USDA announces Intent to Conduct General CRP Signup In 2010
Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack announced that USDA has approved an
additional 300,000 additional 300,000 acres for conserva-
tion projects under the Conservation tion projects under the Conservation
Reserve Program (CRP). These additional areas include 150,000 acres for the State Acres for Wildilife Enhancement (SAFE) Initiative; 50,000 acres for the Duck Nesting Habitat Initiative; and 100,000 acres for the Habitat Buffers for Upland Birds Initiative. Vilsack made
this announcement at the Pheasant Fest this announceme
"Increasing acreage caps to meet the demand for these critical programs will help us do more for wildlife on the same number of acres," said Vilsack. "This is part of our efforts to target conservation to give the American taxpayer more bang for the buck in terms of improved water
and air quality, reduced erosion, and benefits to the climate.'

Secretary Vilsack also announced that USDA would conduct a general CRP signup later this year, with program details and the specific signup start date to be announced upon completion of a Environmental Impact Statement.

Currently USDA's SAFE portfolio inludes 75 approved projects in 22 states covering up to 500,000 acres. With these

The initiative also benefits other wildlife species, filters runoff, recharges groundwater supplies, protects

## Garza County Underground Water Conservation District News

The annual check of the water level in irrigation wells has been performed. There have been 24 wells checked in January and February, 2010, all of which were also checked in 2009.

Most of the wells checked in 2010 showed a decline in the water level, ranging from 6 inches to 36 inches. Four wells showed a rise in the water level of 6 inches. The average decline of the 24 wells checked was 2.4 feet.
