Save our trees

Several weeks ago I visited with the City-Manager concerning watering the trees at the City Park because they are dying. She was very nice and they started watering the trees the next day. The trees have not been watered since. The same scenario happened a few years ago. The trees were not watered but once and 1/3 to 1/2 of them died. They were cut down; some of them were big decades-old shade trees; as are these dying now. I asked a city person about watering them and was told that the Park trees might not get any more water, that someone complained about watering the trees because they could not water the trees and grass at their resi-

Now let us talk. The trees at the park are watered out of the lake and have never been watered with city water. The water in the lake will only evaporate and do no one any good. They only watered the trees and not the grass (not that it would matter) because the grass will come back if it ever rains. Dead trees will not.

Everyone in town can, if they wish, enjoy the park trees. Many people passing through Post stop at the City Park, I know this because I am down there six days a week walking with my wife, who unlike me likes to walk. The trees at your home are for the most part enjoyed by you only. No one wants their trees to die, I understand this and if you have a lake, water your tail off.

I was not told and did not ask who complained about the watering. I should have asked because obviously they did not know the Park was watered out of the lake and if I knew them, I could have laughed with them about talking about something they knew nothing about. Which I have done more times than I can count. If they did know the Park was watered out of the lake there must have been a misunderstanding.

It is depressing and aggravating to watch trees die needlessly, especially in West Texas; we have so few trees. I am going to continue to try to get the trees watered. It may be too late for some of them. If I am successful and you see water going at the park and have any questions or would like to discuss this I am in the phone book.

ent caterpillars build tents - no joke, they really do. They weave a silk web on the branches of trees, which works and is shaped like a tent. Inside the tent there are

different chambers with thick and thin walls for regulating temperature. Each chamber can let in heat according to the thickness of the walls. The tent keeps the caterpillars from freezing in the spring, and from frying in the summer.

Sometimes there are so many they just look like one big clump and I can't count them. They are considered

pests because the large groups can eat all the foliage on a tree preventing fruit and killing the tree. They like small fruit trees best, especially

Eventually in the summer they turn into moths, which lay their eggs in the fall in the same place where the tent was. When it warms up next year in the spring, another generation of caterpillars will build the tent again.


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The Paperboy Enemy of the State?

Garza County Sheriff's office says "Click it or Ticket"

POST _ The Garza County Sheriff's office wants to remind motorists to "Click it or Ticket". In order to enforce this reminder, the GCSO will be stepping up enforcement beginning May 19, 2014.

GCSO's efforts are part of a larger, national "Click it or Ticket" mobilization that runs May 19 to June 1, 2014. As motorists take to the roads to celebrate the long Memorial Day weekend, law enforcement officials across the nation will be ensuring that everyone buckles up. "Memorial Day weekend kicks off summer vacation

season and we want to ensure that everyone arrives

at their destination safe and sound," said Sgt. Henry Benitez. "If you are not wearing your sear belt, you will be ticketed."

According to new data released from the Department of Transportation's National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) fatalities are up nationwide for the first time in five years. In 2012, 10,334 people who were killed in motor vehicle crashes were not wearing their seat belts. NHTSA data also details how more traffic vehicle deaths occur at night. In 2012, 61 percent of passenger vehicle occupants killed during the nighttime hours of 6 p.m. to 5:59 a.m. were not wearing their seat belts.

"We are determined to help bring these numbers

down," said Garza County Sheriff Terry L. Morgan. "There are too many people dying on the roads, and many of those deaths could have been prevented if people took the simple step of wearing their seat

ave you ever thought about the number of people you have L become acquainted with or associated with through business or just in passing? Wow, that would be in the zillions if you happen to be even close to my age. But you know, we quite possibly, only remember a small portion of those

people by name. I so want to remember all of my

teacher's names, but in reality, I only remember two. That doesn't mean that I didn't like the other teachers. Now Miss Towrey, she was different, and was my fifth grade teacher. I remember her because she was young, PUCKETT cute, and probably was in her first year of teaching.

We girls were all going to grow up to be just like her. Now Mr. O'Hara, my freshman algebra teacher, well my memories of him are a little different. Poor Mr. O'Hara was bald as could be, and behind his back the kids referred to him as "Mr. No Hair." One day in class several students had their hands up to ask a question, me being one. After a long wait, while I was daydreaming; I have a very short attention span. Finally Mr. O'Hara recognized me and said, "yes Linda", in which I replied respectfully, "Mr. No Hair" and the crowd went wild. Well needless to say, I never forgot that little incident or Mr. O'Hara.

My point in sharing my "personal" experiences with you is to bring to mind, all the wonderful stories that are out there, just waiting to be discovered by someone. I would like to share with you a great family history that I ran across just yesterday.

Peter Magnus Nelson, born June 3, 1863 in Bingsgarde, Sweden, to parents Nils Peter and Ana Persson. It was the custom in Sweden for sons and daughters to take the father's first name and add son or dotter for their last name. In Peter's case, his last name became Nilsson until he became Americanized sometime during 1914-1920 at which time he became known as Peter Nelson. Peter's family were farmers in the southwest coastal area of Sweden.

After having served only one year of his three year compulsory service in the Army, Peter was granted permission by the King of Sweden to be released from military service in 1888 to allow him to sail to America.

He settled in the Clifton, Texas area as he awaited the arrival of his betrothed, Christina Carlsdotter in 1889. They were married March 15, 1891. After they were married, they made their first home on a farm near Hereford, where Peter purchased land for 50 cents per acre. He dug water wells to pay for his land. Peter and Christina had seven children before they sold the land to return to Sweden in 1901. They had promised his family to return for a visit.

While in Sweden they enrolled their children in a Lutheran school since they only spoke English. Friends and neighbors were anxious to hear stories about the United States. Peter and Christina had three more children while there, unfortunately one only lived less than a year and was buried there in Sweden.

On May 28, 1907, they boarded the ship Celtic and set sail for New York. They settled in Norse, Texas where they had one more child and lived there for a few years until they moved to Post in 1914. They had heard of Post through friends and made their way by wagon.

The Nelsons made their home at Close City in 1916. Many thought they were Germans since they built their barn so big. Their children attended the close City School. Peter insisted they speak Swedish at home so they would not forget their parent's native language.

On February 20, 1917, the Nelsons and other families formed the Evangelical Lutheran Trinity Church, which later became Faith Lutheran Church in 1963. They met in the Nelsons home with the first pastor being Rev. A.L.E. Weber. He later became the Nelson's son-in-law.

Peter died of a stroke August 8, 1933 and Christina died February 17, 1939 of anemia. Both are buried in the Terrace Cemetery.

The next time I am at the cemetery, I'll make a point of visiting the graves of Peter and Christina Nelson to just take a moment to honor them for their life and travels all the way from Sweden to a

little town called Post City, Texas. See you next week.
