# Talks continue on ATV trails

SPUR - The saga that is White River Lake ATV proposal has continued with the second public hearing in as many months held last month.

Understandably, there are proponents and opponents of this \$1.1 million proposal by the Texas Parks and Wildlife proposal.

At the crux of the issue on the side of the White River Municipal Water District are the needs to provide four communities and the surrounding area with sustainable water.

When the water levels are up, the recreational boating and fishing crowd is very happy and the WRMWD receives an average of \$60,000 in additional revenue annually.

However, when the lake is in its current state and this part of the state is suffering through yet another extended drought, that revenue is just as dry as the lakebed.

According to Tom Fulton, manager at the water district, something on dry land needs to happen to replace those

missing revenues.

According to TPW officials who have spoken at recent meetings, none of the currently state funded projects have failed to meet grant guidelines.

"We have given out grants totally some \$60 million," said Steve Thompson, who is with the Off Highway Vehicle office of the TPW. "Over the 21-year history of the program, none of them have failed. It's just never happened."

There are under 100 motorized trail programs across the state. Of the 80 or so annual applications TPW processes in a year, only about eight of them are for motorized trails.





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

Do a search for "boring playgrounds," and you'll see that people everywhere are unhappy about the way things have changed in the name of safety.

The capitalist part of my brain (damaged in just one playground concussion) just kicked in. Why not revive dangerous playground equipment and market it to parents who would like to let their children have fun and take risks and maybe even break a radius or an ulna or suffer a mild head injury? Or why not build an old-fashioned playground somewhere and make it a destination point for traveling families?

Fabrication should be easy. When nothing is plastic, you don't need molds. Everything I remember from my grade school playground was built of wood painted green and steel painted silver. The most complicated piece of equipment was the merry-go-round. The janitor no doubt kept the bearings greased.

Here's to a return to the good stuff for the good of children everywhere!

And may that woman's book be an instant hit.

# Legends

emember our three part series on the infamous "Postite" Monte Bridges? Well, to refresh your memory, Monte was convicted of two slavings (July 1, 1934) of 48 year-old Jay Donaldson and 20 yearold Miss Bertha Gordon. He was given a 50year prison term of which he appealed and in a second trial held in Dawson County the conviction was upheld. Apparently he only received seven years for killing Miss Gordon. Officers believed the murder occurred in the car that Sunday afternoon as blood stains were found on the seat and windshield, and a bullet hole through the side of the car. The bodies were then tossed out on highway 84 about four miles from Post. Lying on the ground between the bodies

was a .45-caliber revolver. Even though Bridges was convicted twice, he filed several appeals and the sentence stood until a Judge Kreugaer found there may have been an error, hence Monte's sentence was for only 20 years. According to record, the original opinion was amended to read 20 years

Bridges had already killed Mr. I. Nathan, a prominent businessman on a street in Post on March 9,

1924. A verdict was returned as not guilty. Well here we are with a total of three people dead, a 50 year sentence that was reduced to 20, and the man is still free as a bird. So he goes to Borger and murders another gentleman, Mr. Fred English a hotel proprietor. He then leaves the country and ends up in San Bernardino, California where he walks into the Sheriff's office and asked to be arrested. He was extradited back to stand trial for the manner, honest and a "devilishly hard worker."

Ella was 19 years old when Louis married her in Post on February 22, 1919. They moved into the Lubbock Hotel in Lubbock, Texas. It was there that their son Louis Jr. was born.

Howard's engineering skills allowed him to prosper as a road contractor in West Texas. But as an architect, maybe not so good. He began building a new \$25,000 house for his family, but it turned out to be an architectural freak, for when the builders finished the front porch faced the back garden, while the back door welcomed all visitors on the residential street. Disturbed with the outcome but undaunted, the Howards moved in. Their daughter Jan was born in the new home. They had been married nine years at that time. Another five years of their union endured, though none too happy and in 1933 Ella filed for a divorce charging Howard with "cruel and harsh treatment" toward her during the year prior to the filing of the suit.


When the divorce was granted on March 17, 1933, the myth that the Howards were rich exploded in the face of Lubbock townspeople.

In the community property settlement, Ella got half of the bedroom suite, the family car, and \$925 representing half of the money realized from the sale of exempt furniture, and \$125 for the children.

Howard moved off to Austin and Ella took the children and moved to Fort Worth.

Ella had been divorced for two years when she met T. Karl Simmons who blew into Fort Worth one day from his nearby stock ranch at Bixby. He had gone to see a friend who had a horse for sale. The friend introduced him to Ella and they began seeing each other regularly. Apparently Ella was still very beautiful, husbandless, and to a strong man with a roving eye, the poor girl was to be pitied. Her father had died and her mother had remarried and moved out of Texas. Her brother was in dreadful trouble. Ella was struggling to support her children, but now she had Simmons strong shoulder in which to lean on as she whispered the story of her black sheep brother, Monte Bridges, whose difficulty lay in his trigger finger, and was quick on the draw. Simmons spent a great deal of time in Fort Worth, becoming a familiar sight to many of the residents of the town. He stood by Ella handsomely, contributing money from his oil company, even financing Monte Bridges' defense during his murder trails. However, all the while, he was extremely discreet in his relationship with Mrs. Howard and no one-least of all his wife-suspected his extramarital interest. My Goodness! What a rake. Now the plot thickens.
