He served on a number professional organizations, including president of the County Judges and Commissioners Association of Texas, the West Texas County judges and Commissioners Association and the Texas Association of Counties.

Lee Norman, who succeeded Dalby as county judge, said Dalby set a high standard to follow.

"I think we can equate Judge Dalby's legacy in the late 20th and early 21st centhe late 19th and early 20th centuries," Norman said. "Both were visionaries and set high standards for how they wanted this country, as rough and raw as it is, to grow. Many people, including myself, felt like Judge Dalby was the heart and soul of Garza County just as much as Mr. Post was."

Dangers of distracted driving

ith technology at their fingertips, drivers are constantly faced with distractions, such as talking or texting, which places their safety and that of others at serious risk. April is National Distracted Driving Awareness

awareness of the dangers associated with distracted driving and to encourage Texans to put down their cell phones while driving.

Distracted driving is becoming increasingly common and dangerous, causing traffic crashes and fatalities. This deadly trend is widespread in Texas, where nearly one in four crashes involves driver distraction, according to TxDOT. In 2011 alone, over 81,000 Texas crashes involved distraction in the vehicle, driver inattention, or cell phone use. Sadly, 361 of those crashes were fatal. Cell phone use contributed to 3,147 crashes, 40 of which were fatal.

Drivers can be distracted by conversing with other passengers, eating, smoking, manipulating dashboard controls, reaching for something in the vehicle, and talking or texting on a cell phone. Among the many distractions drivers face on the road, cell phone use is one of the most common and a major cause of distracted driving traffic accidents and fatalities. At any given moment during the daylight hours, over 800,000 vehicles are being driven by someone using a handheld cell phone, according to the National Highway

Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA).

Teen drivers are more likely than other age groups to be involved in a fatal crash where distraction is reported. This age group has the largest proportion of drivers who were distracted; 11 percent of all drivers under the age of 20 involved in fatal crashes were reported as distracted at the time of the crash. In Texas, 46 percent of urban teens and 52 percent of rural teens talk on a cell phone while driving, and nearly the same percentage text while driving. (Texas Transportation Institute).

"Drivers simply do not realize the dangers that are posed when they take their eyes and minds off the road and their hands off the wheel and focus on activities other than driving," said Carol Rawson, TxDOT's traffic operations division director. "Talk. Text. Crash." reminds Texans of the consequences associated with distracted driving. Eliminating distractions and putting away their cell phones while driving can and will save lives."

The "Talk. Text. Crash." campaign aims to reduce distracted driving, not only for National Distracted Driving Awareness Month, but throughout the year.

Your local Texas A&M AgriLite Extension Service agents remind drivers to put away their cell phones and wait until they arrive at their destination to use their phone.

Although cell phone use is the most easily recognized distraction, all in-vehicle distractions are unsafe and can cause crashes or fatalities.

Keep your eyes on the road and arrive alive.





Hard to keep info away from the public

n occasion, we must file a request for information. The process is easy and the outcome is usually the same. The entities cooperate.

When an instance does occur, it is usually out of ignorance of the law and not a deliberate attempt at keeping information from the public.

Below are some questions and answers related to the Public Information Act as

provided by the Texas Attorney General's Of-

What is the Public

Information Act? The Public Information Act, formerly known as the Open Records Act, is located at chapter 552 of the Gov-

ernment Code. The Act BLACKBURN provides a mechanism

for citizens to inspect or copy government records. It also provides for instances in which governmental bodies wish to, or are required by law to, withhold government

records from the public. What types of records are subject to the Public Information Act?

Any information collected, assembled, or maintained by or for a governmental body is subject to the Public Information Act. The format (paper, electronic, microfilm, etc.) of the record does not affect its status as a public record.

What is a "governmental body"?

For purposes of the Public Information Act, the term "governmental body" encompasses all Texas public entities at the state and local levels. It does not include the judiciary. Private entities may be considered governmental bodies if they are supported in whole or in part by public funds or they expend public funds. The Public Information Act does not apply, however, to private persons or businesses simply because they provide goods or services under a contract with a governmental

How do I make a public information request?

The request must be in writing and must be addressed to the governmental body. While the request does not need to be addressed to any particular person, it is a good practice to clearly label your correspondence as a "Public Information Request" or "Open Records Request." Requests sent via fax or email must be addressed to the public information officer or to the person designated by that officer to receive such requests.

How long does the governmental body have to respond to my request for information?

The Act provides that a governmental body must respond "promptly" to a request for information. If a governmental body is unable to produce the requested information within ten business days, the officer for public information must send you correspondence certifying that he is unable to do so and he must set a date and time when the records will be available to you.

May a governmental body ask me why I want the records?

No, a governmental body is forbidden from inquiring about the purpose for which the records will be used. However, if a request is unclear or very broad, the governmental body may ask the requestor to more clearly identify or narrow his or her request. Additionally, a governmental body may require additional identifying information to determine that the requestor is eligible to receive certain types of information.

When may a governmental body refuse to release the information I request?

If the information you request falls within one of the exceptions to disclosure found in the Public Information Act, the governmental body may refuse to release the information while it seeks an open records decision from the Attorney General. Unless the governmental body has a previous determination from a court or the Attorney General regarding the precise information requested, a governmental body cannot determine on its own to withhold information.

Mama loved long stories

T t was one of those days. The kind when L you have a lot of work to do and none of it you want to do, so you just piddle.

Tink and I both were piddling. He had a script for a pilot to write, and I was rewriting the content for my website. Both creatively "stuck," we sat in our office — he in a cushiony

rain that came then - just as I set about serious work -Tink picked up the diary on the coffee table. It was Mama's.

And that is where the piddling ended and the story began.

My niece Nicole had convinced Mama to do a journal of her life, the kind you purchase and it asks questions such as, "What was your childhood like?" Mama, storyteller she was, plunged right into the task when Nicole gave her the journal. She loved to talk about herself.

Tink began reading. In a moment, he chuckled. I looked up and he said, "Long story." He pointed where Mama had been

writing about a romance previous to Daddy and about the break-up. When she ran out of page, she wrote in big, scrawling letters, "Long story."

I laughed. "Believe me, it wasn't because it was a long story that she didn't tell it, because the longer the story the better she liked it. It was too long to write."

That was Mama. She didn't get in a hurry when she was telling a story. She began at the beginning, looped lyrically through the middle and always dramatically ended the story. No amount of prodding, fussing or begging would get her to shorten a story.

"Mama, just skip all that," I would say from time to time. I enjoyed her stories, especially when on a long drive because she would talk from the moment we left the driveway until we arrived hours later wherever we were going. Listening to her stories made time pass quickly. But there were times, of course, when I was in a hurry and I'd want her to get to the point. Imagine this — she ignored me. She kept on telling her

story just as she intended. I would roll my eyes, heave heavy sighs or throw my arms wildly in the air, yet she didn't bat an eye. She kept right on at her leisurely pace. She didn't even get flustered.

One afternoon, Rodney stopped by Mama's for something. As he was leaving, she commenced one of her tales. He kept edging out the door. Finally, he made onto the porch and down the steps but she had followed after him, never missing a lick in the telling of the tale. He shifted his weight from one foot to the other. Then, authoritatively, he looked at his watch and took charge.

"OK, Bonelle, it's 4:30 and I've got to be at Wednesday night church at 6. Can you finish by then?"

Mama lived 10 minutes from the church's front door. She paid him no attention. She continued on until, at last, she had the story told as best she could.

Mama, frugal in every other way, did not believe in an economy of words. The way she saw it, the longer a story took, the better it was. In truth, though, Mama was not a boring storyteller. She was artful and had a sense of timing crucial to the telling of a good story.

"Have you ever told a short story in your life?" I asked one day during one of marathon length.

She twisted her mouth tightly as oft she did when annoyed.

"If it's too short, it ain't worth tellin'. Why waste the time?"

And you know what? She was absolutely right.
