## Hudman family to be honored by THC

68 years in the making, businesses in original locations

*Editor's note: This is the first of a two-part story celebrating a notable Post business family and their history. After the award ceremony, we will publish part two.*

POST - In this day and age of consolidation and corporate buyouts, it is a celebration waiting to bring to light a local business that is over 65 years old and in its third generation of ownership.

The Texas Historical Commission (THC) will recognize the Hudman Furniture Company and the Hudman Funeral Home as a Texas Treasure Business Award winner. This program pays homage to businesses that have provided

employment opportunities and support to the state's economy for over 50 years.

Hudman Furniture has done just that for the past 68 years, continuously and at the same location. It has always been in the family and is currently owned and operated by Curtis and Richard Hudman, father and son.

Hudman Funeral Home, also run by Curtis and Richard, has also been in the family for the same length of time and has a historical connection to C.W. Post, founder of Post, which was founded in 1907.

In 1912, Post saw his home finished on the west end of Main Street, which is the current location of the funeral home since 1948.

Post never resided in the elegant home with its solid oak doors, majestic stairways with curved banister, leatherette wallpaper and grand archi-

tectural style. Stonemasons Scotty Sampson and Jimmy Napier, who Post brought in from Scotland, built five fireplaces in the home.

The home has been recorded as a Texas Historical Landmark as of 1964.

Victor Hudman was

the originator of the business and had returned from World War II with his brother Marvin. They founded the business in December 1945.

The current and only location was formerly a car dealership and garage.

Victor, who was stationed in San Diego as a

naval dentist, came home after his discharge to join in the transformation of the building.

In 1972, Marvin retired from the business and sold his stake to Curtis and his wife Julia. Curtis and his dad formed a partnership, and in 1995,

## Post Lopes take on Denver City in playoffs

The Post Antelopes will open their post-season campaign against Denver City Friday at 7 p.m. at the Lubbock Estacado field. The second game will be Saturday at noon followed by a game three if necessary immediately following.

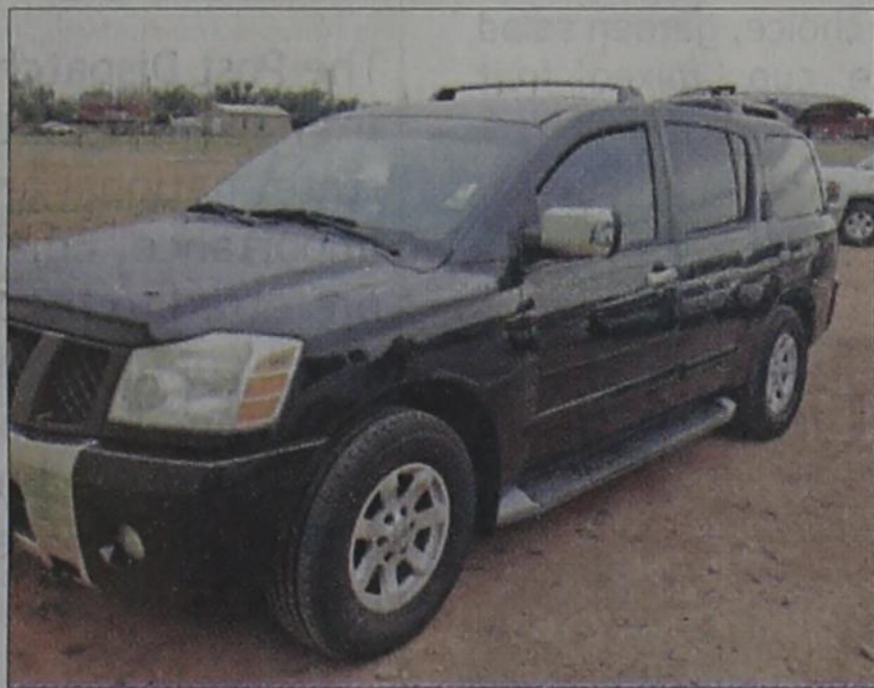
Post is the #3 seed in the tourney and the Mustangs are the #2 seed from their district. Denver City was involved in a three-way tie for the district title, along with Brownfield and Lamesa all with 6-2 district records.

After a coin, Brownfield was the odd man out and received a first game bye. Denver City and Lamesa locked horns on Monday with the Mustangs coming out on top 7-5, having stalled a late game rally by Lamesa, who scored their five runs in the last three innings of the contest.

Brownfield is not the district champs after then defeated DC Tuesday night, 3-2.

Post has an overall series record of 4-3 this season over their bi-district opponents, but has not seen Denver City this season.

The Lopes are 14-9 on the season.

POST - The keen eyes and a curious nature of an anonymous citizen helped in the capture of a human trafficking suspect Saturday afternoon.

A 2004 black Nissan Pathfinder was rolling through Post about mid-afternoon when someone noticed the tail end of the vehicle riding a little bit too low to the ground, with heavily tinted windows added to the truck.

The tipster called Garza County Sheriff's office around 3 p.m. to make the report and the truck was pulled over a short time later headed north on US Highway 84.

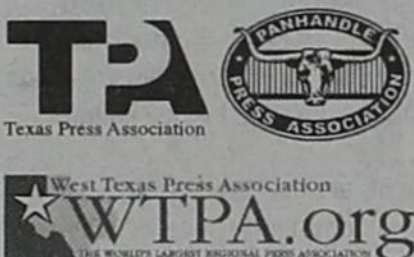

## Letter to the Editor

### Save our trees

Several weeks ago I visited with the City Manager concerning watering the trees at the City Park because they are dying. She was very nice and they started watering the trees the next day. The trees have not been watered since. The same scenario happened a few years ago. The trees were not watered but once and 1/3 to 1/2 of them died. They were cut down; some of them were big decades-old shade trees; as are these dying now. I asked a city person about watering them and was told that the Park trees might not get any more water, that someone complained about watering the trees because they could not water the trees and grass at their residence.

Now let us talk. The trees at the park are watered out of the lake and have never been watered with city water. The water in the lake will only evaporate and do no one any good. They only watered the trees and not the grass (not that it would matter) because the grass will come back if it ever rains. Dead trees will not.

Everyone in town can, if they wish, enjoy the park trees. Many people passing through Post stop at the City Park, I know this because I am down there six days a week walking with my wife, who unlike me likes to walk. The trees at your home are for the most part enjoyed by you only. No one wants their trees to die, I understand this and if you have a lake, water your tail off.

I was not told and did not ask who complained about the watering. I should have asked because obviously they did not know the Park was watered out of the lake and if I knew them, I could have laughed with them about talking about something they knew nothing about. Which I have done more times than I can count. If they did know the Park was watered out of the lake there must have been a misunderstanding.

It is depressing and aggravating to watch trees die needlessly, especially in West Texas; we have so few trees. I am going to continue to try to get the trees watered. It may be too late for some of them. If I am successful and you see water going at the park and have any questions or would like to discuss this I am in the phone book.

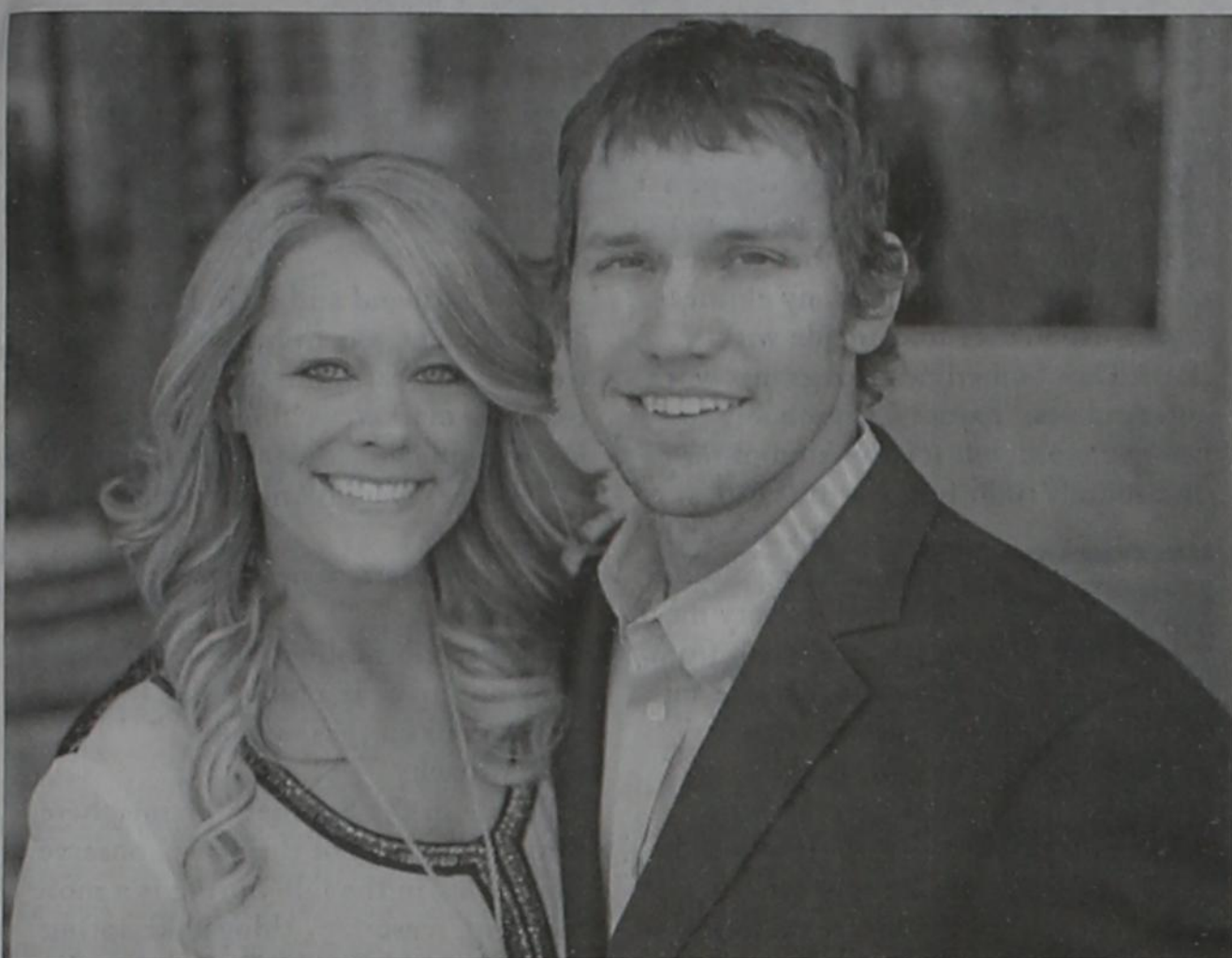

## Wilder's Nature Journal Inside the silk tent

Tent caterpillars build tents - no joke, they really do. They weave a silk web on the branches of trees, which works and is shaped like a tent. Inside the tent there are different chambers with thick and thin walls for regulating temperature. Each chamber can let in heat according to the thickness of the walls. The tent keeps the caterpillars from freezing in the spring, and from frying in the summer.

Sometimes there are so many they just look like one big clump and I can't count them. They are considered pests because the large groups can eat all the foliage on a tree preventing fruit and killing the tree. They like small fruit trees best, especially plums.

Eventually in the summer they turn into moths, which lay their eggs in the fall in the same place where the tent was. When it warms up next year in the spring, another generation of caterpillars will build the tent again.

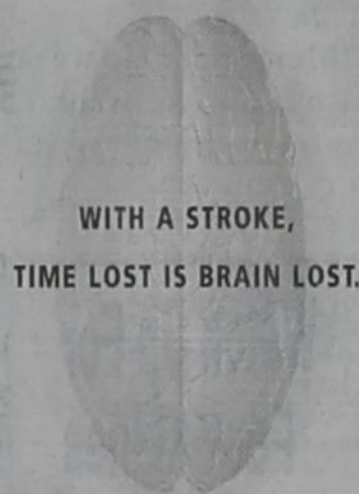

# The Paperboy Enemy of the State?

Republican or Democrat - Are you happy with our government?

Back to clotheslines and Earth Day. Why not make it a global day for people to dry their clothes outside?

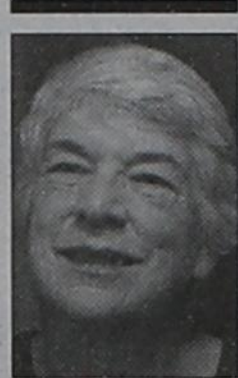

# Garza County Sheriff's office says "Click it or Ticket"

POST - The Garza County Sheriff's office wants to remind motorists to "Click it or Ticket". In order to enforce this reminder, the GCSO will be stepping up enforcement beginning May 19, 2014.

GCSO's efforts are part of a larger, national "Click it or Ticket" mobilization that runs May 19 to June 1, 2014. As motorists take to the roads to celebrate the long Memorial Day weekend, law enforcement officials across the nation will be ensuring that everyone buckles up.

"Memorial Day weekend kicks off summer vacation season and we want to ensure that everyone arrives

at their destination safe and sound," said Sgt. Henry Benitez. "If you are not wearing your seat belt, you will be ticketed."

According to new data released from the Department of Transportation's National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) fatalities are up nationwide for the first time in five years. In 2012, 10,334 people who were killed in motor vehicle crashes were not wearing their seat belts. NHTSA data also details how more traffic vehicle deaths occur at night. In 2012, 61 percent of passenger vehicle occupants killed during the nighttime hours of 6 p.m. to 5:59 a.m. were not wearing their seat belts.

"We are determined to help bring these numbers

down," said Garza County Sheriff Terry L. Morgan. "There are too many people dying on the roads, and many of those deaths could have been prevented if people took the simple step of wearing their seat belt."

"Locally, Garza County has already recorded its first death due to the vehicle occupant not being secured by a seatbelt. Many of these deaths could have been prevented if people had buckled up. We will be handing out ticket year-round to those who still haven't gotten the message," Morgan said.

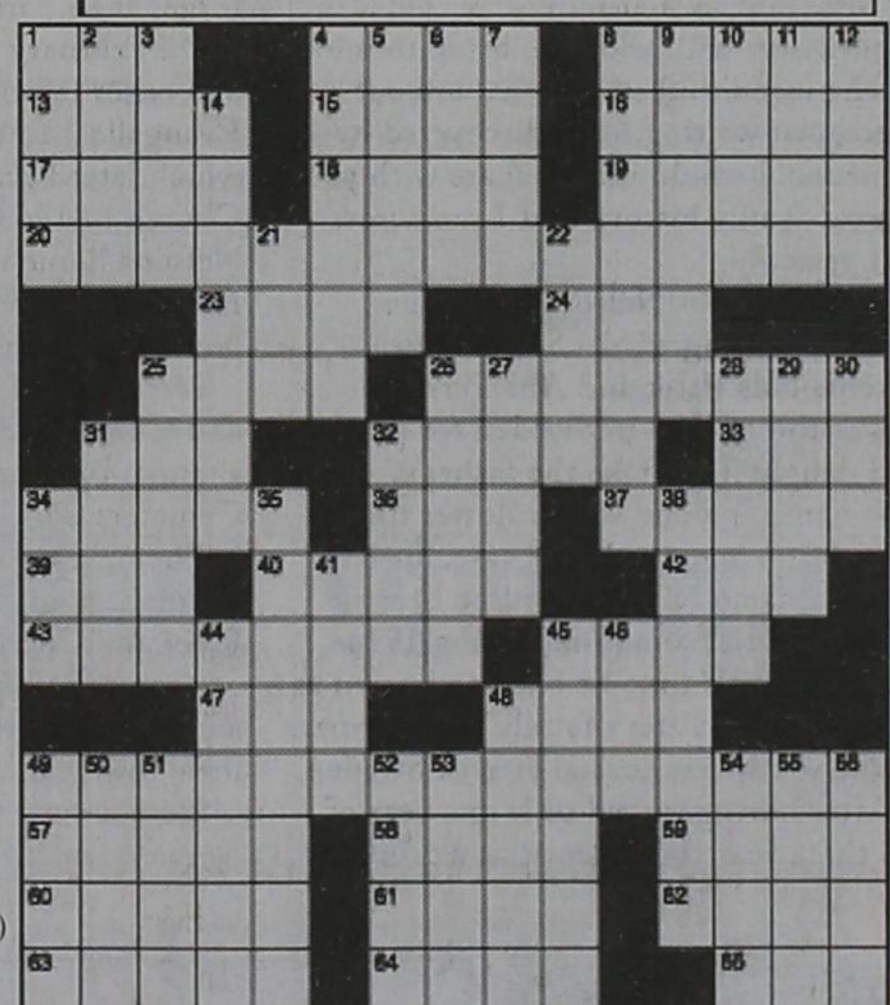

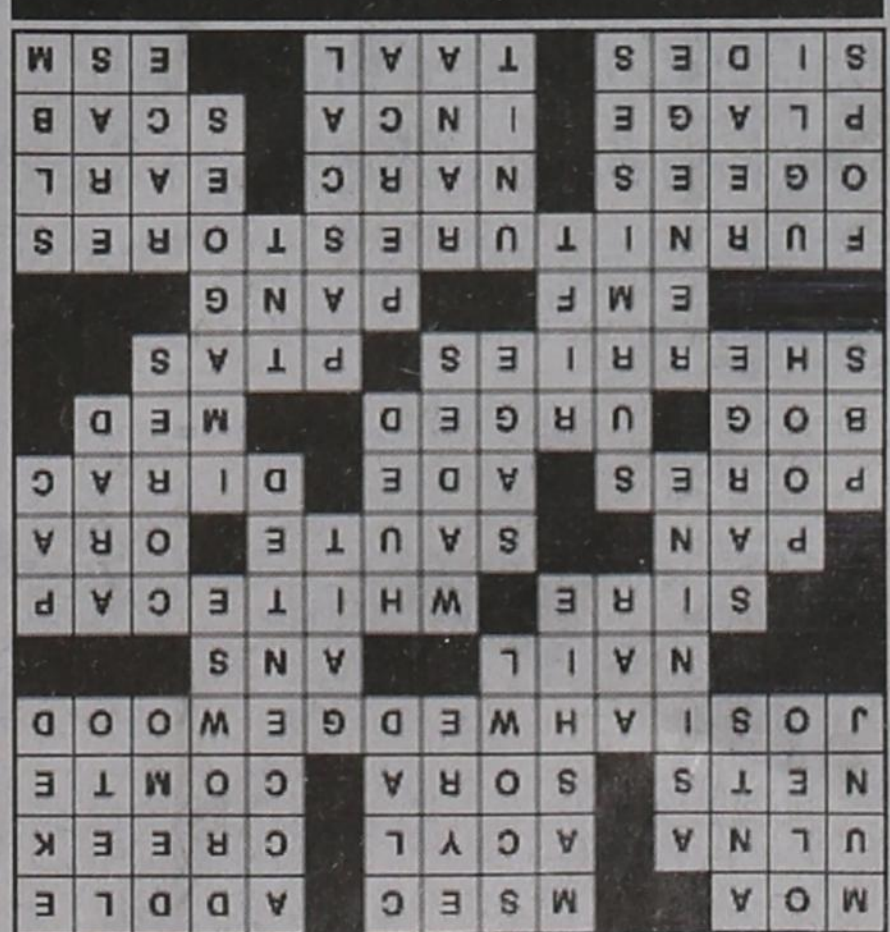

## Legends

Have you ever thought about the number of people you have become acquainted with or associated with through business or just in passing? Wow, that would be in the zillions if you happen to be even close to my age. But you know, we quite possibly, only remember a small portion of those people by name. I so want to remember all of my teacher's names, but in reality, I only remember two. That doesn't mean that I didn't like the other teachers. Now Miss Towrey, she was different, and was my fifth grade teacher. I remember her because she was young, cute, and probably was in her first year of teaching. We girls were all going

to grow up to be just like her. Now Mr. O'Hara, my freshman algebra teacher, well my memories of him are a little different. Poor Mr. O'Hara was bald as could be, and behind his back the kids referred to him as "Mr. No Hair." One day in class several students had their hands up to ask a question, me being one. After a long wait, while I was day-dreaming; I have a very short attention span. Finally Mr. O'Hara recognized me and said, "yes Linda", in which I replied respectfully, "Mr. No Hair" and the crowd went wild. Well needless to say, I never forgot that little incident or Mr. O'Hara.

My point in sharing my "personal" experiences with you is to bring to mind, all the wonderful stories that are out there, just waiting to be discovered by someone. I would like to share with you a great family history that I ran across just yesterday.

Peter Magnus Nelson, born June 3, 1863 in Bingsgarde, Sweden, to parents Nils Peter and Ana Persson. It was the custom in Sweden for sons and daughters to take the father's first name and add son or dotter for their last name. In Peter's case, his last name became Nilsson until he became Americanized sometime during 1914-1920 at which time he became known as Peter Nelson. Peter's family were farmers in the southwest coastal area of Sweden.

After having served only one year of his three year compulsory service in the

Army, Peter was granted permission by the King of Sweden to be released from military service in 1888 to allow him to sail to America.

He settled in the Clifton, Texas area as he awaited the arrival of his betrothed, Christina Carlsdotter in 1889. They were married March 15, 1891. After they were married, they made their first home on a farm near Hereford, where Peter purchased land for 50 cents per acre. He dug water wells to pay for his land. Peter and Christina had seven children before they sold the land to return to Sweden in 1901. They had promised his family to return for a visit.

While in Sweden they enrolled their children in a Lutheran school since they only spoke English. Friends and neighbors were anxious to hear stories about the United States. Peter and Christina had three more children while there, unfortunately one only lived less than a year and was buried there in Sweden.

On May 28, 1907, they boarded the ship Celtic and set sail for New York. They settled in Norse, Texas where they had one more child and lived there for a few years until they moved to Post in 1914. They had heard of Post through friends and made their way by wagon.

The Nelsons made their home at Close City in 1916. Many thought they were Germans since they built their barn so big. Their children attended the close City School. Peter insisted they speak Swedish at home so they would not forget their parent's native language.

On February 20, 1917, the Nelsons and other families formed the Evangelical Lutheran Trinity Church, which later became Faith Lutheran Church in 1963. They met in the Nelsons home with the first pastor being Rev. A.L.E. Weber. He later became the Nelson's son-in-law.

Peter died of a stroke August 8, 1933 and Christina died February 17, 1939 of anemia. Both are buried in the Terrace Cemetery.

The next time I am at the cemetery, I'll make a point of visiting the graves of Peter and Christina Nelson to just take a moment to honor them for their life and travels all the way from Sweden to a little town called Post City, Texas.

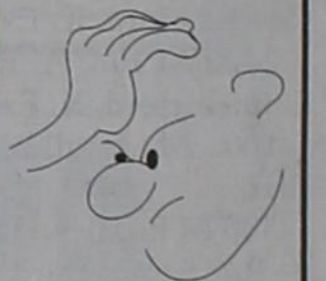

of Palm Springs, CA, officers became suspicious about the other 14 passengers in the vehicle.

As the questioning progressed, according to the Deputy Sheriff Henry Benitez, the driver claimed the passengers were farm workers being transported from one facility to another.

None of the individuals, except Montano, could produce an identification of any sort. Further questioning revealed two minors in the group and most of the individuals were in the country illegally from Mexico, El Salvador and Guatemala.

Montano told officers his cousin was the farm owner.

"He told me they were his cousin's work crew on a farm and he was taking them to another farm in New Mexico," Benitez said.

"Other individuals had different stories on where they were going," he said.

Assisted by other law enforcement officers from Texas Parks and Wildlife, U.S. Border Agents, Department of Public Safety officers and Garza County Constables Office, the 12 adults and two minors were detained and eventually transported to holding facilities in Lubbock.

One of the minors was a 15-year-old Mexican National, while the other was a 17-year-old from Guatemala.

Agent Victor Griffin of the US Border Patrol said this type of intervention is only possible when the

public notices these kinds of activity.

"We are very grateful to the citizens of Post and Garza County, as well as the law enforcement officials there," he said.

"Without the help of these citizens, our job becomes very difficult," he said. "We believe this group came out of the Houston area and the individuals were destined for California and other places."

Montano was arrested and charged with 14 counts of human trafficking and was to be arraigned in federal court in Lubbock on Tuesday.

"It is highly unusual for us to get the coyote and a package of this size in the same incident," Benitez said. "Most of the other offenses involve four or five individuals."

In a May 3 letter to Wesley Burnett, managing director of the Post Dispatch, County Judge Giles Dalby indicates an error was made in the process of advertising the county's request for proposal (RFP) for prison management. "The public notice should have been posted for 30 days before the deadline for delivery of proposals to the Commissioners Court, as directed in Section 351.102 of the Texas Local Government Code," Dalby wrote in his letter. "It was my understanding from prior requests from proposals sent out that the one I authorized was correct. I take full responsibility for this error".

### 20 years ago

Many people scoffed when the Old Mill Trade Days owners Marvin and Sheree Butler claimed their dream would draw 10,000 people to Post. They aren't scoffing now Marvin said the first ever Old Mill Trade Days didn't fall far short of the 10,000 prediction made by he and his wife. "We had approximately 7,000 paying adults," said Butler. "Add the children under 12 who came in free with an adult, the vendors, their helpers and then another 1,000 or so who came in the north gate without paying, we came pretty close to 10,000. Old Mill Trade Days began April 28 amid much hoopla under sunny skies and concluded May 1. In between, there was rain, mud, cloudy skies and more sunshine. Marvin said the rain may have slowed things a bit, but was really "no problem."

### 30 years ago

A group of 22 Post residents attended a public hearing last Thursday evening concerning this year's city street paving project. Property owners on affected streets asked about payment schedules for their portion of the curb and gutters, along with a few questions about individual problems. City council members

were also quizzed by property owners whose streets are not on the paving list this year, asking when their streets would be paved.

### 40 years ago

Bank rains brought nearly two inches of moisture officially to Post this week, giving cotton farmers some hope at last of getting a 1974 crop planted and bringing smiles to ranchers' faces while doing wonders to their ranchlands. According to reports received by The Dispatch, the rains, which started last Friday night, were quite generally over the entire county with some portions of the county receiving even more than the in town measurement here. Lewis Herron, farm representative of the bank, told the Dispatch Wednesday morning while light rain continued to fall that while more rain continued to fall that while more rain was needed, the rains already received had "really improved the irrigated cotton situation."

### 50 years ago

The Post Public Schools have just made their best showing in history in the South Plains Science Fair, and congratulations are due not only the youthful winners, but also their teachers and the school administration as well, all of whom have combined to bring the schools' science department up to a high standard. Post's top honor was won by Elisabeth Tubbs, a high school junior, and by winning first place in the high school physical science division she has earned for herself a trip to the National Science Fair in Baltimore, Md., where her project will be on display. And, in the primary division, Mrs. Lucille McBride's room from the Post Elementary School won the top award with an exhibit on "How Plants Grow." So, from the bottom to the top—from the lower grades through the high school division of the regional Science Fair—the Post Public School's exhibitors did themselves proud.

fund will match it with four dollars.

Each of the four commissioners were asked to put together a short list of roads and bridges that would qualify for the funding. Each precinct has a different amount of total roadway and bridges to account for.

Once projects begin, the county must provide the state with monthly billing statements showing the work being done. TxDOT will then turn around and reimburse the cost with in 30 days.

The county is responsible for all aspects of the projects and will perform a final inspection to be forwarded to the state.

Garza County can also ask for assistance from the

local TxDOT office for expertise in engineering, as the county does not employ such a person.

"This is going to be a good thing overall for 20 percent of what it will normally cost. We need to be frugal with the taxpayer's money," said Ted Bannon Pct. 3 Commissioner.

The number of roads and the exact mileage are still being calculated at this time.

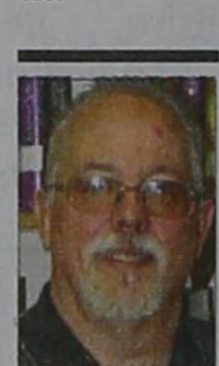
### Throw 'da bum out
