With a rush to meet the March 8 filing deadline City Council candidates will give voters some new choices. None of the 3 City Council incumbents filed for re-election: Ward 3, Tommy Basquez; Ward 4, James Eastering and Ward 5, Rodney Tidwell. The lone candidate, Ward 3, for the May election, is Les Looney. Ward 4 candidates are O. L. (Ferg) Ferguson and Mark Short. Brant Guthrie, Terri Morris and Anita Morris are candidates for Ward 5.

In the Post ISD School election, Drew Board Kirkpatrick added his name to the ballot, giving voters 4 candidates to choose from for two at-large positions. Theresa Doggett, Robbie Williams and incumbent Diann Windham are also candidates. Billy Max Gordon did not file for re-election to

All of the incumbent members of the Garza County Health Care District board for the 3 open positions filed for re-election and with no one challenging them, an election will not be necessary. The Garza County UWCD is in the same situation with incumbent directors Dicky Wallace, Pct. 2; John Boren, Pct. 4 and Ronald Thuett, At-Large being unopposed.

Early voting for the city and school elections begins April 26; Election Day is May 8. City early voting will be held at City Hall, April 26 through May 4, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Extended early voting for the City election will be on Monday, April 26 and Monday, May 3, 7 a.m. to 7

County primary run-off election set; tax abatement decision postponed

Garza County Commissioners Court met in a regular meeting March 8. Commissioners in attendance were: Gary McDaniel, Pct. 1; Charles Morris, Pct. Courtesy photo 2 and Ted Brannon, Pct. 3. Mike Sanchez, Pct. 4 was not present.

The Commissioners also heard an election report from Clerk Jim Plummer. He informed the court that a primary run-off election will be held on April 13, 2010 with early voting set for April 5-9, 2010. There are two run-off races: Democratic Party County Commissioner Precinct 4 and Republican Party, Justice, Supreme Court, Place 3. Early Voting will be held at the courthouse and there will be two polling places on Election Day: Voting Precincts 4 (Wells Fargo) and 6 [Justiceburg (LAH) Firehouse].

Plummer also reported that the total voter turnout for the joint primary election was 705, or 24% of the registered voters. Of those 173 voted in the Democratic Primary and 532 in the Republican Primary. Those figures are down from the 2006 Gubernatorial Primary Election: 811 total voters, 51 Democrats and 760 Republican.

The Court considered an application for a tax abatement for the Red Hollow Wind Energy project and accepted the application as presented. Tax abatement issues for the wind energy proj- Machinery bid. ect were discussed. Randy

Sowell of Freemantle Energy, developer of the Red Hollow project, explained that the project will be done in two phases: Phase 1 would include a minimum of 15 to 20 megawatts or about 10 wind turbines and Phase 2 would include 15 to 80 megawatts. Therefore, Freemantle suggests two separate abatement agreements with identical terms except for the size of the projects (phases).

Judge Norman explained that the court would better serve the needs of those involved in this project if it could seek help with the understanding of the entire abatement process. Commissioners agreed and voted to table this agenda item. As a result of this decision, no action was taken on the discussion of the proposed abatement.

Mike Burke appeared before the court regarding the Lake Alan Henry RV Resort plat. Burke presented the court a survey of the plat of a portion of the original town site of Burnham and his plans for the RV resort. Judge Norman said that the re-zoning of the property from residential to commercial was approved by the LAH zoning

Two sealed bids for a used maintainer for Precinct e were opened at the Commissioners meeting: Warren Cat for \$177,240 (after trade-in) and Yellowhouse Machinery for \$121,000 (after tradein). Commissioners voted to accept the Yellowhouse


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
Varsity Softball Brings Home Trophy

The Post Lady Lopes welcome an impressive list of softball teams from around the region to play this Thursday through Saturday at the David Nichols Park ball fields.


Post threw the first pitch Thursday morning to the Brownfield JV team.

It was a great tune-up for us for the upcoming district schedule." The Lopes took a 3-3-2 record into District 3-2A play this past Tuesday against Idalou at home.

Last Saturday the boys shut out Olton, 14-0 on ten hits in their fourth and last game of the tournament. Pitcher Dale Diaz (1-0) got his first win of the season with the help of John Bocko and Chess Postell from the mound. The Lopes exploded for 10 runs in the bottom of the first and never looked back. Post crossed the plate four more times in the second inning. M.J. Wynne hit for a double and a triple, Clint Windham a home run and Diaz and Chase Greathouse hit a double each to aide in the win.

Post opened up the three day event against Tulia last Thursday with a 6-2 loss to the Hornets. Tulia shocked the Lopes in the first and fourth innings scoring two and four runs respectively. The Lopes suffered five defensive errors and were sluggish at the plate with fives hits including doubles from Ernie Saldivar and Jacob Perez. The Tulia game ended after five innings due to the time limit.

In the second game, Post scored first in the top of the third with one run against the New Deal Lions who responded with three of their own. Lope senior pitcher Clint Windham (1-1) struck out six batters in five innings. Post had a 4-3 lead going into the bottom of the fifth inning when the Lions scored three runs to go ahead 6-4. The Lopes scored one more in the sixth but was not enough and the game ended due to the time limit. Saldivar and Perez again doubled-up at the plate for a double



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GOP: 'Contractually-Bound?'

Seeking to capitalize on the righteous indignation voters are feeling toward President Barack Obama and his Congressional allies, a group of Republican politicians is dusting off an old playbook.

Led by former GOP Speaker Newt Gingrich - Washington's preeminent "Reformer in Name Only" – this group's plan is to bring back the "Contract with America," the 1994 policy platform that helped propel Republicans to majorities in both the U.S. House and Senate in 1995. In unveiling his first draft of such a document, Gingrich spoke of "the clarity, the positive focus, and the election results of the 1994 contract."

He obviously wasn't able to speak about the post-election results of the contract, because those are frankly few and far incidentally. between.

Nonetheless a second contract, according to Gingrich, "would be a powerful unifier for all those who are tired of the corruption and waste of Washington and the alien views of the secular-socialist coalition seeking to radically change America."

Well, well. That's tough talk - but once again, it's all pre-election. And while Republicans are great at campaigning on limited government talking points, they've proven positively awful when it comes to governing according to those principles.

After all, the "corruption and waste of Washington" didn't stop when Gingrich and his Republican Revolutionists rode into town, far from it in fact. And as for the "secularsocialist coalition," didn't Gingrich recently endorse a secular socialist (over a limited government Conservative Party candidate) in a New York Congressional race?

"Fool me once, shame on you. Fool me twice, shame on me."

That should be America's response to a "second contract."

Gingrich's 1994 plan was actually dead before arrival, meaning that the Speaker and his committee chairmen broke their balanced budget promises early on in their D.C. first appropriations process — literally days after arriving in the capital.

"We got our people into leadership," the late Paul Weyrich, a long-time Gingrich ally, complained in 1996, "but we are not getting different policies."

Indeed the signature "accomplishments" of the Republican Revolution were partisan distractions — a politically-motivated government shutdown

and the impeachment of President Bill Clinton. And of course after Clinton came the big government era of "Bush Republicanism," which has been an unmitigated fiscal disaster.

Also, remember how the Gingrich contract was going to replace career politicians with

"citizen legislators?" Well more than a decade-and-a-half later, there are still nearly two dozen Republican members of the class of '94 serving in the U.S. House. Six others have gone on to become U.S. Senators, including Sen. Lindsey Graham of South Carolina, a staunch supporter of Obama's "cap and trade" energy

Gingrich's "second contract" doesn't mention a word about term limits,

"The Republicans have stopped being reformers," former congressman John Kasich lamented shortly after the GOP was routed from power in 2006. "They're practicing politics as usual."

"We had succumbed to the temptation of things that we had criticized the Democrats for," U.S. Rep. Dan Lungren added.

Indeed, Democrats won control of Congress in 2006 by pledging to restore fiscal sanity in light of Republican budget excesses - and Obama won the presidency in 2008 by promising tax cuts to the middle class. Clearly, these "bread and circus" centrist diversions (neither of which the Democrats were ever serious about implementing) masked a sinister socialist agenda, but should Republicans be the ones we trust to make a course correction? And more importantly, can America afford the consequences of another

aborted "Republican" revolution? Much more promising a reform effort than Gingrich's top-down contract, in my opinion, is a grassroots movement by tea party activists to create a Contract From America - a document springing up in cities and towns across America rather than originating from the corrupt centers of power in Washington,

Or for that matter the Mount Vernon Statement, which challenges candidates to pledge their allegiance to the fundamental foundations of Constitutional governance.

Ultimately, though, Republicans and Democrats alike will be judged not by their promises but by their votes - which will either protect taxpayers and promote their liberties or continue down the same bipartisan path of excess and interventionism.





Democratic Party: County Commissioner, Precinct 4 -Jerry Benham and Mike Sanchez.




March 2, 2010 Primary Elections Voter Turnout






