## School Funding Lost Due To Senate Changes

Bovina Independent School District (BISD) will lose \$319,000 for the 1993-94 school year as a result of education funding changes created by Senate Bill 7 (SB7).

Senate Bill 7, passed June 1, is designed to equalize the funding between the wealthier and the poorer school districts, but the truth is many poorer school districts will lose money, according to figures supplied by the Equity Center in Austin.

Early predictions showed that Bovina would have to increase its

property tax rates from the current \$.97 per \$100 to \$1.19 in order to recover the lost funds. According to Tommy Cathey, Bovina ISD superintendent, several different measures may be taken to soften the effects of SB7.

In one attempt to soften the blow, Cathey has appealed to the Texas Education Agency to dispute the number of students used to determine state funding, in hopes to recover nearly \$100,000. He said it would be another month before he would know how the appeal will turn out.

For now, he explained that the district is looking into several other options they will have to face. The district may have to rely on a small tax rate increase and cuts in the proposed 1993-94 budget to operate, Cathey explained.

Another option is using money from the reserve fund, which is a fund for emergencies or projects, such as the new rooms added at the high school. It isn't a renewable source of income. "We're not in good shape," Cathey explained.

He explained that he feels that SB7 will only be around for the 1993-94 school year, due to the

number of lawsuits which have been filed. He believes that the legislators will have to go back to work to find another way to fund the educational system.

Cathey is not alone in his beliefs. SB7 is the fifth school finance overhaul in nine years and according to the Equity Center's news release in June, many school districts have filed suit to block the implementation of SB7 before the new school year. But, "District Judge Scott McCown refused to grant the request for an early hearing, indicating that he would probably not hold one until the early fall."

They are suing because of the gulf SB7 creates between the poorer and wealthier school districts. "The redistribution of funding contained within SB7 defers far into the future

any hope of equity for these students (in poorer school districts) while simultaneously guaranteeing that their districts cannot get there without imposing disastrous tax increases upon their residents," from the Plaintiff-Intervenors, a legal group working against SB7 in the legal system.

## Local Boy Competes in Nationals

He has been competing in junior high contests and attending Don Hood's summer camps. Hood has coached many olympic competitors and according to Pam, was a big motivator in his life.

They learned of the USA Track and Field organization through F.H.S. athletic director, Frank Belcher. The organization sponsors contests for children of all ages, from primary age group through high school age groups.

The Kendricks found out about the qualifying meet and Andy and his father, Danny, began extensive practice, which they continue now in preparation of the national contest. According to Pam, they practice at the high school every day for a few hours around lunch time.

"He feels very confident...and excited," Pam said. The family is planning to take their vacation to be with Andy when he competes. Also, Pam explained, that both sets of grandparents are planning to go with them.

Andy's future plans includes continuing pole vaulting in high school and with USA Track and Field.

## Post Office Sustains Break-In, Vandalism

The Bovina Post Office was closed most of the day Monday, July 19, because of a break-in.

According to Leon Saddler, Bovina Police Chief, someone or several individuals busted a glass door leading from the lobby of the post office into the business office, sometime after 1 a.m. Monday morning.

Once inside the work area, the burglars vandalized the work area, according to Sam Proce, US Postal Inspector from Lubbock, some items were taken, but the postal officials didn't wish to list them.

Officials are encouraging anyone with information on the crime to call any area law enforcement agency.

There is a \$5000 reward for the information that leads "to the arrest and/or conviction of the individual or individuals responsible," as written in the news release.

Postmaster Laura Bartlett said that this was the first time that the Bovina Post Office had been broken into. She added that some vandalism was done to the lobby over the years, but it was the first time that anyone gained access to the work area.

"I've heard of post offices getting broken into, but this is the first time it's happened to me," Bartlett said.

## Area Blessed With Additional Rains

The Bovina area enjoyed a second round of rains during the past week, with farmers receiving from an inch to three inches of rainfall in addition to what they had received the previous week.

Official measurement in Bovina was 1.48 inches this week. Added to the .68 inches received on July 13-14, that makes 2.16 inches for the month, making July easily the year's wettest month, moisture-wise.

Parts of the county received considerably more moisture than was logged in town this week. It was reported that Les McCain measured 3.35 inches Monday evening through Tuesday, and that it was all good rain, for the most part.

County Extension Agent for Agriculture, Gary Patterson, said that up to three inches of rain was received this week in the Farwell area, and Lazbuddie caught from an inch to an inch and one-half.

"The rain has sure helped everything. The corn was getting behind schedule, and it (the rain) was just what it needed," the county agent added. Patterson noted that the hot temperatures this summer have been great for the county's cotton crop. "It looks extremely good, especially compared to last year," he said. The cotton is fruiting, and there again, the moisture should help the cotton put on more fruit.

Patterson said the county lost a minimal amount of acres to the weather, and there should be between 50,000 and 60,000 acres of cotton in Parmer County this year.

The expected near crop failure, due to the flooding in the Midwest and the drought in the Southeast should result in overall higher prices for area farmers, especially for corn.

Tom said that if they don't sell the Yankee Cafe, his brother-in-law may come to Bovina to manage it for him. "We're going to try to keep it open," Tom said.



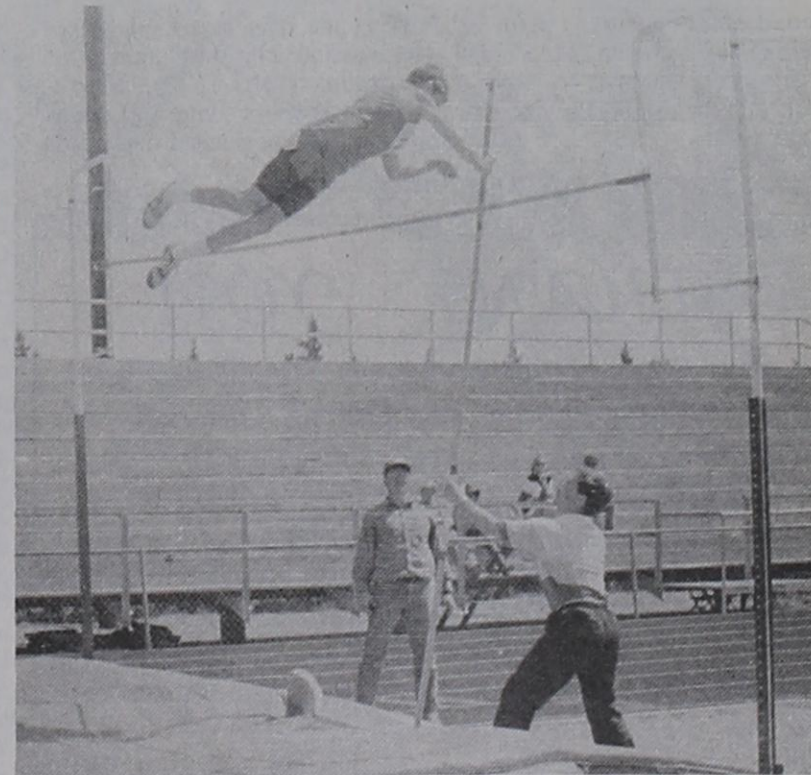

## Looking Up!

 The Bible literally pulsates with vibrant stories and great spiritual truths, a veritable one volume library full of wisdom, adventure and intrigue! The Bible is still the largest seller by volume on the book market today, and has been for most of this century.  
 Written by some forty different authors over a period of 1600 years, the Bible's first writer and editor was Moses who lived c1500 years B.C. Its last author, the Apostle John, one of the original twelve disciples of Jesus, wrote the Revelation about 100 A.D. The Scriptures themselves tell of historical events and future happenings over the total span of history from The Creation to the Consummation, from The Beginning to Eternity. Christians believe the Bible has God for its

ultimate Author, and the men who wrote and recorded the historical events, human stories, and spiritual truths therein were guided and inspired by the Holy Spirit (see 2 Peter 1:21).  
 As a one volume anthology of Divine revelation, the Bible consists of 66 individual books, 39 in the Old Testament and 27 in the New Testament. (Roman Catholics also include the Apocrypha.) The King James version of 1611 is still the most often purchased Bible, although the New International Version will probably supercede it in popularity in the near future. Although the old KJV is written in Elizabethan English, it is still revered for its dignity and beauty of language, although the newer versions are probably easier to read and understand for most folk.  
 You might be interested to know that the chapter divisions to the Bible are not in the ancient Hebrew and Greek manuscripts but were added by Stephen Langton about 1228 A.D., and the scriptures were not divided into verses until the 1400s and 1500s. It was Bishop Ussher who added dates to the margins of the KJV in 1701, based on his historical chronology which placed the Creation account of Genesis in the year B.C. 4004.  
 The Bible contains some of the world's greatest literary masterpieces in both poetry and prose, such as The Creation story and The Fall of Man of Genesis 1-3, the Twenty-Third Psalm and the Love chapter (I Corinthians 13), just to name a few. They are, along with numerous other biblical passages, unequalled in quality of style, depth of meaning and inspirational content!  
 Even William Shakespeare greatly revered the Bible. The story goes that Shakespeare wanted his name included in the Bible, so during the time that King James commissioned his translation of the Scripture (1607-1610), Shakespeare, who was living in London at that time, persuaded one of the

biblical translators who was working on the Psalms, to include his mark. This supposed signature of Shakespeare is found in Psalm 46, which corresponded with Shakespeare's age in 1610 (he was born in 1564). If you count from the beginning of the 46th Psalm to the 46th word, you come to the word "shake" in the third verse. Similarly, if you count backward 46 words from the end of the psalm you have "spear" in verse nine. Thus, "Shakespeare" at age 46 in Psalm 46!  
 Although the above story about Shakespeare is probably more coincidence and conjecture than truth, the Bible itself contains some of the most classic and true stories of all time. Such adventures as Adam and Eve, Noah and the Flood, Moses and the Burning Bush, Joshua and the Battle of Jericho, David versus Goliath, Jonah and the Big Fish, Daniel in the Lion's Den, the Birth of Jesus in Bethlehem, the Prodigal Son, the Good Samaritan, the Crucifixion and Resurrection of Jesus, etc., have intrigued folks for centuries. They make interesting bedtime stories for boys and girls, great lessons in leadership and faith for youth, and practical Bible studies for adults. The Scriptures give us the foundational truths for faith.  
 If you have not read them recently or ever, why not make a point to read one of them a day for the rest of the summer. And be sure to attend your Sunday School or Bible study at your church. You'll be surprised anew how wonderful and meaningful God's word is!

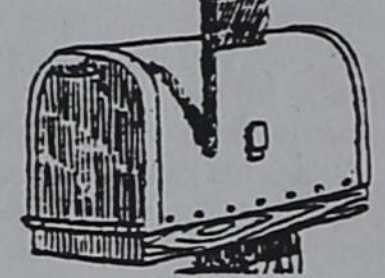

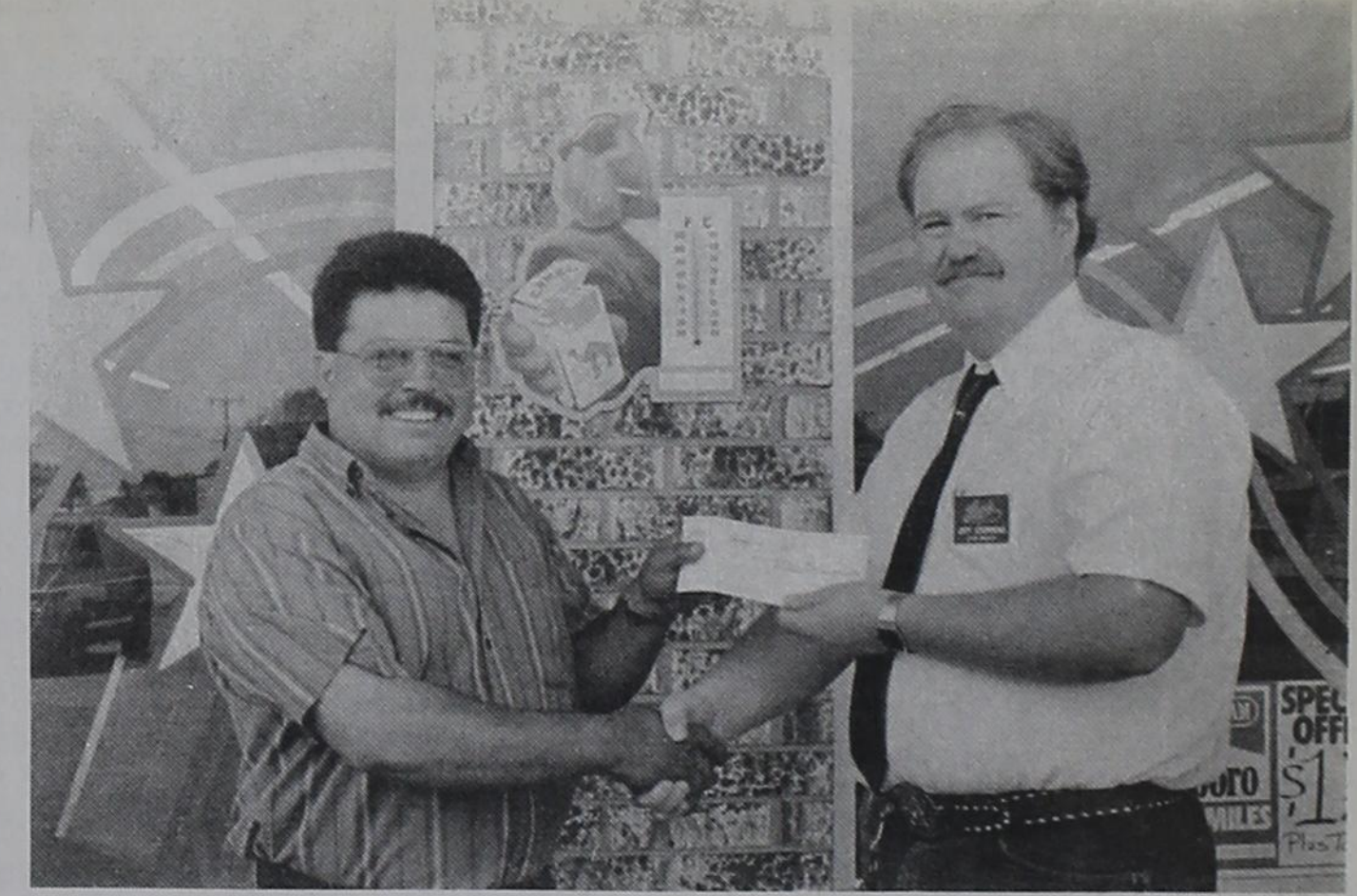

# Cast Iron Cookware Can Last Through Generations

Several years ago, my husband called me while visiting his hometown, Houston, to let me know he was bringing me a surprise.

Even with the warning, I was not prepared for the large and extremely heavy box that came down the luggage chute at the airport.

He brought me a big box of old cast iron skillets that had been his grandmother's. The collection included a round griddle, two mini-skillets, two regular-sized skillets and a chicken fryer.

The cast iron was coated with black, baked on grease and some pieces were rusted. Having grown up in the non-stick coating era, I didn't know where to begin in making the cookware usable.

I sought advice and received plenty of it. Several people told me to place the cast iron pieces directly in the flames of a campfire. When the fire has burned out and the cast iron is cooled, the pieces should be cleaned and seasoned.

Some people recommended putting the cast iron in the oven on the self-cleaning cycle. A few suggested that I take the skillets down to a radiator shop and have them dipped in acid. (That method is not considered safe by food safety experts.)

The method that Tony and I chose was good old-fashioned elbow grease. We bought a wire brush with a metal scraper on the end and wore it out on the griddle. It took several days of both of us scraping and scrubbing to clean off the years of built up grease.

But, it was worth the effort. After being seasoned, the griddle now has a non-stick surface that is

easy to clean and cooks pancakes almost as good as Tony remembers his grandmother making. The griddle shows no signs of wearing out and probably will last another lifetime.

To season cast iron cookware, coat the piece inside and out with unsalted grease--unsalted pork fat, shortening, oil, etc. Place the greased item in an oven at about 300 to 350 degrees. Leave the cast iron in the oven for one to two hours, swabbing the inside from time to time with a paper towel to re-distribute the grease.

Remove the cast iron from the oven and allow the cookware to cool. When the piece has cooled, wipe out the excess grease.

With careful use and cleaning, cast iron can last for many years. I usually wipe out the griddle with a clean towel, wash it to remove any baked on food particles and dry it thoroughly to prevent possible rusting. If necessary, I apply a thin coat of oil to the griddle before storing it. The seasoning process can be repeated from time to time if needed.

To get the most from your cast iron cookware, keep the following tips in mind:

\*Do not pour cold water into a hot, dry skillet; the cast iron can crack.

\*Similarly, cast iron can crack when dropped on a hard surface.

\*Store in a dry place with lids or tops off.

\*Thoroughly dry each piece before storing.

New cast iron cookware also needs to be cleaned and seasoned before being used. New cast iron comes from the factory with a coating that needs to be removed with soap and water before the

cookware is used. After cleaning, season the piece as described above. Here are a few recipes that are perfect for cast iron skillets, griddles and chicken fryers.

## CRISPY FRIED CHICKEN

2-1/2 to 3 pound chicken, cut up  
1 cup buttermilk  
1 cup all-purpose flour  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/4 teaspoon black pepper  
1/4 teaspoon garlic powder  
1/2 teaspoon paprika  
Vegetable oil for frying

Rinse the chicken pieces and pat dry with paper towels. Put the chicken in a dish or pan; pour buttermilk over chicken. Turn chicken to coat well; cover and refrigerate for 30 minutes to 12 hours, turning two or three times. (Note: do not soak the liver and gizzard in the buttermilk.) Put the flour, salt, pepper, garlic powder and paprika in a plastic or paper bag; close the bag and shake to mix. Remove the chicken from the refrigerator; turn over in the buttermilk to coat once again. Remove one or two pieces at a time and let the excess milk drip off. Drop the chicken pieces into the bag and shake to coat the chicken. Pour oil into a large, heavy skillet to measure 1/2-inch deep. Heat the oil over medium high heat for 4 to 5 minutes. Using tongs, put the coated chicken into the oil. Reduce the heat to medium and cook for 20 minutes. Adjust heat to keep oil bubbling around chicken, but not browning the chicken too fast. Cook the liver, gizzard and bony pieces of chicken for 15 minutes. Makes 4 to 5 servings.

## PANCAKES

1 cup all-purpose flour  
1 tablespoon sugar  
2 teaspoons baking powder  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1 egg, well beaten  
1 cup milk  
2 tablespoons vegetable oil

In a medium-sized bowl, mix together the flour, sugar, baking powder and salt. In another mixing bowl, combine the egg, milk and oil. Add the milk mixture to the flour mixture all at once. Stir the mixture just until blended; the mixture should be slightly lumpy. Pour 1/4 cup batter onto a lightly greased hot griddle or skillet. Flip the pancakes when they are golden brown on the bottom and bubbly on the top with slightly dry edges. Makes 8 to 10 pancakes.

## GRILLED CHEESE SANDWICHES

8 slices white or wheat bread  
1/4 cup butter or margarine, melted  
16 slices cheese, American or Colby Jack

Brush one side of one piece of bread with melted butter. Place the bread, buttered side down, on a hot griddle; top with two pieces of cheese. Butter another piece of bread and place it on top of the cheese, buttered side up. Cook until the bottom slice of bread is slightly browned and the cheese is beginning to melt; flip and brown the other side of the sandwich. Repeat with the remaining bread and cheese. Makes 4 sandwiches.

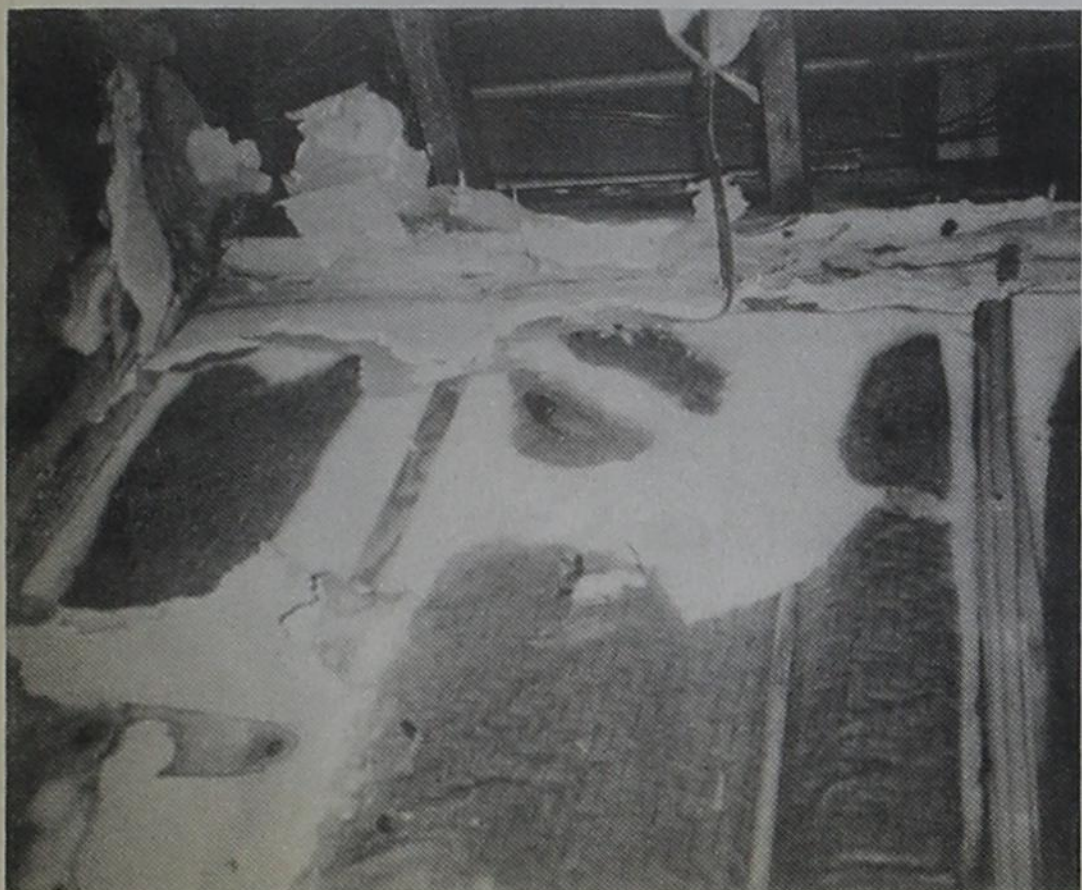

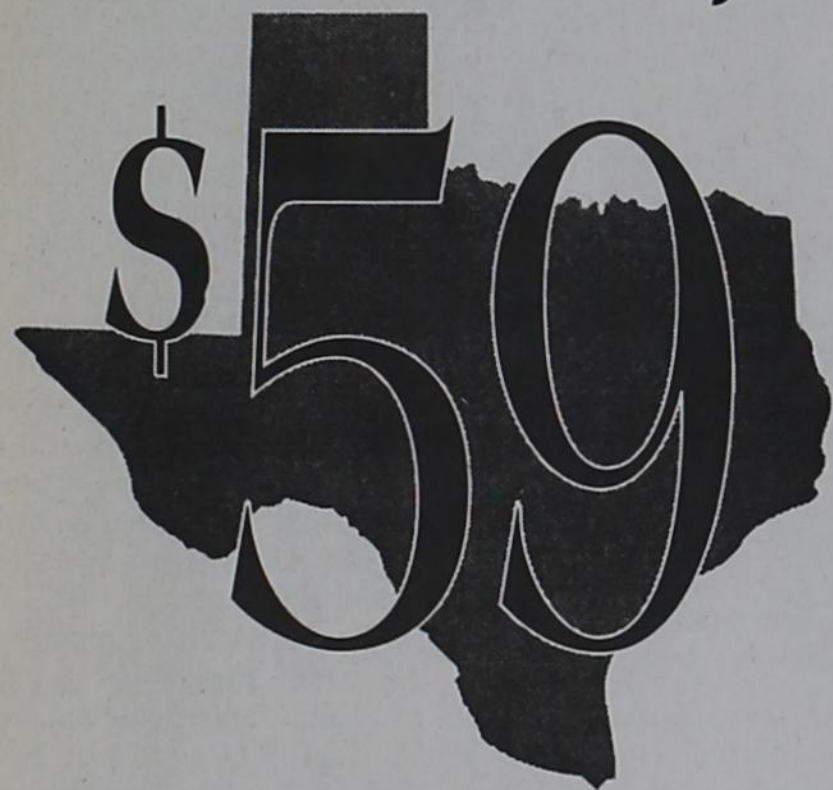
