# Officials debate gun-carrying policy

Post ISD officials are in the process of considering whether or not to allow certain members of the staff and faculty at each of the district's campuses to carry a firearm.

On Dec. 14, 20-year-old Adam Lanza walked into Sandy Hook Elementary School in Newtown, Conn., and opened fire, fatally shooting 20 children and six adults in the second-deadliest shooting in U.S. history after the 2007 massacre

Less than a week after the Sandy Hook attack, Texas Commissioner of Education Michael Williams directed all school districts throughout the state to immediately address their respective district's plan to mitigate, prepare and respond to such an incident.

# **Changes** ahead

Qualifying for the May 11 school board and the Post municipal elections ended March 1.

The seats for Wards 1 and 2 in the city of Post will be uncontested, effectively re-seating incumbent Councilwomen Melba Cimental and Pixie Grisham, respectively.

City Manager Deana Watson said those two particular elections will be canceled since they are unopposed.

Mayor Archie Gill, who was appointed in October to fill the unexpired term of Thressa Harp, filed to retain his seat on the council.

Gill will face opposition from local business owner and political newcomer T.K. Thompson.

# **Daylight-saving time** begins this weekend

This weekend marks the beginning of daylightsaving time - the annual event lauded by businessowners and sunshine-loving residents, while widely criticized by those in the education community.


The official change will be in effect at 2 a.m. Sunday and dictates the time "spring forward" one hour to 3 a.m.

Since 2007, daylight-saving time was officially moved from the first Sunday in April to the second Sunday in March per the Energy Policy Act of 2005 signed by President George W. Bush.

While digital clocks on many personal computers, smartphones, tablets and other electronic devices will automatically adjust to reflect the semiannual change, residents are reminded manual clocks must be adjusted by hand.

Daylight-saving time will end at 2 a.m. Oct. 28, the last Sunday in the month, when the time will officially "fall back" to 1 a.m.

Electricity council expects another 'tight' summer

### Special to the Dispatch

AUSTIN - The amount of electricity available to serve consumer demand will be tight again this summer, according to information released this week by the Electric Reliability Council of Texas, which operates the power grid and manages the electric market for most of the state.

"Current estimates indicate that available to meet anticipated spring we likely will see very tight conditions on the hottest days," said Kent Saathoff, vice president of Grid

Operations and System Planning for ERCOT. "There is a significant chance that ERCOT will need to issue Energy Emergency Alerts and appeal to consumers to reduce their energy use on some of those days." ERCOT issued two reports Monday: the final Seasonal Assessment of Resource Adequacy for spring and a preliminary assessment for summer. Sufficient resources will be

well beyond expected conditions does not occur during the early part of the season when power plants are undergoing maintenance to prepare for summer.

The preliminary summer assessment anticipates a peak demand of 67,998 megawatts, based on a weather outlook similar to that of 2010 and a slower-growth economic outlook.


ERCOT officials anticipates 73,708 MW of generation capacity before accounting for power plant outages, which typically total about 2,600 MW during an operating day. One MW can serve about 200 homes

during peak demand periods. This assessment counts wind power at 8.7 percent of its installed capacity, and ERCOT stakeholders are currently evaluating whether to recommend increasing that capacity value based on performance in recent years.

"Although we expect to have more resources available for summer demands than we projected at this time in 2012, we also expect higher demand this year," Saathoff said.



Comeaux said there are a number of concerns that surround the allowance of firearms on campus and that school officials are investigating a number of alternatives to school safety. "We're exploring all of our options right now to ensure

the safety of our kids and employees," Comeaux said. "Our discussions are in the very preliminary stages, but we're looking at everything from allowing a certain number of teachers to carry a firearm to hiring more school police officers."

with ERCOT, said current trends call for a summer that is hotter and drier than normal.

"Although we don't anticipate prolonged heat waves like those in 2011, we expect conditions in many areas to be similar to 2012," Coleman said.

Power demands in the ER-COT region are highest in summer, primarily due to air conditioning use in homes and businesses. The ERCOT region's all-time record peak occurred on Aug. 3, 2011, when consumer demand hit 68,305 MW. Although the summer of 2012 was much milder than the recordbreaking conditions that marked the previous year, ERCOT still

in June, July and September. The final assessment for summer 2013 will be released in May. ERCOT will continue to assess conditions to determine if additional actions should be taken to help protect system reliability this summer. Those actions could include bringing "mothballed" units, resources that are not currently operating but could be brought back to operational status, back on-line for the peak season.

During its February meeting, the ERCOT board of directors approved a protocol revision that would authorize ERCOT to contract for these resources if the additional capacity would likely

be needed to prevent an emergency situation.

That same month, the board also approved changes to help ensure steps taken to protect reliability, including deployment of operating reserves, did not result in prices that did not reflect the scarcity conditions. Because generation companies in the ERCOT market are paid only for the energy they provide to the market, prices during scarcity conditions are designed to provide necessary revenues during fewer operating hours. If generators cannot recover their costs, they are unlikely to invest in new resources.

The Public Utility Commission of Texas in 2012 increased the systemwide offer cap, the highest price at which power can be offered into the market, to \$4,500 per megawatt-hour in August 2012, with annual incremental increases scheduled up to \$9,000 in summer 2015. The cap will go up to \$5,000 per MWh this summer. ERCOT also has set the cap as the price for units that are called upon in scarcity conditions.

Balancing supply and demand ERCOT has taken other steps in the past year to address ongoing resource adequacy concerns as electric demand grows faster than generation is being built to

serve those electric needs. These efforts focus primarily on encouraging consumers to use less electricity during the periods of highest demand.

A pilot program began in 2012 to encourage more consumers to provide Emergency Response Service by reducing their electric use within 30 minutes after receiving direction from ERCOT That pilot, which pays eligible participants for this service, has been extended through summer 2013. For the first time, residential consumers are now able to participate, through aggregators, in the grid operator's paid demand response efforts.

Other steps ERCOT has taken to support reliability focus on increasing consumer awareness of system conditions. Last summer, ERCOT launched the ERCOT Energy Saver mobile app that provides current load information and offers push notifications to consumers when conservation is needed. ERCOT also began posting non-binding real-time prices for the next hour on its website to increase awareness for consumers who may want to reduce their energy use when wholesale prices are expected to rise.

Efforts to encourage investment in new generation continue both at ERCOT and the PUC.

# A variety of homestead exemptions could lower your property taxes!

A homestead exemption lowers the property taxes on your home by lowering its value. If your home is valued at \$50,000 and you receive a \$15,000 homestead exemption, your home will be taxed as if it were worth \$35,000.

# Who qualifies for an exemption?

Anyone who owns a home on Jan. 1 and uses it as a primary residence on that date is entitled to a \$15,000 homestead exemption to lower school taxes. It doesn't matter if your home is a house, condominium or mobile home. Counties, cities and special taxing districts may also offer homestead exemptions.

# Are other exemptions available?

If you're disabled-or if you're 65 years old or older-you are entitled to an additional \$10,000 school tax exemption on your home. And if you qualify for the 65 or older or disabled exemption, you're also entitled to a permanent, locked-in "ceiling" on the school property taxes on your home. The county, city or junior college may adopt a tax ceiling for 65 and older or disabled homeowners. The age 65 or older homeowners school tax ceiling transfers to the surviving spouse, if the spouse is 55 years of age or older at the time of death and lives in and owns the home. The age 65 or older homeowners (or their surviving spouses 55 years of age or older) also may transfer the percentage of school tax paid, based on their former home's school tax ceiling to a new home.

If you're a disabled veteran who receives from the Veterans Affairs (VA)---(1) 100 percent disability compensation due to a service connected disability and (2) a rating of 100 percent disabled or a determination of individual unemployability. you are entitled to an exemption from taxation of the total appraised value of your resident homestead.

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

# **Remember to "Render!" Taxable property renditions** are due April 15.

# Does this apply to you?

If you own tangible personal property that is used to produce income, such as the equipment or inventory owned by a business, it does.

# What is a rendition?

A rendition is a report to your county appraisal district that lists all of the taxable property that you owned or controlled on Jan. 1 of this year. This often applies to furniture, fixtures, equipment or inventory owned by a business.

# What are the advantages of filing?

- You give your opinion of your property's value.
- · You record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will go to the right address.
- If your property's value depreciated, you can file a report of decreased value.

# What is the deadline?

- The last day for filing 2013 renditions is April 15.
- An automatic extension is available if requested in writing by the April 15 deadline
- The chief appraiser may grant an additional 15 days after the deadline for an owner-who shows good cause in writing.

No. If you had a homestead exemption on your home in 2012, you won't need to reapply for 2013 unless your chief appraiser requires it. However, if you haven't received an exemption on your present home-or if you've moved to a new home-you'll need to file for an exemption for 2013. If you are 65 this year, you may file for the age 65 or older exemption up to one year after the date you turned 65. And if you became disabled, you need to file for the disabled person's exemption.



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

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# **Nancy's Notions** Walking is the best excercise for diabetes

xercise is something most of us love to A hate. But there is good news: Walking is one of the safest and easiest ways to get the

It's cheaper than a gym membership, more fun than a stationary bike, more convenient than swimming, and easier on the muscles, joints, and feet than running. Research shows sustained, regular exercise, like walking, reduces the risk of several life-threatening diseases, in-

cluding heart disease, stroke,

such as yard work, or energetic housework. (I know, I snickered at this one too but that is what the research reported.)

Walking should be refreshing, not an ordeal. Make walking fun. Consider whether you want to walk a certain distance (say to the post office) or whether you want to walk continuously for a certain number of minutes. Choose the pace you want to walk and stick with it. Appreciate the considerable health benefits you're racking up.

The faster you swing your arms as you walk, the faster you'll be able to walk, since your arms and legs move in sync. To swing your arms faster, bend your elbows at a 90-degree angle rather than letting your arms hang down at your sides, and don't let your hands swing higher than chest level.

When walking, push off with the balls of your feet, and take quicker strides, not longer ones, since extending your normal stride can cause low-back pain. Your body will automatically choose the right stride length that works best for you. Remember, keep your head up, shoulders back, and chest out to maintain a comfortable upright posture.

you have muscle cramps, leg pain, breathlessness or extreme fatigue. It's best to walk with someone else, just in case you need extra encouragement or a reminder to check your blood sugar while exercising.

## Oatmeal and **Apple Muffins** Serves 8; serving size: 1 muffin

1/4 cup egg substitute 2/3 cup whole-wheat flour 2 tsp baking powder 2 tsp cinnamon 1 tsp nutmeg 1/2 cup nonfat milk 1 cup raisins 1peeled, cored, and chopped apple 1/4 cup natural unsweetened applesauce 2/3 cup rolled oats 4 Tbsp Splenda Brown Sugar Blend

Preheat oven to 400° F. Beat egg substitute. Sift together flour, baking powder, cinnamon and nutmeg. Combine all ingredients, mixing just to moisten. Spoon batter into muffin cups until 3/4 full. Bake for 15-20 minutes.

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# Springer bill targets 'government overreach'

## Special to the Dispatch

AUSTIN — Rep. Drew Springer, R-Muenster, on Tuesday filed HB 2416, "The Shopping Bag Freedom Act" to give retailers and consumers the freedom to give and receive plastic and paper bags across the state and stop the overreach of big government.

As of last Friday, businesses in the city of Austin will no longer be able to distribute single-use bags to any of their customers. This means visitors to the capitol city will soon have to bring reusable bags with them if they intend to make purchases on their trip.

At a time of economic recession and with food prices at an all-time high, this hidden social-tax on the poor will cause many to have to choose between necessary items such as milk and bread or having a reusable bag to carry their groceries. "This act is just the latest example of government elites trying to step between the business and consumer in an attempt to push forward a misguided nanny-state agenda," Springer said. "It is all for show, plastic bags make up just 0.6 percent of Austin's litter, and in San Francisco litter from bags actually increased after enacting their ban." There are also health concerns associated with the use of reusable bags. A study by Home Food Safety Program found that only 15 percent of Americans wash their reusable bags, a prob-

lem that has led to spikes in E. Coli poisoning in places such as San Francisco and Washington D.C.

"They can't expect everyone will wash their bags regularly," Springer said. "This policy puts uninformed populations at risk of serious illness and even death. Even if bag hygiene was realistic, why mandate people to waste more water on laundry in a time of severe drought in the region and state?"

This initiative will cause

the city to use another halfbillion gallons of water per year if people properly wash their bags after use. Not only is this bad for conservation efforts, but it will serve as yet another monthly expense for all citizens of Austin.

"This type of government overreach must be stopped here and now," Springer said. "If a municipality can ban bags, what is to say they won't mandate how large a soda can be or how much salt one can put on their food."





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
