Dry and getting dryer

POST - The United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) released an update to the country's drought monitoring status and although it is very dry in this region, there are worse places to be than here.

Garza County, listed as a D1 level drought (see graph), the very northwest corner of the county is listed as a D2 level, which is the beginning of severe drought.

Garza is ringed on three sides by severe conditions and not too far to the west is the D3 area around Lubbock and further north is the Amarillo area, which is listed as exceptional drought or a D4 level.

According to Victor Ashley of the Garza-Borden County Farm Service Agency, the area is bracing for what's down the road.

"If we hit a D2 for eight consecutive weeks, we get a declaration from the state," he said. "That would open up relief in the way of emergency loans from the USDA."

Farmers and ranchers would have to document a number of things to qualify.

Gov. Rick Perry re-instated a disaster declaration several weeks ago, which includes Garza and some surroundings counties. Some 108 counties across Texas have been designated primary natural disaster areas, according to a Farm Service Agency release dated Jan. 17th, 2014. Perry issued a similar declaration back in 2011.

The 2014 Farm Bill allows for losses to be recouped from as far back as Oct. 1, 2011 to provide assistance to "livestock producers who suffered grazing loses to drought and fire."

"(The) USDA is determined to make implementing the livestock disaster programs a top priority and plans to open program enrollment by April 15, 2014."

Garza County fiscally healthy

POST - The Garza County had full plate of the usual county fare for business in their most recent meeting. But two items will catch most reader's attention.

The first being the fiscal health of the county's bookkeeping abilities while the second has to do with capital crimes committed in Garza.

The certified public accounting firm of Bollinger, Segars, Gilbert and Moss have deemed that a lion's share of how the county conducts their business is good and the overall state of the county's are healthy.

While the summary of the year's long audit that began in 2012 and finished last fall was a lengthy one, it did not point out any glaring errors in the way the country conducts their record tracking.

ver given much thought to the common cold? I bet you do when you have one. When we hear "there's no cure for the common cold," what we're not hearing is there are more than 200 varieties of the cold virus.

According to the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases, an adult will get between two and five colds per year with the majority coming between September and May. Children - with perhaps more exposure to

germs (or lack of habits to prevent transmission of germs) - can get as many as

Scientists continue to discover new viruses which cause colds.

seven to ten colds a year.

Colds are most contagious about two days before symptoms start and during the early stages of illness.

The average cold lasts from two to 14 days. Coughs, sometimes a symptom of a cold, can persist up

to six weeks.

You can make yourself more resistant to cold viruses by exercising, reducing stress, getting good sleep and washing your hands frequently.

During the course of a cold, there are some things you can do to hasten the illness:

Days 1 to 2

There are no symptoms as the virus incubates in the body.

Days 3 to 4

The first signs of the cold often include a tickle or soreness in the throat and many times a runny nose, sneezing and chills. Getting as much rest as possible, relieving the symptoms with over-the-counter medicine and drinking plenty of fluids are good ways to get back on

Days 3 to 5

The head and sinuses become very stuffy and there is much sinus and chest congestion. You should continue to drink fluids and rest as much as possible. Steam inhalation and elevating your head to rest will help relieve sinus pressure.

Days 6 to 14

Most symptoms subside but a cough can persist for weeks. It's fine to return to normal activity and continue to treat your cough.

Maybe the most important thing to realize about colds is that there is not much you can do outside of what's been mentioned. Not even your wonderful doctor can do much for you, so you might save the time and money by riding it out at home.

If someone in your family has a cold, odds are that the whole household has been exposed. You might as well prepare to go through the cycle.

At the beginning of the winter, I was ill about six out of eight weeks at one point. It was awful. I believe I had around four colds, but it's hard to tell. The cough was the worst part. I guess it comes with the territory when you're around as many youngsters as I am...

Tyler Canady reviewed the summary in about 30 minutes of corrections and future suggestions, most of which are caused by minor changes in accounting practices.

David Copeland had the task of reviewing the report itself, which again, had nothing stand out that would jeopardize the county's financial standing.

At one point, County Judge Lee Norman pointed out that the county enjoyed a rather healthy standing with the Standard and Poor's rating system.

"A rating of two by Standard and Poor's is good," he said. "We sit at 2.14 on that scale. The county may be a little top heavy in the debt ratio, but the Dalby Unit keeps the tax burden low."

The county does knowingly carry a sizeable amount of debt, but because of the revenue generated by the correctional facility, it does not adversely effect the citizen's tax rate.

Commissioners cepted the report as it was presented.

In a second issue, commissions renewed a cooperational program with the regional public defenders for capital cases group out of Lubbock.

Individuals charge with capital murder can use this system to provide for representation if they cannot afford an attorney of their own choosing.

gram comes from the Texas Indigent Defense Commission grant program. This is a cost-sharing program.

Under the rules, counties who participate in this program essentially have a place to assign a lawyer for these case and those cost associated with the trials are then shared by the TIDC. There is a sliding scale over the first five years of the program.

The inter-local agreement sets forth the rules by which the program operates and the conduct of the lawyers involved.

> While city and county officials would like to clear such items off the delinquent rolls, they would like to do so "at cost" and neither side wants to incur the burden of fees and such in the process.
