Run-off election voting starts Monday

Early voting begins Monday, April 5 in the run-off elections for the Democratic and Republican parties. "Both ballots are short with one race each," said District and County Clerk, Jim Plummer. Early voting will continue through April 9.

All early voting is at the county courthouse, 300 W. Main St. in Post.

The political race getting the most attention of Garza County voters is the runoff for the Democratic nomination for

Below is an explanation of this process for the run-off election:

You can only vote in the Democratic run-off election if you live in Commissioner Precinct 4. Precinct 4 includes voting boxes 4 and 6. If you are unsure whether you live in Commissioner Precinct 4, check your voter registration card in the "COMM" box on the upper right side of your card.

There are two candidates for the Democratic County Commissioner Precinct 4 run-off election: Jerry your voting box is 4. Benham and Mike Sanchez.

Early voting for the run-off election for both the Democratic Commissioner's run-off and the Republican State Justice, Supreme Court run-off will be at the Garza County Courthouse, first floor. You can vote early between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. Monday, April 5 through Friday, April 9.

Election Day for these run-off elections is Tuesday, April 13. On that day you can vote at Wells Fargo Bank if you are voting in the Democratic Commissioner's run-off election and 18.64



County Commissioner, Precinct 4. The winner of that race will face Republican Harry Record in the November General Election.

The March primary sported three challengers to incumbent Mike Sanchez. Candidate Jerry Benham ended up with the most votes but not enough to claim the nomination. Sanchez had the second most votes. According the Texas Election Code, in a primary a candidate must receive a majority of the vote, or 50.01%. Benham picked up 36.3% and Sanchez 28.3% of the votes in the first primary.

The Republican Party will also hold a run-off for a statewide race for Justice, Supreme Court, Place 3 between Debra Lehrinann and Rick Green.

inquired about which ballot they can cast.

Whoever wins this run-off election will be on the ballot as the Democratic candidate for Commissioner Precinct 4 against the Republican candidate, Harry Record in November.

If you didn't vote in the March primary, you can vote in either the Democratic run-off for County Commissioner Precinct 4, or, you can vote in the Republican run-off for State Justice, Supreme Court, Place 3. You cannot vote in both.

If you voted in the primary election held March 2, you can only vote in the same party run-off election. For example, if you voted a Republican ballot in the primary election, you cannot vote in the Democratic Commissioner's run-Plummer said that some voters have off. You can only vote in the Republican run-off for State Justice, Supreme Court.

You will also vote at Wells Fargo Bank if you are voting in the Republican State Justice, Supreme Court run-off and your voting box is 1, 2, 3, 4 or 5. Your voting box is indicated in the "Prec. No." just above your name and address on the left







Weekly Inspirations

"33 At the sixth hour darkness came over the whole land until the ninth hour. 34 And at the ninth hour Jesus cried out in a loud voice, "Eloi, Eloi, lama sabachthani?" - which means, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" NIV Mark 15:33-34

As we approach this Sunday, the Sunday set aside for all Christians to celebrate the Resurrection of Jesus from the grave, I can't help but smile a little more than usual. Christmas is a wonderful time of the year when we celebrate Christ's birth, but Easter is the day in which we remember that not only was He crucified for our sins, but that He arose and defeated death, that old enemy of all. And because He arose, those in Christ are assured resurrection as well.

Mark Chapter 15 recounts the Crucifixion of our Lord, "21A certain man from Cyrene, Simon, the father of Alexander and Rufus, was pass-

ing by on his way in from the country, and they forced him to carry the cross. 22They brought Jesus to the place called Golgotha (which means The Place of the Skull). 23Then they offered him wine mixed with myrrh, but he did not take it. 24And they crucified him. Dividing up his clothes, they cast lots to see what each would get." NIV And then as Paul Harvey would say, "The Rest of The Story" in Chapter 16, "1When the Sabbath was over, Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James, and Salome bought spices so that they might go to anoint Jesus' body. 2Very early on the first day of the week, just after sunrise, they were on their way to the tomb 3and they asked each other, "Who will roll the stone away from the entrance of the tomb?" 4But when they looked up, they saw that the stone, which was very large, had been rolled away. 5As they entered the tomb, they saw a young man dressed in a white robe sitting on the right side, and they were alarmed .6"Don't be alarmed," he said. "You are looking for Jesus the Nazarene, who was crucified. He has risen! He is not here. See the place where they laid him. 7But go, tell his disciples and Peter, 'He is going ahead of you into Galilee. There you will see him, just as he told you." NIV And, wonderfully, this horrible story when we began in Chapter 15:33-34, now through God's plan and ultimate timing becomes one of triumph.

Have you ever felt as Christ did in verses 33 and 34? Wondering if God has somehow forgotten about your circumstance? By this account, it appears that even Jesus wondered if God had forgotten Him at this point in time. I believe this simply illustrates to us that Jesus has experienced everything that we experience. That He understands when we feel alone and forgotten! That is why is it so wonderful to know that He is the one who sits at the right hand of the Father interceding (pleading our case to God) for us. Many times in life, we just cannot understand why all the bad things seem to happen to us. And that's okay. God knows that we will at times doubt and wonder at these things. Scripture also tells us that we see through a veil while God sees clearly.

And yet as we read on in the Scriptures, we come to understand that what Jesus went through- all the horrible pain and agony- the feelings of being abandoned by the Father- were all for you and I. To give us the opportunity to experience GRACE (UNMERITED FAVOR) -SALVA-TION! Many times throughout our lives, we may not understand why we go through the hard times, but I can assure you that Jesus understands your hurt and pain, so much more than anyone else. And the great news is this: God did not forsake His Son, and He will not forsake you! This week, my prayer for each of you is simply that the God who set in motion the wonderful plan of Salvation will bless and watch over each of you this Resurrection Sunday.

April is Child Abuse and Neglect Awareness and Prevention Month

The Garza County Commissioner's Court has proclaimed April "Child Abuse and Neglect Awareness and Prevention Month," making Garza County a part of this national effort. The proclamation was designed to remind local residents of the roles they should play in keeping local children safe and families strong.

The proclamation pointed to the 68,000 Texas children who were confirmed last year as abuse victims and the 280 Texas children who died from abuse and neglect.

"Child abuse and neglect is something that we fight year 'round, but April is especially important," said Greg Cunningham, Child Protective Services spokesman. "Child abuse is a crime that hides in the dark, but if we take this opportunity to shine a light on the problem, we can find the children that need our help."

"Abuse is abuse," Garza County Victim's Advocate Jayta Cravy explains. "Whether it is verbal or physical, it is abuse and it all does damage. She encourages anyone who needs help to take action now.

To heighten public awareness of child abuse and neglect, the Garza County Child Welfare Board is asking the public to "Go Blue" on Wednesday, April 7. You are encouraged to wear a blue shirt, dress, tie, or ribbon to encourage individuals to support children and families.

According to the Child Abuse and Prevention Treatment Act, the following minimum standards are included in the definition of child abuse and neglect:

• Neglect is the failure to provide for a child's basic needs (physical, educational and/ or emotional). Of course, certain situations are not always viewed as neglectful. Sometimes incidences are influenced by cultural values, community standards of care or poverty. In these situations, the family is in need of information or assistance. When a family fails to use the information and resources provided and the child's needs continue to be unmet, further child welfare professional intervention may be necessary.

 Physical abuse is injury as a result of any physical action that harms a child. Injuries can range in levels of severity, from minor bruises to severe fractures or death. Such injury is considered abuse even if the caretaker did not intend to do so.

 Sexual abuse includes any sexual activity with a child: fondling, penetration, incest, rape sodomy, indecent exposure and commercial exploitation through prostitution or the production of pornographic materials. Emotional abuse is any pattern of •

behavior that impairs a child's emotional development or sense of worth, including criticism, threats, rejection or withholding love or support.

Abuse can be reported locally through the Garza County Victims' Assistance Program, 495-2479 or 495-5511 or the Sheriff's Office, 495-3595. You can also report abuse to Women's Protective Services in Lubbock, 747-6491 or 24 hours a day at the Child Abuse Hotline: 1-800-252-5400.



This Week in Post City

It is always enjoyable to look back through past editions of The Post Dispatch. Of course, we get a little taste of past news in "Yesteryears" each week; however, the advertising in this newspaper through the years is as much a "blast from the past" as the news items.

Here's are some of the ads that appeared in The Post Dispatch in January of 1996.

Ada Lou Bird at LaPosta had a "Wall-to-Wall" sale. Her advertising slogan was: "La Posta makes you look like you're Suposta!"

Lily Dale's on E. Main St. had a clearancesale. Chilipitin New & Resale in Manna Square advertised a "salebration." Caprock Boots on E. Main was also having a sale featuring belts, purses and jewelry. Danish Imports announced Coming Attractions for 1996: Fossil Dallas Cowboy Super Bowl watches, Department 56 Heritage Village Collections and Snow Bunnies as well as Aromatique's newest fragrance, Café au Lait.

Rosie's Restaurant, 507 S. Broadway, advertised that they were open 24 hours, 7 days a week and, among other specials, offered a \$5.00 Graveyard Chicken Fried Steak special every day between 10 p.m. and 2 a.m. Jim Jackson's Chaparral Steak House & Bar-B-Q featured a Texas Buffet, "all you can eat for only \$4.75."

Following this advertising history theme, I took a look at The Dispatch from 1982. Tanner's Trends for Men at 215 E. Main was having a January Clearance Sale featuring men's velour shirts 25% off; colored overalls for \$12 and corduroy overalls for \$15. Circle M Food Stores, 125 W. 8th used 2 pages of newspaper advertising for their Dollar Day Sale. A dozen eggs were 69 cents and a gallon of milk was \$1.69. Harold Lucas Motors, 111 S. Broadway had a 1981 jade green Monte Carlo on the lot for \$8,225.

ing, but he is recognized as being one of the first (if not the first) to realize the tremendous impact advertising could have on the public. This realization of the power of advertising would be a continuous thread through Post's endeavors beginning with his coffee substitute, Postum, and continuing to the establishment of Post City.

According to the biography, "C. W. Post Wilson, Jeremy Danial, Val-- The Hour and The Man," Post used more than print advertising to sell his products. In the fall of 1896 Post made a long lecture tour through New England on the subject of the powers of mental suggestion and proper diet. This same year Post was made a member of the London Society of Physical Research. His lecture tour provided the opportunity for individuals throughout New England to know him personally; realize his intelligence and honesty; and, at the same time, learn about his cereal products.

The biography also tells us that by 1904 C. W. Post "was considered an authority on advertising." English newspapers covered a meeting of advertising men who gathered in Battle Creek. Mr. Post's presentation was reported in full in several newspapers "across the pond," making him an internationally recognized authority on advertising. Mr. Post was chosen President of the American Association of Advertising several times.

Post used handbills and flyers to promote Post City and entice people to move to his planned community. Now, over 100 years later, the Post community is proof that adver- . tising works!



What's really driving the Toyota controversy?

How many congressmen does it take to identify the cause of a runaway Toyota Prius? No, it's not a trick question. A congressional panel issued a draft report recently on a case of supposed runaway acceleration in San Diego.

Why wasn't that left to the objective assessment of the police and courts? The answer to that question was made clear during recent congressional hearings on the Toyota recalls.

In February, Toyota executives were hauled in front of Congress, purportedly so that renowned auto experts like House Energy and Commerce Committee Chairman Henry Waxman of California could determine the cause of reported cases of unintended acceleration and evaluate Toyota's alleged failure to respond.

The hearings had the fingerprints of politics all over them. Indeed, it was uncanny how easily a careful observer could predict whether a given congressman would defend or deride Toyota. Just take stock of which pressure groups dominate his or her district.

Would you believe that Rep. John Dingell, D-MI, was highly critical of Toyota? Or that Rep. Henry Cuellar, D-TX, whose district is home to thousands of Toyota employees, came to the car company's defense?

The whole spectacle is a rogues' gallery of pressure groups descending upon Washington.

The United Auto Workers union showed up hoping to use Toyota's problems as leverage to force the company to keep open its sole UAW factory. Rumor has it that some in the UAW camp even hope to unionize all of Toyota's U.S. factories.

The trial lawyers are drooling at the prospect of parlaying Toyoda's apology into hundred-million-dollar awards. No need to wait for the evidence to come in, either as they have their own "experts" who already "know" Toyota is covering up pedals of doom.

And then there's the Detroit lobby, which is hard to distinguish from the government itself now that the government holds a 60 percent stake in General Motors. Even if concerns about an electronic problem in Toyota's vehicles turn out to be baseless, domestic manufacturers stand to benefit by prolonging the parade of bad publicity.

Anyone who thinks Toyota's executives were summoned to Congress to discuss the evidence concerning Toyota's vehicles has missed the point. Regardless of what we ultimately discover about Toyota, this was about a horde of pressure groups seeking to impose their economic agendas via political power.

But pressure groups are only a symptom. The cause is the government's power to intervene in the market to pick winners and losers. In the auto industry alone, the government controls everything from whom car companies can hire (unionized employees) to what kind of vehicles they must build (hybrids).

And elsewhere it decides which businesses are "too big to fail," which industries "deserve" massive subsidies, and which unproven technologies warrant billions of taxpayer "investment." That's a recipe for pressure group warfare.

This is not what Madison and Jefferson had in mind. Their vision was of a strictly limited government, which would perform one basic function, guard individual rights. Its role was to protect the individual's rights to life, liberty, and property from infringement by thugs and frauds, while otherwise leaving people free to produce and trade in a free market.

In the original American system, it's the job of the market to pick winners and losers, and the job of the courts, not Congress, to arbitrate disputes, such as that between Toyota and drivers harmed in accidents.

The truth is Toyota's troubles should not be a political issue. On a free market, Toyota would have to address the real or alleged problems with its cars and work to restore its reputation with consumers, or suffer the consequences.

And if the company were proved in a court of law to be guilty of negligence, it would be held accountable. In any case, there would be no need for the circus now taking place, with all its sordid political posturing and favor-trading.

So here's a proposal. Make Washington come up with a plan to disentangle government from the economy. It might even start with a congressional investigation.

Amid the clamorous debate over health care, how much have you heard from the doctors? Very little. Nobody's particularly interested in what they have to say. It's taken for granted that they'll always be there when you need them.

These are the forgotten men and women of American health care. They stand to one side, mostly silent, while self-important politicians noisily debate how to allocate "access" to health care. These legislators hold showy "summit" meetings of "stakeholders," where doctors are outnumbered by the poor, the uninsured, the already-sick, the health insurers, the drug companies, and big corporations like Walmart.

In this political universe of warring pressure groups, no tiny minority can expect to have much influence—even the minority that provides the services everyone is clamoring for.

their members' defense, it falls to the rest of us—those whose very lives may depend on a physician's skill and dedication—to consider some pointed questions our leaders won't ask:

* Are you content to have your doctor's professional judgment second-guessed and regulated by politicians?

* Should our legal system treat doctors like civil servants who are obligated to place their skills and intelligence at the service of every individual who happens to need medical care?

* When America's doctors have finally lost all freedom to treat patients as their professional judgment dictates, who will be left to provide health care in this country?

The debate over health care did not end with the vote; it's just moving into a new phase. It's past time for that debate to start taking serious account of the doctors—not as one pressure group among many, but as individuals whose freedom our government is duty-bound to protect. It's wrong to keep ignoring doctors' rights.

A grim sign for ObamaCare

How ironic that, even as the Senate debated the reconciliation "fixes" to ObamaCare, word came that Social Security has reached the so-called tipping point -- years ahead of schedule.

For the first time, Social Security will pay out more in benefits than it receives in tax revenue, to the tune of \$29 billion.

The reason: Continued high unemployment means there are fewer paychecks from which to deduct Social Security taxes. Meanwhile, many who can't find work are applying for benefits much earlier than they'd planned.

The so-called tipping point wasn't supposed to arrive until 2017, according to current congressional projections.

And it also means that the ultimate day of reckoning -- when Social Security runs out of money unless something is done to stabilize the system -- has been pushed ahead by four years, to 2037.

So is this really the time for the

US to be setting out on a trilliondollar entitlement adventure filled with so many unknowns and untested elements?

And, more important, whose ultimate financial impact on the skyhigh -- and still soaring -- national debt is open to so much question?

You'd think not.

But President Obama and congressional Democrats don't seem to have gotten the message.

Which is that even beyond the inherent costs of a system like So-

cial Security, unsettled economic conditions can have a swift and unexpected impact.

Budget estimators predicted that unemployment would average 8.2 percent last year and 8.8 percent this year.

Instead, it remains at about 10 percent.

No, Social Security isn't running out of money just yet: Thanks to some fixes a quarter-century ago and past robust economies, the system maintains a balance of \$2.5

trillion.

But with annual payments now running in the red, that balance will slowly be depleted.

And, by law, Social Security can't pay out more money in any given year than it has in its balance.

In other words, it cannot print money.

The same could well hold true for ObamaCare, once its payments fully kick in down the line.








