicle collisions. Of these, 600 happened in urban areas and 400 happened in rural areas.

Nearly 80 percent of Bicycle-Motor vehicle accidents stem directly from unsafe behavior of the bicyclists. Ninety-two percent of the bicyclists under the age of 12 were found to be responsible for such collisions. The Jaycees hope that the parents

and kids will support this program by attending. Maybe we can prevent another tragedy from happening. Entry blanks are included in this issue and parents will be required to sign the form before their child can participate.

TROPICAL ICE CREAM PIE

- One 9-inch pie
- 2/3 cup coconut bar cookie crumbs
- 2 tablespoons melted butter
- 15 to 16 coconut bar cookies
- 1/2 cup broken pecans
- 1/2 cup caramel OR butterscotch ice cream topping
- 1 can (8 1/4 oz.) crushed pineapple, drained
- 3 pints vanilla ice cream

Combine cookie crumbs and butter. Press mixture evenly over bottom of buttered 9-inch pie plate. Stand whole cookies upright around edge. (Cookies may have to be trimmed if too long). Chill. Combine pecans and ice cream topping. Chill. Spoon 1 pint ice cream into cookie shell. Top with 1/2 ice cream sauce, then 1/2 crushed pineapple. Add additional 1 pint ice cream, then remaining sauce and pineapple. Top with remain-

General installed its one millionth telephone in May 1973 at Texas A&M University. The one million milestone was reached after almost 47 years of operation, the company being incorporated in June 1926.

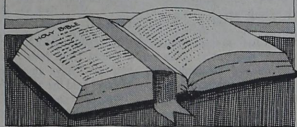
THEREFORE, I, as Governor of Texas, do hereby designate the month of May, 1979, as

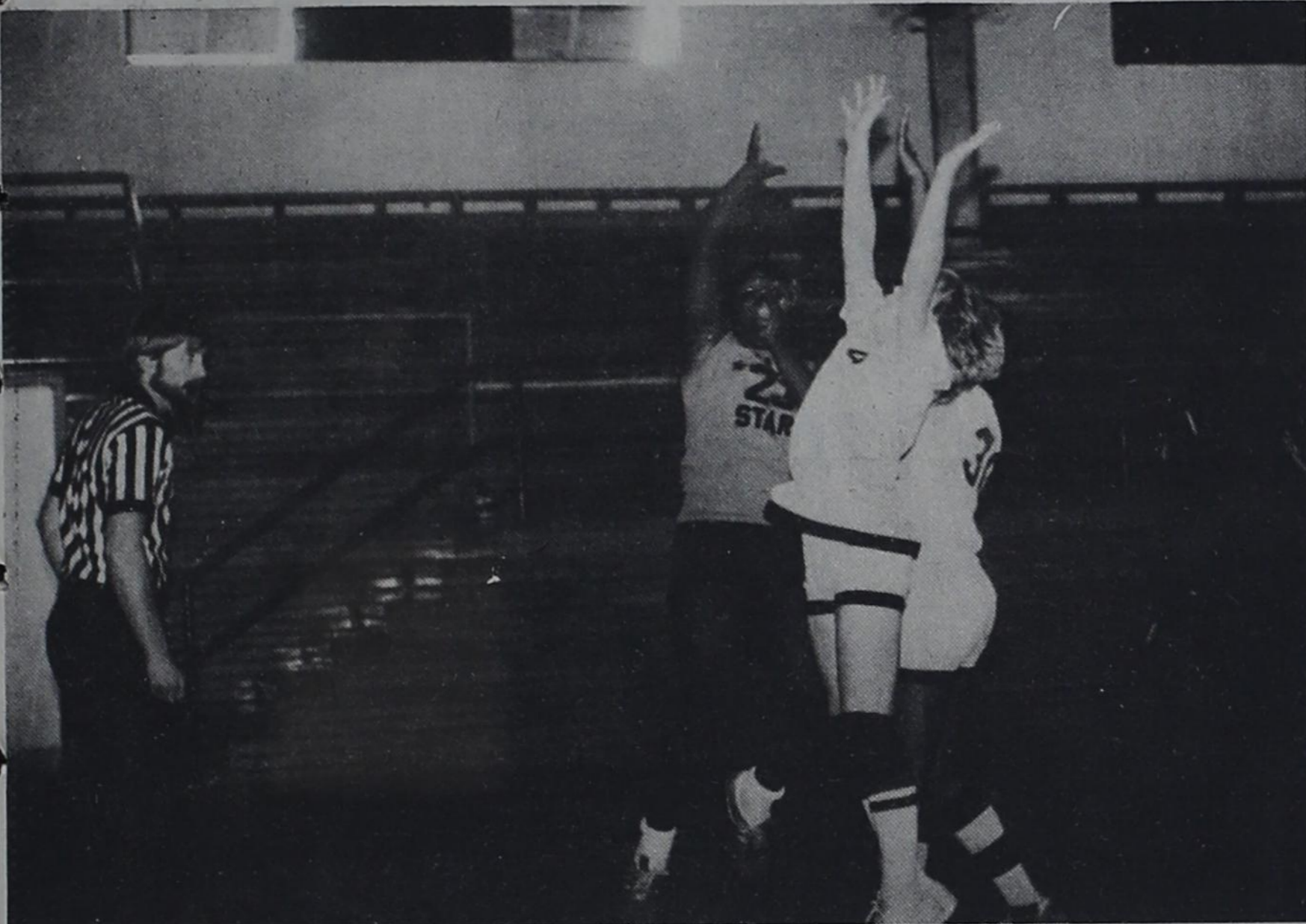
